





According to a just released progress report on the research at Tech, still more nutritious and acceptable food products have been prepared using vary-

ing percentages of cottonseed flour to replace wheat flour in many food items.

A third set of cottonseed flour recipes has been compiled for such foods as cheese crisps, choco cottonseed candy, sandwich spread for cottonseed bread, nut butter cookies, nutty praline bars and many others.

The progress report said earlier testing of cottonseed flour yeast breads has also been continued by varying the levels of cottonseed flour with additions of grain sorghum flour and another additive known as

sorghum flour, however, were of protein.

In addition, snack crackers with cottonseed nut filling have been prepared, rated by a small taste panel and stored for future testing to determine storage qualities and consumer ac ceptability.

She added that the addition of liquid cyclone processed cottonseed flour "significantly increases the nutritional value of the proteins in white wheat flour," according to results of extensive rat - growth studies which have been conducted.

With each 100 pounds of fiber, the cotton plant yields approximately 170 pounds of cottonseed. Seed production averages approximately 850 pounds per acre in West Texas, of which only about 15 per cent is the basis for the cottonseed processing industry which previously has produced -- as pri-mary products -- linters, oil for food, and hulls for livestock

The second phase of the program is a beautification program now underway to develop a pocket park in downtown Post. Trees and bushes are being planted, the land is being graded, and flower gardens and benches will be added.

These projects and hundreds of others like them are en couraged by the GFWC - Shell Environmental Responsibility Program throughout the country. The Program, which was launched in 1971, will continue this year. It replaces a Shellsponsored education program conducted by the two organizations from 1963 through 1970.

This new Program awards a total of \$55,000 to state and national winners. It is de signed to foster an interest in initiating and executing pro jects that will improve the environment. The money will be used by the winning clubs to expand their environmental efforts.

The charge that the wage- in drawing conclusions as to and is ineffective in checking inflation at this point is like filing a murder charge when there is no corpus delicti, according to W. P. Gullander, president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

"The present system of wage and price controls has been subjected to a barrage of criticism in recent weeks," Mr. Gullander told the Joint Economic Committee of Congress. But he said such criticisms have been supported mainly by "prejudiced rhetoric, rather than by objective analysis.'

"The chief threat to the success of the wage-price stabilization effort is not its own internal shortcomings, real though these may be," he said. "It is rather the tide of ill-informed and prejudiced criticism to which the program has been subjected."

Mr. Gullander told the committee that an attempt to reconstruct the program in wholesale fashion, in midstream, would be fatal to its chances for ultimate success.

"A shift to a program which would be punitive toward business would stop the present rising economic trend dead in its tracks," he said.

"Despite the histrionics of tem has favored business as against labor is completely contrary to the facts."

The NAM president said under which the wage-price control system has been laboring, one might have expected its record in restraining price increases to be unimpressive. "Instead, we find there has been a very striking reduction in the rate of rise in the cost of living since

last August," he said. He pointed out that from August, 1971, to February, 1972, the Consumer Price Index rose at an annual rate of only 2.8 percent, compared with 5.6 percent for the year ended August, 1970, and 4.4 percent for the year ended August, 1971.

Mr. Gullander said the major problem in restraining inflation is the increase in employee compensation.

"There is no margin to impose a further squeeze on profits as a contribution to the stabilization program," he said. "The public should be more aware of these facts

Consumers Want to Know

I'd like to buy a room air conditioner but I don't know what to look for. Please give me some suggestions.

Appliance experts advise that you assemble facts such as the size of the room to be cooled - the height, length and width, the direction the room faces, the type of window-such as casement, double-hung, etc., and the electrical voltage in your home. This information will help the salesman determine the cooling capacity you need and the best unit to do the job. Then you should ask about noise level, temperature controls, and filter. You should also find out how to clean and replace the air deflection features. Also consult use-andcare instructions.

Are accessories such as variable fan speeds and directional controls worth the extra price on room air conditioners?

Most air conditioner owners like a choice of fan speeds because low speed offers quieter nighttime cooling and higher speeds are useful for daytime cooling during very hot weather. Air directional controls allow you to direct the airflow up, down or to either side, thus preventing drafts. A thermostat may contribute toward more economical operation because it allows setting a temperature range that the unit maintains automatically. These accessories are no longer extra on many air conditioners.

Firefighter Awards Announced for 1972

Ward LaFrance Truck Corporation, Elmira, N.Y. has announced the "Annual Ward LaFrance Fire Industry Awards" for heroism, to be made next October.

