Snyder Youth Dies In Wreck

A 17-year-old Snyder youth was killed in a one-car rollover on U. S. 84 in the city limits of Slaton Saturday night, and two other youths in the car suffered minor injuries.

Joe Mark Keller suffered fatal injuries when the 1969 car he was driving went out of control and rolled over him after he was thrown from the vehicle. Damage estimate of \$2900 to the car was made by investigating officers.

A collision on Railroad Ave. last Thursday injured the driver of one of the cars, Mrs. Ruby

Sanders Holt of Slaton. Her 1972 car was involved in a collision with a 1968 auto driven by Albert Harrison Grigsby of Slaton. Mrs. Holt was admitted to Mercy Hospital, then transferred to Lubbock, where she remained Wednesday.

A pedestrian, Charles Rosario Martinez, 19, of Lubbock, was injured about 1:30 a.m. Sunday when a car containing four unidentified men drove into a yard at 155 S. 2nd. Martinez was treated at Mercy Hospital for a leg injury.

'Meet Jesus' Evangelist Is Former Area Resident

Dr. George Worrell, Texas Tech graduate and former Lubbock and Lamesa resident, will be the featured evangelist for the community-wide "Meet Jesus" Crusade scheduled here in July. Special music during the week-long crusade will feature a 125-voice local choir directed by Marion Warren of Eules and also will feature the Shloh singing group.

Worrell, born in Dalhart in 1930, married the former Betty Joy Haberer of Dimmitt in 1952 and the couple now has five children. A graduate of Big Spring High School, he earned his B. A. degree at Tach in 1951 and earned B. D. and Th. D. degrees at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth in 1955 and 1962.

Licensed and ordained at College Ave. Baptist Church in Lubbock, Dr. Worrell pastored First Baptist Church in Lamesa from 1966-70 and earlier was pastor of churches in Fort Worth and Oklahoma. He is a staff associate in the field of academic evangelism for the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

Dr. Worrell has been a teacher of Hebrew and Old Testament at the seminary, speaker at many events, author of articles in Adult Teacher and Baptist Standard, has led a tour of Europe and been speaker for meetings in Korea and Taiwan. He is responsible for the Meet Jesus Crusades in Texas during 1973.

Alvin Walker, local music committee chairman, said 125 singers are needed from the various participating churches for the crusade, scheduled July 22-29. Walker said the first choir rehearsal is planned at 6:30 p.m. July 6

at Westview Baptist Church. Other local committees also have been busy preparing groundwork for the crusade, which will be held nightly in Tiger Stadium.

Warning Issued On Following Emergency Vehicles In Slaton

Slaton motorists were warned Wednesday that city ordinance prohibits following emergency vehicles operated by policemen and firemen, and that violators can be ticketed and fined.

"The situation is getting dangerous," said Police Chief

Fred Clark. "If motorists persist in following emergency vehicles, they may be faced with being injured or causing a city patrolman or fireman to be injured while answering an emergency call. When a siren is sounded from a patrol car, fire truck or ambulance, then the person operating this vehicle will be en route to an emergency call and motorists should immediately get out of the way of the emergency vehicle and not try to follow it."

Chief Clark cited a portion of the new city ordinance covering the situation as follows:

"Upon the sounding of the siren or other fire signal, when a fire alarm has been turned in, each and every car or vehicle being driven upon or in any street or alley of the City of Slaton, shall be immediately parked to the curb to the right of the street or alley in the direction such car or vehicle is being driven, and shall remain so parked until the driver thereof shall have fully determined that the fire truck is traveling away from the car or vehicle he (or she) is driving, or that the fire truck has reached its destination.

"For violation of this section the offender shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars (\$5.00), nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).

