**CREATE YOUR OWN Shades of Christmas...**

Want to create a big—and original—holiday effect for very little? Try decorating your window shades.

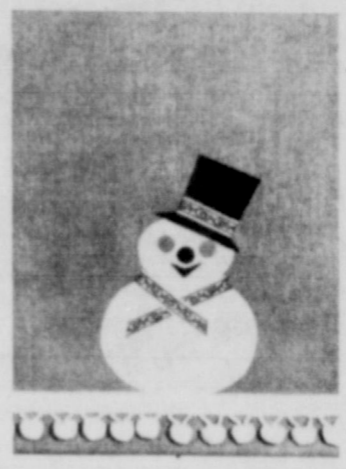
Cotton shade cloths lend themselves beautifully to a whole new kind of easy, do-it-yourself decor. Just match holiday decorations to your color scheme.

For instance, you might decorate a red and white striped shade with a collage that consists of a red fabric bowl filled with green and white mistletoe.

Cut the shapes from cotton fabrics and glue into place with a vinyl adhesive. Create the bowl from bright red corduroy and trim with tiny white cotton rickrack.

Cut a half-oval shape from green cloth and attach to the top of the bowl. Then add on green leaves and white berries for mistletoe.

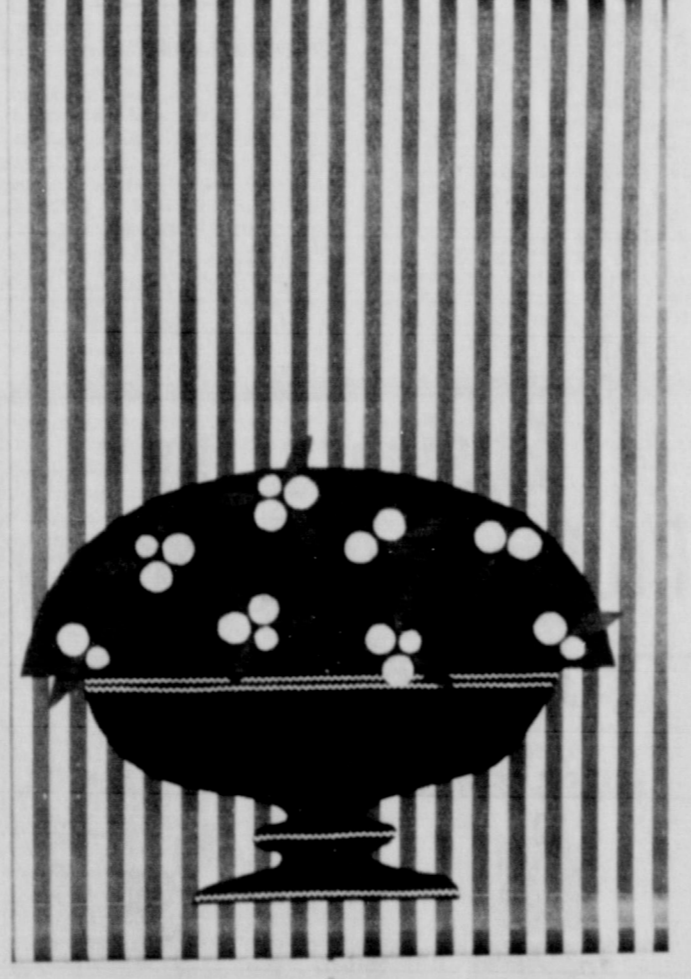
The completed shade will add a note of gaiety to any room, but it's especially effective in the dining room where it can act as a centerpiece for a buffet table pushed against the window.



**SNOWMAN SHADE**—A blue shade of textured cotton takes on a holiday air with a cheery-looking snowman. Cut the snowman from cotton batting and add a hatband and scarf made from narrow cotton trim in red and white. Cut holes in the batting so the shade color shows through for eyes, and glue on cotton fabric scraps for other facial features. A row of oversized cotton ball fringe is attached to the shade slat.



**ANGEL MOTIF**—Christmas shades can be charming anywhere in the house. This cotton shade in rich colonial blue is spotlighted with an appliqued angel cut from cotton fabrics and glued into place. Use white cotton for the robe, pink for face and hands, and yellow for hair and wings. Self-adhesive gold braid outlines the angel's triangular shape, creates a small halo, and trims the shade border.



