

#### Flores Elected At CAB Meeting

Jesse Flores, 400 S. 5th, was elected as a tract representative to the Lubbock County Community Action Board (CAB) Tuesday night at a meeting in

CAB meets the fourth Tuesday of each month. The board has 36 directors -- 12 appointed by governmental offices, 12 appointed to represent special interest groups, and 12 elected from various tracts.

Carroll McDonald of Slaton is also a representative on the board, appointed by county commissioner Max Arrants.

O'Brien Thompson, council member from Amarillo, objected to the Slaton grant, He said it would set a precendent and make it impossible for the council to turn down "another 150 cities if they had enough initiative to get in an applica-

tion." Warren Beasley, executive director of the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education, argued that police agencies in smaller towns frequently have a harder time getting funds from local sources.

Lakey, a 1968 graduate of Slaton High and a standout football player, is now hospitalized in Japan, according to a report received here by his mother, Mrs. Barbara Lakey. She said the extent of his injury was unknown.

Mrs. Lakey said her son had written her and said he expects to be transferred to a hospital in the United States as soon as he is able to travel. Lakey had been in Vietnam since October, 1969, and was wounded early this month.

A native of Arkansas, Mrs.
Lucy Butler came to Slaton
in 1924. She lived at 855 So.
16th St. before moving to the Slaton Nursing Home about sev-

en months ago. Named "Mother of the Year" in 1964 by Radio Station KCAS, Mrs. Butler raised eight children after one died at the age of 18 months.

Mrs. Butler was the oldest six children and was raised on a farm in Arkansas. She said she remembers there was school only three months of the year -- the hottest months in the summer. After her father was elected to the school board, they started a school called "prescription school" where they paid the teacher to attend. It was a six month a year school, Her father gave up farming and was employed later as a salesman for a timber company that made railroad ties and posts.

She married Wilson David Burchfield in 1906 but he died on their fourth anniversary with pneumonia. They had three

### **ImmunizationCampaign** Set Against Rubella

Plans are being made for a mass immunization campaign in Lubbock County for Rubella (German measles), it was announced this week,

Slaton Chamber of Com merce and BCD, with cooperating civic clubs, has agreed to the sponsor immunization campaign in Slaton,

The Lubbock City - County Health Department, in cooper-ation with the Lubbock, Crosby, Garza County Medical Society and the metro - Lubbock chapters of the National Foundation, is organizing a campaign for immunization of all school and pre-school children 10 years of age and under for rubella.

Vaccine for children 5-10 years old will be provided by the Texas State Health Department, and the 1-4 year olds be paid for by donations from individuals and local civic

The last great rubella epedemic, in 1964-65, killed 30,-000 babies and caused birth defects in 20,000 more. A child protected against German measles will not bring them to his mother, and she need never be haunted by the knowledge that this disease innocently transmitted from her to her unborn

The existence of a vaccine is not enough to stamp out a disease, however. The real danger of German measles is that the average person does not take it seriously enough. Many people know it only as threeday measles. Almost everyone thinks of it as a harmless, childhood disease, if they think of it at all. But this is not only a disease of children, and therein lies its danger.

About one woman out of 10 escapes German measles during childhood and therefore remains vulnerable into her childbearing years. German measles is dangerous if a woman catches it while she's pregnant. The first three months of pregnancy is the time this disease poses the gravest threat to the growing embryo. It can cause a miscarriage, a stillbirth, or a birth defect.

The symptoms of German measles are quite mild: lowgrade fever, a rash starting on the face and spreading down the body, swelling of the lymph glands in the neck. These signs may be so slight that a pregnant woman doesn't even know she's had the disease -- until her child is born with defects.

German measles is usually over in one to three days with no lasting effect, unless the victim happens to be an unborn child. Then the effects are lasting. Loss of hearing, impaired vision, congenitally damaged hearts and mental retardation are common among German measles babies. Many do not



### Deadline Near, Only Half Of

"With the April 15 motor vehicle inspection deadline five weeks away, only about 50 per cent of the registered vehicles have been inspected," stated Captain Alan Johnson, motor vehicle inspection supervisor of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

"Unless there is a rapid increase of inspections, it appears that many vehicles will not be inspected before the April 15 deadline. Any driver operating a vehicle displaying an inspection sticker on the right-hand side of the windshield after April 15 will be operating in violation of the

inspection law," Johnson added.
Johnson noted that this will be the last April 15 inspection deadline, because on Sept. 1, 1969 the Texas Legislature adopted a year-around inspection program. Inspections will come due one year after the current month of inspection. This will establish an anniversary month for each vehicle to be inspected and prevent the logjam of over six million vehicles

to be inspected at one time. The new inspection sticker will be placed on the left-hand side of the windshield. The number of the current month of inspection will appear on the sticker.

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
