Gas Rate Hike Gets Approval Of Committee

Agreement on a proposed rate increase for natural gas used in 34 West Texas cities was announced Friday in Lubbock in a joint statement by Fred Poe, chairman of the steering committee of West Texas Municipal Utilities Committee, and K. B. Watson, executive vice president of Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

The agreement came in the form of a recommendation to the governing bodies of the member cities for a 13 percent increase in the cost of gas effective on billings dated on or after Nov. 15, 1970. The recommendations also included a provision for a gas rate adjustment to Pioneer based on the cost of gas during the calendar year to become effective on April 1 of the following year.

Each member - city of the West Texas Municipal Utilities Committee will review the joint recommendation for passage by local ordinance.

Slaton was not a member of the utilities committee, however the city commission studied the announced agreement during a Monday meeting. They instructed City Atty. Harvey Morton to review the agreement and the commission will consider it at the next meeting.

Pioneer agreed to provide each city a verified statement by March 1 of the field cost of gas for the prior year to determine the rate adjustment for the following year.

The first such adjustment report will be delivered to each city by March 1, 1971, for action by April 1, 1971, to become effective April 15, 1971.

Absentee Voting Continues Here

Absentee voting for the Nov. 3 general election continued to be conducted in Slaton this week at the Kertan Studio office on the west side of the square.

Any qualified voter who expects to be absent from the county of his residence on Nov. 3 may cast an absentee ballot. He should take his voter's registration certificate to the absentee box or the county clerk's office before the closing Oct. 30 date.

In addition to state, district and local races, the Nov. 3 ballot will include seven proposed amendments to the Texas Constitution.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverage law; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands; (4) reconstitute State Building Commission; (5) county road bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of government.

Texas has a record 4,150,645 registered voters this year. Normally, absentee voting accounts for approximately five per cent of the total vote turnout.

Rainfall, measuring up to two inches, fell in the Slaton area Thursday, Friday and Saturday, slowing the start of the cotton harvest but apparently averting a damaging frost.

The continuing overcast skies last week provided heavy cloud cover to hold the surface heat and keep the temperatures from dropping below the freezing mark, according to weather bureau officials.

Low temperatures in the Slaton area were recorded in the upper 30's for the most part of last week. The minimum climbed to 48 Tuesday morning, however, and up to 51 on Wednesday. Slaton had a maximum of 38 degrees last Friday, but the high moved on up to 50 degrees Tuesday. Another warm day was predicted Wednesday.

The drenching rainfalls last week put an end to activity in area fields. Some farmers had already started mechanical picking of the longer staple cotton, and a few stripping operations had been reported in progress.

Cotton defoliation was also going strong before the rains started last Thursday. The harvest of cotton is expected to move into high gear if good weather continues. South Plains residents had welcomed the return of sunshine and warmer weather this week.

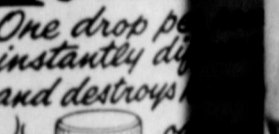

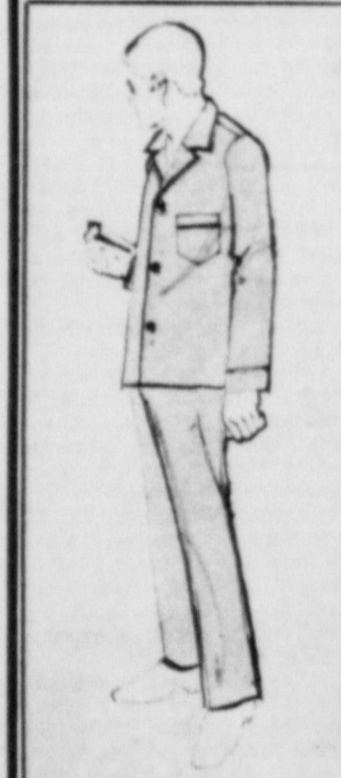

Robert Abbe, C.P.A. from Tahoka, presented the audit which showed 99 percent collection of school taxes for 1969-70.

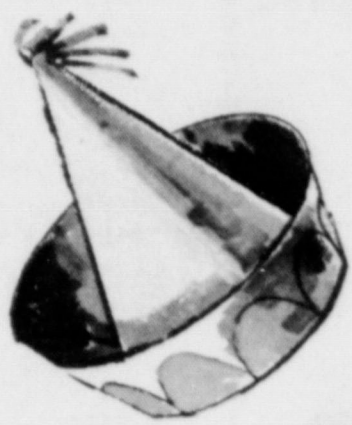
The board approved changing the fee for students from \$20 to \$25 for drivers education. The classroom work will be done during the spring semester with the driving being taught in the summer.

