


Wrecks, Burglaries Are Investigated Here

Wrecks, thefts, burglaries of rural area homes and a report of a rape attempt highlighted activities investigated by Slaton Police Dept. and sheriff's officers in the area during the last week.

At 9th St. and Old Post Rd. Friday, cars driven by Nora Martinez Vasquez of Rt. 2, Slaton, and by Charles Shaw Jr. of Wilson collided. On the previous day, a 1969 auto driven by Andrew Allen Bray of Grand Prairie overturned about 11:15 p.m. on U. S. 84 bypass. The car was headed north, went out of control, and overturned twice into a cotton field. Bray was not injured.

On Sunday a 1966 auto driven by Charles Lee Thomas was involved in a collision at the intersection of New Mexico and Dayton with a 1968 car driven by Willie Handie, 845 E. Geneva. Total estimated damage was \$150.

The rural area homes of Wallace Saage and Wallace Saage Jr., near each other east of Slaton, were burglarized, apparently Tuesday. Sheriff's officers investigated this, and a .12 gauge shotgun stolen from one of the residences apparently has been recovered. Also missing were a \$200 camera and a radio valued at \$30.

Pauline's Flowers reported theft of a watch valued at \$33.35. At 3:45 p.m. Sunday, a 16-year-old girl living in the southeast part of the city notified officers that she was awakened from a nap in the living room by a man 18-20 years old who attempted to assault her. She

told officers she screamed and pushed the subject away and he then ran from the home by the back way, and down an alley. Police questioned a suspect.

Property damage of \$25 was estimated when vandals broke windows on a home at 220 W. Scurry Sunday. The house is owned by Mrs. Florence Cobb.

Officers found five cases of beer and two fifths of whiskey in the car of a man stopped for traffic violation, and a Brownfield resident was charged.

Among numerous calls made to the police department last week were many of less serious nature. On Thursday a woman called to report her garden "has been visited frequently by a horse." And another woman called police to report there was a man in a topcoat "acting in a suspicious manner" at a local supermarket. The investigating officer found it to be a store employe picking up litter.

ROTC membership at Slaton High School has no bearing whatsoever on a youngster's eligibility for military service, Col. Clifford D. Bowen said this week.

Col. Bowen explained that some parents of prospective ROTC students have discouraged their children from signing up for the classes because they had the erroneous idea that students who have taken ROTC can be called into military service.

"There's no draft now, and this was not so even when there was," he observed.



LVN Classes To Begin At Levelland

South Plains College will begin a new class on Aug. 29 for persons interested in becoming a Licensed Vocational Nurse. The program objective is to train vocational-practical nurses who provide nursing care under the direction of a licensed physician, a licensed dentist, or a registered nurse.

Lecture and clinical experiences are provided in the 12 month program. College housing is available on the SPC campus. Twenty-six weeks of pre-clinical instruction is taught on the South Plains College campus while the remaining twenty-six weeks are spent working in 40 hour week schedules in actual hospital work.

The South Plains College LVN Program is approved by the Texas Education Agency and Texas Board of Nurse Examiners, the program qualifies graduates for licensure. Instructors for the program are Mrs. Danner and Mrs. Helen Brown.

Persons interested in entering the LVN Program at South Plains must meet the following entrance requirements: (1) be between the ages of 18-50 years-old, (2) high school diploma or have passed the G.E.D. exam, (3) good physical and mental health (each applicant is required to have a physical exam before acceptance into the program, (4) moral integrity, (5) definite interest in nursing, (6) pass nursing aptitude exam, and (7) have a personal interview with the Director of Nursing at SPC.

Nursing Aptitude Exams must be taken and passed by Aug. 27, 1973 or persons will not be allowed to register in the program for the 1973 Fall Semester at SPC. Persons

interested in obtaining a time and date for taking the Nursing Aptitude Exam may contact the Guidance Department at South Plains College, Phone 894-4921.


