

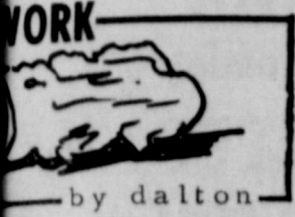

## Buckets of Rain Fall On Slaton During Week

Rainfall -- a rare commodity around here for many months--returned to the Slaton area in earnest during the last week, with a total of 5.5 inches falling since Thursday. A half inch had been recorded in Slaton the previous week, bringing the year's total to .75 of an inch. The year's total now is 6.25. Last Friday, 2.5 inches of rain was measured here, and .60 of an inch fell Saturday. On

Sunday there was a trace of rain, then 2.4 came in two good spurts Tuesday night. Temperatures plunged to 48 early Sunday, the lowest reading of the week. The highest temperature recorded here during the week was 88 last Thursday. The Slatonite was notified by mail Wednesday that Lubbock County has been approved as a drought disaster county.

## Bikes On Sidewalk Pose Problem Here

Problems of youngsters riding and parking bicycles on the city sidewalks -- particularly downtown -- were discussed by members of Slaton City Commission Tuesday night.

Mayor Bland Tomlinson said he had received several complaints -- and had almost been run down once -- regarding bikes parked or lying on the sidewalks downtown. He said the situation has been discussed with the police chief, and commissioners agreed that laws prohibiting bicycles on the sidewalks may have to get stricter enforcement unless youngsters cease this practice immediately. It was noted that bikes left on the sidewalk could be impounded.

Possibility of establishing parking areas for bicycles only also was discussed. City commissioners also discussed initial steps toward applying for a grant to be used

## Slaton Votes For Winners, Losers

Slaton Democratic voters cast 1,170 ballots in last Saturday's election, and some winners and some losers carried the three local boxes. In two Cooper boxes, 336 votes were cast; Posey counted 103; Roosevelt 244 and Acuff 153.

Dolph Briscoe, the statewide front - runner in the governor's race, was the choice of seven of the eight above-mentioned boxes, with the voters in Precinct 38, Stephen F. Austin School, going for Frances Farenthold, 167 to 108 for Briscoe. Altogether, the three Slaton boxes polled 454 votes for Briscoe, 307 for Farenthold, 207 for Ben Barnes, and 189 for Preston Smith.

In the U.S. Senate race, Ralph Yarborough beat Barefoot Sanders in West Ward 209-157, and in Austin School 282-69, but Sanders won in Precinct 36 (Slaton Clubhouse) by 176-163. Sanders also won in the Cooper boxes, tied 47-47 at Posey and won in Roosevelt (122-94) and Acuff (75-69) precincts 39 and 40. Yarborough led the ballot statewide and will face Sanders in a runoff.

John Hill beat Crawford Martin in the statewide race for attorney general, but two Slaton precincts went for Martin. Precinct 36 gave Martin a 198-150 margin, and 37 (West Ward) went for Martin 235-154. But Precinct 38 again was the rebel, going for Hill 178-172. Roose-

velt, Acuff, Posey and Cooper also voted for Hill.

Joe Christie, who campaigned in Slaton, carried only Precinct 38 of the three Slaton boxes. The others went for Wayne Connolly, who will face Bill Hobby in a state runoff for the Democratic nomination. Of the eight area boxes, only Posey went for Hobby.

In one race of prime interest here, Sheriff Choc Blanchard was re-elected, barely winning the countywide vote with a margin sufficient to avoid a runoff with either of his two opponents. On the County level, Blanchard had 15,655; Paul

Enger polled 8,204 and Charlie Bowman 7,251. Another top-rated race interest-wise saw Pete Laney upset incumbent Delwin Jones for the state representative job in this district, No. 76. Lubbock County and all the Slaton area boxes gave Jones the most vote, but Laney won a narrow victory in the district, which includes Hale County and part of Swisher County.

All the eight area boxes voted against forced busing and, on the Republican ballot, all except Roosevelt voted against daylight saving-time. Thirty -

## 80-YEAR-OLD INVOLVED

### Slaton Man Dies After Knife Fight

A 64-year-old Slaton Negro man died of stab wounds Tuesday morning after an apparent knife fight with an 80-year-old

Negro man on New Mexico Street.

Pronounced dead at the scene at 11:05 a.m. Tuesday by Justice of the Peace Arvin Stafford was Eddie Johnson, of 920 S. Oklahoma St. Johnson had several knife cuts in the chest and face.

Police Sgt. Tony Chavez, who answered the call to the scene, said he found the 80-year-old man standing at the scene, bleeding from cuts on the face and chest. A pocket knife with a 3 1/4-inch blade was taken from the man. The body of Johnson was lying on the ground near a car.

The older man was taken to Mercy Hospital, where his condition was not believed serious, although he remained hospitalized Wednesday.

