



On the previous day, a 1969 auto driven by Andrew Allen Bray of Grand Prairie overturned about 11:15 p.m. on U. S. 84 bypass. The car was headed north, went out of control, and overturned twice into a cotton field. Bray was not injured.

On Sunday a 1966 auto driven by Charles Lee Thomas was involved in a collision at the intersection of New Mexico and Dayton with a 1968 car driven by Willie Randle, 845 E. Geneva. Total estimated damage was \$150.

Sheriff's officers investigated this, and a .12 gauge shotgun stolen from one of the residences apparently has been recovered. Also missing were a \$200 camera and a radio valued at \$30.
