## **New Curtains Approved**

Purchase of new curtains for the stage of the high school auditorium and adoption of a proposed professional consultation agreement between the school board and Slaton Classroom Teachers Assn. constituted major action taken Tuesday night at the April meeting of the board.

The new red curtains to replace the worn-out ones presently used in the auditorium will cost \$1,815, it was reported. Installation of the curtains possibly could be achieved by the end of the current school term, according to M. W. Kerr, high school principal, who appeared at the board meeting in regard to the purchase of the curtains.

Bill Carnes, presenting the proposed consultation agreement for the Classroom Teachers, assured the board that the document in no way attempts to alter or diminish the statutory authority of the board to establish policies and procedures for the school district. Rather, it was noted, the purpose is to establish a line of communication between the teachers and the board to promote better understanding and help each group to assist the other in matters of common interest.

## Ground Is Broken For Hamburger Stand In City

Ground was broken last week and construction begun on the Big B Burger, a new hamburger stand on the corner of 22nd and Division Sts., on the corner west of Handy Hut.

Buddy Hoffman, 635 S. 16th, is builder and owner of the new business, which he expects to have in operation by about June 15.

"I saw the need of an eating establishment for the kids in school, and I know the problem they have in getting food in limited time they have for lunch," Hoffman said. He reported that the business will employ six persons, and will seat about 40.

There will be no curb service, but there will be a walkup window for orders, in addition to the inside service. Ken Cantwell, now of Albuquerque, will be manager of the facility, which Hoffman said will be constructed for about \$20,000.

## Warning System Is Mapped For Storms

Don Kendrick, civil defense director, announced that a meeting of all those involved in storm warning system was held recently to complete plans for operation of the system during this season.

Among those at the meeting were Kendrick, Chief of Police Glenn Farmer and Capt. Jeff Craeger; Pete Williams, assistant civil defense director; and Bob Kern, representing Slaton Fire Dept. Plans for storm watches and

notification of public whenever necessary were discussed. "We will keep abreast of the storm clouds through our spotter organization, made up mostly of firemen and police officers," Kendrick said. Whenever there is any imminent danger to Slaton, Radio

Whenever there is any imminent danger to Slaton, Radio Station KCAS will be advised and will come on the air to advise citizens, even if it is after the normal hours of station operation, Kendrick noted.

In the event that a tornado apparently is going to strike in the immediateSlaton area the sirens will be sounded. The signal is the same as the fire signal, except that the fire signal is only four blasts, whereas the storm warning will last from three to five minutes. "So if it blasts more than four times, you know it is a tornado warning, and should take precautions," Kendrick said. He also observed that if the signal was one long continuous sound, it usually means a malfunction of equipment, not a tornado about to strike.
