Mayor's Race Draws Three Men

Four Announce For Ward 3 Council Seat

Interest in city and school elections picked up a little this week when three more candidates filed in the city races, and the two incumbents announced for re-election in the school trustee election.

A race for the citywide mayor's election was assured Tuesday when Norberto (Bart) Diaz signed up as candidate in that race. He is a former member of the Slaton Police Department. Jonas Cain, a former mayor, had previously announced.

Bland Tomlinson, former owner and operator of Bland's Furniture, filed Wednesday afternoon in the mayor's race -- providing voters at least three choices in the citywide election.

Two more candidates announced this week in the Ward 3 City Commission race. They were Jessie Flores and Henry Bollinger, a former commissioner. The ward already had two candidates to announce -- R. J. Clark and Glen Powers. The four are seeking the post now held by Floyd Guelker. Ward 3 is located in northeast Slaton.

J. S. Edwards, commissioner for Ward 1, was unopposed in his bid for re-election at press time Wednesday. Candidates had until 5 p.m. Wednesday to file. Ward 1 is situated in southwest Slaton.

Don Kendrick, board president, and Tommy Davis have announced as candidates for re-election to the Slaton School Board. Both trustees are completing their second terms. Trustees are elected for three-year terms.

Both the city and schools elections are scheduled for Saturday, April 3, this year. The city formerly held its election on Tuesday. Absentee voting will start March 15 in both elections.

Cynthia Akin, 16-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glen D. Akin, was crowned "Miss South Plains Electric, 1971" in the Cooperative's annual Queen's pageant Monday night in Lubbock.

The 5-6 blonde, was tabbed by a trio of judges as the pageant winner among 20 South Plains contestants. Runner-up was Nancy Kveton of Lorenzo, Kathy Stennett, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Arlen Stennett, was one of the three alternates. She is a junior at Roosevelt High School and was sponsored by the Roosevelt 4-H Club.

Miss Akin was sponsored by the Slaton FFA Chapter. The chapter will receive a \$50 cash award for sponsoring this year's winner, while \$100 will

go to her for a wardrobe.

In June, Miss Akin will participate in the Government-in-Action Youth Tour, an 11 day all expense paid trip to Washington, D.C. The later part of July, she will represent the Cooperative in competing for the title of "Miss Texas Rural Electrification" in Dallas, and in September, she will appear with the 1971 Oratorical winners as a part of the program at the Cooperative's annual meeting.

City Thaws Out After Snowstorm

Slaton and the area was belted by another hit-and-run snowstorm Tuesday -- the second storm to sweep the area in less than 10 days.

Although it snowed most of the day Tuesday, the wet amounted to only two to three inches and left about .25 of inch of moisture. The sun finally peeked through late Tuesday evening, and the thaw started quickly with rising temperatures Wednesday. Slaton had received a 5-inch snowfall on Sunday, Feb. 21.

The snowfall started here early Tuesday as frigid temperatures clamped an icy grip on much of the South Plains. Driving was hazardous here, but schools held classes as usual. The snowstorm was not as severe as the one which hit some nine days earlier.

Street Sign Project Started

Nearly every day you hear a newcomer, a visitor or even a resident who has lived here several years, comment on the street sign situation in Slaton.

With this in mind, the beautification committee of the Women's Division of the Chamber of Commerce, has begun a project to do something about it.

"It won't take a lot of money -- but a little money from a lot of residents," said Mrs. Tommy Wallace, chairman of the committee. The committee met Monday night to make their plans for the year and decided new street signs were the most important project they would tackle. Mrs. LeRoy Holt and Mrs. J. S. Edwards were named chairmen for the project. Sixteen ladies, Jonas Cain, C of C beautification committee chairman, and Earl Bartley, C of C manager, attended the meeting.

Mrs. Wallace said pipe has been volunteered for the signs; city employees will install them, but what is needed is money to purchase the signs. The committee plans to ask for donations from various clubs in Slaton as well as go door-to-door for contributions.