'Entertaining' Is Club Program

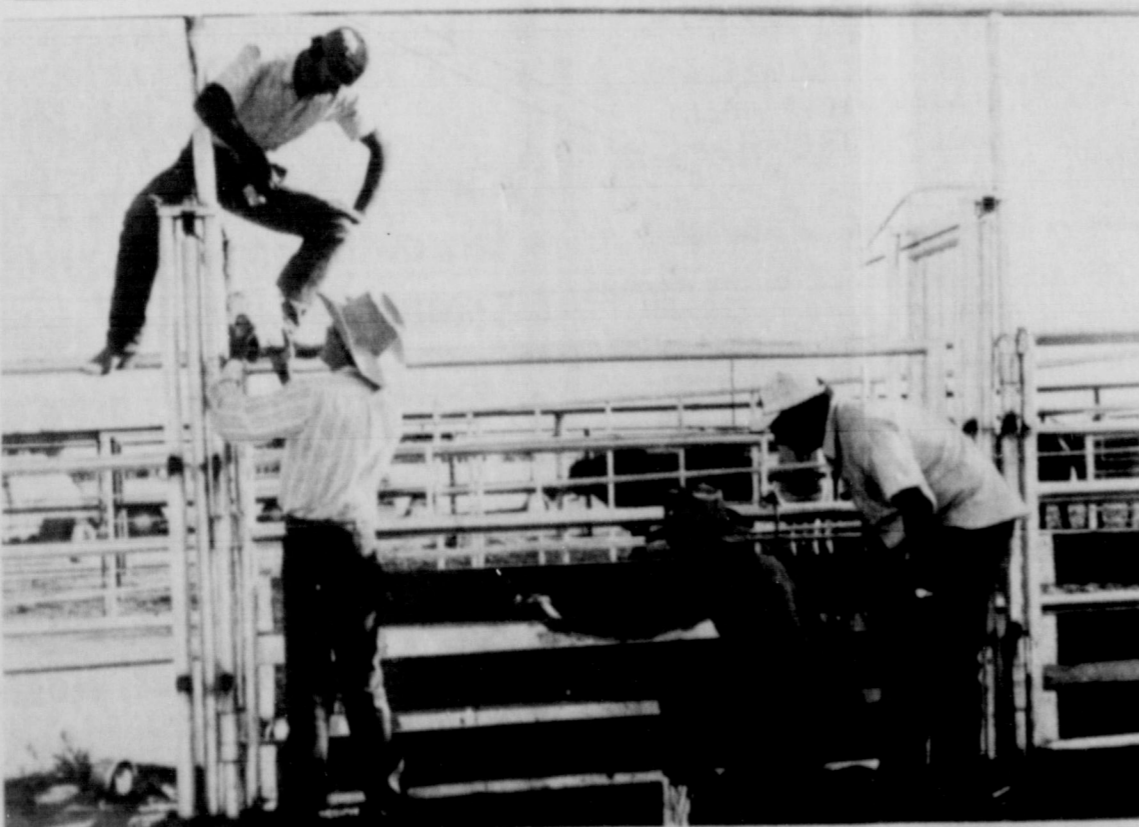

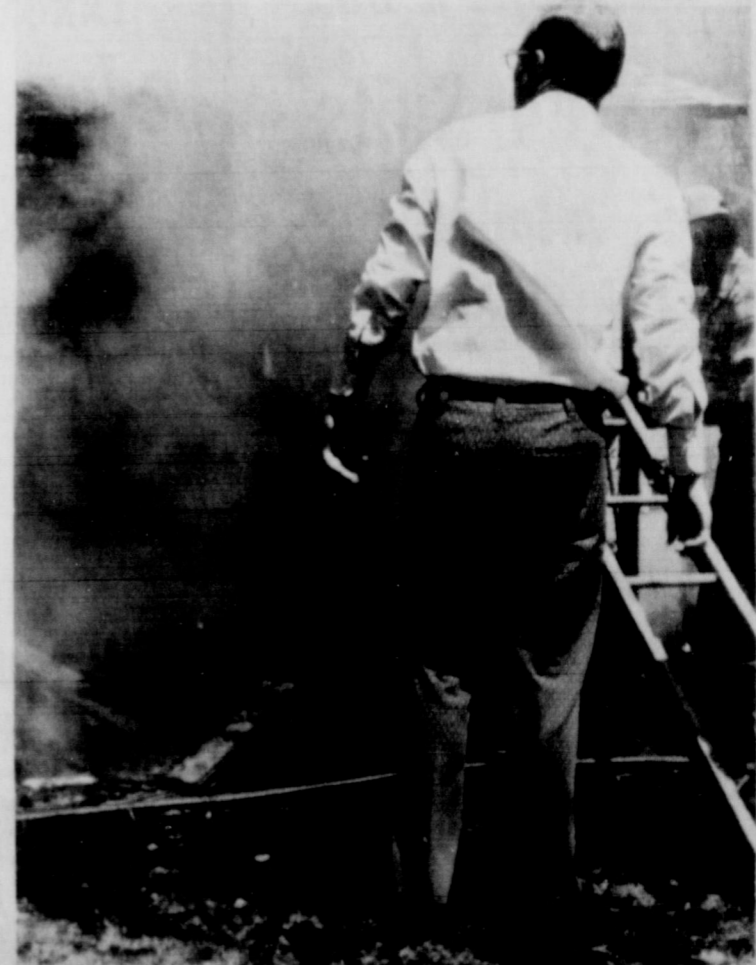

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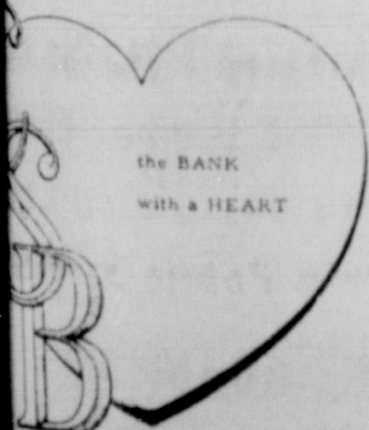

Anderson, Clayton To Halt Cotton Merchandising

Anderson, Clayton & Co. announced last week that it is withdrawing from cotton merchandising in the United States. This activity is headquartered in Memphis, Tenn. The decision will not affect cotton and cotton related operations in Brazil and Mexico, and will in no way change the Company's U. S. cotton ginning, cottonseed processing, and cotton warehousing and compressing activities.

COTTON TALKS

It now appears almost certain that cotton, wheat and feed grain farmers after this year will be operating under a "target price" type farm program. Producers will be exhorted to produce abundant supplies for the benefit of consumers, and in theory at least, will be insured against financial losses by a payment to make up the difference between market prices and a "target" specified by law.

The Senate passed such a bill on June 8. The House Agriculture Committee on Friday, June 15, was expected on the following Monday to report legislation built on the same philosophy. And, amid cries of "it can't be done," House Committee Chairman Bob Poage of Waco was saying he'd have the bill on the House floor by Thursday, June 21.

The Senate bill for cotton sets a target price of 43 cents per pound and calls for producer payments equal to the difference between that price and the average market price for Strict Low Middling (SLM) inch-and-a-sixteenth cotton as figured in the spot markets during the first five months of the marketing year, August through December.

The House version is expected to come from Committee with a target price of 38 cents a pound, with the payment based on the difference between this figure and the weighted average price paid to farmers for all cotton qualities. Not yet settled by the House Committee on Friday was whether the average farmer price would be figured on the August-December period or on a 12 month, January through December basis.

inch cotton in the spot quotations to average prices paid to farmers was pushed by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., on the grounds that spot market quotations do not accurately reflect prices paid to farmers. The House Committee agreed with this PCG position.

