Slaton Seeks New Football Coach

Bill Curry, Slaton head football coach and athletic director for boys, has resigned to accept the position of assistant principal of Seminole High School. It

was announced this week. Curry has been athletic director here for two years, with the title recently changed to athletic director for boys, since Mrs. Frank

Benson has been named athletic director for girls, creating two separate and equal positions in the athletic area of Slaton schools. Curry's letter to the board

of education was read at a called meetig of the board last Friday night. The coach explained why he was resigning and said he wished to "extend the best of everything to the Slaton school."

He and his wife Sylvia are operating the summer youth program here and they and their children have been very active in Slaton First United Methodist Church.

Since accepting Curry's resignation last Friday, school board members have spent a considerable amount of time in called sessions to interview coaching prospects. There had been three more called meetings of the board by Monday, with another scheduled Tuesday afternoon. At last Friday's meeting, the board decided to seek a proven winning coach of their choice rather than to solicit applications for the job.

"We've been losing football games too long," one board member said. "I'm tired of losing. . . we want a good strong boys athletic program in all sports."

In talking with applicants, however, the board members pointed out that although they want to win ball games — sooner or later — they realize that coaches cannot produce winners without complete support of everyone involved, from parents and players through other members of the community.

There appeared to be a strong possibility that the new head coach and his assistant could be named as early as Wednesday, although it could be days later. School board members noted that the new coach would be pressed for time to get organized in time for this fall's schedule.

Citizens Warned Of Thefts; Dogs, Junk Cars Targeted

An increase in thefts of articles left in cars and yards in Slaton this week prompted Police Chief Fred Clark to warn citizens against leaving items in unlocked cars and in yards at night.

Chief Clark also reported that strict enforcement of

two city ordinances has begun.

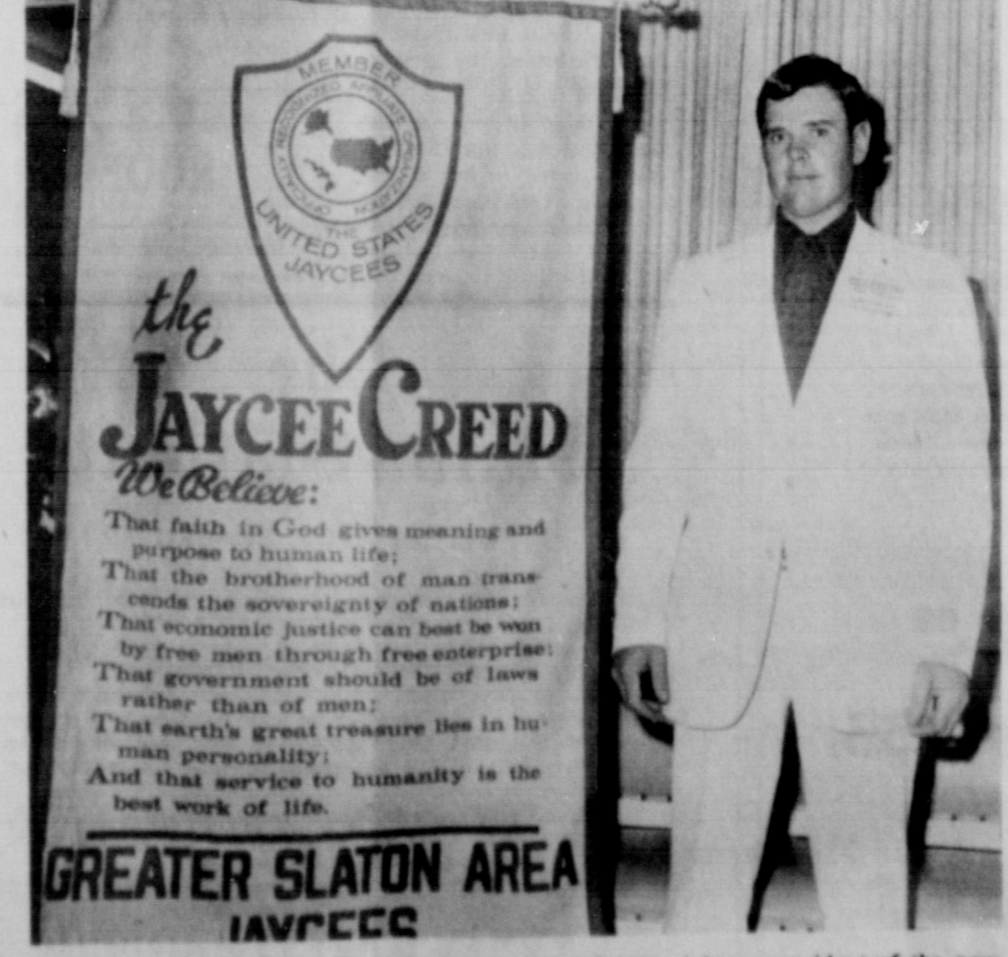
"We have started picking up abandoned and junk vehicles and we have delegated two officers to operate the animal wagon to enforce the dog ordinance," he said. "Anyone who has an abandoned or junk car they