"Our goals at least 100 signs in all four wards," said Mrs. Wallace. "The signs will cost from \$4 to \$5 each" she said.

Babe Ruth Meeting Tonight

Slaton Babe Ruth League will hold an organizational meeting tonight for the 1971 season, it was announced by J. W. Holt, president. The meeting will be held in the community room of Citizens State Bank.

All persons interested in seeing the Babe Ruth program continue are urged to be in attendance tonight. Only five persons attended a meeting last week.

Any men interested in managing or serving as a coach for one of the teams are especially invited to attend.

The mercury dipped to a record low of 6 degrees here Wednesday morning before the thaw started. Winds gusted up to 30 mph Tuesday during the snow and, with the temperature at 12 degrees early Tuesday, the chill factor was about 15 below. Not much wind accompanied the frigid 6-degree reading Wednesday.

The high temperature Tuesday was only 22 degrees, but the mercury was expected to climb into the 50's Wednesday. High reading for the week was 72 degrees last Thursday.

Forecasters call for the month of March to be as dry as ever this year in spite of Tuesday's snowfall. The National Weather Service at Lubbock Regional Airport predict that two or three low pressure systems will drift across the South Plains this month, but moisture from the Gulf of Mexico will be somewhat limited, reducing the chance for significant precipitation.

Annual Scout Drive Launched

The South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America, held its annual sustaining membership drive here Wednesday with Coy Evans serving as the local campaign chairman.

A kickoff breakfast was held Wednesday morning at The Chapparal Restaurant and plans were made for the one-day campaign drive. Edwin Knight is serving as auditor for the funding drive here.

Evans said a number of volunteer workers called on prospects Wednesday in the sustaining membership drive. Results of the campaign were not complete at press time.

Bob Hurst, Scout executive for this area, pointed out that Slaton now has six Scouting units -- three Scout troops, two Cub packs, and a recently-organized Explorer post. The total South Plains Council budget for the new year is \$181-458.

Also present at the breakfast meeting Wednesday was Jim Baber of Lubbock, campaign chairman for the Mackenzie Trail district. He explained that there are four categories of sustaining memberships: general -- \$12 to \$24, special -- \$25 to \$99, major -- \$99 to \$499, and guardian--\$500 and up.

Among the services provided by the Council as a result of the sustaining memberships are: training courses for all leaders, maintain camping facilities, help conduct annual Scout-O-Rama, provide year-around program services at Camp Post, work with in-situations to organize new Scouting units, provide full-time services of a professional and office staff, conduct Boy Scout Camporees, provide literature and stock insignia, forms, awards, badges, certificates.

Post Office Adding Early Mail Dispatch

In a move to have better mail service for Slaton patrons, the post office department has authorized another dispatch here, it was announced this week by Postmaster Rush Wheeler.

Out-of-town mail that is mailed in the post office before 2:30 p.m. will be dispatched to Lubbock at that time and will gain about three hours. This could mean--in some cases--that the mail will arrive at its destination one day sooner.

Wheeler said the 2:30 p.m. dispatch to Lubbock will make it possible to connect with earlier dispatching out of Lubbock. He emphasized that this will not effect the regular dispatch of mail at 6 p.m., pointing out that this is an additional effort to improve service.

To get mail on the earlier dispatch, patrons should drop the mail in the "out-of-town" slot at the post office no later than 2:30 p.m. Separating your mail by out-of-town and local always makes for better service and delivery, said Wheeler.

Industrial Meet Called Tonight

A stockholders' meeting of the Slaton Industrial & Development Foundation, Inc., is scheduled at 8 p.m. today in the Reddy Room of the Southwestern Public Service Co. office.

Main items on the agenda are the election of two directors and a review of the financial statement, according to secretary Hack Lasater.

