Fred Clark. "If motorists persist in following emergency vehicles, they may be faced with being injured or causing a city patrolman or fireman to be injured while answering an emergency call. When a siren is sounded from a patrol car, fire truck or ambulance, then the person operating this vehicle will be en route to an emergency call and motorists should immediately get out of the way of the emergency vehicle and not try to follow it."

Chief Clark cited a portion of the new city ordinance covering the situation as follows:

"Upon the sounding of the siren or other fire signal, when a fire alarm has been turned in, each and every car or vehicle being driven upon or in any street or alley of the City of Slaton, shall be immediately parked to the curb to the right of the street or alley in the direction such car or vehicle is being driven, and shall remain so parked until the driver thereof shall have fully determined that the fire truck is traveling away from the car or vehicle he (or she) is driving, or that the fire truck has reached its destination.

"For violation of this section the offender shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars (\$5.00), nor more than fifty dollars (\$50.00).


Sidewalk Sale Is Popular Here



PINCH, DISBUD FLOWERS For bushy growth and numerous blooms on annual flowers, pinch back the main stem when young plants are 4 or 5 inches tall, suggests a landscape horticulturist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Pinch back lateral stems a second time for more dense growth. Disbudding, or removing all buds from the stem except the terminal one, produces a large fine flower.

It now appears almost certain that cotton, wheat and feed grain farmers after this year will be operating under a "target price" type farm program. Producers will be exhorted to produce abundant supplies for the benefit of consumers, and in theory at least, will be insured against financial losses by a payment to make up the difference between market prices and a "target" specified by law.

The Senate passed such a bill on June 8. The House Agriculture Committee on Friday, June 15, was expected on the following Monday to report legislation built on the same philosophy. And, amid cries of "it can't be done," House Committee Chairman Bob Poage of Waco was saying he'd have the bill on the House floor by Thursday, June 21.

The Senate bill for cotton sets a target price of 43 cents per pound and calls for producer payments equal to the difference between that price and the average market price for Strict Middling (SLM inchand-a-sixteenth cotton as quoted in the spot markets during the first five months of the marketing year, August through December.

The House version is expected to come from Committee with a target price of 38 cents a pound, with the payment based on the difference between this figure and the weighted average price paid to farmers for all cotton qualities. Not yet settled by the House Committee on Friday was whether the average farmer price would be figured on the August-December period or on a 12 month, January through December basis. 
AUSTIN -- Both the consumer and the door-to-door salesman will have reason to think twice about an at-home sale now that there is a new State law which gives the buyer the right to change his mind.

The "Home Solicitation Act" Dallas Sen. Bill Braecklein and Rep. Chris Semos of Dallas became law when the governor signed it June 13.

Basically, this law provides that if a consumer is solicited at his home for a sale or merchandise or services costing \$25 or more, and subsequently







decides that the goods weren't what they'd been cracked up to be, he can back out of the deal within a three-day period.

But it also imposes some strict responsibilities on the consumer, as well as the seller. For instance, the Home

"Have faith in God" -portion of Mark 11:12 -- a very simple statement spoken by Jesus, but very profound! That's the answer to all our problems and situations.

Have you ever, in your Christian living, let little picky things build up until you feel like you're going down hill and can't seem to stop, and get back on the right track? I suppose all of us are guilty of this -- but we need to remember that all of us sin and come short of the glory of God.

However, Jesus does not want us to stay "down". He came to give us "abundant" life. When you're at your lowest, you might ask yourself this question: "Is this the abundant life Jesus came to give me?" Then we begin to look up and trust Him to pull us out of the boggy messes we seem to get into, and set our feet upon the solid rock of trusting completely in Jesus. It's in our weakness that we're made strong, He

In times like these we need to remember that God IS faithful (man is not -- I am not -- but He is)! "Even when we are too weak to have any faith left, he remains faithful to us and will help us, for he cannot disown us who are part of himself, and he will ALWAYS carry out his promises to us." (II Tim. 2:13.)

We must believe (by faith) and accept His help in the same way we accept salvation (by faith). Whether we "feel" like He is helping us or not, we must accept His help by faith, believing His promises that if we ask in His name. He will do Could it be that we let what we feel speak louder than what the Word declares?

Another good scripture to remember is Hebrews 4:16 -- "So let us come BOLDLY to the very throne of God and stay there to receive his mercy and to find grace to help us in our times of need."

If I ever needed help from God, it's when I'm "down", and this scripture helps me to know that I can come boldly and ask for His help -- not like some cringing slave, almost afraid to speak to his

Just this week a fellow Christian and I were discussing this over a cup of coffee -of how we'd been low and had let little picky things build up. And how it would be good if we could just go off somewhere by ourselves, away from responsibilities, families, etc., until we could get things straightened out again. Even when I was a