want removed may call the police department and we will remove them free of charge. A car which has no current license tags or inspection sticker and which is not stored out of sight of public view is classified as an abandoned or junk vehicle. None are picked up without due process of law.

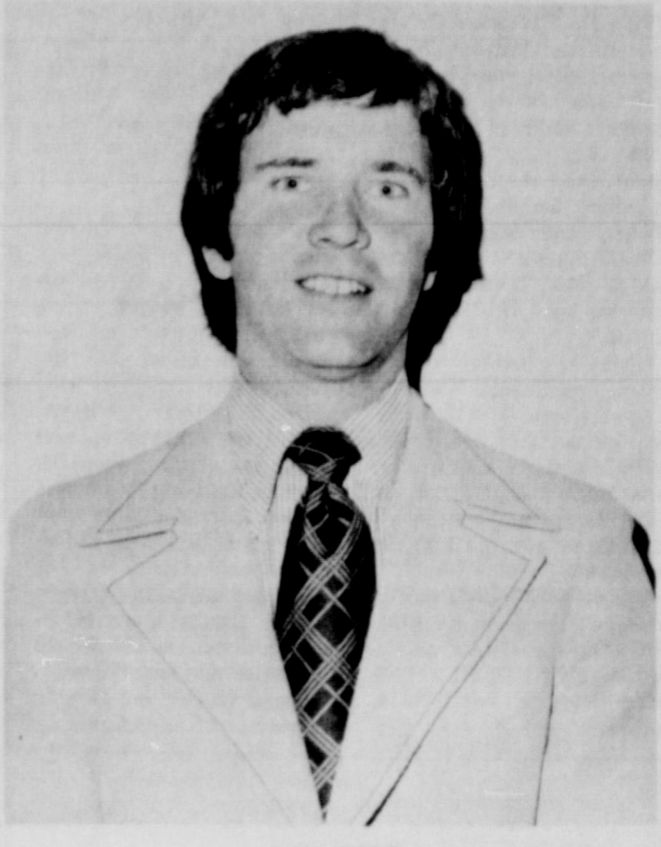

J.W. Holt Named Bank's Top Officer

J. W. Holt, executive vice president of Citizens State Bank, has been named officer in charge of the bank's operation following announcement of the resignation of T. J. (Tommy) Wallace as president.

Wallace, president of the bank since 1965, has been named executive vice president and director of Plains National Bank, Lubbock, effective July 8. With his resignation, the chairman of the board, E. W. Williams Jr. of Amarillo automatically becomes president, and Williams announced that Holt would move up to take over direction of the bank, while retaining the title of executive vice president and director of Citizens State.

"No further personnel changes are anticipated at this moment," Wallace said, in announcing his resignation and the change in status for Holt. Wallace will remain on the board of director of Citizens State Bank.

Holt, a former bank examiner, joined Citizens State six years ago as vice president, moving here from Lubbock in 1968. In January 1969 he was named executive vice president and director.

A graduate of Liberty High School, he earned a bachelor of science degree from Texas Christian University in 1964. In that same year he was married to the former Jo Elder of Wichita Falls, and they now have two children, Brent, 9, and Kristi, 5. They are members of St. Christopher's Episcopal Church in Lubbock.

Holt is a former president of the Slaton Chamber Commerce, Babe Ruth League and of the Lubbock chapter of the American Institute of Banking. He currently is president of Slaton Lions Club. He likes golf and other sports.

