## Tigers Host Idalou Vital Grid Clash

Two teams still in contention for the District 4-AA championship clash here Friday night in Tiger Stadium, and Slaton Coach Ernie Davis hopes his Tigers have the momentum going to the Idalou Wildcats.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. for the important game. Each team has a 2-1 won-lost mark in league play, with Slaton losing to Dever City and Idalou bowing to the league - leading Roosevelt Eagles.

Slaton's gridgers will take the field knowing that four straight victories can earn them the district title, and that Idalou is still fighting for survival in the chase. The teams have not met a common foe this year, but Idalou will be out to avenge a 14-3 defeat from last season.

Coach Davis Wednesday pronounced his Tigers in good

physical and mental condition for the game. He said the starting lineup, offense and defense, would probably be the same as for the Post game last week. "We'll try to utilize more boys at certain times during the game," he added.

The Wildcats have a new look this season, brought about by Coach Jack Fry in his first year at Idalou. Fry was an assistant at Cooper before moving to Idalou, and his first goal was to change the overall attitude. The Wildcats from a wishbone T and power I on offense.

Defense has been stressed and the Wildcats are led there by tackle Steve Merritt, 200-pound senior letterman, and Charles Armacost, another 200-pound senior letterman. Guards are returning starter James Sowder, 175, and Jerry Lane, 165. Randy Truett, 165, is the center. Stoney Jackson, 180 senior, and Randy Nettles, 140 junior, are at ends.

Guiding the offensive attack will be Bonnie Eaquivel, 150 junior. The Cats boast two explosive runners in halfbacks John Mojica, 150, and Jerry Franklin, 180. The pair, along with fullback Mike Jordan, 160, all started last year.

Idalou opened with a 14-6 victory over arch-rival Kress in non-district play, then lost to Petersburg by 14-0 and Lockney by 19-6. Roosevelt tallied late in the game to capture a 7-4 decision over the Wildcats to open district play. Idalou downed Falls, 31-0, and upset Taboka, 14-7, the past two weeks.

Probable starters on offense for Slaton: Brad Lamb and Leslie Melcher at ends, Brad Winchester and Bobby Hopper at tackles, Steve Mosser and Stan Jaynes at guards, Mike Spear at center, Steve Nieman at quarterback, Randy Davis and Ron Bartley at halfbacks, and Kenny Schuette at fullback.

The Tigers have scored 42 points in the last two games, and Coach Davis is hoping the offense will continue to click. Bartley has been the top rusher in six games, going for 323 yards.

Slaton breeders will be offering show barrows at the Pig Sale, with a large number of South Plains and New Mexico buyers expected to attend. The barrows will be sifted and judged prior to the sale, with the breed champions and grand and reserve champs going up for sale first.

Auctioneer for the event will

The "show barn" now under construction originated last year when a C of C committee headed by Glen Akin sought to secure a "civic center" type building here for various functions. The ag committee this year, headed by Milt Ardrey, Jay Gray and Robert H. Davis, continued to work on the idea and got the project launched.

The Chamber voted to endorse the project and contributions have been sought, along with fund-raising projects. A turkey shoot has been held each weekend in October, with proceeds going to the building fund.

The "turkey shoots" will continue this weekend and next at the JED Club, one mile west of Slaton Co-Op Gin. Shooting starts at 10 a.m. Saturday and 1 p.m. Sunday.

The FFA chapter at Slaton High School is building pens for the show barn and will be doing other work in the building.

The new facility will be available for various functions. The building will be a light-green colored steel structure, fully insulated. Plans call for rest room and concession areas, and the grounds around the building are to be landscaped.

### Girl Scout Fund Drive Begins

The Athenian Study Club and Girl Scout leaders are conducting the Girl Scout Fund Drive this week in Slaton, according to the Caprock Girl Scout Council.

Volunteer workers are seeking \$875 to continue and expand Scout activities for girls from seven to 17 years of age in this area. Athenians will conduct the drive in the business section of town and Girl Scout leaders and mothers of Scouts will conduct a door-to-door drive from 2 to 5 p.m. Sunday.

