## Clean-up Drive Begins Here

A general Spring clean-up drive is scheduled in south-east Slaton beginning Monday and continuing through May 27. All residents of the area are requested to cooperate, it was announced this week by Mrs. O. B. Allen.

Mayor David Hughes has authorized city support of the clean-up drive. Persons are asked to put old cars, trees, discarded furniture and other large items of trash or rubbish in the alleys to be picked up by city crews.

Mrs. Allen said she hoped many residents would take this opportunity to paint, plant grass and other projects which will help beautify the community. She also expressed appreciation for the cooperation received in this drive last Spring.

## Firemen Fight Blaze

Slaton Volunteer Fire Department joined Lubbock Fire Department units in battling a blaze at Lake Ransom Canyon about 6 p.m. Monday.

Fire destroyed a trailer house, heavily damaged an - other and razed the workshop of Betenough and Ham at Lake Ransom. Damage was estimated at between \$24,000 and \$30,000.

## Twin Tornadoes Leave Death, Damage in Area

Massive cleanup operations were underway this week and aid was being planned for storm victims after tornadoes left two 175-mile paths of death and destruction across the South Plains-Panhandle area.

The Friday night storms left at least 21 dead as the tornadoes

moved through Whiteface, Whitbarra, Anton, Cotton Center, Plainview, Silverton, Sherwood Shores north of Clarendon, Laxbuddle and Pampa. The injury list was near the 200 mark.

A preliminary estimate of \$5 million damage was made Sunday by representatives of

Gov. Preston Smith who flew over part of the devastated area and stopped in Plainview for a survey of the city with the most damage.

Slaton and the area was under the tornado alert, and many residents stayed up until the 3 a.m. "all clear" time came. Windy, dry days have dominated the weather picture here the past week.

Almost miraculously, no one was killed in Plainview. A trailer camp and lakeshore village near Clarendon was hardest hit by the fatality toll with 16 reported killed. Two were killed near Hale Center, two near Claytonville east of Kress, and one from Silverton.

Weather officials said the tornadoes spun out of "freak double tracks." The tracks were about 40 miles apart and were parallel, running in straight paths from the southwest to the northeast.

Plainview was preparing for a mock tornado Civil Defense exercise, set for Saturday, when a real funnel slashed into the city a day earlier.

Johnnie W. Moore, pastor of First Christian Church at Slaton, was honored as "Town and Country Minister of the Year" for the Christian Church in Texas during a state assembly Friday in Fort Worth.

He was presented the 1970 award in a session of the 83rd assembly of the Christian Church in Texas (CCT) in the theatre of the Tarrant County Convention Center.

Attending the assembly as delegates from Slaton were Mr. and Mrs. Moore, Elaine Moore and Mrs. Jim Newhouse. Moore's parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Moore of Muleshoe, were also in Fort Worth to witness the award presentation.

In accepting the award, Moore told the assembly: "No minister earns this award himself. More often churches produce preachers, rather than it being the other way around. . . certainly, that has been true in my case. If some of you don't think your minister is enough of a minister, maybe you should try being more of a church."

Moore and his wife, Amrina, have four children -- Cheryl, 14; John David, 13; Melody, 11, and Tim, 6.