Questioning of witnesses indicated that the two men had been arguing over a bottle of whiskey.

Other police activity during the week concerned break-ins and thefts which continued in the city.

The office of James Perkins, principal of Slaton Junior High, was burglarized and an undetermined amount of money taken. The intruders gained entry through a window on the east side of the gymnasium, then broke a glass from the door to the principal's office, reaching through to unlock the door. The incident occurred Monday night.

Melvin Kinnison, 140 N. Terry Drive, and C. L. Walton, 140 E. Powers, reported theft of mini-bikes from their yards. Kinnison valued his "Cat" mini-bike at \$139, and reported the theft occurred during the daylight hours Thursday. Walton was missing a 1971 Honda mini-trail valued at \$300.

An extension light and two tool boxes were stolen Friday from a 1966 auto owned by R. L. Smith, 700 S. 8th. An electric guitar in a tan case was stolen from the Pentecostal Holiness Church, 105 W. Know on Sunday.

Mrs. Clyde McAllister, 925 S. 10th, reported Friday that her residence had been burglarized, with rooms ransacked.

A new patrolman, Jerry Glynn Edwards, 22, joined the force this week, replacing Jack Visage. A graduate of Lubbock High, Edwards has been working as jailer for the Lubbock Police Dept. since December, 1968.

## Teacher Vacancies Are Eyed

Discussion of vacancies in the teaching faculty caused by resignations, leaves and re-assignments was one of the highlights of Tuesday night's meeting of the board of trustees of Slaton Independent School District.

In West Ward, Mrs. Nellie House is retiring and Mrs. Elizabeth Thompson has resigned, both as third grade teachers. Mrs. Bobbie Barnes was employed by the board Tuesday night, to be assigned to either kindergarten or to third grade. Mrs. Brenda George will teach in kindergarten. Mrs. Sandra Bledsoe has been hired to replace Mrs. Thompson.

In junior high, a coach for eighth grade boys is being sought, and Mrs. Margaret Smith has resigned as 6th and 8th grade language arts teacher. Several high school and special education teachers have resigned, with only one of the positions filled at this time, Supt. J. C. McClesky told the board. Mrs. Micken Benson, who has been teaching special education, will transfer to high school English, replacing Mrs. Velma Figley, who is retiring.

Omer Carrothers, ICT instructor, has resigned, as has Mrs. Barbara Guajardo, English and speech teacher. Special education teachers who will not be back this fall include Mrs. Vickie Hart, Mrs. Nancy Howard and Mrs. Judy Overturff, all on leave, and Mrs. Betty Knight and two teachers in the Roosevelt School (See TEACHERS, Page 12)

## School Transfers Face Tough Rules

Parents of some students who have been attending Slaton public schools by transferring in from some adjacent district are running into problems regarding these transfers for the coming school term, and in some cases may be denied their applications to transfer to Slaton school even if they have done so in the past.

Supt. J. C. McClesky noted that new and stricter rules forced on the Texas Education Agency by recent federal court orders are being enforced for the upcoming transfers and every student transferring not

only must meet all the new requirements but also must have his or her transfer application approved by the state agency, instead of the local school.

In a ruling by a federal judge in East Texas last year, the TEA was given the following directive, to which it must adhere in all other transfer cases: "Defendants (Texas Education Agency) shall not permit, make arrangements for or give support of any kind to student transfers, between school districts, when the cumulative effort in either the sending

ing or receiving school... will be to reduce or impede desegregation."

The TEA noted that a violation of this ruling would be where a school with a low percentage of black students accepts white transfers from a school district with a higher percentage of black students. "However, the same situation would exist if the minority student population were Mexican American," said the TEA.

Senior students eligible for graduation that year and special education students would be

excepted from the regulations.

"We realize this is going to work a hardship on some people, but there just isn't anything we can do about it," Supt. McClesky said, emphasizing that local officials simply have no more authority to approve or disapprove transfers. White transfers into the Slaton system from some nearby school districts probably will be approved, he noted, while others probably will not. Those affected by the new laws have been asked to contact the administrative offices of the school.

