City Cleanup Program Is Going Well, With A Lot Mow To Come

With a lot of debris already cleared out, and with many residents of the city working to beautify their own particular part of the city, Slaton's Clean-up program launched in April has been going well, according to city officials.

Adopted by the city, the Chamber of Commerce, clubs and individuals, the program which is being given a new push this week, "will greatly improve the city's appearance, avoid spreading of weeds, reduce mosquitoes and other pests and reduce fire hazards," Mayor John Landreth said Tuesday.

Landreth noted that the danger of fires is greatly increased when weeds in vacant lots dies. In connection with this, he observed that the city is now mowing vacant lots (and others) at a minimum charge at the request of citizens.

"If anyone has problem in this respect, we urge them to call city hall and we will try to work it out with them," he said, adding that eventually the city may find it necessary to mow and assess charges against some property where

The mayor reported that the city already has moved out more than 100 loads of trash, scrap metal and other debris.

The cleanup campaign is part of a plan to beautify the city so that Slaton can compete for th Blue Ribbon City award of West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Obedience is better than sacrifice, 80 says scriptures in many places.

Why do we teach our children to be obedient in the first place? Is it because we just want to be boss, or is it because we love them?

A good servant obeys without question. An obedient child of God obeys without questioning the "why".

Remember the story in the Bible about the centurion whose servant was sick and ready to die, and the centurion sent some respected Jewish elders to Jesus to ask him to come and heal the servant. Jesus went with them to go see about the sick servant, but before arriving at the house, the centurion sent word that he wasn't even worthy to have Jesus come to his home, but that if he'd just say the word, he knew that his servant would be healed.

The centurion added, "I know, because I am under the authority of my superior officers, and I have authority over my men. I only need to say 'Go!' and they go; or 'Come!' and they come; and to my slave, 'Do this or that,' and he does it. So just say, 'Be healed!' and my servant will be well again!"

Jesus marvelled at this man's faith, and said he had not found such great faith anywhere, even in Israel. And when the centurion's people returned to the home, they found the servant healed, (Luke, completely chapter 7.)

With a target price of 35 cents, even the unreliable averages compiled for 1966 through 1972 would indicate a drastic reduction in producer returns on the High Plains. Quoted price average for High Plains cotton, 1966 through 1971, was 20.03 cents per pound. The five-month average quotation for SLM 1-1/16 inch cotton for the same years was 25.75 cents.

The cotton loan level under the Committee's version of a new farm law, according to presently available information, would remain at 90 percent of the average world market price, with the Secretary retaining authority to make adjustments as he might seefit.

reports indicate the Secretary would be given new authority to restrict plantings above the base allotment should he anticipate a carryover above 7 million bales.