Holt paid tribute to Wallace, commenting "we are certainly sorry to see Tommy leave, because he has done a tremendous job for the bank in the last 10 years." He added that no policy changes in the operation of the bank are anticipated.

Wallace, a native of Wills Point, joined the Slaton bank in 1964. He has 27 years of banking experience.

Built-In Service Ups Food Costs

One reason food costs more today than in Grandma's day is that shoppers are buying their way out of the kitchen by paying for built-in maid service in the foods they select. These "convenience" foods may save time, but they are not always money savers. In fact, many consumers wind up paying many times the value of a homemade item, just to get convenience.

We buy cheese already shredded, onions peeled and diced, tea mixed with water, pre-sweetened cereal and pre-cut pizzas. All would cost less if we prepared them ourselves.

Boil-in-bag vegetables are more expensive than their plain frozen counterparts. Vegetables in sauce mix are more costly than if we made our own sauce. Pre-sugared ready-to-eat cereals are higher priced than unsweetened ones. And cereals you cook yourself are nearly always less expensive than ready-prepared brands.

Buying "main dish" dinner mixes that lack only the meat may shorten cooking time, but you're paying someone else for a combination of sauce, seasoning and macaroni or rice you could prepare at lower cost.

Stars and Stripes, A History For Symbols

Back of Massachusetts the Declaration of Independence with a star and most parish. It was the signatures from the 13 colonies, 198

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goal to which man has aspired from time immemorial; the stripe is symbolic of the rays of light emanating from the sun.

The first flag of the colonists to have any resemblance to the present stars and stripes was the Grand Union flag. It consisted of 13 stripes, alternately red and white, representing the 13 colonies, with a blue field in the upper left hand corner bearing the crosses of St. George and St. Andrew, signifying union with the mother country.

Continental Congress passed a resolution that established the stars and stripes on June 14, 1777, but did not specify the arrangement of the 13 stars on the blue union, except to say that they should represent a new constellation. As a consequence, they had a variety of forms.

General Washington, when the flag was first flown by the Continental Army is said to have described its symbolism as follows: "We take the stars from heaven, the red from our mother country, separating it by white stripes, thus showing that we have separated from her, and the white stripes shall go down to posterity representing liberty."

A new star was added for each new state, and the now 50 star flag is easily recognizable by all.

This fourth of July as flags are flying across the nation, stop to think a moment of the history and symbolism behind the stars and stripes. America's bicentennial is fast approaching, an event which will mark 200 years of independence. Remember the past, but also think ahead to the future and how it can best be protected.





This was the fourth in the series of Kidstuff programs, that will continue throughout the month of July.



Safety and sanitation are
the prime areas for concen-
trating regulatory and en-
forcement measures. Camp-
ers must be provided a
sanitary place to live, as
well as a safe one.

The law set out specific
areas for drawing up rules
and regulations. Included
are consideration of ade-
quate and proper supervi-
sion in all activities by
qualified personnel where-
ver camp activities are con-
ducted. Proper safeguards
for sanitation encompass
such areas as: proper pre-
parations for food prepara-
tion, and serving, healthful
and sufficient water supply,
and proper waste disposal.

Safety encompasses such
things as proper water
safety procedures for swim-
ming pools, lakes and wa-
terways, and safe boating
equipment; proper mainte-
nance and safe use of motor
vehicles; safe buildings and
physical facilities and pro-
per fire precautions; safe
equipment used in all recre-
ational pursuits; and proper
regard for the number of
persons using a facility.

Among the guides used in
setting up regulations were
the Texas Water Safety Act,
a manual on Fire Safety for
Suburban Areas Texas,
Food and Drug Laws al-
ready enforced by the
Health Department, and
environmental health prac-
tices falling under the
Health Department.

In the Act is a licensing

section near Kerrville.

Helping sponsor the new
Youth Camp Safety and
Health Act was an organiza-
tion of Texas youth camp
operators, the Camping As-
sociation for Mutual Pro-
gress (CAMP). CAMP was
looking for more uniformity
in its safety and sanitation
practices.

The Advisory Council on
Youth Camp Safety has
worked with the State
Health Department in draw-
ing up proposed rules to be
tried out this summer.
Later, public hearing will be
held on the regulations
before they are submitted to
the State Board of Health
for adoption.

