Mrs. Conner Is Pioneer Queen

Mrs. Theo Conner who has been selected Bicentennial Pioneer Queen of Slaton received her crown and a red bouquet of flowers Tuesday morning just before her ride in the Veterans' Day Parade in an antique car owned by Mac Klattenhoff and driven by Paul Ray Martin.

Mrs. Conner came to Slaton, June 10, 1910, the day the Slaton townsite was sold. She came from Lubbock with her widowed mother and a brother and sister. Her mother was Mrs. Ida Champion, who kept boarders. They had previously lived in Plainview. then Lubbock, originally from Wise County where she was born Nov. 6, 1899. Her mother died in 1948 and her sister and brother have died since.



Hickox went on to say that the young men in the service today are willing to sacrifice for their country if the time comes when they are needed.

Hickox closed his remarks by saluting the veterans and saying that he hoped everyone would respect the great traditions of this country and the country's flag.

NHS CHANGES It has been said that change is inevitable, and the same holds true for the National Honor Society.

Not long ago, the only requirement for membership of NHSwas a good grade average; but NHS sponsors Mr. Gordon and Miss Alexander have tried to make the faculty, who votes on the members, more aware of the other qualifications.

These other qualifications are cited by the Constitution of the Cooper Rural Chapter of the National Honor Society. It states that members must have attended Cooper the preceding semester and be either Juniors or Seniors. They also must maintain a 3.00 grade aver-

More importantly, students must possess outstanding qualities of character, service, and leadership in order to be elected into the organization and retain membership.

When voting, teachers must use their own personal observations of the student. They should not consider rumors. Also, if they do not know the student very well. they will not vote on him.

When teachers are voting on the student's character they consider his honesty. responsibility, fairness, tolerance, courtesy, and cooperation. For service, the contributions the student has made to his classmates. his school, and his community are considered. The student's leadership roles in the classroom, school, and community are what the teacher thinks about when voting for leadership.

Leadership was the main weakness of almost all the students not elected into the NHS. Most of them scored high in all other areas.

Gordon was asked which of the qualities he thought to be more important: character, scholarship, leadership, or service. He replied, "As a sponsor, I think they are all equally important. But personally, I think character is the more important. Without good character, the other qualities will be misused. For example, a person may have the qualities of leadership and service, but without good character he will lead the wrong people and


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Junior High Jottings


This week has been great week at Junior High. The sixth grade did well in the Colgate-Palmolive School Action Plan.
