UNDERSTAND that the people working Texas constitution are just about to give up or give up, but the following written by Lynn Ashby of the Houston Feb. 1 still is applicable, so we are it for our readers.

A 70-year-old Slaton man struck down by a car which left the scene Saturday night, and the victim remained in critical condition Wednesday.

Thomas Biera, 1000 S. 7th St., was walking in the 900 block of S. 9th St. crossing between Henzler Grocery and Tom's 8 'Till Late, when he was struck by a car described by witnesses as a blue or green Vega or other small car. The accident occurred about 10:15 p.m.

Biera was taken to Mercy Hospital and later transferred to Lubbock Methodist. He reportedly suffered internal injuries and two broken hips.

Thefts, burglaries and vandalism reports were on file at the police station this week. On Saturday, Mary Ann Brandon reported theft of \$126 from her purse at Cloverleaf Liquor Store.

Last Thursday, Keith Price, 1205 S. 13th, reported theft of a pinball machine valued at \$300 from a storage building at 1025 E. Geneva.

About 2 a.m. Friday, three high school senior boys were arrested at the high school track after a 15-foot podium used by the band director was pulled down by tying it to a vehicle with ropes. The youths agreed to work out an arrangement for settlement of the damage caused by the vandalism.

On Sunday, Mrs. Carol Arguello, 930 W. Hockley, reported a burglary at that address, with two rings valued at \$150 each listed as missing.

## Swimming Pool Will Open Here Saturday

Slaton Municipal Swimming Pool will open to the public at 1 p.m. Saturday, after Chamber of Commerce officials initiated some last-minute repairs to the pool to make the opening possible despite the condition of the filter system valves.

At first it had been feared that the pool might not be operated this year because the valves were corroded, and the city and chamber were told that extensive — and expensive — repairs would have to be made, including replacement of the tanks and valves.

This work still will have

to be done within a year or two, according to chamber manager Tom Roy, but some stop-gap repairs have been made at a cost of \$500 to let the valves operate again. Eventually, repairs estimated to cost about \$11,000 will be required.

Under the management of Morris Dixon and Lonnie

Kuss, the pool will be open to the public from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. Tuesday through Sunday, and will be closed Mondays. The pool is available for private parties starting at 7 p.m. any day of the week by advance arrangement of at least 48 hours with the managers. The phone number at the

pool is 828-7123.

"We would like to encourage everyone to take advantage of the time available for private parties," Dixon said. "Groups can have a lot of fun this way at a reasonable cost, and, of course, lifeguards will be on hand."

Private swimming lessons also will be available starting around June 8. Details will be announced later.

Cost of admission to the pool is 50 cents for children under 12; 60 cents for those age 12 through 18; and 75 cents for adults.

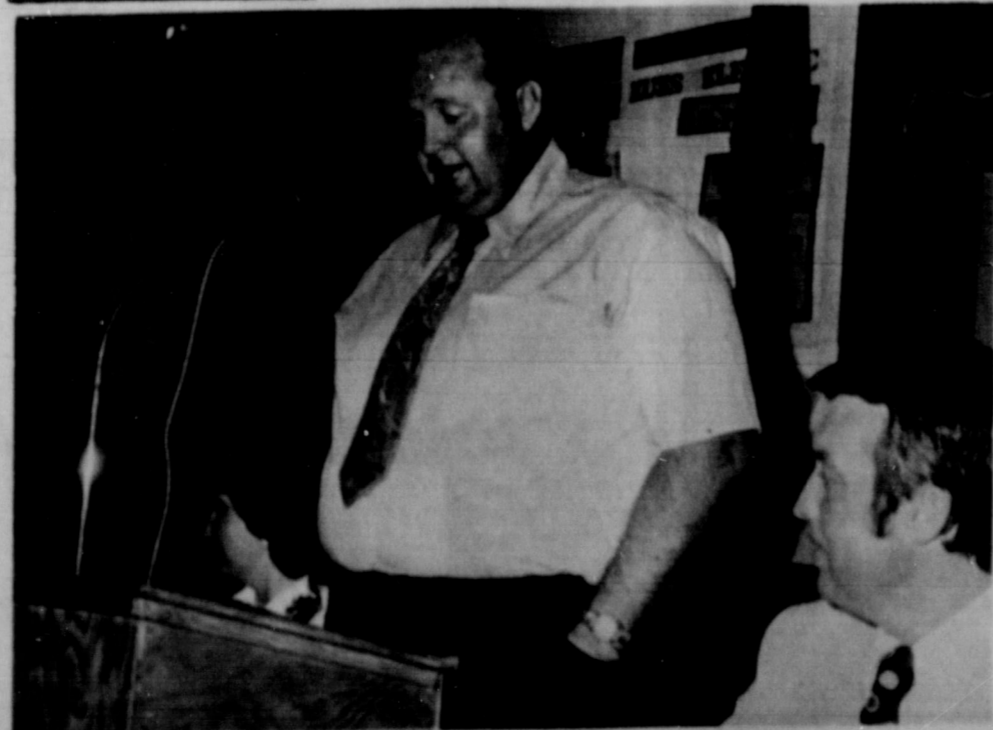
Patrolmen Ricky Majors and Roger Cooper and Sgt. Edwards also received appreciation awards.

