Unofficial accounts of what happened indicated that the two had landed in the heavily weeded area a few hundred yards southwest of the south end of the runway because one of the men, Evans, had something in his eye. A little later, as they were preparing to ascend, the craft burst into flames. There was an unconfirmed report that leaking gasoline from the craft into the weeds

ignited. The two were burned as they escaped the flaming craft. Slaton fire department units and an ambulance were at the scene a few minutes after 3 p.m. and the two injured men were removed. A large area of the grassland burned off, and the blackened chopper framework remained upright on the ground. Firemen stayed on duty in the area around the destroyed craft for some time, to keep the blaze from spreading out of the dry-lake

Federal officials said the cause of the fire was still under investigation.

A fund to aid the Arvin Stafford family has been started at Citizens State Bank and anyone who cares to contribute is urged to contact anyone at the bank.


Stafford, local justice of the peace and owner of Slat-Co Printing, is recuperating at home following a severe heart attack, and will be unable to work for some time.

Cold-Tolerant Cotton May Become Reality

tolerant cotton is a producer's dream which may become fact in a few years, according to a research scientist in Lubbock. If so, the development could lead to an annual recovery of \$18 to \$24 million in lost revenue from low-micronaire cotton, and improved fiber quality and cotton seed for textile and processing industries.

Dr. Jack Gipson, cotton physiologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, said that his research since 1963 has shown that low fiber and seed quality are generally associated with cold temperatures which retard the rate of cotton boll development. As temperature drops below 70 degrees Fahrenheit, the metabolic functions of the ally slow down, ceasing

degrees.

Low temperatures encountered on the High Plains in September and October, Gipson explained, account for most of the slow-down in boll development. Minimum temperatures average about 57 degrees in September, and 46 degrees in October, though it is not uncommon for the mercury to plunge to 41 in September and down to a frigid 34 in October.

July and August minimum temperatures fall in the mid-60's range.

'The detrimental effects of low temperature on fiber micronaire is of particular importance to High Plains producers," Gipson noted. In the 25-county cotton of 60 percent of the annual

the 10-year period between 1963 and 1972. This means that of an annual two million-bale crop, some 1,200,000 bales would be penalized to some degree for low micronaire. Based on a common discount of \$15 to \$20 per bale, the economic loss of High Plains revenue is staggering. And these are conservative figures.

"Both production records and research data," the researcher said, "compelled us to look for a way to deal with low temperatures."

From previous research with Dr. L.L. Ray, TAES cotton breeder. Gipson knew that certain varieties were better adapted or more tolerant to low temperature than others. This meant that deal with low temperatures.

maturing strains for testing. All of the lines were developed at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock, where the two TAES scientists are based. The plants now are being subjected to temperature stress from emergence to killing frost and evaluated for earliness and potential cold tolerance.

The plants are grown in small plots and are covered each night with field growth chambers mounted on wheels and tracks. The chambers are equipped with heaters and air-conditioners to enable the researchers to maintain desired temperature levels.

Gipson explained that on-

tures usually are adequate. In their study for the 1974 crop year, seven experimental strains and three standard varieties are being evaluated, he noted.

Of the seven experimental strains, three were selected for performance under low temperature stress in 1972, the seed increased in 1973, and are now being put through another cycle of low temperature stress to determine the extent, if any, of increased cold tolerance. Each year the strains that fail to show promise are deleted and replaced by other strains with potential

cold tolerance. The study is being supported by the U.S. Department of Agriculture with funds being made available through Cotton Incorporat-

Diabetes was the fifth leading cause of death in Texas in 1972 and second cause of blindness. Therefore, the value of screening can be clearly shown, since early detection plays an important role in the future of diabetes victims.

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Screening services are channeled to those at high risk of getting the disease. Experience has shown those at high risk to be close blood relatives of diabetes victims, those persons more than 45 years of age, the obese and the parents of a nine-pound-plus baby when the parents reach age 45.