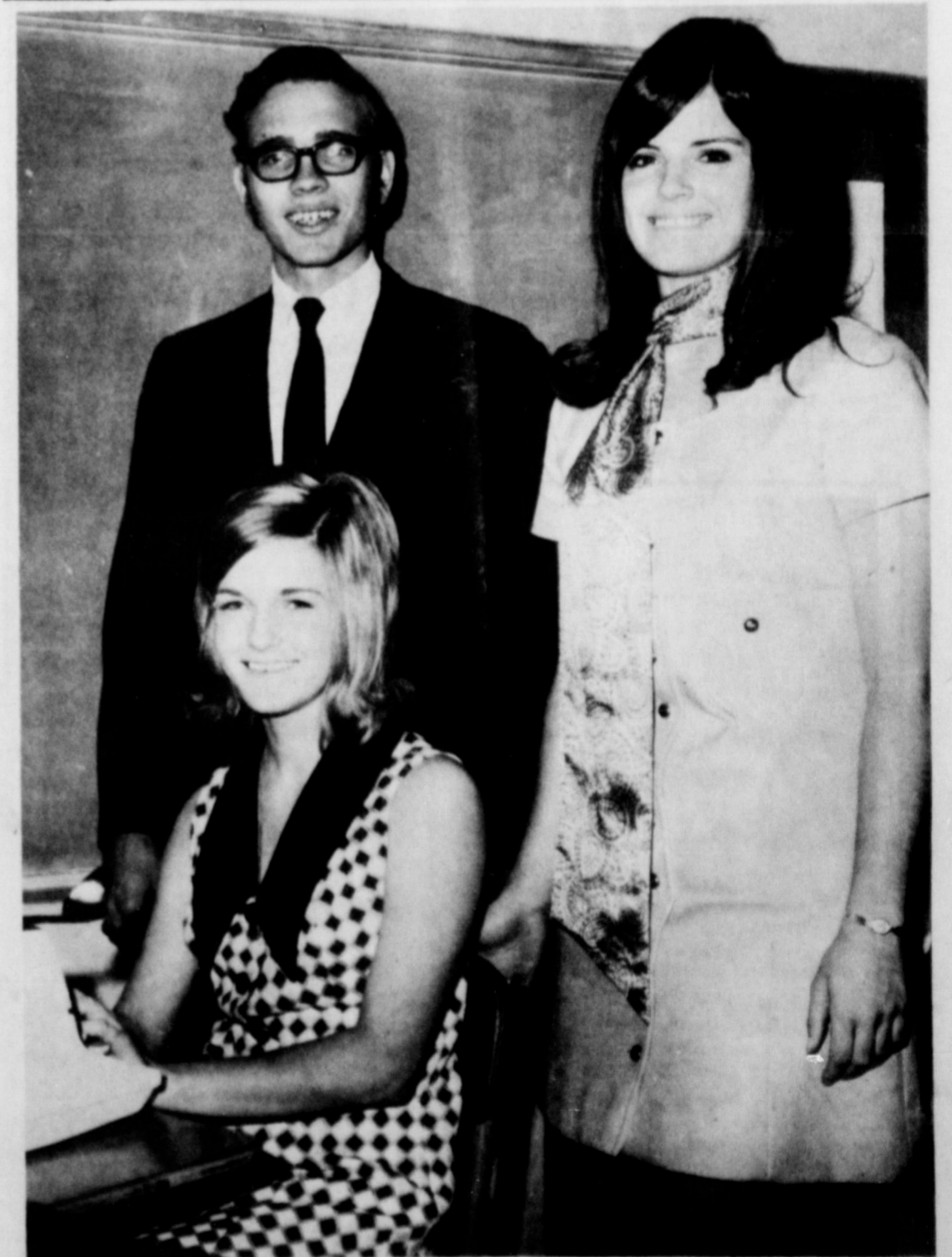

Behind the Badge

Of the many safety features incorporated in late model automobiles, apparently the most misunderstood and misused is the head restraint.

According to the Texas Safety Association, people seem to have got off on the wrong foot by thinking of the safety devices as "Head Rests."

TSA General Manager Lloyd F. Palmer, releasing the results of a recent informal visual survey, warned motorists, "Head restraints are not built or designed for use as a pillow."

"They are designed to prevent the head and neck from being thrown backward during rear-end collisions to minimize

whiplash - caused injuries. In order to do this, head restraints should be adjusted so that they are centered at the back of the head--not at the neck."

Slow - motion studies of rear-end crash situations show that the head can be thrown backward in as much as a 90 degree angle, causing severe injury. The head restraint, when adjusted properly, can reduce such injuries, commonly called whiplash.

The Texas Safety Association says the recent survey showed a large proportion of Texas motorists are leaving the head restraint adjusted where it would strike the back of the neck if a rear-end collision were to occur. Leaving the restraint in that position could result in a major injury. The head restraints became standard equipment on 1969 model automobiles.

What, if any, is the relationship between viruses and human cancer? Research scientists are trying to find out. Help them by giving to the American Cancer Society. The answer could save lives.

