McClesky read to the board a letter regarding the attorney general's opinion on charging fees to students. Among other things. he said, students no longer may be required to rent band instruments from the school (some of the more expensive ones belong to the school), to pay uniform fees, class dues, workbooks. fees in classes like typing. art and photography, party funds. local club dues such as FHA, or even fees for driver education courses. except in the summer.

Oct. 1 Deadline

McClesky told the board that the state has ruled that such fees may not be collected after Oct. 1 of this year, and that any fees collected since then must be returned. He also noted that the state has said that schools may keep fees paid before Oct. 1. if they wish. The superintendent asked the board to "tell me whether we should return the money collected before Oct. 1. as well." He estimated that the ruling will cost the school about \$5,000 for the rest of this year to pay for items which normally would have been paid by the students. He also estimated that returning fees already collected before Oct. 1 would cost an additional \$3,000.

"I don't see how we can penalize these people who paid their fees early by keeping their money and letting these others who haven't yet paid get the same things free." Basinger said.

It was noted that the high school band, for example, has collected around \$800. with more than that amount still outstanding.

The board however voted to keep the fees paid up to Oct. 1. with Williams. Hall and Mosser voting affirmative, and with Basinger. Screnil and Tumlinson opposed to keeping the fees. Zowie! Tigers Splinter Post

With a loud crash noticed throughout the area, and with echoes all the way downstate, the Slaton Tigers Friday night toppled previously-unbeaten Post 12-7. knocking the Antelopes out of the state rankings (where they had been No. 10 in one poll) and giving Slaton a well-earned victory of the sort which had eluded the Tigers in four previous games this season.

Slaton came roaring from behind in the last quarter on two mile-long touchdown plays by Tailback Bill Mc-Clesky to win the game after trailing 7-0 for most of the contest. Even then, Post came slashing back downfield on out-of-bounds plays to stop the clock time after time, until it finally ran out on them at the Slaton 28. but not before a big crowd of dejected Post homecoming fans and a large group of deliriously happy Slaton fans had chewed off all their fingernails. Post managed to get in 14 plays in the final 2 minutes and 10

Lots of Heroes

Slaton had plenty of heroes in this biggest win for the football Tigers in several years. McClesky, of course, was just superb on his two long runs, one of 79 yards and the other a total of 87 yards after taking a perfect pass from Quarterback Mike Tumlinson out of the shotgun formation. But Bill, who gained 141 yards on 16 carries, had lots of company in the super-game department, as Slaton's defense was just double. tough, time after time, getting standing ovations from the Tiger fans as they came off the field after repeatedly stopping Post when it counted. Artie and John T. Limmer Basinger, Geron Stricklin and Greg Basinger and others all played rugged defense for the Tigers.

The Slaton offensive line did good work, too, and the other backs all did a fine job of blocking (and running, too, on occasion).

In the first period, neither team was able to generate much offense at first, then Post got to rolling behind some good running by little Edward Price, a fast, highstepping youngster who had gains of 19, 10 and 5 yards in a drive halted at the Slaton 34 when Greg Basinger recovered a Post fumble. Slaton couldn't move, and punted down to the Post 39,

Bryan Davis, the Antelopes' talented quarterback. faked a handoff, kept the ball and broke loose to streak 61 yards down the right sideline for a Post touchdown, and Garland Dudley kicked the extra point to make it 7-0 with 2:38 left in the first period. ### Commissioners Discuss Police Radio Problem

For the first time in six months, a full City Commission met Tuesday morning. The brief meeting result-

ed in a unanimous vote to pay the September bills and in the discussion of several other matters.

One such matter, which was tabled until the next meeting, was a request by Police Chief Larry Williams for a change in the radio frequency the police are now using

According to Alex Webb, city secretary, who explained the situation in the absence of Williams, five cities are now using the frequency Slaton uses.

"It's like a party line. We can't transmit until everybody else is through." said Webb.

Wolfforth, Abernathy, Idalou. Shallowater and Slaton all share the same frequency.