**BOWL OF MISTLETOE**—This decorative shade can act as a centerpiece for a holiday buffet table that's pushed against the window. Use a red and white striped cotton cloth shade and form a collage made from cotton fabrics glued into place with vinyl adhesive. Use red corduroy or cotton velveteen for the bowl, and trim it with tiny white cotton rickrack. Attach a half oval shape of solid green to the top of the bowl, and add on green leaves and white berries.

proof cotton batting—the kind that's used under Christmas trees—and glue into place.

Add a hatband and scarf of narrow cotton braid in red and white. Use cotton fabric scraps for facial features, and cut holes in the batting for the eyes so that the blue shade color shows through.

For a finishing touch, attach a row of oversized cotton ball fringe—representing a series of unmelted snowballs—to the shade slat.

These are just a few of the many ideas that can be developed to celebrate the festive season.

Ideas can be as sophisticated or as simple as you choose.

For an added touch, holiday greetings can be written on the outside of the shade

**Remember The Old-Time Christmas?**

In the frenetic pace of modern life, the simple Christmas traditions of the past seem all but forgotten, but at Greenfield Village and Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan, the unique joys of earlier Christmases are well remembered and faithfully recreated. This year beginning December 9, the real spirit of the season comes to life there so that visiting families can experience today the kind of Christmas their ancestors knew.

The warmth and nostalgia of earlier Yuletides abounds in the Greenfield Village houses decorated as they might have been by their original famous owners -- men like Edison, Ford, the Wright Brothers, Noah Webster and Stephen Foster. These and other authentic early American buildings, aglow with candles, freshly-cut greenery, festive tables, poinsettias and Yule logs, trace 300 years of Christmas tradition.

The nostalgia is punctuated by activity. Bread bakes in the hearth of a pioneer cabin, taffy bubbles on the stove of a 19th-century farm kitchen and hammers shape red-hot iron on the ancient anvil of America's oldest operating forge. In a cozy old parlor, a costumed hostess crochets Christmas gifts to the accompaniment of traditional Christmas music of the period.

Outside, groups of singers roam the streets singing traditional Christmas carols. The sound of their music drifts through the bare trees to mingle with the tinkle of harness bells on the horses pulling old-fashioned sleighs across the crusted snow.

At the Town Hall on the picturesque Village green, visitors are greeted by the friendly aroma of the hot, spiced cider and Christmas cookies served there. In the nearby Clinton Inn, families dine amid festive decorations which re-create Christmas as it was in a roadside hostelry a century and more ago.

Nostalgia also reigns in the adjacent Henry Ford Museum. Intriguing and often quaint Christmas decorations from out of the past line the aisles and the sound of Yuletide music of other eras fills the air. From time to time, visitors hear concerts of traditional music played on antique instruments from the Museum's collection.

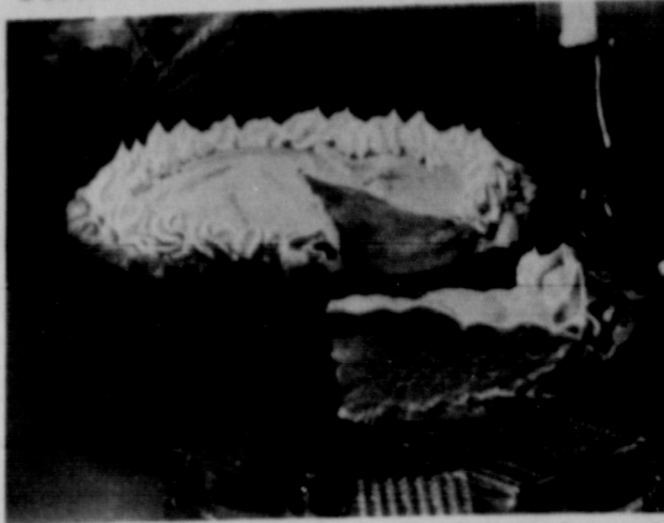
Along the Street of Early American Shops, more than a dozen craftsmen are busy recreating that time when not only the luxuries, but also the necessities of life were made by hand. These skilled artisans mold candles, blow glass Christmas ornaments, cast metals, form pottery and make dolls, hooked rugs, quilts and many other objects in the time-honored tradition of their arts.

Rounding out this Christmas from the past, the Greenfield Village Players present "Puss in Boots," a charming holiday entertainment for the entire family. This warm and humorous adaptation of the classic fairy tale is enlivened by songs and dances specially created for this production.

**Fluffy Pumpkin Pie**

1/2 cup sugar  
1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
1 teaspoon pumpkin pie spice  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
3/4 cup milk

1 egg, slightly beaten  
1 can (16 oz.) pumpkin  
2 cups (or one 4 1/2-oz. container) frozen whipped topping, thawed  
1 baked 9-inch pie shell, cooled

\*Or use 1/4 teaspoon each cinnamon, nutmeg, and ginger.

