Veterans Day Draws Crowd

Veterans Day may not cause much commotion in some cities, but Slaton has a long-standing tradition of honoring its veterans and Tuesday was no exception.

Highlighting the day was a large downtown parade. More than 50 entries marched in the parade, and hundreds of spectators lined the streets to watch. Marching bands, color guards, floats and several car loads of pretty girls were featured in the parade.

Out-of-town judges awarded both the float prizes and the band prizes and winners were announced at the end of the parade.

The Athenian Study Club won first place in the float division with a Bicentennial float which featured an American flag and a huge Slaton Bicentennial emblem. Prize money for first place was \$100.

Wins Second

Second place went to the VICA Club entry from Slaton High. The group won \$75 for their train float.

Boy Scout Troop #123 won the \$50 third prize with their float depicting the crossing of the Delaware.

Other floats entered in the parade were made by the FHA West Texas Wheelers, American Legion Auxiliary, the Slaton Garden Club, the Jaycees, and the American Legion Junior Auxiliary.

The first prize \$100 for bands went to the Wilson High School Band, and the \$75 second place money went to the Wilson Junior High Band. The Slaton High School band appeared in the parade, but did not compete for prizes. The SHS Tiger Band also provided several marches and the Star Spangled Banner before the keynote speaker appeared.

Local parade participants were the Slaton Police and Fire Department; the Spirit of '76; VFW Post #6721; American Legion Post #438; World War I veterans; Slaton High JROTC; city officials; gold star members; Cub Scout Pack 123; the Bicentennial Teen and Pioneer Queens; the Brownies; Maxine Odom James' dance students; Lions Club Queen, Bryant Farm Supply, SHS Homecoming Queen and Court; Slaton ambulance and various committees of the American Legion Auxiliary.

A special appearance was made by the Christmas Gift Shop from the VA Hospital in Big Spring, sponsored by the American Legion Auxiliary.

The parade began at the City Park and marched east down Garza and circled around the square where Maj. Joseph Hickox of Reese Air Force Base gave the main address.

Preceding the keynote speaker was the invocation by Rev. Gene Cherry of the First Christian Church of Slaton and a welcome by city mayor J.N. Landreth.

Hickox spoke briefly to the crowd of several hundred. He told the younger people in the audience, "I wish I could say that your future is secure, that you won't ever have to experience the horrors of war. But it's not. If the future were secure, there would be no need for me to wear the uniform of the U.S. Air Force."

Hickox told the crowd that "You hear a lot today about how the United States is becoming a second rate power. You hear about the cutbacks in defense spending. But I'm proud to say that there is a determination and a great pride in our servicemen today."

Hickox went on to say that the young men in the service today are willing to sacrifice for their country if the time comes when they are needed.

Hickox closed his remarks by saluting the veterans and saying that he hoped everyone would respect the great traditions of this country and the country's flag.

Tuesday's parade was the eighth annual such event, and officials of the sponsoring organizations say it was the largest one yet.

Plugs needing repair are positioned at 15th and Knox, 19th and Division, 9th and Floyd, 4th and Geneva, 6th and Lubbock, 4th and Floyd, 9th and Jean, 9th and Powers and 9th and Scott.

Kern mentioned that the fire department tries to look after the plugs themselves, but that much of the work

Mrs. Conner Is Pioneer Queen

Mrs. Theo Conner who has been selected Bicentennial Pioneer Queen of Slaton received her crown and a red bouquet of flowers Tuesday morning just before her ride in the Veterans' Day Parade in an antique car owned by Mac Klattenhoff and driven by Paul Ray Martin.

Mrs. Conner came to Slaton, June 10, 1910, the day the Slaton townsite was sold. She came from Lubbock with her widowed mother and a brother and sister. Her mother was Mrs. Ida Champion, who kept boarders. They had previously lived in Plainview, then Lubbock, originally from Wise County where she was born Nov. 6, 1899. Her mother died in 1948 and her sister and brother have died since.

Her first home in Slaton was located on two lots behind the Harvey House in a half board and the top part a tent; a little later they moved into a long, two-room house.

Mrs. Conner started school in Slaton's first school which was one room with some curtains for dividers. The Methodist

Church also used this building for its meeting place. Her last year of school was in West Texas State Teacher's College. She then taught school in Hansford County, Texas.

On Sept. 10, 1920, Theo married Ray Conner who worked for Santa Fe. Their first home was in Slaton. His work took them away from Slaton at times but they always came back. They had two children, Mrs. Maxine Walker and Bob Conner both of Slaton. Ray Conner died in 1942.