'Chief Williams said it is terribly confusing and timewasting. When a transmission is first made, his men can't tell if the trouble is here or in Abernathy," said

Changing the frequency would involve changing the crystals in the new radios which just recently have been installed in the police cars and in the base station of the Police Station. The cost of the work is

estimated at \$1200. Alex Bednarz appeared before the Commission on behalf of the Hospital Board, requesting that some lights be placed in front of

some dark spots. Bednarz told the Commission that the night nurses were nervous about the lack of lighting. Landreth said he would speak with Hospital Administrator Arnold Ingraham and see what could be worked out.



For added security, take photographs, preferably in color, of items too small or delicate to be engraved. such as rings, other jewelry and fine silver or china.

Then display a sticker outside your home or business showing that items inside have been marked. When you do this, you've accomplished several things at one time.

You've advertised to potential burglars that your valuables have traceable identification numbers.

If a burglar should take something in spite of the warnings, you've notified his "fence" that these items are easily traceable and will be extremely difficult to get rid of.

When law enforcement officers locate marked items in the possession of a burglar or fence, there's no question of being able to prove rightful ownership. which aids in the apprehension and conviction of bur-

cense numbers in most states are in computerized banks available in seconds to law enforcement departments, you've made it easy for your property to be returned to you.

Sound simple? It is. And it works.

When Chief Everett F. Holladay conceived the idea in Monterrey, California, in 1963, enthusiasm was low. As burglaries occurred. more and more families 4,000 participating households in a town of 50,000. Solar heat collectors on a

commercial scale will probably show up on the farm before anywhere else. Exactly when solar energy units can practically be used is still an open question. Certainly not right away, but tests performed in six states by the Agricultural Research Service indicate that low temperature drying of grain by use of simple solar collectors is technically feasible. Technically feasible and economically practical are often some distance apart. It appears this is still the case with solar drying since the main thing the ARS testing ascertained was a need for more tests. The new series of tests will be conducted during the next two years and will provide more information on economics of the various ommercial systems as well as ncreasing the technological information available on energy collection

### Two Bad Decisions

The Slatonite believes that the Slaton school district has a good board of education, made up of men who do their best at the thankless and unpaid task of trying to keep the school operating as it should in the face of increasing federal and state government interference. But this doesn't mean that we always agree with their decisions, and they made a couple of bad ones Tuesday night.

The worse of the two was a vote to penalize those parents and youngsters who pay their bills on time. The board voted 4-3 to keep all the fee money paid in before Oct. 1 and forget about collecting from those who did not pay by that time. Because of a state attorney general's ruling, the school cannot legally collect any fees after Oct. 1, but could have returned the money paid by the more conscientious citizens who already had paid fees for such things as workbooks, band uniforms and instruments, etc. The only excuse for the action was to save about \$3000 in fees already paid. But only a few minutes earlier, the board had rejected a bid on a piece of property of more than \$6,000, with the members agreeing that this amount put into the general fund would hardly be noticeable.

The other action on which the board erred, in the newspaper's opinion, was in voting 4-2 for a test exemption policy which permits some students with average grades as low as 70 to skip the quarter exams. This was recommended by the classroom teachers, and reportedly favored by almost all of them, but we suspect that at least some are more interested in having fewer papers to grade than anything else.

A teacher should have the right to give a test or not, as he or she chooses. But if one is given, then everybody ought to take it. And even if there should be exemptions, they should in no way apply to students making grades as low as 70.\_\_

When the Texas Water Quality Board was created in 1967, groundwork, such as that provided by Ehlers, provided a good springboard from which to work. Consequently, abatement of water pollution in Texas has moved ahead more rapidly than in many other areas of the country.

So what is secondary treatment? Let's look first at primary treatment which, basically, simply screens out solid matter in wastewater.

Secondary treatment goes several steps further by adding biological processes to break down organic matter, thus eliminating harmful bacteria.

Still more effective is advanced treatment, sometimes called tertiary (or "third stage") treatment, which produces wastewater of excellent quality. Advanced treatment is being required by the TWQB now in several problem areas and, while it is extremely costly, it will be required elsewhere as the need arises.

The Environmental Protection Agency announced, in July of 1975 that some municipalities in the US probably would not comply with federal secondary treatment requirements until at least the late 1980's. So, while not all of our water pollution problems are solved, Texas is far ahead of most other states in that respect.