Combine sugar, gelatin, spice, and salt in saucepan. Blend in milk. Cook and stir over medium heat until sugar and gelatin are dissolved and mixture just comes to a boil. Gradually stir hot mixture into egg. Blend in pumpkin; chill until very thick. Then blend in 1 cup of the whipped topping. Spoon into pie shell. Chill until firm -- about 3 hours. Garnish with remaining whipped topping.

**Garlands Make Graceful Decorations**

Garlands make graceful, fixed decorations in the proper setting. On banistered staircases the garland can be wound in and out of the stair columns with the newel post and finished off with velvet bows, Christmas bells or other traditional motifs.

The garland is satisfactory to outline a large mirror or painting on all four sides. Also, the garland can be draped in scallops around the ceiling moldings, studded with wreaths at intervals. This is recommended only for very large rooms.

### WITH RATE INCREASE

## Toll-Free Calls Start Sunday

Toll-free calling between Slaton and Lubbock will go into effect at 12:01 a.m. Sunday. With the Extended Area Service (EAS), Slaton customers can dial any Lubbock telephone number.

"We are pleased to inaugurate this service for Slaton customers, another step in providing the best quality phone service we can for the community," said Les Stevens, manager for Southwestern Bell.

The telephone company began work on the Slaton-Lubbock EAS arrangement after the Slaton City Council approved new rates in August, 1970, to be effective with the service cutover.

The new monthly basic rates include \$18 for one-party business service; \$7.25 for one-party residence service; \$5 for two-party residence service; \$11.85 for suburban four-party business service; \$5.85 for suburban four-party residence service; \$2 for a business extension; and \$1.25 for a residence extension.

Current basic rates include \$11 for one-party business service; \$5.75 for one-party residential service; and \$1 per extension in the home since May, 1969.

"In the past 13 1/2 years, taxes, wages, and Southwestern Bell's investment in Slaton have grown considerably," Stevens said. "At the same time, the cost of operations have increased sharply. In addition, Southwestern Bell expended a large capital investment in providing the EAS service. All these factors necessitated the increase in rates."

Stevens pointed out that the company has been able to hold the line on basic rates since 1959 by continued and increased sales activities and through the use of numerous technological advances in equipment and facilities.

In dialing toll-free calls to Lubbock starting Sunday, Slaton customers need dial only the seven digits of the Lubbock number. From Sunday on, customers should not dial "1" as they have done in the past when dialing a One-Plus (toll) call.

"Slaton customers should wait until Sunday to attempt to dial Lubbock toll-free," Stevens emphasized. "The equipment will not be operational until that time."

The telephone company is making last minute checks and tests before the cutover.

Stevens also pointed out that Lubbock numbers are the only ones which Slaton customers can reach toll-free under the new EAS arrangement. Slaton customers cannot dial such locations as Ransom Canyon, Wolforth and Idalou, which also have EAS arrangements with Lubbock.