PCG is also asking that average market prices be figured on a 12 month period, using the last 7 months of one marketing year, January through July, and the first five months of the next, August through December. Otherwise, cotton grown on the High Plains, Rolling Plains and in Oklahoma, much of which is marketed in January and February, will have very little influence on average prices and therefore no effect on payment rates.

"The thing to remember in this regard," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, who was in Washington during House Committee deliberations, "is that the payment will not be the difference between a target price and the price received by any individual farmer, but on an average of prices, and how that average is figured can mean the difference between profit and loss for our High Plains farmers."

The loan level in the Senate bill for practical purposes would be set at whatever level the Secretary of Agriculture thought necessary to keep U. S. cotton "in line" with world prices.

PCG objected to this provision also and asked that the loan be set, firmly, at 90 percent of the average of world market prices for the preceding three years, with no

Secretarial authority to reduce it below that level. Current law governing the 1973 loan levels similar to that in the Senate's new bill, and the Secretary has announced the 1973 loan at 20.65 cents, basis SLM 1-1/16 inch cotton, as compared to a considerably higher level that would be justified by the "90 percent of the world market price" language.

Efforts succeeded in getting a change in the loan provisions of the House Committee bill, but not exactly what was asked for.

Johnson says he hasn't seen the exact language relating to the loan, "but some have calculated that the loan under the House Committee's bill couldn't be lower than about 26 or 27 cents for 1974, whereas there would be no lower limit under the bill passed by the Senate."

The House Committee version also bases the loan and other sections, it is understood, on Middle one-inch cotton, the quality used prior to 1973.

The most disheartening aspect of the Senate's bill, Johnson believes, was the \$20,000 per farmer limitation on total payments. This was adopted by the Senate in the form of an amendment to the bill reported from committee. The current program, the Agriculture Act of 1970, limited payments to \$55,000 per person per crop.

