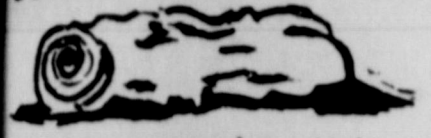

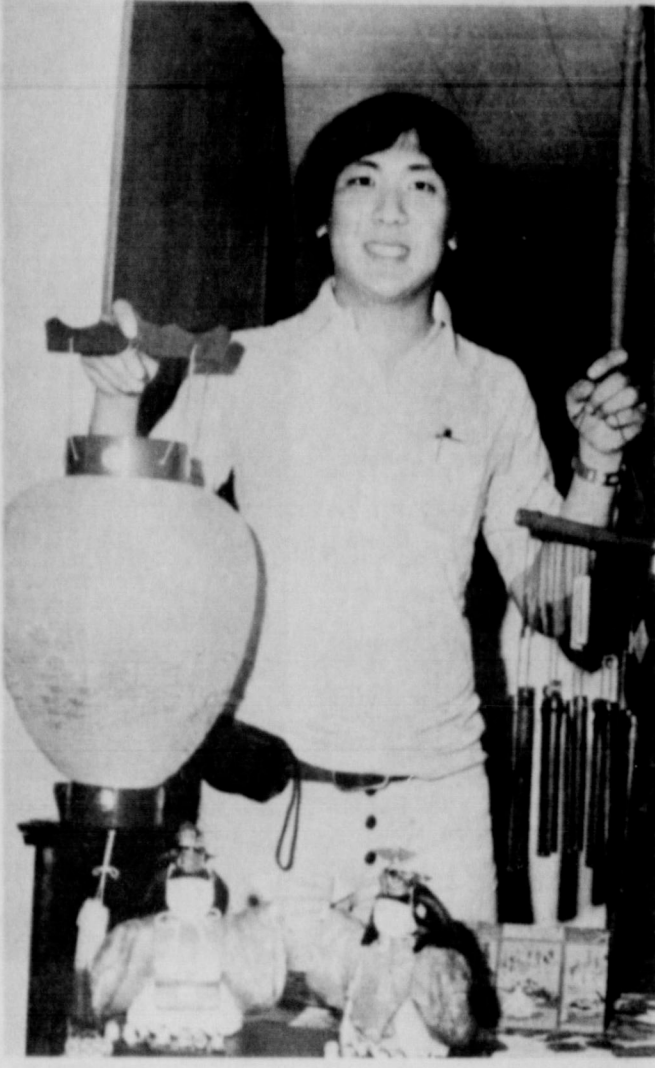

Offering a firm handshake and a warm smile, Kazukiyo Miki greets people with, "Hello. Call me Miki, like Mickey Mouse."

Miki is a 20-year-old Japanese student visiting Slaton as part of the International Lions Club exchange program. He is staying with the Wayne Edwards family for two weeks. He will then go to Houston and San Antonio

and return to Slaton for another two weeks. At that time, Miki will stay with the Hack Lasater family.

Osaka is Miki's home town. It is the second largest city in Japan. Miki said, "There are only three temples in the whole city. Only three places to worship."

Miki is the oldest in his family. He is the son of Minoru and Sachiko Miki, and his younger sister is named Leiko and his brother is named Kenji.

Road Deaths Less In '74

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 31 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, according to Sergeant O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and 13 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1974 shows a total of 195 accidents resulting in 14 persons killed and 130 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1974, shows a total of 466 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 261 persons injured as compared to June, 1973, with 559 accidents resulting in 27 persons killed and 331 persons injured.

