Services for Robert L. Kincheloe, 48, were held Wednesday in the Bible Baptist Church with the Rev. H. E. Summar, pastor, officiating. He collapsed about 5:30 p.m. Monday while working in a vessel of toxic gas at Paymaster Oil Mill Co. at 2300 E. 50th St. Police said Kincheloe and several other men were working in a vessel containing hexane, a gas used to remove oil from cottensseed, when Kincheloe staggered and collapsed. All workers, including Kincheloe, were said to be wearing gas masks.

Justice of the Peace Charles Smith withheld a ruling pending results of an autopsy he ordered.

A native of Bosque County, Kincheloe moved to Slaton from Ballinger in 1947.

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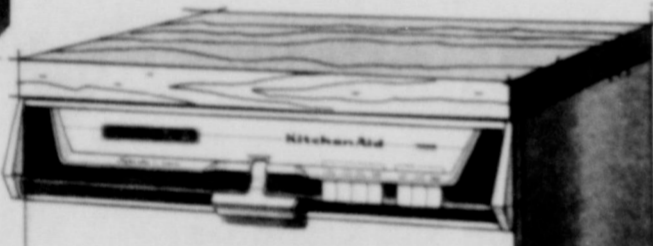
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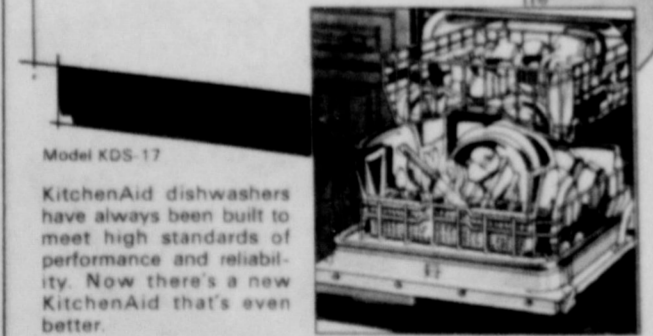

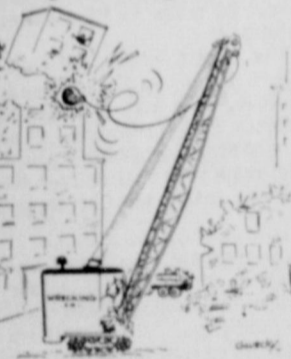

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and 34 persons injured. The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1971 shows a total of 445 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 242 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety for November, 1971, shows a total of 576 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 19 less accidents, one more fatality, and two less injured than during October.

Grandfather's home was in a beautiful location. I remember the low mountain ranges where he went hunting, and also the long winding creek that we had to cross three times to get to the nearest town.

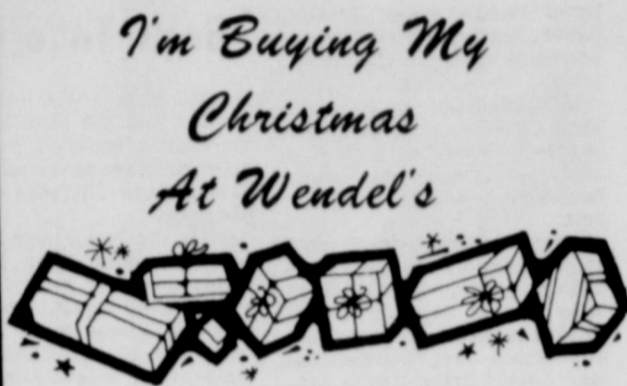