A total of \$5,000 in prizes will be made, and on-or-off duty firemen of all ranks are eligible

The first award will be for \$3,000 and a plaque commemorating the achievement. Second prize will be \$1,000 and third and fourth prizes will be \$500 each.

Mobile Laboratory Is Seeking New Ozone Data

The ozone layer, the gas that absorbs the sun's deadly radiation high in the sky and makes life possible on earth, is being studied by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

From the truck-mounted Satellite Photometric Observatory built by Goodyear Aerospace Corporation, NASA scientists in Yuma, Ariz., are determining ozone height and volume density by measuring reflections from a 100-foot diameter, balloon-type satellite called Pageos. This measurement may give scientists insight into the effect highaltitude air pollution has on the environment.

Data are recorded on tape and by an oscillograph, both being fed by a detection system on the mobile observatory's 24-inch diameter telescope.

One word you'll be hearing more often is "ombudsman." Although sometimes referred to as "a smorgasbord of syllables," it may be defined more explicitly as "one who comforts the afflicted and afflicts the comfortable."

Back in 1809 the Swedes provided for an ombudsman in their Constitution. Usually appointed by the legislature, the ombudsman is considered a public defender. His job in Sweden and other countries is to protect citizens against government or bureaucratic mmission or omission.

For almost a year now, the U.S. government has had an ombudsman for business. Our constitutional right to petition the government is actually advanced by this special assistant to the Secretary of Commerce. His office also provides a better communication bridge between government and business.

Ombudsmen, sometimes given other titles, are also appearing in the U.S. Postal Service and state and local governments as well as private industry. This "good offices" approach has led to clarification of many difficulties between private firms and government bureaus.

Inquiries range through such subjects as imports, wage and price freeze, product standards, technology transfer, trade with China, how to keep informed on government procurement, as well as the whole gamut of government programs. In the first six months of the new office, some 1700 cases were

handled besides a large number of routine inquiries not requiring research, reference or extensive service, according to Thomas E. Drumm Jr., the new U.S. ombudsman. The general public benefits because jobs are created here as the result of increased business overseas.

Water Pollution Control Measure Is Submitted

Slaton city officials have submitted to the Texas Water Quality Board a municipal water pollution control and abatement proposal, as required by the Legislature in Senate Bill 835 passed last year. Deadline for receipt of the proposals by cities of 5,000 population and more, was May 1. The law affects 230 cities in the state, though only 150 made the May 1 deadline.

The legislation requires all cities in the 5,000 or more population bracket to form their own water pollution control and abatement programs, and to be responsible for the surveillance and enhancement of water quality problems within their city

tend to a city's extra territorial jurisdiction, though the latter is not a requirement. In addition, the law gives all cities, regardless of size, the right to monitor, inspect and sample possible water pollution dis charges, as well as the right to enforce penalties associated with violations, though smaller cities are not required to do so.

The TWQB is charged, by the legislation, with the responsibility of assisting and advising the cities in the implementation of the program. 

ANSWER: In our opinion you are too young to be babysitting. In your letter you didn't mention whether you babysit for just your younger sisters and brothers, or if you babysit for other people. In either case, we still feel that you are too young. To be a babysitter you must be able to handle the responsibilities of that position. It is serious business. You deal with the health and safety of a young child or young children. You must be able to know what to do if an emergency should arise. If you are constant-ly frightened, you are in a state of mind that could lead to tragedy if you were needed to react swiftly and calmly to an emergency situation. We feel that a 13 year-old who is mature can babysit for older children. You should be at least 15 or 16 years old if you are going to babysit with an infant.

Among dangers in older houses inadequate electrical systems get top billing. The number of appliances needed to live modernly has brought about this power problem. Houses wired twenty or thirty years ago were adequate at that time, but today they are usually inadequate.

Nutrient Value Of Hay Effects Quality

or know the exact feeding values of the hays they use. They can rely on time-honored hay judging techniques to estimate hay quality. Or they can know their hay's real worth by having it tested chemically, says Associate County Agricultural Agent

A major factor affecting hay quality is the stage of maturity when the plants were cut. No mature seed should be present. Coastal bermudagrass should be no more than 14 to 16 inches

Since plant leaves have the nutrient quality, high highest quality hay should contain a high proportion of leaves to stem, notes Hemphill, A bright green color indicates a minimum of bleaching and leaching losses of vitamins and other

nutrients. Good, clean hay crops have an aroma or fragrance, not a moldy, dusty smell, adds the agent. Large and numerous stems mean hay with low acceptability and quality. Good, clean hays are also those with minimum of stubble, weeds and foreign matter.

Having hay chemically tested is the only sure way to know its actual feed value, points