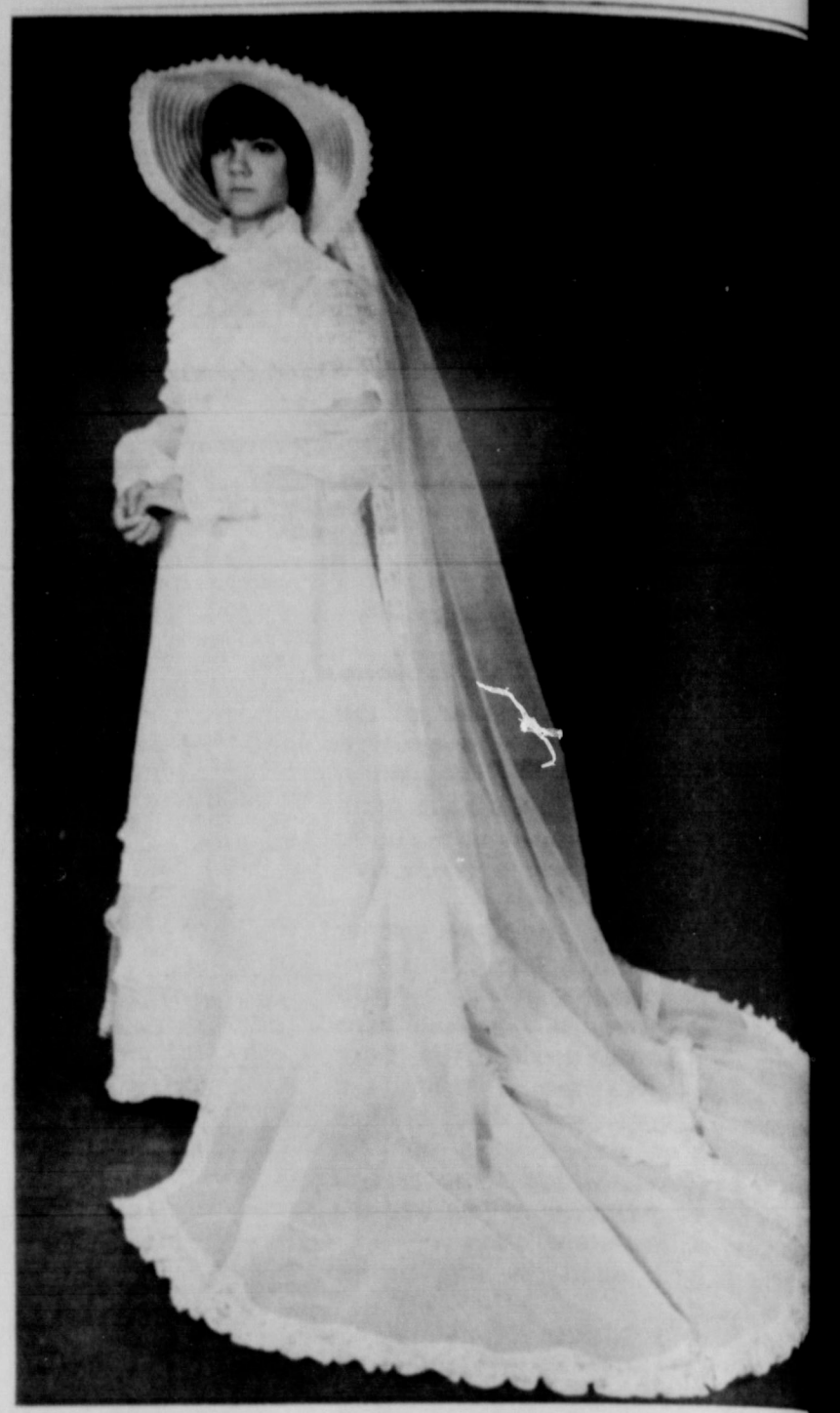

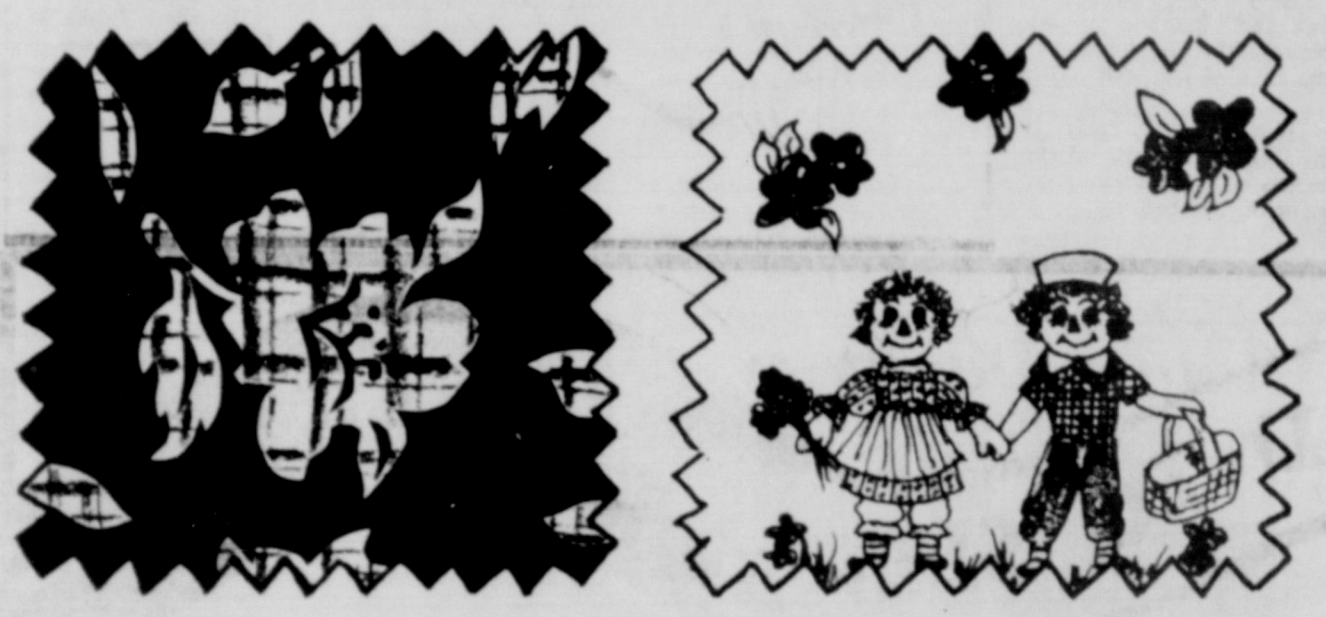

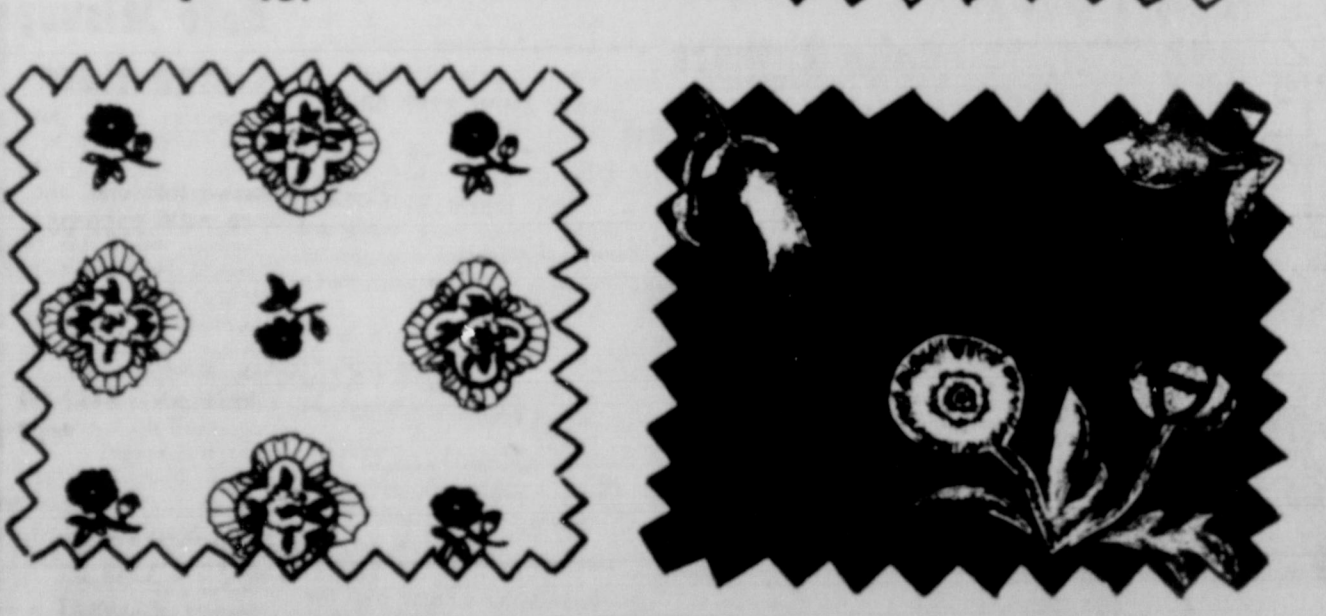

We're glad to have Mrs. Ethel Ratcliff in our home. Remember until next week, we all need friends.