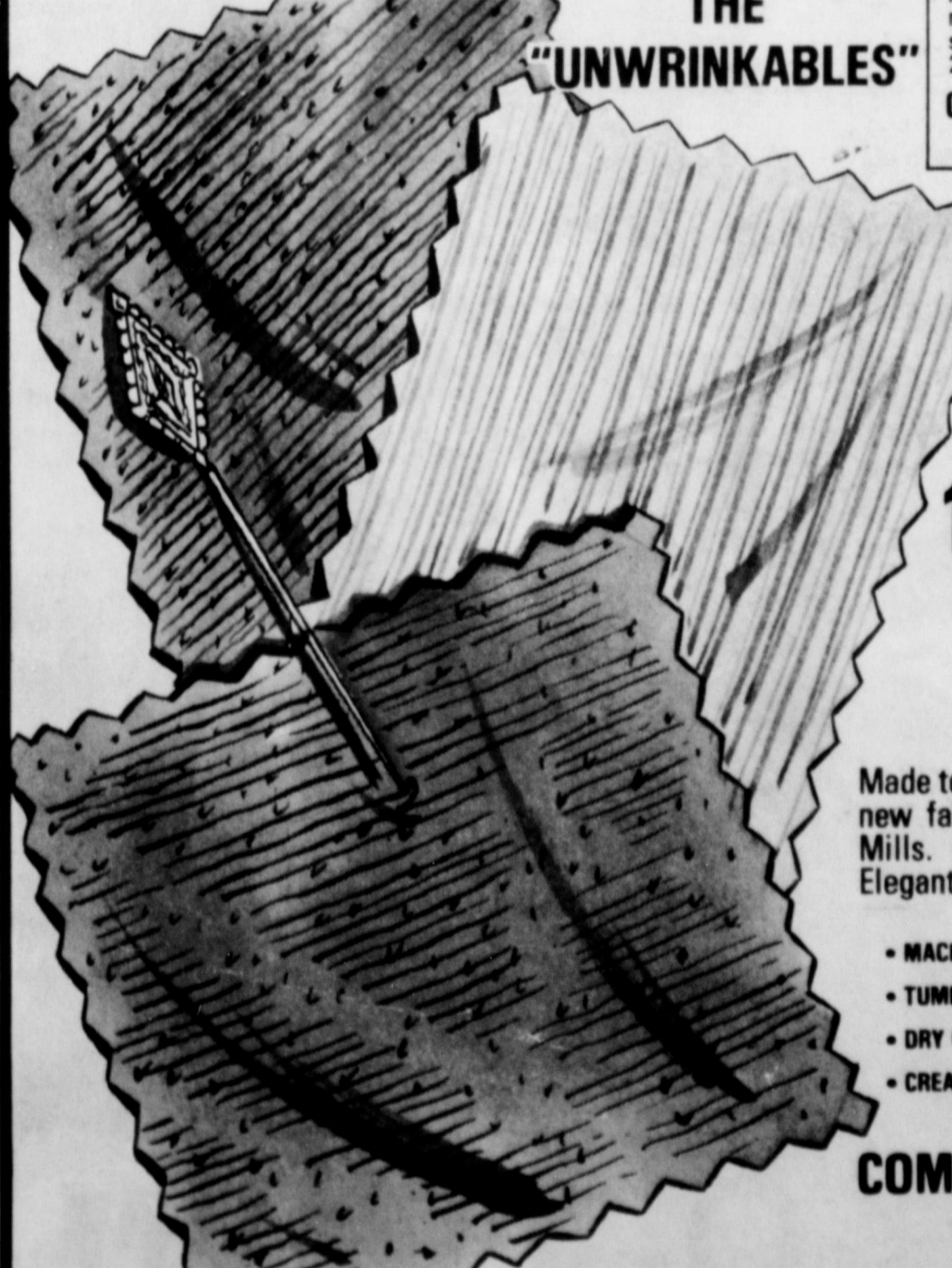

### Meeting Slated On Farm Bill

Details of the compromise farm bill in the U.S. House of Representatives will be explained in meetings next Friday (April 24) in Lubbock and Amarillo. All farmers and ranchers are invited to attend the meeting nearest them.

J. P. Jones, Swisher County farmer who is now Southwest area director for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, USDA, will outline provisions of the proposed bill.

The Lubbock meeting will begin at 10 a.m. at the Koko Palace with H. L. King, Brownfield, Texas Farm Bureau secretary - treasurer, presiding. Carrol Chaloupka of Dalhart, TFB state director from District 1, will be in charge of the Amarillo meeting which begins at 2 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, West.

The proposed compromise farm legislation is expected to be reported favorably out of the House Agriculture Committee early next week. It is said to combine provisions from the "consensus" or Administration farm proposal and the Food and Agriculture Act of 1965 which is scheduled to expire at the end of this year.

Household Finance Corp. is parent firm also to National Car Rental System, Inc. and King - Seeley Manufacturing Co. of Detroit.