The terms of directors Clark Self Sr. and Lasater expire this year. Bill Smith is chairman of the industrial foundation. Other directors include T. J. Wallace, Coy Evans, Truett Bownds, and Bill Adams.

Kennedy Injured In Electrical Mishap

Ronnie Kennedy, an employe of Southwestern Public Service in Lubbock, was injured Monday when he was working on electric lines near Brownfield.

It was reported that he accidentally shorted out a 23,000-volt line and caught his shirt afire and burned his arm. His belt strapped around the pole kept him from falling.

He is a patient at Highland Hospital in Lubbock.

Farmer Named Police Chief

Slaton's assistant police chief, Glen W. Farmer, has been promoted to the chief's post by the City Commission this week following the resignation of Walter Head.

The 39-year-old Farmer was appointed police chief by Mayor David Hughes and the city commission endorsed the action in a special session last Thursday. Head had resigned to enter the police training field with the Texas Criminal Justice Council.

In other business during the special meeting last week, the Commission approved a seal coat program for some 58 blocks of pavement and authorized bids on the project. The street repair program is estimated at slightly more than \$19,000. The commission also studied cost estimates on several sewer projects.

Farmer, a graduate of Baylor University, has served as assistant chief under Head for about two years. He served about five months as police chief when Head left here in August, 1968 to take a post in New Mexico. Head returned in January, 1969 and served as chief until this week.

Farmer has worked with Head on the Amarillo Police Department before coming to Slaton as a patrol sergeant in September, 1967. He left the department for a short time in 1969 before returning as assistant chief.

Head had submitted a written resignation requesting his resignation be made effective March 8. The commission decided to go ahead with the transition and made Farmer's appointment effective.

PATSY GAMBLE TELLS LIONS-- Slaton Youth Concerned

"Slaton youth DO care and want some responsibilities," members of the Slaton Lions Club were told Monday by Patsy Gamble, Slaton High School junior.

Miss Gamble reported on the Panhandle Youth Leadership Conference which was held in Amarillo Saturday and Sunday. She was one of 17 Slaton youth to attend the conference under sponsorship of the education committee of Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

The SHS junior reported that delegates to the conference are interested in forming a youth organization here--"a youth Chamber of some type organization," Miss Gamble added that "the youth want to do the work--we just want your support."

Goals at the conference, Miss Gamble explained, were to create better communication between existing youth groups, to exchange ideas, and to encourage all youth to work together to better our environment.

Youth at the conference divided into groups and proposed projects "to benefit youth, their peers and their communities" and "to publicly prove that youth are concerned about their communities."

She said the group she was

with discussed ways to solve prejudice -- not only between races but between youth and adults. Miss Gamble said if a local youth organization was formed that "we will attempt to involve all races in our planning stages of the club."

In a question and answer period, Miss Gamble told Lions she believed that "each race has to bend a little to help ease racial problems." She added that we can't solve our problems unless each race is willing to "meet in the middle of the road--not wait for another group to come all the

He stated that the average contribution is 11 to 12 cents per capita. "Slaton will be far above that average at about 17 cents per capita," he said. He said Slaton will probably exceed Lubbock in per capita contribution.

Mrs. Connie Locke has been chairman for the drive in past years. However, she now serves the Heart Fund on the county level as secretary. She also is a director on the State Board for the Heart Fund and is a member of several state committees.

"The success of Heart Sunday in Slaton was the combined effort of 76 volunteers," Mrs. Smith said. "I would like to sincerely thank all these women personally for their enthusiasm and effort." Then women were chairmen over their particular areas and they involved workers to walk their blocks. "Even though the weather was undesirable these women did so enthusiastically," Mrs. Smith said.

"I would also like to thank every Slaton citizen for their gracious contributions. Certainly our goal would not have been obtained without them. I feel the very fact of Heart disease being the number one killer in our country (53% of all people die of heart related illnesses) was the contributing factor of the gracious success."

