Three Year Pacts To School Chiefs

Board Renews Teacher Contracts

Approval of teacher contracts and extension of administrative pacts highlighted a regular monthly meeting of Slaton School Board Tuesday night. New three - year contracts were extended to Supt. J. C.

McClesky, athletic director Ernie Davis, the four school principals, and business manager Buford Duff. The superintendent's con

tract, still with two years to go, was extended one year while the others had two years added on to their one-year pacts. All current teacher contracts were offered one-year renewals. In other business, trustees

approved the textbook com mittee's report on adoptions for the 1970-71 school year, discussed a kindergarten program, studied a proposed ath-letic budget for next year, and approved bills.

supt. McClesky reported an average daily attendance of 1,782 students the past six weeks, compared to a total en-

rollment of 1,807. The school chief also reported that a kindergarten program with age and income limitations would be mandatory for the school to offer next term. Limitations are reduced each year and, according to state plans,

all children will be required to attend kindergarten by the 1977-78 term.

The program next term must be offered to "educationally handicapped children who are at least 5 years, 5 months old at the start of the school term. Attendance is voluntary, however.

For the purpose of the pro-gram, an "educationally handi-capped" child is defined as either-or: (1) A child who cannot read, speak and comprehend the English language to the extent that he is not familiar with the common English language words that are nec-

essary for normal progress in the first grade, (2) A child who is from a family whose annual income is \$3,000 or less.

A child who is not educationally handicapped is not eligible for enrollment in the kindergarten program until 1973-74.

The superintendent briefly discussed a "two-track" system in high school, with plans being made to start initiating the program next term. Idea is to offer vocational classes for students who do not plan to attend college after graduation. Although the local

assignment for next year will be increased about \$12,000, the superintendent was somewhat optimistic about the school district's financial condition.

"If we remain frugal for another year, I believe the district should reach a good financial condition," he told trustees, Teacher salary increases approved by the state, the new kindergarten program and other items will bring about the increase in the local funds needed, it was pointed out.

The proposed athletic budget given to the board for con-

ON HEELS OF HEAVY RAINS Snowstorm Hits Area

A massive late-winter snowstorm covered the Slaton area in a blanket of white Wednesday, adding more moisture on the heels of a heavy rainfall accumulation last Friday.

The weather forecast early Wednesday called for snow to ac-cumulate up to three inches. The late wintry blast was reminiscent of big snowfall ranging up to 13 inches on March 15-16 last year.

Thunderstorms and accompanying light shower activity had dumped almost three inches of moisture on the Slaton area Thursday and Friday, providing an invaluable boost to seasonal cover crops in the area and added significantly to the best underground moisture seasons in years.

The rainfall, reported by most residents as consistent throughout the area, ranged from 2.5 to 3 inches by most reports. Heavier amounts of 3 to 4 inches were recorded further south of Slaton and around the Post area.

Most farmers observed that the rainfall was "out of this world" insofar as area agriculture prospects are concerned. The good moisture base is expected to cut down on the necessity of extensive pre-irrigation come planting time for cotton.

Driving was slightly hazardous around the city Wednesday morning as snow continued to fall. Traveler's warnings were also posted around the area by the highway department.

The temperature dipped to 26 degrees here Wednesday morning after a low of 38 degrees Tuesday morning. High was predicted for 30 Wednesday, after the merc, y had climbed to a week's high of 78 on Monuay.

Dance Halls Target Of New City Law

Slaton City Commission took a big step toward control or elimination of "Honky tonks" with passage of a dance hall and public dances ordinance during a regular meeting Monday night.

Slaton Police Chief Walter Head had been seeking stronger legal means to combat the operation of such establishments. He emphasized that after-hours operation of some joints drew "undersirables" from other towns in the area. The new ordinance, passed on

first reading Monday night as an emergency measure, pro-

vides for the licensing of dance halls and spells out strict sanitation requirements on public dances.

In other business Monday night, the commission heard another citizen's complaint on sub - standard housing conditions, discussed the city's liability insurance coverage, discussed collection of delinquent taxes, and approved monthly bills.

Members of the commission attending were Mayor David Hughes and commissioners J. S. Edwards and Otis Neill.

Although Ordinance 334, concerning dance halls and public dances, goes into effect immediately, the commission voted to give establishments 30 days to comply with the new law. A legal notice on the ordinance is published in today's Slatonite, so enforcement is expected to start on April 11.