Slaton has 85 Girl Scouts and leaders in the program. In a proclamation signed Monday by Mayor Bland Tomlinson, he called on citizens to support the drive.

Cold rains chilled Slaton and the South Plains area Tuesday, the moisture coming on the heels of thunderstorms which left heavier amounts of rain Monday morning.

Tuesday's cold front collided with moist Gulf air over Texas, causing torrential rains downstate and spawning tornadoes in some sections. Maximum temperature in Slaton Tuesday reached only 52 degrees, and the mercury dipped to a chilly 39 Tuesday night.

Slaton recorded about .30 of an inch of moisture Tuesday as a light shower lasted through much of the day. The city and surrounding area had registered about .50 to .70 from showers Sunday afternoon and early Monday morning--leaving about 1 inch for the wet period.

The area was under a weather alert Sunday night, with Hart catching the most destructive storm and twister. Several funnels and tornadoes were sighted in the Amberst - Olton-Hart region, and hail accompanied the storm.

The cold front and rain Tuesday was more of a surprise, and the front was much colder than the one which moved across the area Sunday night. Area farm experts were concerned about the effect of the weather on cotton crops. Even though the amount of moisture was light, the chilly temperatures are hurting the maturity of the cotton.

Skies were clearing Wednesday, however, and farmers were hoping for some more warm, sunny weather to help the crops mature. Forecasts called for the mercury to rise in the high 60's Wednesday.

The Weather Service blamed the bad weather on a stationary cold front stretching from Oklahoma all the way to the Mexico border. The wet weather was expected to end Wednesday, with cool temperatures hanging on following breakup of the front.

High temperature here the past week was 90 degrees recorded Friday.

### SLATON TO PLAY 4 NON-DISTRICT GAMES

## Cooper In, Idalou, Ralls Out Of New 5-AA District Next Year

Most of District 4-AA's teams will move to a new 5-AA loop next year -- a circuit that welcomes Cooper and drops Idalou and Ralls.

The new alignments were announced by the University Interscholastic League Monday afternoon. The new 5-AA district will have Slaton, Roosevelt, Cooper, Friendship, Post, Taboka and Denver City. Cooper was elevated from Class A.

The area league was changed to District 5 due to a district being added on the South Plains. The old 3-AA loop was divided, with Abernathy, Floydada, Idalou, Lockney, Falls and Tulla going into 4-AA. District 3 will have Dimmitt, Friona, Littlefield, Morton and Olton. The alignments for the 1972-

73 school year also include an opening football date of Sept. 7 and 11 weeks to play 10 games. With a seven-member district, each 5-AA team will have one open date during the league schedule.

Supt. J. C. McClesky and Athletic Director Ernie Davis were to attend a district meeting Wednesday night at Friendship, where Supt. J. Weldon Bennett is district chairman. The new district schedule will be drawn at that time.

Coach Davis reported Wednesday morning that a contract has been renewed with Kermit with the Yellowjackets scheduled to play here the second game next fall. He said tentative agreements have been made with Littlefield and Abernathy. The

other non-district game may be with Brownfield again, but it was not definite Wednesday.

Davis said he was satisfied with the new district setup, but would have preferred an even number of schools in the circuit. "Travel-wise", he pointed out, "Denver City is the only school not in the immediate area."

The change was "about what we expected," Coach Pete Hurst of Cooper said this week after learning the Pirates would be elevated to 5-AA. Hurst commented that "it's a tough district to be in, but if we have to go up this is the league we wanted."

Cooper School, located in the

"It's good to keep your hands busy", Mrs. William Rust said. And if you've ever visited her and her daughter, Mrs. Daurice Frohlich, who lives with her at 505 East Crosby, you would know she really means it.

The two of them spend hours almost every day working on something. One of Mrs. Rust's favorite ways to pass the time is to make greeting cards. She made over 500 of the individual covers last year and has made over 300 this year. "My busy time on them is just starting", she said.

