Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—More than a score of Los Angeles college students were injured, one perhaps fatally, as the result of burns from "gasoline bombs" and from blows on their heads and bodies here early this morning following a "pajamerino"

party on the campus of the Southern branch of the University of California.

According to the students of the Southern branch, they had gathered for the "pajamerino" party, when more than 500 young men, rumored to be students of a rival university, arrived in automobiles and attacked them with "gasoline bombs," rags and bottles filled or saturated with gaso-

line. They attempted to set fire to a woodpile that had been gathered for the party.

A fight followed, clubs, flats, bricks, torches and any other weapon handy were brought into play.

A riot call brought policemen from all stations and more than 200 gathered before the fracas could be quelled.

Succeeding in their endeavor, the attacking forces set fire to the woodpile. The glow caused a fire alarm to be sent in and the fire department was sent to the scene. Several students lay unconscious on the campus when the police ambulances arrived.

It was reported that one who was taken to a hospital was dying from a broken neck.

The occasion of the gathering was a football celebration in honor of the game with the Occidental College, Southern branch students said they were sure the attacking forces were not Occidental students.

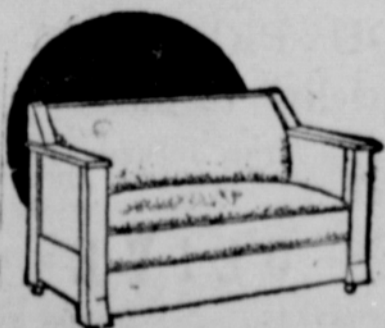

Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin

Washington, Nov. 8.—North American precipitation for the year beginning Oct. 1, 1922, is expected to be less than the ten-year average. Of course some sections will get more, some less; the important thing for the producer to know is what the prospects are for his immediate vicinity so he may know what kind of crop to plant and sow. A shortage of rain means a shortage of crops as a general average and that means good prices for products of 1923. The absence of severe storms for about 20 days of October brought out general complaints about dry weather. From near Nov. 10 to 30 sufficient severe storms are indicated to bring a good general average of moisture that will be favorable to winter grain. My information is that the beginning of the crop season indicates bad crops in Australia, New Zealand and the islands near them; only fair crops in South Africa; good crops in Argentina. Shortage of wheat and ry crops in Europe is greater than heretofore reported. World conditions continue to indicate a world shortage of grain for 1923. Some countries will produce above normal crops but more below. Local forecasts follow:

Sec. 1. North of 47, between 90 and Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures Nov. 12 and 20, highest 16 and 24; average colder than usual; colds near 20; most severe storms and most rain during week beginning Nov. 14.

Sec. 2. North of 47, east of 90, highest temperatures 11 and 18, lowest 14 and 22; average about normal; most severe storms and most rain during week centering on 16.

Sec. 3. Between 39 and 47 and between 90 and Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures 11 and 16, highest 14 and 18; average much warmer than usual; most severe storms and most rain during week centering on 14.

Sec. 4. East of 90, between latitudes 39 and 47; highest temperatures 11 and 15, lowest 13 and 17; average much warmer than usual; most severe storms and most precipitation during week centering on 16.

Sec. 5. Slaton and vicinity. South of 39, between 90 and Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures 10 and 20, highest 14 and 24; average cooler than usual; most severe storms and most rain during the week centering on 17.

Sec. 6. South of 39, east of 90; lowest temperatures 12 and 22, highest 17 and 26; average much warmer than usual; severe storms and most rain during week centering on 17.

Sec. 7. North of 43-1-2, west of Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures 10 and 18; highest 14 and 22; average cooler than usual; severe storms and most precipitation during the week centering on 14.

Sec. 8. South of 43-1-2 to Mexican line, west of Rockies' crest; lowest temperatures on 10 and 18, highest 14 and 22; average much warmer than usual; most severe storms and most rain during week centering on 15.

I am always pleased to receive suggestions from readers of the Slatonite and always reply. I am all the time trying to improve my work, and the best information I get as to what my readers most desire comes from them. Everything about my weather work is new; I am not following the methods of any other person and progress is necessarily slow where there are no experiences nor examples as guides. As a rule, most of our knowledge comes from others; that is true in my case except as to the foundations of my weather work. The most important thing to those interested in producing farm products is future cropweather, and I am very much interested in the wishes and opinions of readers of the Slatonite on this subject.

WHAT THIS COUNTRY NEEDS.