It remains to be seen what will be done on the limitation issue by the House. But it is historical fact that the House is "tougher" on limitations than the Senate. "So the picture isn't very bright," Johnson concludes.

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PINCH, DISBUD FLOWERS -- For bushy growth and numerous blooms on annual flowers, pinch back the main stem when young plants are 4 or 5 inches tall, suggests a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Pinch back lateral stems a second time for more dense growth. Disbudding, or removing all buds from the stem except the terminal one, produces a large fine flower.

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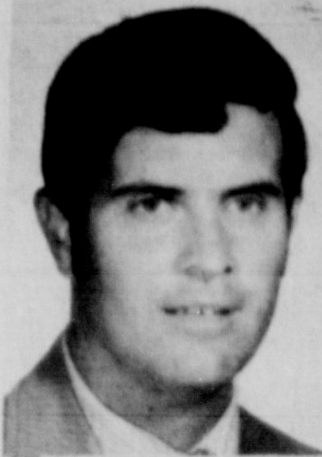

AUSTIN -- Both the consumer and the door-to-door salesman will have reason to think twice about an at-home sale now that there is a new State law which gives the buyer the right to change his mind.

The "Home Solicitation Act" by Dallas Sen. Bill Braecklein and Rep. Chris Semos of Dallas became law when the governor signed it June 13.

Basically, this law provides that if a consumer is solicited at his home for a sale of merchandise or services costing \$25 or more, and subsequently

PRaise THE LORD

"Have faith in God" -- a portion of Mark 11:12 -- a very simple statement spoken by Jesus, but very profound. That's the answer to all our problems and situations.

Have you ever, in your Christian living, let little picky things build up until you feel like you're going down hill and can't seem to stop, and get back on the right track? I suppose all of us are guilty of this -- but we need to remember that all of us sin and come short of the glory of God.

However, Jesus does not want us to stay "down". He came to give us "abundant" life. When you're at your lowest, you might ask yourself this question: "Is this the abundant life Jesus came to give me?" Then we begin to look up and trust Him to pull us out of the boggy messes we seem to get into, and set our feet upon the solid rock of trusting completely in Jesus. It's in our weakness that we're made strong, He says.

In times like these we need to remember that God is faithful (man is not -- I am not -- but He is!) "Even when we are too weak to have any faith left, He remains faithful to us and will help us, for he cannot disown us who are part of himself, and he will ALWAYS carry out his promises to us." (II Tim. 2:13.)

We must believe (by faith) and accept His help in the same way we accept salvation (by faith). Whether we "feel" like He is helping us or not, we must accept His help by faith, believing His promises that if we ask in His name, He will do it. Could it be that we let what we feel speak louder than what the Word declares?

Another good scripture to remember is Hebrews 4:16 -- "So let us come BOLDLY to the very throne of God and stay there to receive His mercy and to find grace to help us in our times of need."

If I ever needed help from God, it's when I'm "down", and this scripture helps me to know that I can come boldly and ask for His help -- not like some cringing slave, almost afraid to speak to his master.

And we need to remember, too, that if we are believers we should not have to carry around guilt or shame feelings, because Romans 8:1-2 says, "So there is NOW no condemnation awaiting those who belong to Christ Jesus. For the power of the life-giving Spirit -- and this power is mine through Christ Jesus -- has freed me from the vicious circle of sin and death." The scripture (in Romans 8) goes on to say that we aren't saved from sin's grasp by just KNOWING the commandments of God, because we really can't keep them all, but that Jesus himself is our covering for sin. And that we can obey God's laws IF we follow after the Holy Spirit and let Him control us instead of ourselves. Just this week a fellow Christian and I were discussing this over a cup of coffee -- of how we'd been low and had let little picky things build up. And how it would be good if we could just go off somewhere by ourselves, away from responsibilities, families, etc., until we could get things straightened out again. Even when I was a

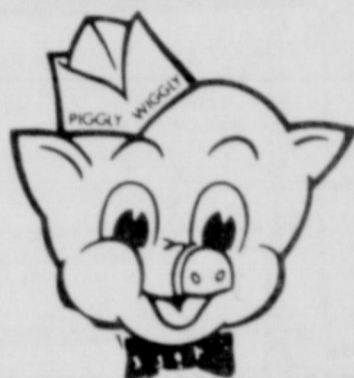