The reason for this is because she uses a lot of Fall leaves on the covers. She uses a process of beginning with wax paper, adding some glue topped with a Kleenex, glitter and whatever she chooses to decorate the cover with. Each cover must dry over night or all day, so it is a time consuming hobby.

Mrs. Rust, at the age of 81, (she'll be 82 on March 6) chooses to pick her own flowers, gather the leaves or weeds and would you believe? -- catch her own butterflies. She has made a butterfly net and said she caught over 100 butterflies last year for her covers. She sells the greeting cards, which includes writing paper and an envelope for 35 cents each. No two are alike.

While Mrs. Rust is working on her projects, Mrs. Frohlich is usually busy crocheting. She has seven grandchildren--and that keeps a grandmother busy", she said. She has started making Christmas gifts for them and other members of her family. She has beautiful sweaters, hats, socks, smocks and bedspreads (just to mention a few) that she has completed.

Mrs. Rust is quite a collector of antiques. She is especially proud of an antique bedroom suite which has been in her family many years. The suite has two dressers which have marble tops. One has a place specifically made for the bed pan.

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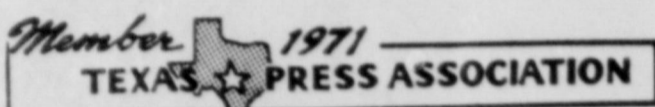

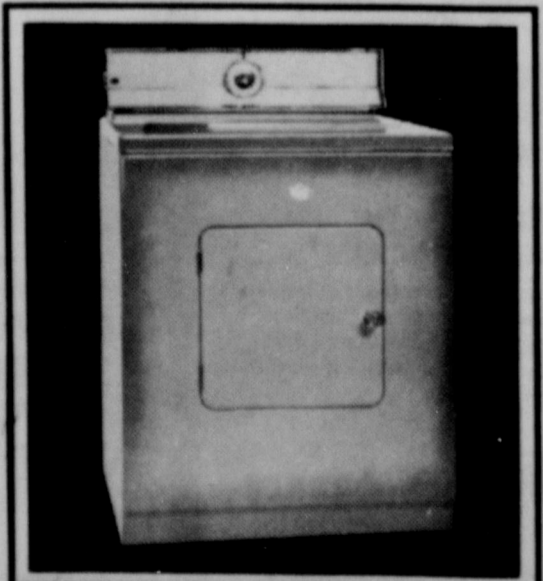

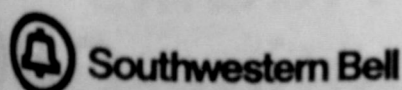

# Tigers Roll Over Post, 28-0, For Second Straight 4-AA Win

With the offense scoring in each quarter and the defense recording its first shutout of the season, the Slaton Tigers captured a 28-0 victory at Post Friday night in a District 4-AA battle.

Quarterback Steve Nieman passed for two touchdowns and scored on 1 and 38-yard runs as the Tigers spoiled Homecoming activities at Post. End Clyde Kitten hauled in a 20-yard scoring pass, and halfback Randy Davis scored on a 42-yard strike from Nieman.

Davis kicked two points, and end Tom Roche got a two-pointer on a pass from Nieman.

The closest Post came to scoring was just before the half, when they got to the Slaton 13. The Tiger defense was tough in the clutch, tacking on 100 yards in losses and the Antelopes netted only 23. Post notched 15 first downs, but 6 of them came on penalties.

Tackle Dwayne Buskemper and guard Brad Winchester were leaders on defense, and tackles Tommy Taylor and Curt

Woollever came on in the second half to make standout plays. Taylor spent much of the fourth period in the Post backfield.

Nieman got great pass protection from the Tiger forward wall and from fullback Kenny Schuette, and he connected on 5 of 6 in the first half for 109 yards and the two scores. Ron Bartley led the ground attack with 78 yards on 12 trips, and halfback Randy Davis had 40 yards in 9 carries. Nieman's touchdown run of 38 yards helped him net 43 yards in 11 trips.

The Tigers tacked on another touchdown just before the game ended, but a penalty erased an 8-yard run by Tommy Walters. Slaton was assessed 124 yards on 13 penalties -- almost as much as in the team's other five games. The penalties, plus a fumble and pass interception, killed some scoring opportunities for the Tigers.

