

Slaton area business people and farmers -- who also will be affected by some of the reg-ulations -- are '_wited to attend a meeting in Slaton Junior High School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, June 1, regarding new federal safety regulations now in effect.

Herbert M. Kurtz, assistant area director for the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), will preside at the meeting arranged by the Educational Committee of Slaton Chamber of Commerce, J. C. McClesky, president. Kurtz will answer questions

regarding the new regulations and their enforcement, and will show a film on the rules.

materials shall not create a hazard. Bags, containers, bundles, etc., stored in tiers shall be stacked, blocked, inter-locked and limited in height so that they are stable and secure against sliding or collapse."

Injured Youth Is Paid Special Tribute Here

David Brake received a medal Tuesday, even though he didn't think he earned it.

The 17-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Brake, 1325 W. Crosby, was critically in-jured in a two-car smashup on Woodrow Road west of the city on Jan. 16, and for weeks lay near death. But now he has recovered to the extent that he is at home, understands what is going on, although he can't speak, and is moved about in a wheel chair.

His mother is quick to give credit for his remarkable improvement to the supreme out-side source. "The prayers of so many people for David's recov-ery have had effect," she said. "They have been a tremendous help."

Using a board on which the alphabet is painted, David points to letters and spells out words to converse with others. His mother said he asked her what he had done to deserve the military excellence awards, When Col. Bowen explained to him Tuesday that "you've been one of our top cadets," David just shook his head.

The youth's promotion to cadet lieutenant colonel also was made effective, Col. Bowen



It's Grass Cutting Time: Be Careful

By Virginia Knauer Special Assistant to President Nixon for Consumer Affairs

What domestic appliance do you know of that can cut like a knife, shoot like a gun or explode like a

Your rotary power lawn mower can if it is care-

The most hazardous part of your mower is the fast rotating blade, but you should be aware of other hazards too. Rocks and other debris can be hurtled from the discharge chute at high speeds. mower gas tank being filled while hot can explode. A mower running in a closed garage can emit poisonous carbon monoxide fumes. Or loose clothing - even long hair - can be caught in a mower's exposed moving

The power mower is a valuable tool for the modern homeowner, but it is not a toy and should be taken seriously. In 1969 an estimated 140,000 injuries were caused by mowers. Fortunately. there are two ways to reduce the injury toll: design a safer mower and increase consumer awareness about

Improved safety features are becoming available on many models, such as discharge chutes that minimize ejection of dangerous objects and guards that keep the operator's feet away from the blades.

Look on your mower for the triangular silver-colored safety seal, sponsored by the Outdoor Power Equipment Institute, which indicates that the mower has been certified by an independent laboratory to meet standards set by the American National Standards Institute in 1968. In small print you will read:

"ANS B71.1-1968." The standards have been upgraded in 1972 so that later in the year you may see a new gold-colored seal labeled "ANS B71.1-1972."

However, the ANSI standard is voluntary and is only a minimum standard.

Here is where consumer safety awareness comes, in. By investigating the safety features of the mower you buy and by paying a few extra dollars if necessary, you can get a mower whose safety features exceed the minimum. Ask your dealer for the free safety mowing guide published by OPEI or write to Outdoor Power Equipment Institute, 734 15th St. N.W., Washington, D.C.

The OPEI guide can be especially useful if you own a mower bought many years ago when safety features were fewer or if you have lost your owner's manual. Also, you should have your mower inspected annually by a serviceman to eliminate loose parts, cracked blades and other hazards.

To report a mower accident, write a letter to OPEI and send a copy to Food & Drug Administration, Bureau of Product Safety, Room 222-C, 5401 Westbard Ave., Bethesda, Md 20016. Include the manufacturer's name, the model number and the serial number. This will aid FDA in its efforts to gather data about product-related

Union Monopoly Threatens Exports, Says Farm Bureau

Union monopoly power is threatening our export market, both for farm products and industrial goods, William J. Kuhfuss, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, said.

"In the last six months of 1971, the United States experienced a foreign trade deficit for the first time since 1893," Mr. Kuhfuss explained. "We are importing more than we are exporting. This simply says we are not in a competitive position with our products. Overall wages and imposed labor demands are basically responsible. The biggest increases in both retail and wholesale costs are increased wages which are being reflected in everything from capital investments to hourly wages. We are all benefited by good wages, but excesses must be avoided if we are to remain competitive in the market. Wage demands must be related to productivity," he said.

"In the long run, commodities are going to be produced where they can be best pro-duced for the lowest price.

Don't Try to Memorize Social Security Number

Don't try to memorize your social security number. Don't - especially - try to repeat your social security number from memory when an employer asks you for the number for his records when you start

That advice comes from social security officials here.

"Your social security number has nine digits," a spokes-man noted. "If you try to memorize it, you can easily

try to repeat it. If you furnish a wrong social security number to an employer, it may cause difficulty in crediting your earnings to your social security record. That may eventually affect your social security

An employee's earnings are credited to his social security number when they are reported by his employer. The employee's earnings determine the amount of monthly social security benefits he may collect when he retires or becomes severely disabled; also the amount of benefits his family may get if he dies prematurely.

"If all of your earnings are not credited to your social security number, your benefits may amount to less than they should," the spokesman said.

Advice from social security: Always carry your social security card in your purse or wallet. When starting a new job, always show your social security card to your employer and make sure he copies the number and the name from your card.

"Remember," the spokesman said. "Don't try to memorize your social security number. It could cost you money."