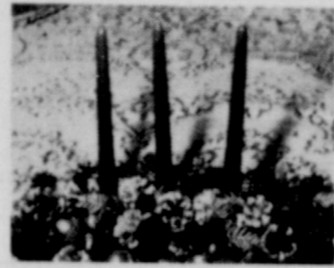

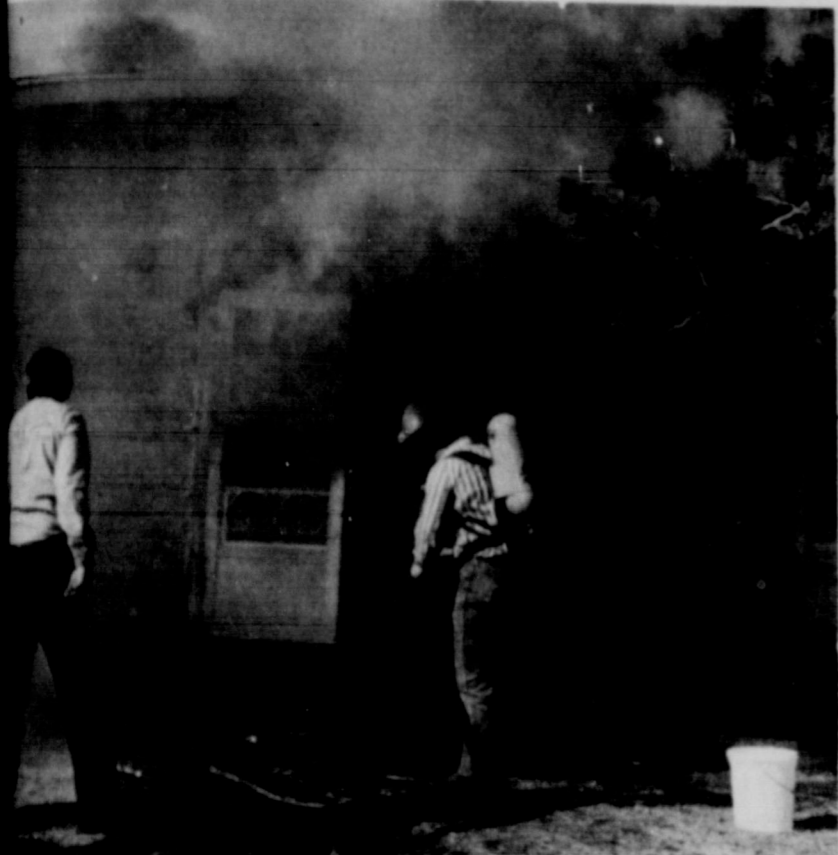
as Washington scored 21. The Tigerettes were ousted by Canyon, the eventual winner, 46-40, after having drummed Muleshoe 75-46 in the first round.

A nice surprise! Under the wrapping and pretty decorations, scrumptious-looking gifts such as fruit cakes, pastries and delightful presents, but care is taken in wrapping these gifts to insure their cooking-to insure their product later.

Removing fruit cake from its paper wrapping, leave it in paper wrapping thoroughly, in a paper bag, county Extension.

Wrap securely in a layer of moisture-proof packaging material such as cellophane, waxed paper, plastic or laminated paper. Store in a cool, dry place in a tightly covered container.

Fruit cakes are aged to give them their special flavor. They are considered best after three months storage. They keep well, fruit cakes keep up to one year in storage. When ready to use, remove the cake from its wrapping and thaw. It will be unwrapped while still in its paper.

**OLD FRUIT CAKE**

Soak 3 pounds seeded raisins in 1/2 cup brandy for 24 hours. Cut into half-inch cubes; 1/2 cup raisins, 1 pound butter, 1/2 cup sugar, 1/2 cup molasses, 1/2 cup dates or apricots, whole-if desired-- 1/2 cup red watermelon rind, 1 pound pecans, walnuts, and 1/2 pound flour, 1/2 cup cinnamon, 1/2 teaspoon cloves, 1 teaspoon allspice, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 pound butter or shortening and 1 cup brown sugar in a greased pan. Add egg yolks to this mixture.

Mix a small amount of water with the dry ingredients and add to the mixture to keep them together.

Put mixture alternately in a greased pan with fruit juice or sweetened condensed milk. Add fruits and nuts, thoroughly. Finally add egg whites.

Make 11 pounds of which may be baked in 2 coffee cans or steam pans. Line them with paper to fit, with the paper one inch above the top, grease the paper, and the batter firmly into 1/2 inch of the space over a pan of

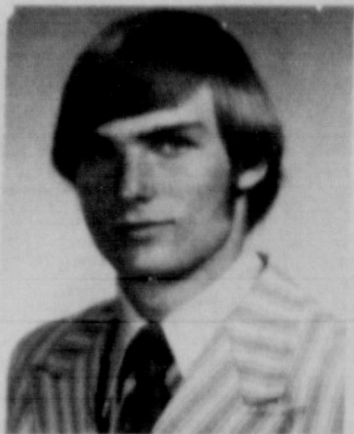

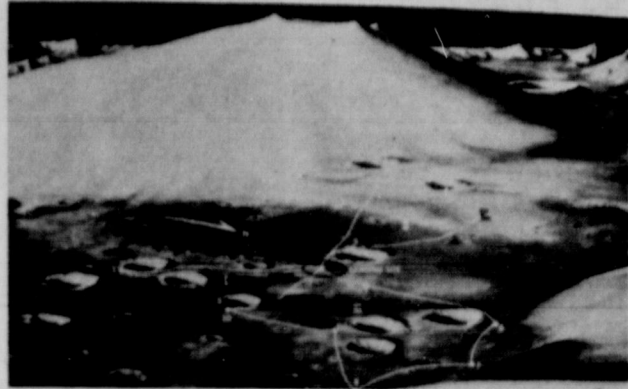