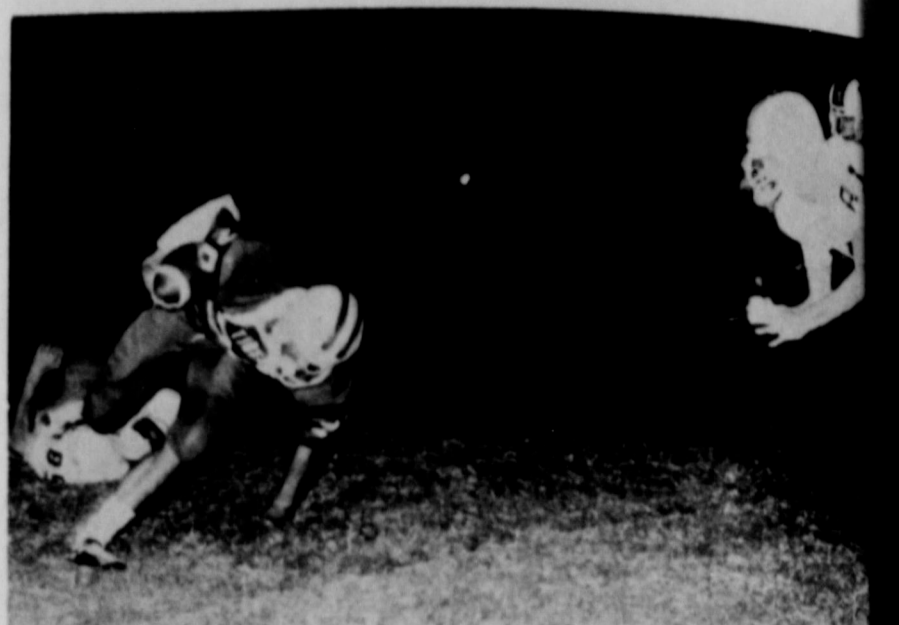

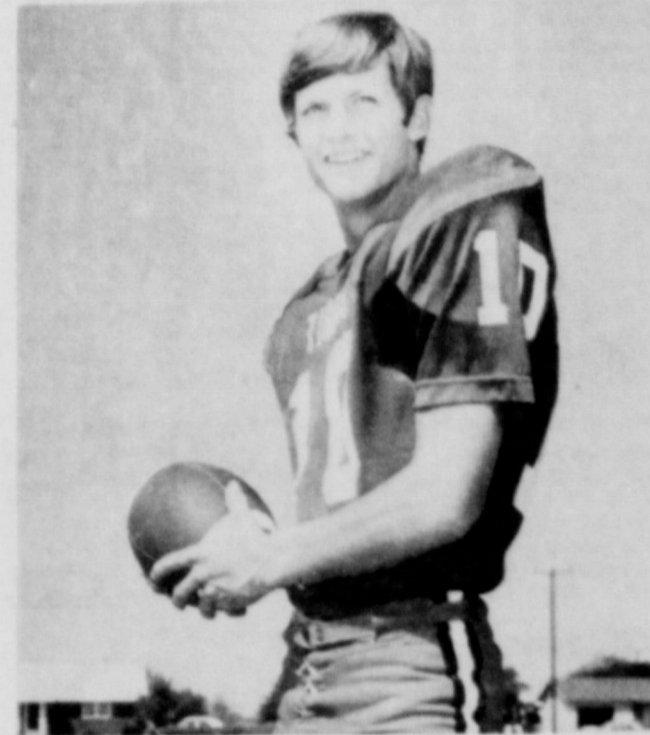

TRIGGERS TIGER WIN---Junior quarterback Steve Nieman passed for two touchdowns and ran for two in the 28-0 triumph at Post Friday. The scoring strikes went 20 yards to Clyde Kitten and 42 yards to Randy Davis, and Nieman ran 1 and 38 yards for the other scores. The 150-pounder has a 51 percent completion mark on 19 of 37 pass attempts for 273 yards.