Eleven Slaton Men Get TIC Citation

Eleven Slaton business and civic leaders received citations last week from the Texas Industrial Commission and Gov. Preston Smith for having made a "significant contribution to Texas' industrial development."

Receiving the citations were: Earl Bartley, Bill Smith, T.J. Wallace, V. G. Browning, A. H. Grigsby, Joyce Ross, Ernie Davis, Ansil O'Neal, Carroll McDonald, Rush Wheeler and Alex Webb.

The citations were presented to local recipients by E. H. Sheffield of the commission staff in a meeting culminating nearly a year's work towards incorporating pertinent industrial location information on Slaton into the nation's most sophisticated computerized site location data bank.

Called "Insta-Site", the commission's computer program has already received two distinguished awards itself from the Southern Industrial Development Council, a professional society covering sixteen Southern states.

Participation of local leaders in gathering information for "Insta-Site", means that information on Slaton industrial assets will be instantly available to all industrial firms considering new plant sites in Texas.

Sheffield presented Earl Bartley, C of C executive vice president, who served as the

commission's local coordinator for the project, a massive 85 page printout containing 1444 items of information on the Slaton area. Local award recipients collected data for 393 items of information on the printout and the balance were collected for the community by the commission staff.

As soon as the local group has reviewed the information and suggested any changes necessary, a computerized Community Analysis Report will be available that shows how Slaton compares with other cities of similar size on the factors that industrialists look for in locating new plants. Using the Community Analysis Report as a guide, Slaton leaders will be able to plan effective measures to spur local economic growth.

"The next phase in the development of the computer program is to match Slaton plant location resources with a profile of the location requirements of all types of expanding industries", Sheffield said.

"This will enable us at the commission to help you concentrate your industrial development program on companies you have the best chance of attracting to Slaton", Sheffield continued.

Statewide, more than 14,000 business and civic leaders in 390 Texas cities will receive the special citations for their part in making the new program possible.

pointment effective March 1. The commission also decided to leave the assistant chief's post vacant for a "trial period." Mayor Hughes said he and at least two commissioners feel that enforcement will not be curtailed by leaving one officer off the staff, and it could lead to more pay for the remaining force.

Farmer had asked the commission to allow him to fill the vacancy when he appeared at the session Thursday for an interview on the chief's post. He said it was difficult to arrange schedules now for 24-hour police coverage, and he pointed out that the assistant chief's duties included much investigative work.

The commission approved advertisement of bids on the seal coat program, with bids to be opened at 10 a.m. on March 19. The commission will have a regular meeting March 22 to consider the bids. Bennett Reeves, consulting engineer with Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, explained the proposed seal coat program before the commission approved the plans and specifications.

Although the Municipal Airport runway was listed on the bid, it will not be included in the work. Minor repairs are to be made at the airport, however, Mayor Hughes said.

TARBOX PROPOSES BILL ON OUTDOOR MUSIC FESTIVALS

A Lubbock legislator says licensing outdoor music events goes "a long way in helping communities protect themselves from unwanted rock music festivals."

"Recently near Lubbock we had one of those rock festivals planned, Rep. Elmer L. Tarbox (D-Lubbock) told the State Affairs Committee. "But fortunately bad weather and rain knocked down the attendance to about five instead of the expected 5,000 or we might have had a serious situation on our hands."

Tarbox said the state has no regulations to force promoters to provide adequate health and sanitation conditions, "nor an adequate means to protect our citizens from property damage."

The committee referred the bill to a subcommittee for further study.

The bill requires promoters of all "outdoor music festivals" to register with the county clerk within 60 days before the event is to be held. The promoter also has to file with the clerk all plans "to comply with the minimum standards of sanitation and health" prescribed by Texas law.

The application is forwarded to the county commissioners court with the county health officer's recommendations.