Steve Ruiz, along with his father, appeared at the commission meeting to lodge complaints about uninhabited houses in the southeast part of town. Ruiz said the buildings were a "menance to the health and welfare" of residents, pointing out that one boy had been bitten by a rat.

He further complained of homes where no toilet facilities were provided, not even an outdoor toilet. The mayor pointed that city law provides that houses within 150 feet of a sewer line must hook onto the line and have adequate toilet facilities.

The commission has dis cussed the sub-standard housing situation in previous meetings, and the mayor said some 75 such houses had been spotted in an unofficial survey. The commission has attempted to secure voluntary permission to

The full text of the dance hall ordinance can be read at city hall, but briefly it provides: All public dance halls shall be duly licensed; applications for licenses must be made at the city secretary's

office and the dance hall approved by the building in spector, fire marshal, city health inspector and the chief of police. It further provides for an annual fee of \$25 and a fee of

\$5 for each dance held; permits shall expire at midnight on week-days and 1 a.m. on dances starting on Friday, Saturday or Dec. 31; no dance hall permit shall be issued to any applicant not above 21 years of age, nor any applicant con-victed of a felony in the preceding 10 years.

The ordinance also provides for all dance halls to provide at least one ladies' and one men's rest room with specified facilities and maintained in sanitary conditions. Sufficient lighting is also required in such dance halls.

The provisions of the artici do not apply to private dances given at private homes by the owners or occupants, or to dances given by permanently organized clubs, societies or organizations were admission is restricted to the members and their guests.

The ladies restroom shall contain no less than two (2) flush valve commode type bathroom fixtures with running water attached. Dance Permits: In addition to the dance hall license required by Section 3 above, there shall be required

water. Both restrooms shall be furnished with one lavatory fixture with hot and cold running water attached and shall be furnished at all times with clean hand towels. In addition, the restrooms shall be swept clean of trash, dirt and debris and maintained in a sanitary condition.

The entire dance hall shall be swept clean of trash, dirt and debris and otherwise maintained in a state of repair essential to comply with building and housing codes of the City of Slaton.

The exterior of such dance hall shall be supplied with sufficient artificial lighting to fully illuminate entrances, exits and attendant parking areas. Such lighting shall be operating at all times while a dance is in progress past 6:00 o' clock p.m. The interior of such dance hall shall be supplied with sufficient artificial lighting to fully illuminate all portions of the interior premises. There shall be a switch, within six (6) feet of the entrance, by which lighting for all portions of the interior premises may be turned on and the interior illuminated. Such switch shall at all times be accessible and unlocked. the expiration of such permit

All rooms connected to the dance floor, or other portions of a dance hall, by a doorway shall remain accessible and unlocked during the conduct of a dance, with the exception of the cash or ticket office.

SECTION 8. Duty of Police Department:

It shall be the duty of any member of the Police Department of the City of Slaton to cause a dance hall to be fully vacated whenever any provision of this Article, or other applicable law or ordinance is violated or whenever any disorder is endangering the safety or welfare of the people there

All Ordinances previously passed pertaining to dance halls or public dances, and all other Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith shall be and are hereby repealed and superceded insofar as such conflicts exist; all Ordinances and parts of Ordinances not in conflict herewith shall remain in full force and effect. It is not intended that the provisions of this Ordinance shall conflict with specific offences provided by the Penal Code of the State of Texas or with any Civil Statutes of the State of Texas and in the event any penalty provided under state law is greater than the \$200.00 penalty herein provided, the provisions of the State law shall apply and control. SECTION 12, Separability:

If for any reason any section, subsection, sentence, clause or phrase of this Ordinance shall be held invalid or unconstitutional by any Court of competent jurisdiction, such portion shall be deemed to be a separate, distinct, and in-dependent provision and shall not effect the validity of the remaining portions hereof. SECTION 13. Emergency:

As the public convenience and necessity requires that this Ordinance be passed as an emergency measure, the rule requiring that no ordinance shall be passed finally on the date of its introduction is suspended, and this Ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure to take effect from and after its passage. The requirement for immediate passage as an emergency measure is due to the fact that many public dance halls are now in operation which do not provide adequate health, fire and safety precautions to their patrons, thereby exposing large numbers of the general public to health and safety hazards.

SECTION 14. Publication: The City Secretary is direct-

ed to cause the publication of this Ordinance as provided by the Charter of the City of Slaton, Texas.