City Products Corp. sales for 1969 were \$1,096,958,000. City Products is among the nation's top 20 retail companies both from volume and profit standpoint and operates approximately 5,000 stores in all 50 states.

City Products subsidiaries include T.G.&Y. Stores, Ben Franklin Stores based in Chicago, Coast-to-Coast Stores, based in Minneapolis; White Stores, based in Wichita Falls, Tex.; Von's Grocery Co., based in Los Angeles; Barker's, Gold's and Dryer's Furniture Stores, based in Los Angeles; Huffman - Koons Furniture Stores, based in New Jersey, and Herst - Allen, based in Chicago.

T.G.&Y. began operations in 1936 from Oklahoma City general offices and warehouse.

It has grown to 128 stores

at the end of 1967, when purchased by Butler Brothers of Chicago, but remaining an autonomous division and continuing under the operation of T.G.&Y. officers.

The division had grown to 219 stores by 1960, the year Butler Bros. was purchased by City Products Corp., with headquarters in Chicago and operating throughout the United States.

This merger brought all of City Products' merged with T.G.&Y. in 1969. Scott operated 110 stores in 18 states, with most of its outlets being clustered in the Great Lakes

and Middle Western areas. This merger brought together City Products' combined stores into one T.G.&Y.

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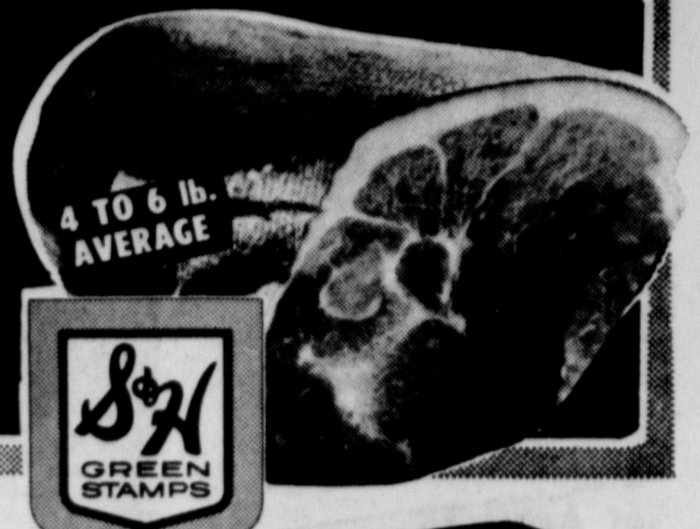


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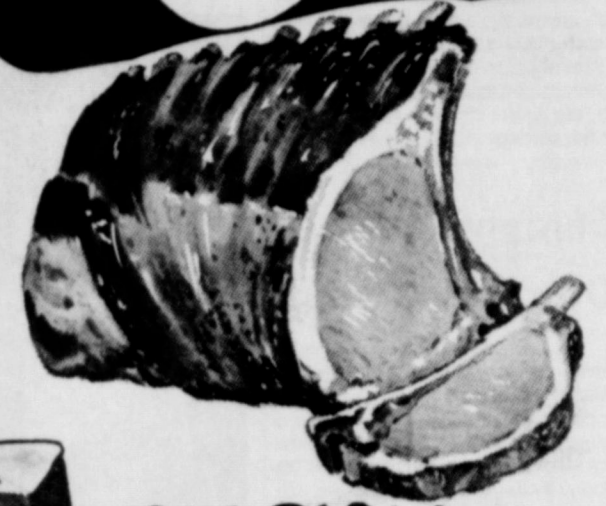
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# Three Qualify For Regional