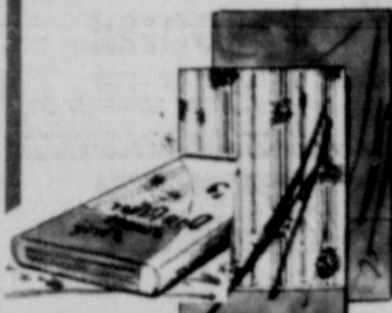

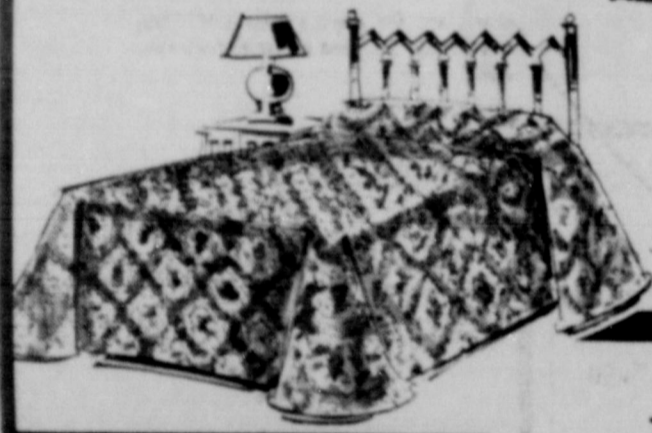

## Questions May Spot Problems

"Impaired hearing ability, which is one of today's most wide-spread handicapping afflictions, also is one of the least understood," according to David Smith, director of the Beltone Crusade for Hearing Conservation.

The crusade, Beltone Electronics Corporation, world leader in hearing aids and electronic hearing test instruments, is designed to build public awareness of the need for hearing conservation.

In substantiating his statement, Smith pointed out that figures released by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare indicate approximately 14 1/2 million persons in the US are suffering from measurable hearing losses.

6. Do you no longer hear sounds like a faucet dripping or a doorbell ringing?
7. Are you having more and more difficulty hearing in noisy places?
8. Do you have trouble hearing when your back is turned to the speaker?
9. Do you actually seem to hear better in noisy places?
10. Have you been told you speak too loudly?

"While this quiz is in no way a diagnostic test of a hearing problem, and can not absolutely predict that a hearing loss may exist, persons who answer 'yes' to four or more of the questions, may have a hearing loss, and should have a hearing test at the earliest convenient time," Smith stressed. Hearing tests are available from medical doctors, at hearing clinics or from hearing aid specialists.

## Water Affects Insecticides

So you've been spraying your garden with a recommended insecticide and still haven't gotten rid of all those bad bugs? Well, it just may be that you're using the wrong type of water in preparing your insecticide mix. "Water from municipal supplies is generally alkaline in nature and therefore reduces the effectiveness of many insecticides when used in preparing a spray solution," points out Dr. Charles Cole, area entomologist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. So what's the solution? "Using distilled water helps," says Cole. "Also, rain water is good to use in mixing insecticides. "Set out a few tubs or buckets during the next rain and collect some of that good water," suggests Cole. "The rain water will not only put more life in the insect sprays you prepare, but it's also better for watering flowers, pot plants and the like." So, don't go blaming that insecticide you bought or the store where you bought it the next time you get poor results when spraying for insects. The problem just might be in the water.

