Gas Rate Hike Gets Approval Of Committee

Agreement on a proposed rate increase for natural gas used in 34 West Texas cities was announced Friday in Lubbock in a joint statement by Fred Poe, chairman of the steering committee of West Texas Municipal Utilities Committee, and K. B. Watson, executive vice president of Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

The agreement came in the form of a recommendation to the governing bodies of the member cities for a 13 percent increase in the cost of gas effective on billings dated on or after Nov. 15, 1970. The recommendations also included a provision for a gas rate adjustment to Pioneer based on the cost of gas during the calendar year to become effective on April 1 of the following year.

Each member - city of the West Texas Municipal Utilities Committee will review the joint recommendation for passage by local ordinance.

Slaton was not a member of the utilities committee, how ever the city commission studied the announced agreement during a Monday meeting. They instructed City Atty. Harvey Morton to review the agreement and the commission will consider it at the next meeting.

Pioneer agreed to provide each city a verified statement by March 1, of the field cost of gas for the prior year to determine the rate adjustment for the following year.

The first such adjustment report will be delivered to each city by March 1, 1971, for action by April 1, 1971, to become effective April 15, 1971.

By subject, the proposed amendments relate to: (1) censure and removal of judges; (2) authority for mixed beverlaw; (3) assessment of farm, ranch and forest lands; (4) reconstitute State Building Commission; (5) county road bonds and assessed valuation; (6) increase value of homestead exemption from forced sale; and (7) authority to consolidate functions of gov-

Wilson School **Board Okays Annual Audit**


The Wilson School Board met in regular session on Tuesday, October 20, Items of business included the approval of the 1969-70 school audit, a change in the fee for drivers' education, and enrollment and attendance reports and comparisons. Robert Abbe, C.P.A. from Tahoka, presented the audit which showed 99 percent collection of school taxes for 1969-

The board approved changing the fee for students from \$20 to \$25 for drivers education. The classroom work will be done during the spring semester with the driving being taught in the summer.

Enrollment reports indicate a substancial increase over the past several years with 426 enrolled at this time. The elementary school has 255 enrolled with the Junior and Senior High has 171. Average daily attendance for the first six weeks was 393,61 as compared to 357.15 at end of the first six weeks last year.

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