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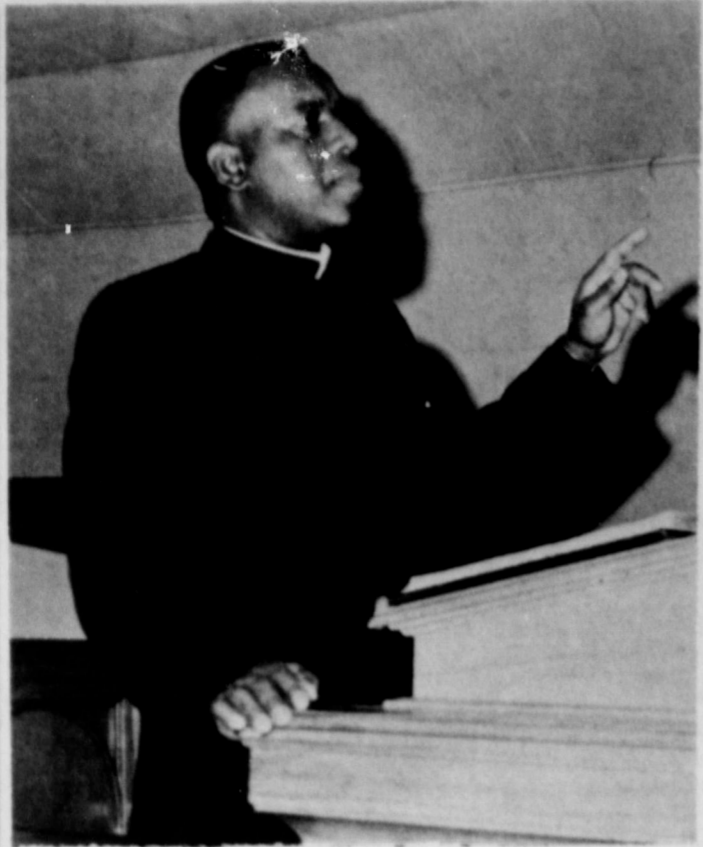

Services were read at 2 p.m. Saturday in the First Baptist Church at Floydada with the Rev. Floyd Bradley, pastor, officiating.

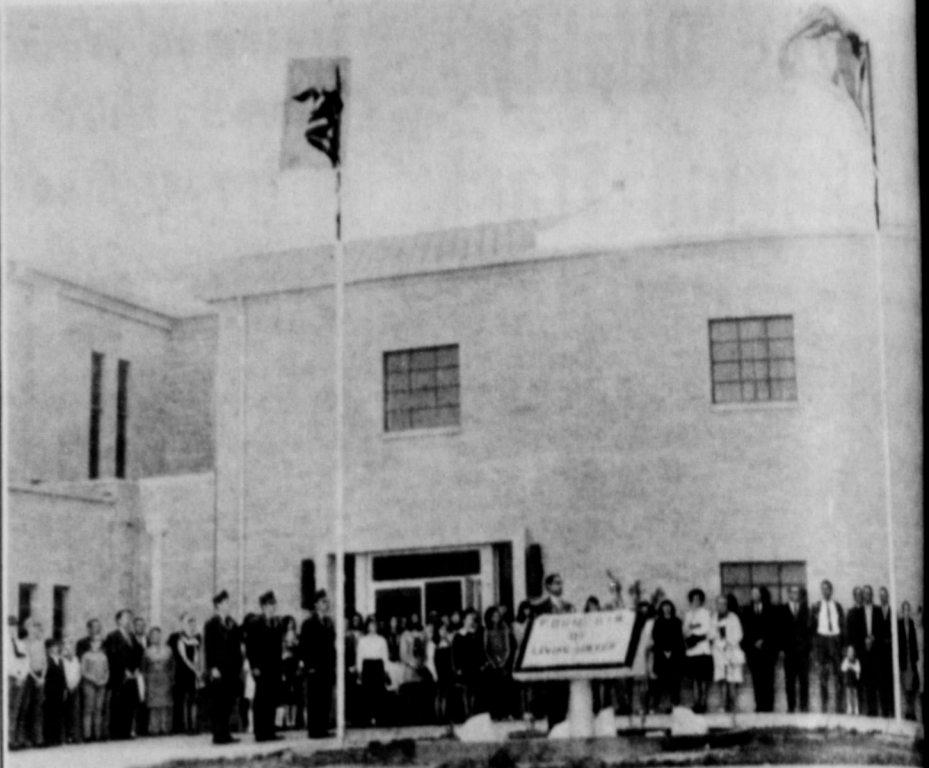

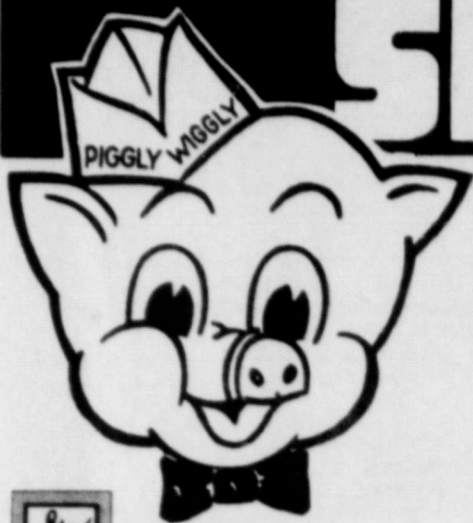
