City Police Chief Resigns

Glenn W. Farmer, chief of police for the City of Slaton for nearly a year and a half. has submitted his resignation to city commissioners who accepted it Tuesday night.

Chief Farmer said his resignation would be effective Aug. 15. He is leaving the department after five years to accept a teaching position in the Law Enforcement Program of Wayland Baptist College, Plainview. He said he and his wife, Pat, would remain in Slaton for some time, but eventually would move to Plaincommissioners passed two review. Joining the force in September 1967 after moving from Greeley, Colo., Farmer first was sergeant, then assistant chief, then chief of police since March 1971. He will receive a bachelor of arts degree in law enforcement from Wayland College after completing work this week, and is the first graduate of the law enforcement program from any college in the South Plains area. Slaton Man Is Fatally Shot

A 55-year-old Slaton man was fatally shot early Monday afternoon in south Slaton and a Slaton woman remained in county jail Wednesday after being charged with murder with malice in connection with the shooting.

Joe D. Burleson, 215 S. 12th St., was shot once in the abdomen and was dead on arrival at Mercy Hospital. Officials said a .22 caliber bullet apparently severed a vein causing massive internal bleeding. Burleson had been a heavy equipment operator in road construction work.





4-H'ers, Leaders Sew Better

SPECIAL - 4-H members aren't the only ones who "learn by doing" through 4-H programs. Volunteer leaders also can "learn by doing" in a training course designed to help them help 4-H members improve their sewing skills.

The course, Your Sewing Machine, sponsored by The Singer Company, for 17 years, annually involves more than 12,000 volunteer leaders. The leaders in turn use their improved skills and methods in teaching thousands of young 4-H members.

Taking about two days to complete, the course is taught by Extension Service personnel previously instructed by Singer educational supervisors. The course builds confidence in handling a sewing machine and emphasizes the development of creative sewing habits. It also deals with stitching, regulating and caring for the sewing machine, and learning methods of handling different fabrics.

Members and leaders are provided educational materials and aids by The Singer Company, including printed manuals and a variety of fabric samples. Leaders completing the course also are eligible for a certificate of merit.
