

Prospects For New Meat Packing Plant Take Big Step

Chances of securing a million-dollar meat plant soared Wednesday as Slaton city commissioners made an oral commitment to the proposed site at the end of Division Street.

erated Goodnight Sausage Company near Lubbock Municipal Airport announced that his company is the one making plans to locate an ultra-modern meat packing facility in Slaton.

Although the commitment by the city to provide utilities and also to de-annex the plant site for three years is a major step toward bringing the plant into

reality, Goodnight stressed that the installation can in no way be considered definite until some other problems and details concerning the project can be settled.

He did indicate that he now fully expects to be able to locate the plant here, barring any unexpected obstacles, and said more definite word should come

later.

The facility proposed here would be primarily a hog-killing plant, with secondary emphasis on beef, Goodnight said, explaining that with an expanded operation involving more than sausage production, it would be called Goodnight Packing, Inc. "We also will do custom processing for the area," he said.

"We anticipate providing a market for live hogs in this area, whereas in the past producers have had to ship their animals out, the product completed elsewhere and then shipped back into the area several days old to the consumer," he stated.

"The main reason we're locating here is because the peo-

ple of Slaton have been so nice to us, and because Slaton is centrally located," an aide commented. Goodnight expressed appreciation to the Chamber of Commerce, the Industrial Foundation which is securing the plant site, and to the mayor and city commissioners.

The Goodnight Sausage Co.

was operated in Lubbock for more than 30 years before having to move to make room for airport expansion about a year ago. Anticipated cost of the facility planned for Slaton would be from \$500,000 to \$750,000, and at least 35 fulltime employees would be needed. Target date for start of construction would be "possibly in June," said Goodnight.

City commissioners met Wednesday morning with members of the board of directors of the Chamber. No official action was taken at the unannounced session, but city commissioners were polled individually by the mayor in regard to commitments requested by the meat packing firm and only one commissioner said he would vote against the proposals.

Chamber Manager Earl Bartley advised the commission that the people proposing to locate in Slaton "need a decision today" on items which they had asked the city to consider. These included a commitment to run sewer and water lines to the site -- a project which the city has estimated will cost \$12,000 -- and deferral of paying city taxes for a period of three years by means of having the property de-annexed for that time.

Commissioners agreed to support the proposals after the chamber board agreed to make the first year's payment on the note which would be necessary to obtain the funds for extending the lines. Mayor Bland Tomlinson explained that "the city is in dire financial straits" and simply has no available funds for the extension. It was indicated that the necessary money will be borrowed on a five-year note, with the Chamber to pay the first installment.

Bartley noted that company's original idea had been to construct a facility estimated to cost \$400,000 and hire about 25 persons, but that the tentative plans have been expanded. He said that officials of USDA and Texas A&M Extension Service have been working with the company "to conduct a feasibility study for pork production with Slaton being the center of it, and it is their theory that West Texas will become the pork producing center of the nation. If this is going to be done anywhere in the area, we'd like to see Slaton get it."

He added that the proposed facility would serve the entire area and would put fresh pork in the hands of area consumers "one to seven days sooner than any other plant in the country." He pointed out that based on a figure of \$600,000 for the plant, taxes totaling \$4,250 per year would be paid to the city after the three-year de-annexation period. He also said that using the company's figure of a required minimum of 80,000 gallons of water per day, the plant would pay \$5,400 per year to the city for water, sewage and sanitation service, with this money coming in as soon as the service is connected.

Furthermore, he told the commission, about \$6,000 per year would be realized in new city taxes from employees, based on an estimated payroll of \$200,000 annually. He also mentioned the possibility of benefits from new homes, more school taxes and attraction of related industries.

Goodnight officials had been advised earlier that Slaton city ordinance prohibits discharge of animal blood or animal fat into the sewage system, and the company indicated it can meet this requirement by installing special equipment to remove the material without putting it into the sewer line.

Bartley noted that federal and state regulations regarding sanitation and pollution by meat packing facilities now are quite strict and that inspections are frequent. He said holding pens would contain no animals overnight, and would be washed down and disinfected daily.

At a regular meeting of the commission Tuesday night, two city residents objected to proposals to extend water and sewer lines to the site of the proposed industry because they and others in the city "have been paying taxes all along and have been waiting for years for water and sewer lines."

Wrecker Services, Need Of City Utility Extensions Discussed

Need for a workable wrecker service rotation system involving accidents in Slaton, and the plight of residents who are paying city taxes without getting the benefit of all city services were discussed at length by Slaton City Commission in its regular meeting Tuesday night.

The proposed resolution on towing of vehicles was tabled pending revisions after the discussion. Appearing to discuss the proposed regulations with the commission were Mr. and Mrs. L. W. Perkins, Moses Diaz and Jim Dullin.

Mayor Bland Tomlinson explained that the city hopes to establish a workable system of duty service rotation which would be fair to all wrecker service operators. The matter was tabled for further consideration at the next meeting.

Elford Stricklin requested de-annexation of an 80-acre area of unimproved land in northwest Slaton, and commissioners agreed to look into the matter.

Mrs. Perkins protested plans to extend water and sewer lines to the proposed site of a new meat packing plant, in view of the fact that they and other

persons in the city limits have been seeking sewer and water line extensions for years without success.

"We definitely are not against new industry, but we have been out there eight years without a sewer...and I just can't see running it to someone else ahead of those who have petitioned it and requested it in proper order," she said.

Commissioners said they had obtained an estimate of \$22,000 cost of running the sewer lines to the Perkins business, and said the cost was prohibitive at this time.

Need for a plumbing board to establish standards and assist plumbing inspectors in the city was discussed and the commission agreed to look into their authority to establish such a board.

Dullin explained the need for additional office space in city hall for the Department of Public Safety's patrolmen, and it was indicated that the request would be granted at a later date.

Tabled was a suggestion to purchase a small motor grader for the city at a cost after trade-in of \$10,500.

Mayor Tomlinson discussed a suit against Slaton and eight other cities named in an action by three northern members of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority. He said attorney Bob McGinnis of Austin has been named to defend the authority as a whole against the suit, but not the cities individually. Slaton will be required to pay a portion of the attorney's fees, and the group voted authority to Howard Hoffman to represent the city in determining Slaton's portion.

Payment of bills for February was approved.




Roosevelt Girl Takes Miss Electric Title