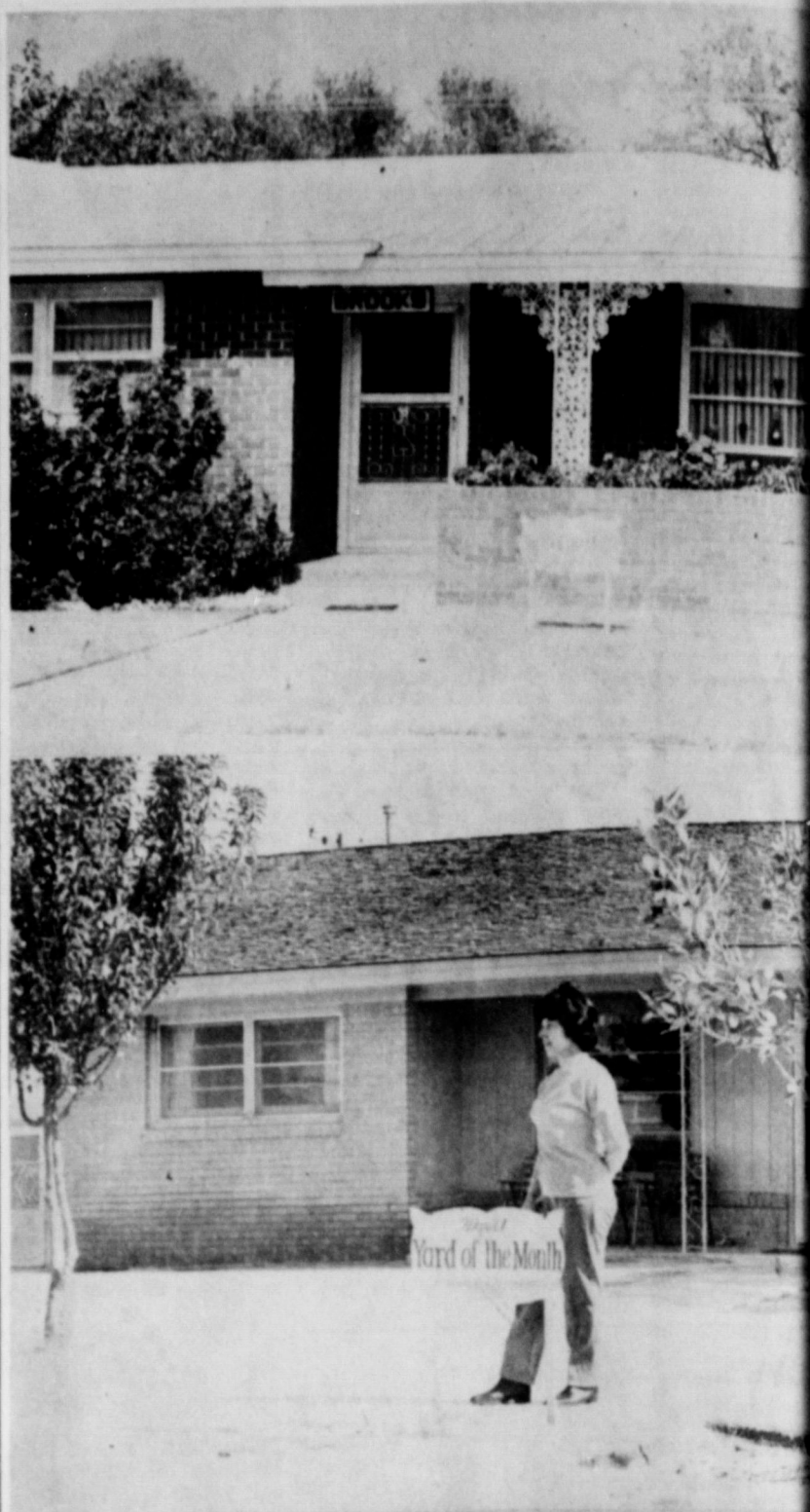

Kahlich Receives Highest FFA Degree

Wayne Kahlich of Rt. 1, Slaton, a 1969 graduate of Cooper High School at Woodrow and a sophomore student at South Plains College in Levelland, received the coveted American Farmer Degree at special ceremonies held during the 43rd National Convention of the Future Farmers of America, in Kansas City, Mo. last week. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Kahlich.

Kahlich was one of 471 FFA members selected to receive the American Farmer Degree, highest degree of membership in the FFA. As a holder of the American Farmer Degree, Kahlich joins a select group representing about one percent of all FFA members.

The 471 FFA members awarded the American Farmer Degree represent the best of more than 430,000 FFA members now enrolled in the nation's 8,175 high school vocational agriculture departments.

FFA members begin as "Greenhands" and after one year of membership may be advanced by the local chapter to the degree of "Chapter Farmer". The third degree, that of "State Farmer", is presented by the State FFA Association and is limited to no more than two percent of the State's FFA membership in any one year. Only students who have earned the State Farmer Degree are eligible for the American Farmer Degree.

In addition to having earned the State Farmer Degree, candidates for the American Farmer Degree must have been active members of the FFA continuously for at least three years. They must have a record of participation in local and state FFA activities and they must have completed all of the vocational agriculture instruction offered in their high school.

Candidates must have been out of high school for at least a year and must have in operation, an outstanding supervised farming or agribusiness occupation program.

American Farmer applicants must have earned at least \$1,000 by their own efforts through their occupational experience program and must have their earnings productively invested or deposited in a bank. Finally, the American Farmer candidates must have demonstrated outstanding ability through their leadership and cooperation in student, chapter and community activities. They must have a satisfactory scholarship record as certified by the local school superintendent or principal.

Each American Farmer Degree recipient is presented a gold key and certificate by the Future Farmers of America. Recipients who attend the convention are presented a check from the Future Farmers of America Foundation to help pay their travel expenses.
