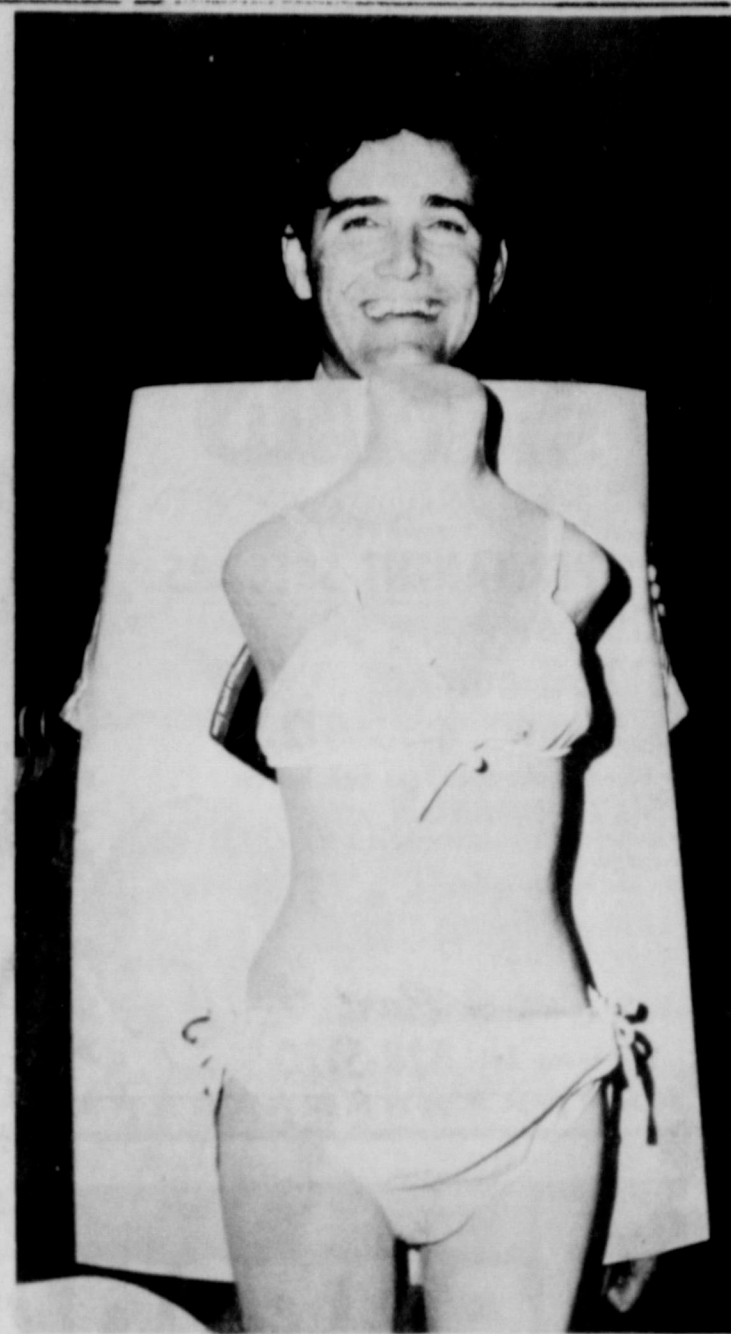

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Stolen Articles Recovered Here Before Loss Reported To Police

Recovery of some stolen items before they had been reported as missing and a 50-cent embezzlement case headed the list of police activities on file for the week at Slaton Police Dept.

Officer Jerry Edwards found too many obstacles in the dark to capture a suspect Saturday night, but did manage to recover a number of stolen articles in the chase, Edwards left a fellow officer in the

patrol car while he took out on foot to chase a man seen near the 1000-block of S. 5th St., after they answered a prowler call. Chasing the suspect in the dark across vacant lots, the officer first stepped into a hole which threw him temporarily, then ran into a wire fence, at which time the suspect, obviously more familiar with the terrain, escaped.

The officers did find in the vacant lot a number of items later found to match the description of some articles stolen from Ruben Solis, 1000 S. 5th. Solis said he was missing 12 tapes, a tape deck, two speakers and a BB pistol from his car parked at the residence, total value of \$142.59. Most of the items were recovered.

Sheriff's officers from Lynn County and Texas Ranger Frank Horger of Lubbock recovered a television set in a raid at O'Donnell and it was found to be missing from Bain Auto Store in Slaton.

Fourth Of July Blowout Set

At least 11 different organizations are planning to sponsor booths or activities in the Slaton county park Tuesday as the community-wide celebration of Independence Day takes place.