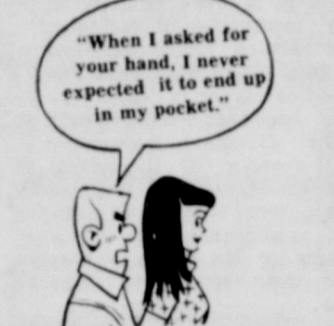

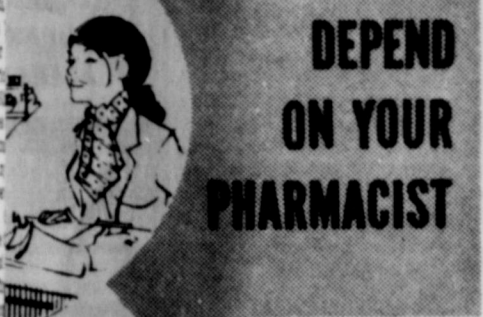

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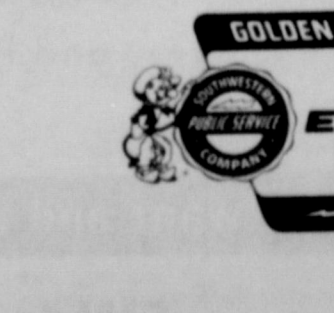

Highlights of the annual banquet include the presentation of special awards to Tigers and Tigerettes. The event honors all varsity and junior varsity athletes at Slaton High School.

Banquet speaker and other details are to be confirmed this week. The dinner menu will consist of chopped sirloin, baked potato, green beans, salad, and cherry cobbler.

The Wildcat Relays in Idalou are next on the schedule for the Slaton track team, after the Tigers started the season by posting a fifth-place finish in the Lone Wolf Relays at Colorado City Saturday.

SHS Coach Doc Mize plans to take about 20 boys to the Idalou meet Saturday. The preliminaries are set in the morning, with final events expected to start about 2 p.m. The meet is expected to draw a large field of area schools.

The Tigers tallied 34 team points in the meet at Colorado City last week with sprinter Donnie Rogers leading the way on third-place finishes in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

Other point-makers included Steve Nieman, 4th in the 440; Ron Bartley, 5th in the 330 hurdles; Joe Johnson, 6th in the 100 and the 220; Freddie Rainwater, 5th in the 880.

Slaton's sprint relay team took a 4th place despite a bad handoff, and the mile relay team finished 5th. The sprint team consisted of Jackie Ford, Johnson, Johnny Hernandez and Rogers. The mile relay team was made up of Hernandez, Tony Martin, Randy Davis and Nieman.

Vernon won the meet with 138 points, followed by Hereford with 131, Colorado City 89, Coahoma 36, Slaton 34, Lake View 26, Sweetwater JV 20, Roscoe 18.

Colorado City's fine sprinter -- Stan Bracey -- was the only double winner of the day as he won the 100 in 9.7 seconds and the 220 in 22 flat. Slaton's Rogers was clocked at 10 flat in the 100 and at 21.7 seconds in the 220. Bracey set a record with a 21.9 timing in the preliminaries.

The host teams' Carl Devorce set the only other records, throwing the discus 157-9 and the shot 58-2 1/2.

Coach Mize was not too pleased with the relay times, but hopes they improve this week. The sprint relay team was clocked in 45.3 but had one bad handoff. The mile relay had a 3:48.1 time.

Nieman had a 53.6 time in the quarter, and Rainwater was clocked at 2:10 in the 880. Alfredo Alfaro was close behind in the 880 with a 2:11, and Bernard Kitten had a 2:14. James Conwright also qualified in the 440 and finished 7th in the finals with a 55 flat. Johnson ran a 10.4 in the 100 and a 23.4 in the 220. Bartley had a 44.3 in the 330 intermediate hurdles.

Brad Lamb finished 7th in the mile run with a 5:01 time. Freshman Bennie Lopez also ran the mile. Mike Speer and Brad Winchester entered the discus throw, and Speer and Ollie Rainwater were in the shot put event. Rogers and Walter Cooper competed in the long jump.
