REGISTRATION BEGINS AUG. 13

School Doors Open August 20

Slaton schools will begin their first full day of classes Monday, Aug. 20, according to superintendent J. C. McCleskey. Registration for the different grade levels have been set at their respective schools.

All parents of kindergarten students (those five years old on or before Sept. 1, 1973) should come to the West Ward School cafeteria at 9:30, Monday, Aug. 13 to register their children. It is important that officials know how many children will be enrolled so that classes may be scheduled accordingly. A recent law had made public kindergarten available to all five year olds who live in the Slaton School District.

Parents should bring the child's shot record and birth certificate or baptismal record, according to Joe Sparkman, administrative assistant.

All new students in high school and junior high should register Tuesday, Aug. 14, at 1 p.m. at their respective schools should register Thursday, Aug. 16, according to principal Ernie Davis. Sixth grade registration time is 1 p.m., seventh grade is 1:30, and eighth grade time is 2 p.m. High school students already enrolled do not need to pre-register.

Other West Ward students, in grades 1-3 will register Thursday, Aug. 16, with the first grade scheduled for 9 a.m., second grade set for 10 a.m.

and third grade registering at 11 a.m. Birth certificates and shot records should be provided for first grade students who kindergarten last year.

Stephen F. Austin School, which houses the fourth and fifth grades under principal Bing Bingham, will have registration on Thursday, Aug. 16, also. Parents may accompany but it is not necessary. Fourth grade students register at 1:30 p.m. while fifth grade students register at 2:30.

All Slaton teachers and employees should be at the Junior High School cafeteria at 8 a.m. on Aug. 15 for a breakfast to start the school year. They will have three days of in-service training, according to Sparkman.

from underground tanks on the premises. Value of the loss was placed at \$119.82.

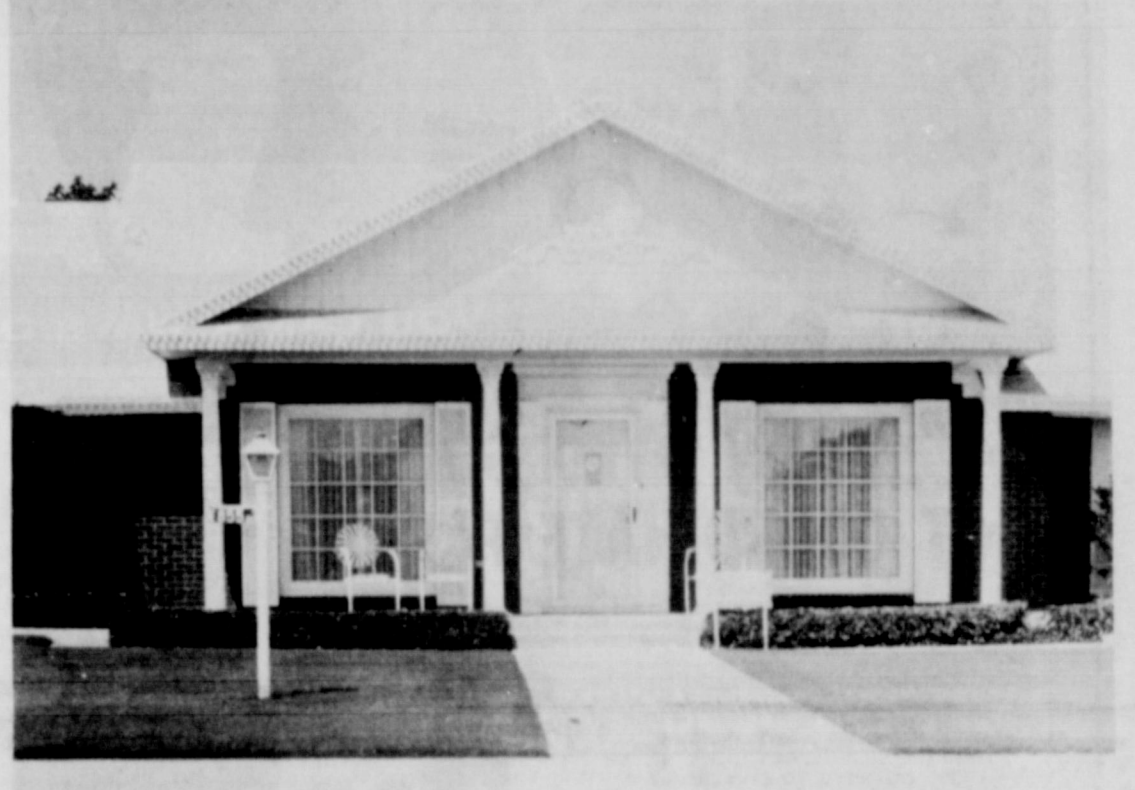