Capping the activities will be the fourth annual fireworks display at the park about 9:30 p.m., under supervision of the Slaton Volunteer Fire Dept. Fire Chief Don Kendrick said the fireworks display would be touched off near the park, and that viewers should stay in the park to get the best view of the exhibition. Also, he noted, at the conclusion of the display

will be a lighted flag on the tennis court backstops, carrying out the Independence Day theme.

Most of the activities will begin at noon, although some rounds of the tennis tournament will be played in the morning. Rotary Club will sponsor the tennis tournament.

Wayne Edwards, chairman of the celebration, said the following would take part:

Knights of Columbus, serving barbecue hamburgers. Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, Frito pie and tacos; Women's Divi-

sion of the Chamber of Commerce, serving homemade ice cream; Lions Club to operate the dunking board; Mercy Hosp. Auxiliary, first aid station; Athenian Study Club, children's games; Home Demonstration Club, cake walk; Jaycees, Cokes and snow cones; U. S. Army Recruiters, display; ping pong tournament entrants should sign up at 1 p.m. at the club house.

Mrs. Norma Bowman, president of Athenian Study Club, said children's races would start at 6 p.m. and would be divided into age groups of 4 through 6, 7 through 9, and 10 through 12. Games will include potato races, water races, egg pitch and sack races, she reported.

Dalton Wood, chairman of the tennis tournament, said that more entries are needed in order to have the event. At least four entries in any singles or doubles bracket is necessary to have an event, he said. Singles and doubles will be offered for boys and girls up to age 14, and for those 14 and over, which will include adults, if any enter.

Slatonites Swelter In 100-Plus Temperatures During Week

Outta sight. That's the word for Slaton's high temperature for the week as Slatonites broiled in 100-plus degree readings for five days in a row, topped by an astounding 108 degrees Tuesday, according to thermometers used by Pioneer Natural Gas Co. in Slaton.

According to Pioneer, readings were 99 last Thursday, 100 Friday, 102 Saturday, 103 Sunday, 106 Monday and 108 Tuesday. They estimated that temperatures would reach 98 Wednesday afternoon.

Using the 98 estimate for Wednesday, the Slatonite's Remington Lektronic calculator came up with an average temperature for the week of 102.285714285, which is a lot of hot.

Stand When Flag Goes By?

STATION -- At university home football games, Cadets always marches in to the music of the playing of these events, recently, I heard a young boy say to the people stand up when the flag goes by. I was the father's answer, but I began to wonder if he answered him.

I have a quiet time with him, I would talk about the flag, Shenandoah Valley, Flanders Field, St. Mihiel, Bastogne, Korea, and Viet Nam. I would tell him my young friend who has been a prisoner of war for more than five years. And, of course, I would tell him of the young men imprisoned over there.

I would talk of what our flag represents, what kind of a country it is. I would remind him that America was the refuge, the land of "the huddled masses yearning to be free," and a land dedicated to justice, tranquility, and the general welfare of its people.

I would talk of the average man and woman and the life they live. I would tell him of the people who have conquered the mountains, prairies, and deserts. I would discuss with him how the very lines of the land are marked by the blood of hundreds who plowed and fought and planned, and whose offspring have abundance around the world to lift others. Then I would talk of the slant eyes, black faces, Nordic color, Irish features, German laughter, Baptists, Catholics, Texans, Yankees, Republicans, Democrats, and of one other tall, short, fat and thin people who are Americans.

I would discuss the "land of the free," "home of the brave," the opportunity to climb the ladder of success and achievement. Then we would talk of the "how you play the game" and about "not who you are, but what you do." We would talk of the "life game plan," and how each man can worship God as he pleases, whistle, dance, and cheer as his conscience dictates. We would discuss our responsibility to our environment, to the minority, sick, lame, and those in their golden years.

I would think about how I could answer, as I began to stand when the flag goes by, I caught myself in the quietness of my office. The thoughts that came to me in a reverent respect and I wanted to cry out to the land that has done so much for me, the nine boys in our company, Company G, 272nd Airborne Division, two of them black, who were killed in Vietnam. Horses Require New Vaccination

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association (TVMA) and the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) issued a joint statement this week recommending the revaccination of all horses immunized during the Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis outbreak of a year ago. Texas is a high-risk area for a V.E.E. outbreak and while it is hoped no impending threat is eminent, revaccination is further insurance for the public against this deadly form of sleeping sickness in horses.