Mrs. Conner has been a member of the Slaton Methodist Church for at least 50 years and has taught the same Sunday School class for 30 years. She has been a member of the Wesleyan Service Guild (now United Methodist Women) of the Church

Tigers Hopeful Of Representing District

The Slaton Tigers football team will play host to Frenship in the final regular season game Friday night, seeking a win which will assure the Tigers of the best season for the football team since 1967's fine 7-2 record. A victory over Frenship would assure Slaton of a tie for the district championship in 5-AA.

Hopefully, Friday night's game will not be the final one of the season for the Tigers, who have not represented district in football since 1949. By winning

Friday, the Tigers will be assured of at least a chance to represent district, since there would be a drawing between Slaton, Denver City and Post for that right, if all three teams win Friday. Post plays Tahoka and DC plays Roosevelt. If Roosevelt should upset DC, then Slaton and Post would tie, but Slaton would represent the league by virtue of having beaten Post.

If the three teams tie for first, as they are expected to do, representatives of the

three schools will get together Saturday, probably in the morning, to draw and find out which teams will be the district's representative in the playoffs.

District 5-AA's champion will play the winner of District 6-AA, which reportedly is expected to be Ballinger, although Colorado City, an early-season foe of the Tigers, edged Ballinger 7-6 in district play last Friday.

Last week, DC beat Tahoka 40-0 while Post was

pounding Roosevelt 41-8. The Eagles, an in-and-out team all year, are capable of beating Denver City, however, and the game will be played at Roosevelt.

Earlier in the season, DC beat Slaton 10-6, Slaton beat Post 12-7 and Post beat DC 33-0.

Tiger Coach Ed Cook warned this week against taking Frenship—which has won just one game—too lightly. "They have more speed than anybody we have played," he commented. If Frenship should upset

Slaton, then Post (by winning over Tahoka) would represent district.

If Frenship, Tahoka and Roosevelt all should win Friday (a set of circumstances considered pretty unlikely), then Post, DC, Slaton and Roosevelt would all be tied for first in district.

Friday night at Tiger Stadium will be Dad's Night, with fathers of Tiger football players seated along the sidelines, wearing numbers of their sons on the team.

Engraving Pen Is Tool For Operation ID Plan

An electric engraving pen is the only tool you need to participate in the Slaton Police Department's Operation Identification Program.

Operation Identification is a program designed to prevent burglaries by marking property. To deter burglars, valuables are permanently engraved with a traceable number—driver's license numbers are preferable—and the owner displays warning decals outside his home or business.

Crime Prevention Officers Joe Hester and Mike Whitley of Slaton Police Department said, "the engraver is very easy and safe to use. You follow a few basic steps of operation. It works from any standard 110 volt electrical outlet. Steps for its use are simple."

Before operating the machine, be sure hands are dry and work area is well lighted, clear of debris and steady.

Quickly get the feel of the engraver by writing your name a few times on a piece of scrap material. There's no need to press down on

the engraver—just move your hand slowly and easily—let the vibrating point do the work.

The knob on the end of the engraver controls the depth of the cut and, therefore, the width of the line being marked. Turning the knob counter clockwise will lengthen the stroke and widen the mark.

The use of the engraver to mark all items with the owner's Texas driver's license number makes stolen property harder to "fence" and, thus, less likely to be stolen.

The identification program also helps law enforcement agencies nationwide return recovered property to its rightful owner.

"The more property that gets marked here, the fewer burglaries and thefts we are going to have," Crime Prevention Officer Joe Hester and Mike Whitley said.

Engravers can be checked out free from the Slaton Police Department.

BICENTENNIAL BITS

The Bicentennial Heritage Committee met Thursday night at the Chamber of Commerce meeting room. Seventeen members were present.

It was reported that there are still a few copies of the souvenir calendars available at the Chamber of Commerce office.

The Slaton pioneer cookbook is being processed. Since it may not be published before Christmas, gift certificates will be available for those who wish to purchase the cookbooks for Christmas gifts.

Mayor John Landreth reported to the group that plans are proceeding for moving the 1809 engine to the city square soon. The engine will be placed on the side of the square, facing north.

The meeting was called primarily for initial work to begin on the Slaton museum. The upper floor of the Chamber of Commerce building is being considered as a starting point. Different persons were appointed to begin investigative work into that site as well as others.

Wayne Green spoke to the group about small town museums and their organization. He will be working with the group in an advisory capacity.

Mrs. Wayne Perkins brought a slate, chalk, and a Santa Fe lantern to show local history items that could be displayed in a museum. She also showed a glass Indian head matchholder dated for the 1876 centennial celebration.