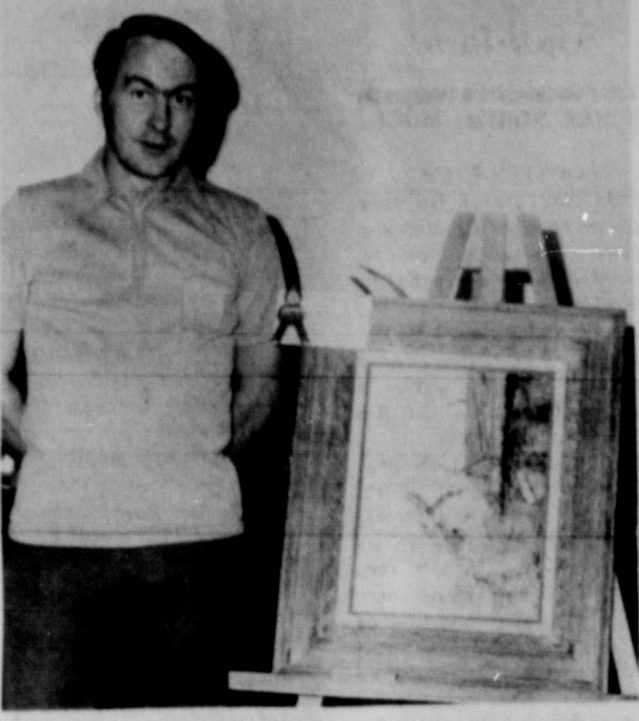

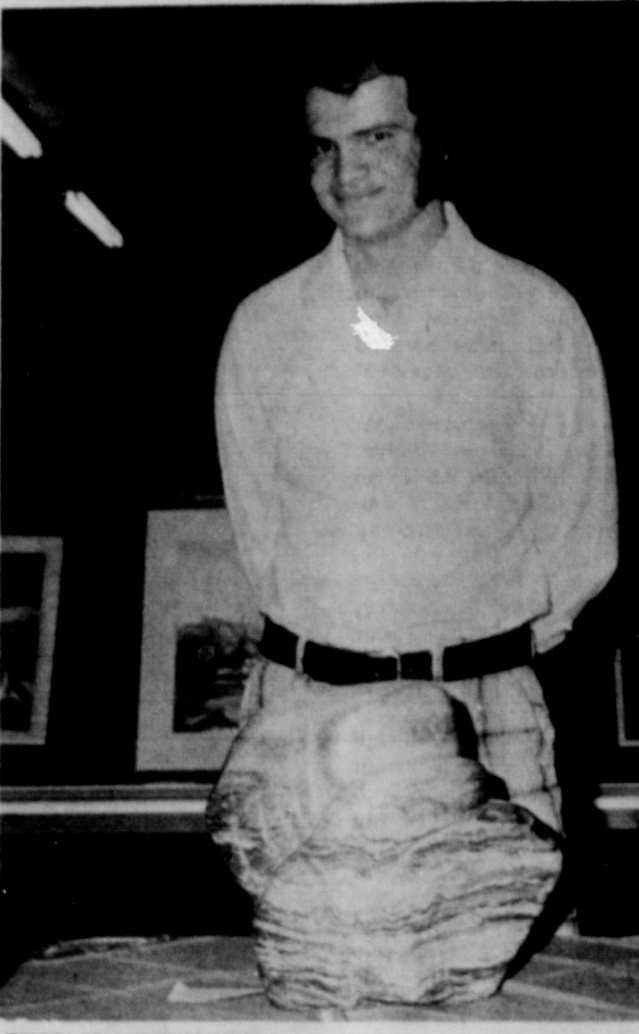

**Texas Wheat Production To Decrease**

AUSTIN--Texas wheat production is expected to decrease 29.3 million bushels from 1973 totals mainly due to the failure of the dryland wheat crop on the High Plains.

Growth of dryland wheat was very slow during the dry fall and winter. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported recently, "Though the recent rains were a blessing, they came too late to help much of the dryland acreage," he said.

Projections for the 1974 harvest were 78,400,000 bushels. However, drought conditions from January to April revised projections downward to 69,300,000 bushels, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service.

"This is more than a 9 million bushel decrease from the December projection, which was already significantly lower than 1973's total production," White said.

Texas produced a record 98,600,000 bushels in 1973 and farmers averaged 29 bushels an acre. The estimated yield per acre for 1974 is 21 bushels.

Nationally, the wheat picture is a little brighter. Estimated winter wheat production is more than 1.6 billion bushels — a 27 percent increase over last year.

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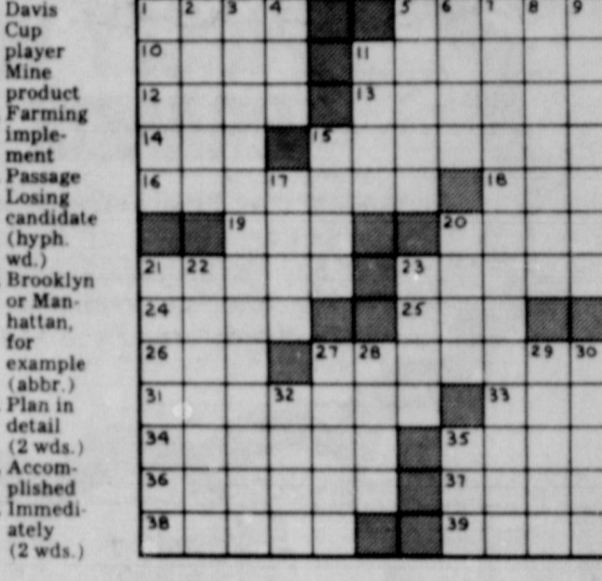