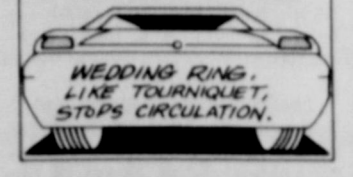

## Pesticides Are Pesky Problems

A statewide campaign for safe use of pesticides is being launched by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Leaflets explaining how to use and dispose of poisons will be placed in stores throughout the state. "We must all bear some of the responsibilities in the fight against environmental abuse," Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White notes in the leaflet. "We must do everything we can as individuals to maintain and improve our environment. Proper use and disposal of pesticides is a must to achieve this objective of a quality environment," White said. One of the most flagrant abuses of pesticides is their disposal. Getting rid of an unwanted poison by pouring it down a drain can result in great harm to the environment. Detailed instructions on how to properly dispose of pesticides are explained in the leaflet. This leaflet is titled "The Safe Use And Disposal of Pesticides And Their Containers." 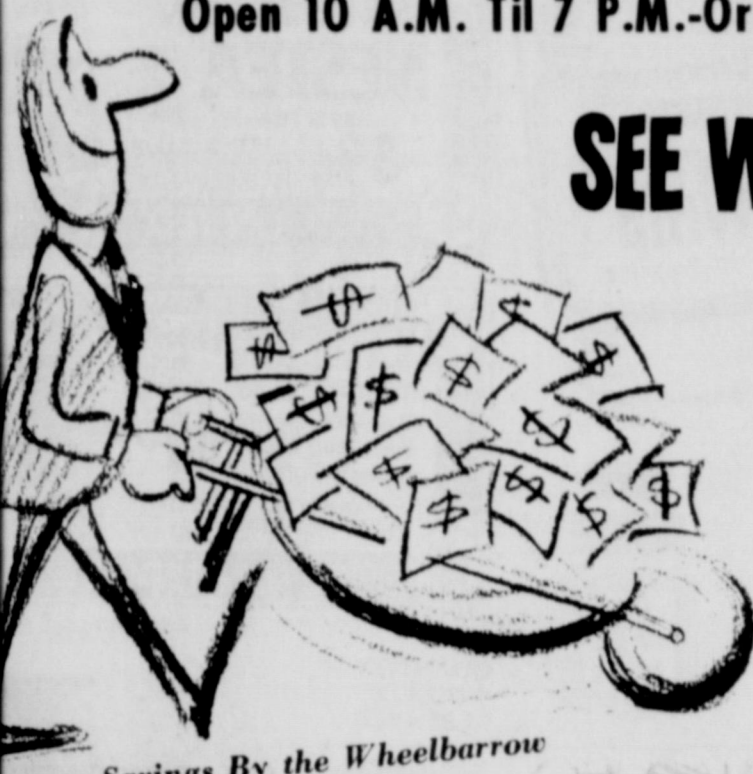

**Safety Act Film May Be Shown**

A horror film entitled "The Occupational Safety and Health Act" may be shown to Slaton merchants soon by a representative of the federal agency charged with enforcement of the recently-passed law. Board members of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce were told Tuesday morning.

Earl Bartley, manager of the chamber, said efforts are underway to schedule a showing of the film on the new law, which will require such things as special restrooms with lounges for all women employees, and water coolers every 100 feet or so, according to those who already have read the act.

The act already is in effect, and some larger firms have been fined heavily for violations, and smaller ones now face inspection, the board members were told. All businesses are affected, it was noted.

**Mobile Home Tie-Downs Advocated By TIAA**

"Mobile homes are like popcorn in a whirlwind when a major storm such as a tornado, severe windstorm or hurricane strikes unless they are properly tied down," Tom B. Lee, general manager of the Texas Insurance Advisory Association (TIAA) said today in advising the owners of mobile homes to anchor their dwelling securely and take proper precautions prior to the storms.

Mr. Lee pointed to the 1970 census which showed a great and growing expansion in the purchase of mobile homes. He also stressed that when a storm such as occurred in both Hurricane Celia and the Lubbock tornado hits a trailer court or park where the tie-down procedures have been less than adequate the effect is one of utter destruction.

"In Hurricane Celia, which swept through Corpus Christi in 1970," Mr. Lee said, "85 per cent of the estimated 7,000 to 9,000 mobile homes were damaged; half were total losses. The dollar value was estimated at nearly \$16 million."

Mr. Lee urged that all trailers be securely anchored by means of high strength cable which can be attached at a nominal cost without detriment to the appearance of the mobile home. He also indicated that, in addition to the cables, mobile homes can be anchored by a clamp on the I-beam under the unit which can be sunk into trailer court foundations. "This kind of protection could be ideally provided by the trailer court owners and builders," Mr. Lee said. "If it is done while the concrete is being poured the cost is negligible."

While stressing the need for such undertakings on a major scale, Mr. Lee acknowledged that some areas of Texas have ordinances pertaining to mobile home tie-downs. "Ideally, the most effective way of ensuring proper safety measures would be to have some form of state law," he said, "how- ever, until that time, we would like to again urge all mobile home owners and trailer park managers to install some sort of tie-downs for the safety of their residences."

An auction to benefit Mercy Hospital will be conducted early Saturday afternoon at Slaton Family Furniture on 20th St., located in the old bowling alley building.

Dan Holt and Joe Baker, owners of the new furniture business, said the hospital benefit auction would be held in conjunction with another auction of furniture which they will conduct.