Post Hammers Eagles 41-8

Post took a 27-0 halftime lead over the Roosevelt Eagles last Friday night, then coasted to a 41-8 District 5-AA win which virtually killed any hope Roosevelt had of representing the district. Only if the Eagles beat Denver City this Friday and Slaton and Post both lose would the Eagles be tied for first with those three teams.

With 7:58 left in the first quarter, Post punted and Roosevelt fumbled on the Eagle 20. On the next play, a pass interference call gave Post the ball on the Roosevelt 1, and from there, Jimmy Dorland scored. The kick for extra point was blocked. Later in the quarter, a Roger Daniel pass into the Post end zone was intercepted.

Early in the second, Post QB Bryan Davis teamed

with Dorland on a 40-yard TD pass play, with the extra point again no good. Midway of the period, Perry Rogers of Post recovered a Lowell Bridges fumble, and with 4:48 left, Edward Price raced 15 yards to score, followed by Davis' run for two points, making it 20-0. Another Eagle fumble was recovered by Post on the RHS 30 with 22 seconds left, and on the next play Price broke for 30 and the TD. A kick was good, and it was 27-0 at halftime.

With 54 seconds left in the third, Post HB Garland Dudley ran 5 yards for a touchdown after still another Eagle fumble. Mike Shepherd's kick made it 34-0. Then a Roosevelt drive to the Post 6 was killed by another Eagle fumble, one of five lost during the game by Roosevelt. Davis ran 14

for another Post TD with 4:34 left in the game, and Dudley's kick made it 41-0. With 49 seconds left in the game, Lonnie Patton recovered a fumble by Post's Randall Wyatt at the Post 40. With 14 seconds left, Bridges scored from the 1 for Roosevelt, and Daniel passed to End Richard Adams for 2 points.

needed is beyond their capabilities.

Mayor John Landreth said "It's our (the city's) job to maintain them and we'll get it done."

Kern suggested that the city contact someone out of town to do the work. "I don't know if its a lack of parts, interest or knowledge, but I think we may need to contract the work."

Kern also requested from the commission a new chassis for the booster unit with a front mounted winch. Kern estimated the cost at \$8,500 to \$9,000.

The commission took the request under consideration.

Rural Fires
Kern also discussed with the commission the pending state of county fire calls and the Slaton Fire Department.

Referring to the current hassle in Lubbock between the city and county officials and the request of the Lubbock Fire Department for more money on rural runs, Kern said, "When we have a fire call, we'll answer it."

Kern said that the Slaton Fire Department had earlier been designated the area of the county from South University in Lubbock to FM 40. He told the commission that this included Ransom Canyon, Buffalo Lakes, Posey, the area known as the "strip" and the Union Community.

Several commissioners asked Kern how effective the fire department is in answering the long distance fire calls. "There's really not much we can do when it takes 20 or 25 minutes just to get to the scene of the fire," he said. "We can usually stop the fire where it is, but by that time the entire structure may be

Buys Computer
In other action, the commission authorized the purchase of an accounting computer for \$17,321.18 and the installing of new crystals in the police department radios for \$450.

The commission also discussed selling water to O'Donnell, but no action was taken, pending more discussion with O'Donnell officials and representatives of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority.

O'Donnell earlier sold some of its water to Lamesa, and is now short on water of its own. They are requesting 10 1/2 million gallons from Slaton.

Webb reported that there would be no problems in obtaining the amount from Slaton's surplus. "We are currently using only about 70 per cent of our allotment," he said.

The commission also approved several traffic regulations set forth by the Texas Highway Department for both Division and 9th Sts. A light will be installed at 9th and Jean Sts. for school hour use, making the block the junior high school is located on a 20 mile an hour school zone.

Down Division Street, several pedestrian crosswalks will be installed and the speed limit will be 30 miles an hour.

The commission discussed the leasing of city owned land, and agreed to go as a group to look at the airport farm lease and discuss the contract with those involved.

"We're taking storage areas and closets at high school and making them into offices," he said.

"We're even teaching classes in the library." One board member noted that there has been no new building on any campuses in 15 years despite the many new programs which have

been instituted by the schools.

R. C. Hall Jr. commented that "instead of running around putting out fires, we ought to be considering what our school situation is going to be 15 or 20 years from now."

Any new construction apparently would necessitate a bond issue, something school boards always try to avoid, but something which seems certain here sooner or later.

The board agreed to seek a site for a house to be constructed by the building trades class, with the house to be sold after it is finished.

Also discussed, with no action taken, was a critical situation regarding the teaching of drivers education in the schools, since the state ruling that schools cannot collect fees from students to pay for such activity, except during the summer.