The spokesmen said that it was only after weeks of study and consultation with scientists and practitioners that the decision was made to revaccinate. Recent outbreaks of V.E.E. in Mexico and the discovery of V.E.E. antibodies in a dog and coyote found in Texas influenced the decision, the spokesmen said. Weather conditions are right for mosquitoes and other vectors to transmit V.E.E. from an infected animal to an animal that does not have immunization or to humans, they said.

Some 90 human cases of V.E.E. were reported in 1971 and about 2,000 horses died during the epidemic in Texas. Recent studies show that while the disease seldom kills adult humans, it was about 40 per-

cent fatal in young children in South America. The disease is almost always fatal to horses, especially young animals.

Ham, White Return From Kansas School

Jack Ham, feed plant manager for Supreme Feed Mills in Slaton, and Keith White, assistant, have returned from Manhattan, Kan., where they attended the first Feed Manufacturing Technology Short Course offered for U. S. Feed Industry by the department of grain science and industry, Kansas State University, in cooperation with the American Feed Manufacturers Association.

The intensive three week short course covered subjects ranging from communications to warehousing.

Weekend trips were arranged to visit a new 7,500 head commercial feedlot; a new feed mill; a large commercial dairy farm; and a drive through the scenic nationally famous Kansas Flint Hills where more than one million head of beef cattle are on pasture.

The 52 students enrolled in the short course came from 27 states and five foreign countries.

Basketball Clinic July 31-Aug. 4

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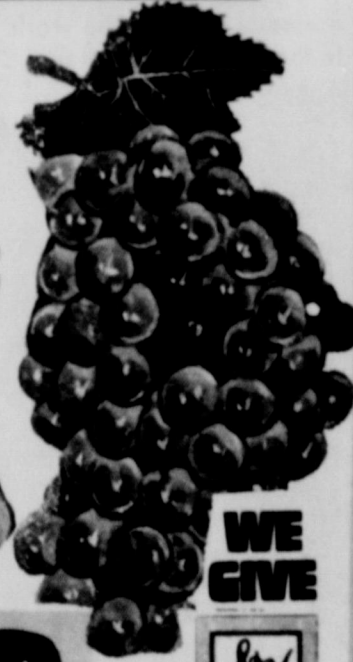

Evangelism Director C. Wade Freeman said the meetings will build on the growing interest and excitement in religion that is especially manifest among youth. Other speakers will be Richard Hogue, youth evangelist, of Houston; Gene Garrison, pastor of First Baptist Church, El Paso; Mike Gott, youth evangelist for Trinity Baptist Church, Tyler; Logan Cummings, pastor of First Baptist Church, Brownwood; and Robert Richardson, pastor of Grace Temple Baptist Church, Denton.

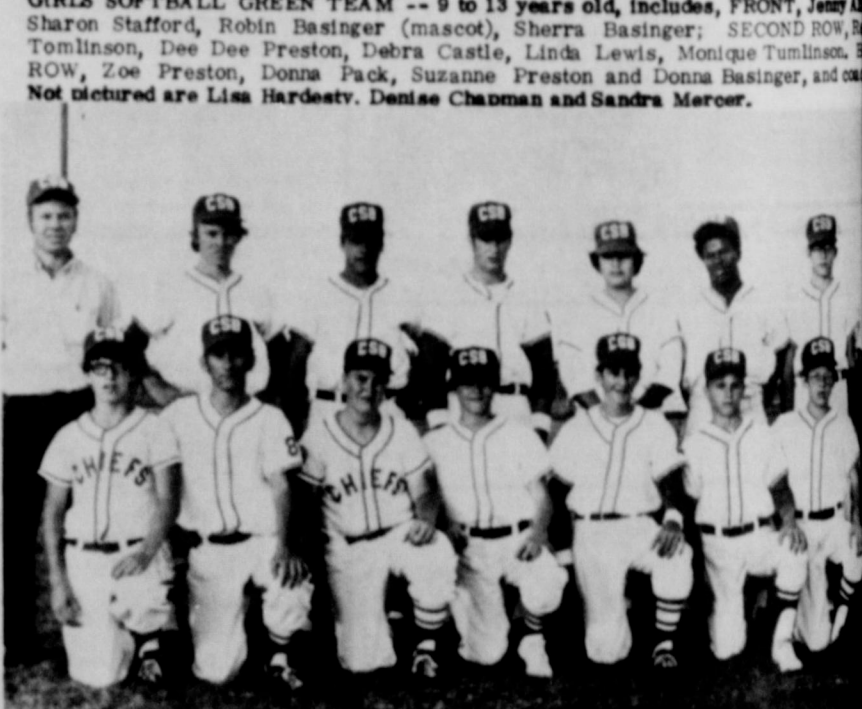