Nieman fired a pass at Davis on a third-down situation, and pass interference gave Slaton a first down on the Post 43. Bartley moved around end for eight yards, but Davis lost 2. Nieman hit Davis with a sideline pass for 12, but an illegal procedure wiped out the gain. On 3rd-and-10, Nieman spotted Davis wide open about the 5-yard line and connected on a 42-yard touchdown play. Davis' kick sailed off the left, and it was 13-0 with 9:08 left in the first half.

Post got one first down, after the ensuing kickoff, on a 30-yard pass play, but Slaton held on fourth down at the Tiger 44 and took over again. The Tigers appeared headed on another touchdown drive before a fumble stopped them. Nieman hit Davis for 18 yards, and Davis reeled off runs of 12 and 20 yards to spark the drive to a first down on the Post 10. Nieman was hit going off tackle and lost the ball, however, and Post recovered on the 8.

The Antelopes couldn't move and punted out to the 50-yard line. Nieman hit his fifth straight pass as Bartley made a fine catch for a 14-yard gain. Two plays later, however, an attempted screen pass by Nieman was picked off by Robert Mindieta of Post.

Lloyd Kitten picked off a Post pass two plays later and returned to the Slaton 45, but Slaton was penalized for pass interference on the play and Post has a first down on the Tiger 27. Another penalty against Slaton for hitting late moved the ball to the Slaton 13. A pass was incomplete then Winchester and Jaynes got the quarterback for a 13-yard loss. Post set up for a field goal attempt about the 32, but the snap went over the kicker and he was tackled at midfield -- a loss of 24 yards as the half ended.

Following some good blocks, he turned the "corner" and cut back into the open -- going 38 yards for the touchdown. Davis made the kick, Nieman raised up and passed to Tom Roche for two points, and it was 28-0 with 7:18 left in the game.

After the next kickoff, Post made two first downs -- one on a penalty before being stopped, Tommy Taylor got the quarterback for a loss of 6, then Dennis Hamer got him for a loss of 6. Slaton got the ball at the 20 and made two first downs, with Leslie Melcher making a great catch on a Nieman pass for 20 yards. Slaton had to punt for the second time, and Kitten got off a 44-yarder.

Kenneth Price almost broke clear on an 18-yard gainer, but Davis made the saving tackle. Then Post was penalized back to the 15 for intentional grounding of a pass. The snap was fumbled and Taylor and Jerry Hopper downed the punter on the Post 23 -- giving Slaton another scoring opportunity. Darrell Eastman hit Tony Martin with a 20-yard pass that carried to the Antelope 3-yard line. Eastman was trapped for a loss of 5, then Walters went over from the 8. 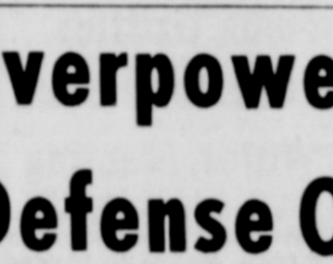

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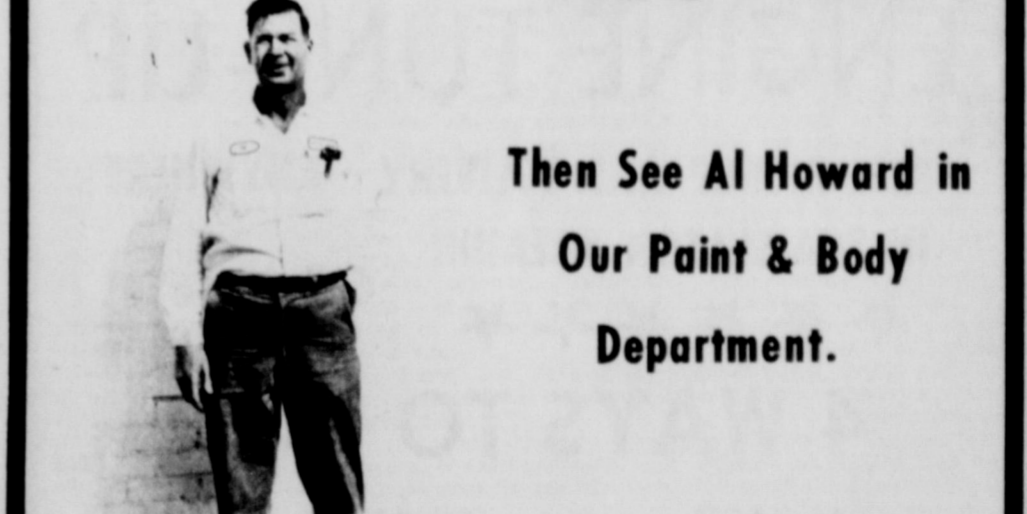