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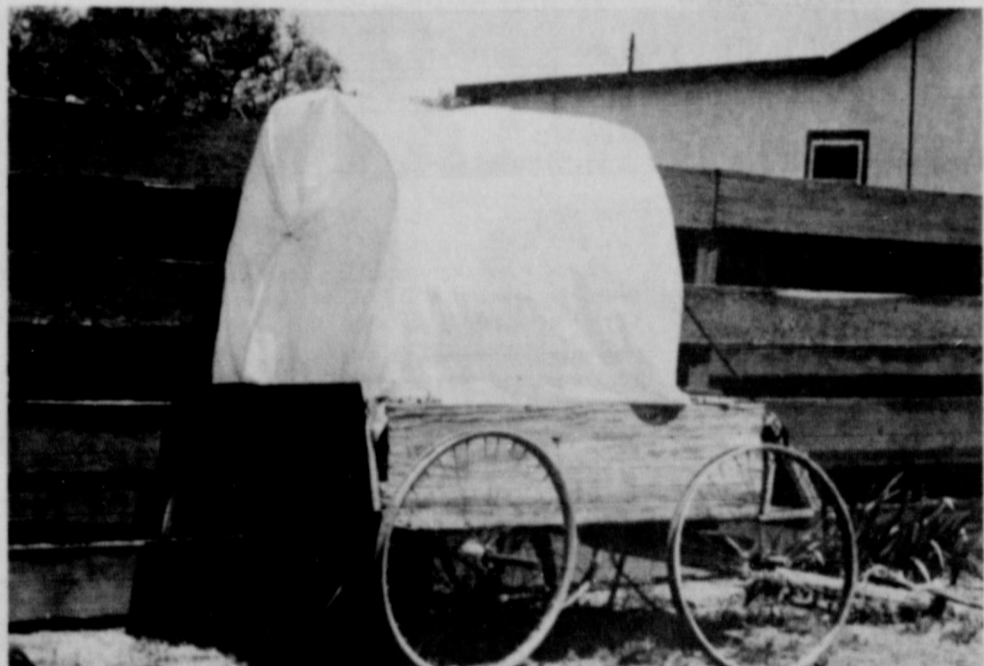
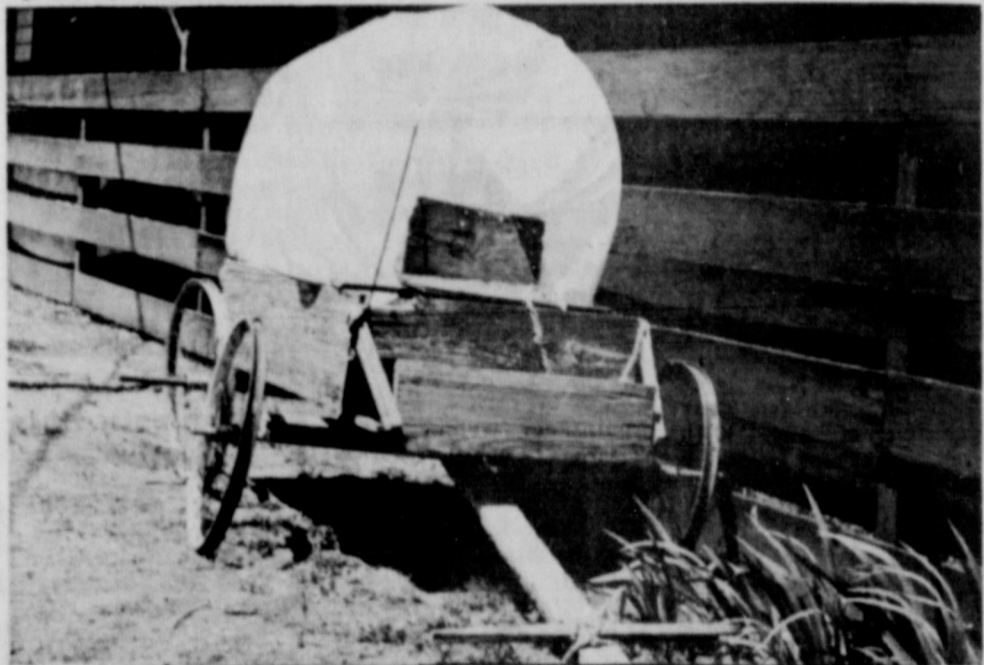