In diabetes screening, a blood sample is taken and deposited in a vial which contains a preservative to protect the blood sugar. The sample then is sent to a Health Department labora-

sugar exceeds a certain level, the individual is re-checked with a follow-up examination.

Screening services are provided for other diseases by other divisions of the State Health Department. Among these are the PKU program for newborn; dental and medical screening through the Title XIX programs for children on the Welfare Department's Aid to Families of Dependent Children roles; hearing. sight and dental screening in the school system; screening of females for cancer; tuberculosis testing; and screening for venereal disease. Screening goes hand in hand with preven-

It is difficult to measure the effects of preventive medicine, and this difficulty adds to the lack of under-

Preventive services may be classed as primary averting the occurrence of the disease; secondary prevention controlling progression of a disease from its early stage to a more severe stage; and tertiary prevention which involves rehabilitation, as in the case of a stroke victim.

Providers of preventive medical services include such major groups as doctors, dentists, veterinarians and other professionals. One of the easiest preven-

tive services to recognize is in the field of immunization. A look at the State Health Department's morbidity reports emphasizes the drop in such diseases as diphtheria, measles, rubella, polio, pertussis - diseases which in the past came to be expected as natural

risks. Last year, for the first time, not a single case of paralytic polio was reported in Texas. Compulsory immunization of school children, plus emphasis on pre-schoolers, helped produce this record.

There has been another change in the health field in the direction of prevention. This is in the field of epidemiology. To the layman, an epidemiologist can best be described as a disease detective. Major concerns of epidemiology are discovery of factors essential to or contributing to disease occurrence, and developments of methods

for disease prevention. Historically, epidemiology had its birth in relation to the study of the great epidemic diseases such as cholera, plague, smallpox, yellow fever and typhus. Until the 20th Century.

these epidemic diseases were the most important threat to human life and health.

The so-called new epidemiology has extended the concept of public health control to emcompass all causes of illness, disability and death. The Health Department's Divisions of Occupational Safety and Occupational Health and Radiation Control are, in a large sense, practicing preventive medicine by finding and eliminating circumstances which effect the health of workers in Texas.

so it is that the State Health Department, through its many different offices, is taking the lead in helping prevent disease and disability in Texas.

Much has been said during the last few years regarding demons. I heard two different well-known evangelists on TV recently who made the same statement regarding persons who were demon possessed.

The demon-possessed man they spoke of was Legion, in Luke 8:26-39. A legion is 6,000, so he may have been possessed by that many or more demons. He was naked, insane, violent, didn't live in a house but among the tombs. Filth is also associated with this occasion, because when Jesus commanded the demons to leave, they asked to enter swine rather than go to the 'deep" (the bottomless pit.) Swine were unclean animals, and back in the Old Testament they were a forbidden food.

Now, could it be that today that some of these dirty unkept people that you see every now and then, are made to be this way because of demons? And the streakers of today perhaps that's because of

about the terrible things that are happening today, we usually say. "What on earth possessed him to do such a thing?" Or when you see someone do something that is so unreasonable, you might say, "What's come over him?" (Or what possessed him?)

walking in the spirit, we have the authority to command demons to leave. And they will obey. Mark 16:17, 'And these signs shall follow them that believe: In my name shall they cast out devils. " Luke 10 tells about the 70 that Jesus sent out to spread the good news, and they returned You know, when we talk rejoicing and told Jesus,

walks like a lion all over this earth seeking who he may devour. He is the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that works in those who are disobedient to God. When we as Christians

exercise our authority against Satan and his demons, we must remember it's not our power, but the great power of God that works.

A policeman can hold up his hand and stop many automobiles because of the authority vested in him as a policeman. He does not stop the traffic by his own power and strength, but the drivers of the cars obey because they respect his authority.

As Christians, we have authority to cast out demons. But we cannot expect to go out and cast out demons simply by using the phrase "In Jesus' Name" either! We must be walking in the spirit.

Praise the Lord, for his power is great, and his promises are unlimited!