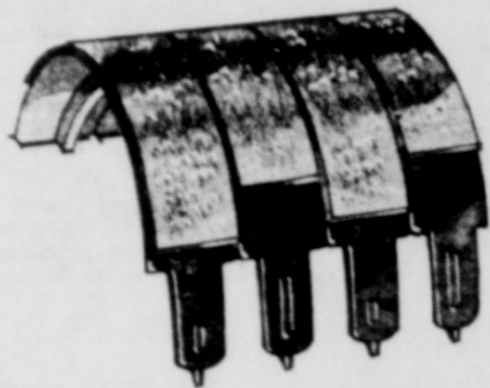

The department reported it held 12 prisoners for the Texas Highway Patrol during the month.

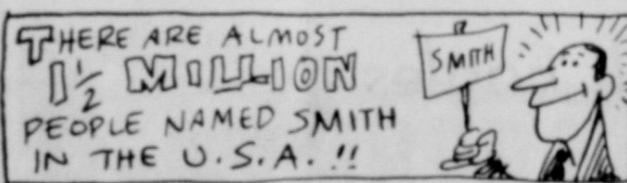

"Public Notice is hereby given that the Commissioners' Court of Lubbock County, Texas, proposes to pass the following Order Setting Specifications for Sub-Division Plats in Lubbock County, Texas."

### WHEREAS, Lubbock County is a county in Texas having a population of less than one hundred - ninety thousand (190,000) according to the last preceding Federal Census.

WHEREAS notice of this order was published in The Slaton Slatonite, a newspaper of general circulation in the County of Lubbock, for a period of 1 day a copy of said notice is attached hereto and made a part hereof.

WHEREAS article 6626a of Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes specifically authorizes this Commissioners' Court to make certain requirements therein set out regarding the laying out of subdivisions or additions in the County of Lubbock and without the corporate limits of any city or town.

WHEREAS it is the desire and duty of this Court to secure as uniform, coordinated and well planned additions as possible in order that the growth of the city of Lubbock and other cities in Lubbock County shall not be delayed or hindered.

Whereas in the opinion of this Court certain standards should be followed by all developers in additions in order to promote the proper growth of the city of Lubbock and other towns of Lubbock County and prevent the growth of slums adjacent to the cities within Lubbock County.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED by the Commissioners' Court of Lubbock County, Texas, that every owner of any tract of land in the County of Lubbock, State of Texas, who may hereafter divide the same in two (2) or more parts for the purpose of laying out any subdivision of any such tract of land, or addition without the corporate limits of any town or city, or for laying out suburban lots or building lots, and for the purpose of laying out streets, alleys, or parks, or other portions intended for public use, or the use of purchasers of owners thereof shall

It is further ordered that the County Engineering Department, will not be considered for subdivision purposes, until adequate drainage has been provided.

It is further ordered that after the County Engineering Department has checked and approved the lay-out, widths of streets, drainage, etc., the person or persons filing the application shall within one (1) year from the date of such approval present the plat approved by the County Engineering Department to the Commissioners' Court of Lubbock County, Texas for its approval.

The Final Plat (plat to be recorded) shall include the following:

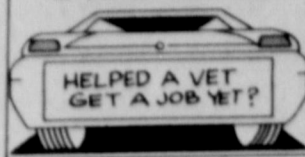