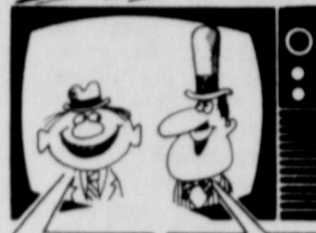

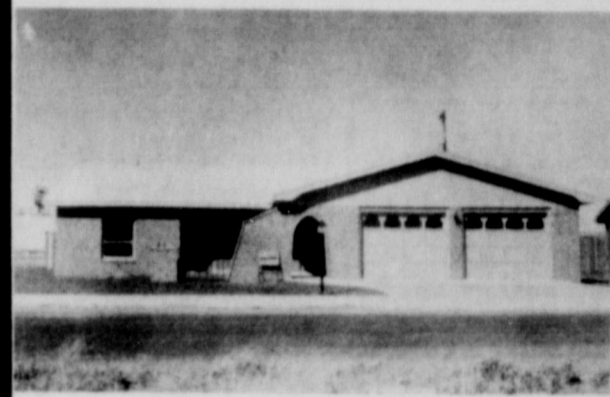

Eye Test Ready For Home Use

One in every 20 pre-school-age children in the U.S. has a vision problem. But help is now available for these children, according to Dr. Barbara Sears, health education specialist. She reported the Home Eye Test Kit which parents can use to do a vision screening of their preschoolers at home is now available.

The kit is free from the Texas Society for the Prevention of Blindness, 3617 Fannin St., Houston, Tex. 77004, and is also available in Spanish.

"Any vision screening only indicates that a child may have a visual defect," Dr. Sears said.

"Vision screening is not diagnostic and does not take the place of a professional eye examination," the spe-

cialist said.

But the Home Eye Test Kit is the chance to locate children who have never had their vision tested, who show no outward signs of eye or vision abnormality, but will show readily in a screening that they are near-sighted, that they are using only one eye effectively, or that they can 'read' the chart with each eye separately but not with both eyes together," the specialist explained.

The Home Eye Test Kit includes a scale version of the E chart, directions for training the child to take the test, for giving the test, and for interpreting test results.

A report form, to be returned to the Society, asks the parent whether the child

passed the test, and if not, whether an appointment has been made for an eye examination, and with whom.

Childhood Development (Texas 4-C Council), an advisory council for the Office of Early Childhood Development, Texas Department of Community Affairs. The difference between eyesight and vision is a crucial one. Fisher explains it by saying that, "Eyesight is the eyes' response to light. Vision is the result of the ability to understand and correctly interpret the information coming through the eyes."

It is good vision as well as eyesight that enables a child to read.

"Vision testing a young child is the best way for a parent to assure himself that his child will not develop a whole series of learning problems once he gets into school. If you wait until the child is already in the classroom to discover that difficulties exist, the

problems will only be harder to solve," says Fisher. "You can give a test as early as between three and four years of age — after a child is verbal and can understand simple directions."

"Look at it this way," Fisher says. "Vision is the single most important sense modality for the human being. It leads learning. Any problem with vision and learning is automatically interfered with."

"A child can have perfect eyesight, 20/20, and still have a vision problem which interferes with learning."

"Vision is a very complex thing and it doesn't have only to do with whether a person is nearsighted or farsighted. The Snellen eye chart test one gets from the school nurse tests one thing more or less — whether the child is nearsighted. Chan-

es are the nearsighted child may learn to read well and may do very well in school, whether his nearsightedness is recognized or not. He can see his book fine.

"But what about the child who has problems focusing and switching from near to far and the reverse? He may have problems in visually following along a line of print. His eyes may not work well together. These and many others are vision problems. If a kid has a vision problem, chances are he will have a reading problem. And reading, let us face it, is basic to learning."

It is a thing Fisher can get passionate about.

Ideally, he feels that the state should adopt vision testing and optometric referral for all Texas' children as a part of regular screening procedures.

Some school districts have regular preschool screening programs already, but none

test for vision as yet.

Between now and the time a law is passed, Fisher says it's going to be up to the parents.

"Family M.D.'s and pediatricians get to see children from birth on — and with good reason," Fisher says. "Lately parents have begun to realize that the first dental exam needs to come before the child is four. 'See your dentist twice a year.' Very effective slogan. Now I'd like to get a campaign started on the need for a vision check with a qualified optometrist."

"How does the child begin to learn? Much or most of it through reading. First through third grade, the child learns to read. From fourth grade on he reads to learn. Naturally he tests with his eyes. If he is having difficulty, he may not be dumb — although that's the way it is often interpreted — he may only have a vision problem."

Might not parents be

afraid that an optometrist will put glasses on a child unnecessarily?

"They shouldn't be," says Fisher. "The optometrist who knows what he is doing and doesn't just fit glasses will do the right thing. Sometimes glasses are only a temporary measure. Sometimes only specialized exercises and training are involved for the correction. If permanent glasses are necessary, fine. But they aren't the only measure available."

How does a parent go about finding an optometrist who has continued his training and at the same time has interest and knowledge about vision and its relationship to school achievement?

Fisher recommends asking five questions of an optometrist, the same five questions that Dr. David Rose, head of the Committee on Children and Youth for the Wisconsin Optometric Association, recom-
