## School Tax Rate, Budget Approved

The rate of 97 cents per \$100 valuation of the board of Slaton Independent School District as the board has approved a budget for the year which would mean that the school would wind up the coming year about \$50,000

payers still will find their tax bills higher, since the district now is taxing on a 100 per cent evaluation, instead of 50 per cent as in the past — and since motor vehicles are being taxed in the district this year.

The projected budget and anticipated revenue for next year would mean that the school would wind up the coming year about \$50,000 in the black, but Supt. J. C. McClesky was quick to point out that non-budgeted expenses always occur, and that any major unexpected increases could wipe out the hoped-for surplus.

Nevertheless, McClesky reported, the school district is winding up this school year about \$17,000 in the black — unless something bad happens between now and Aug. 31. It is the first time in many years for the Slaton ISD to end a year without a deficit.

Many other items were discussed and voted on during the five-hour meeting of the board.

Insurance Agent Bobby Brake appeared to discuss adjustment of premiums on insurance policies with various agents in the city. The board decided to consider a policy change on this matter at the next meeting. In another insurance matter, the board voted to buy liability protection for school board members.

The current year's budget was amended to allow for purchase of a riding type mower, ice machine and some electronic calculators.

Supt. McClesky reported that the interest and sinking fund balance increased to \$28,400 this year, about \$4,000 more than was in the fund at the end of last year. The new tax rate of 97 cents allots 16 cents for interest and sinking fund for the coming year, with the other 81 cents tabbed for local maintenance.

Bell Dairy was awarded the milk contract and Mrs. Baird's bread contract for the coming year. A new bus has arrived, and Supt. McClesky was authorized to borrow \$12,775 to pay for it. In another bus matter, Curtis Aycock, president of Tiger Club, appeared to request that the Tiger bus be repainted. The board deferred taking action on this matter.

Salary of first assistant Coach Tommy Boyd was increased by \$370 a year after the board was advised that Boyd's educational credentials and job assignment could qualify him for a higher pay grade according to state standards.

The board voted 5-1 to pay for filming of Slaton High School football games, an expenditure estimated at \$1,200 per year, which has

been paid in the past by the Tiger Club.

Resignations of Crispin DeLeon, Mrs. Mickey Benson, Mrs. Debbie Mumme and Junior High Coach Keith Sahm were noted, and the board voted approval of hiring the following: Larry Long, to replace Sahm, Mrs. Zell Dickerson for high school English, Mrs. Kay Plemons for homemaking, Miss Caroline Marion for Spanish and French, Donald R. ## City Sets Recall Vote, Moves To Collect Delinquent Taxes

A recall election challenging the right of Ward IV Commissioner Hesikize Thomas to remain in office has been set for Sept. 12 in the city hall, giving the city commission votes on successive Fridays, since Sept. 5 is the date for an election to fill the position of Ward III Commissioner recently vacated by J. P. Spears.

The commissioners decided to hold the Thomas recall

election in city hall since school will be in session at Stephen F. Austin — the usual place for balloting in Ward IV — on election day.

In the Sept. 5 vote, candidates for the seat vacated when Spears resigned in May are B. A. Hanna, B. H. Bollinger and Ira Keys. Absentee ballots for this election now are available at the city hall.

Commissioners also agreed to employ Jack McCreary of the firm of McCreary and Huey of Austin to take over collection of delinquent tax accounts here, empowering the firm to file suit on delinquent taxpayers if necessary.

City Secretary Alex Webb said between \$45,000 and \$50,000 in taxes are delinquent, but pointed out that this includes many accounts which are years overdue.

Howard Hoffman was reappointed to a two-year term as the city's representative to the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority board.

The commission also discussed paving one block of Knox Street between 21st and 22nd adjacent to the St. Thomas Clinic, but took no action on the matter, after noting that one property owner in the block was opposed to the project.

## Net Play Opens In Slaton

Divisions which apparently will be canceled are women's B singles and B doubles, high school girls' doubles and junior high girls' singles and doubles.

Kurt Chapman of Post is one of the strongest entries in junior high boys singles, while Gary Jones of Slaton is one of the favorites in high school boys singles. Debbie Trammel of Roosevelt, a state qualifier and two-time winner of the

district singles, is a heavy favorite in high school girls' singles.

Men's singles, Wood said, looks like a well-balanced division, with several players given a good chance to win it all.

First and second place trophies will be awarded in each division played.

Finals will be Sunday afternoon for the adult brackets.

## Tuesday Is First Day Of School

Summer vacation time is all over, and classes for youngsters in Slaton Public Schools begin at 9 a.m. Tuesday, with buses, teachers and mothers all running

as usual to get school underway again.

Buses will run on the same routes they were running at the end of last school year, according to

Joe Sparkman, administrative assistant, who noted also that the school is going on the quarter system.

Sparkman said the students and parents would notice little change in the quarter system, except that report cards would be out each six weeks instead of every nine weeks.

First grades and the all-day kindergarten classes will dismiss at noon for the first two weeks (through Aug. 29), then go on regular schedule, Sparkman said.

Dismissal times for other grades, which will be the same all year, are 3:30 p.m. for second grade; 3:45 for third, fourth, and fifth; 3:50 for junior high; and 3:55 for high school.

All classes in all grades will begin at 9 a.m., except for the half-day kindergarten which meets in the afternoons only. This class will begin at 12:45 p.m. and dismiss at 2:45 the first two weeks, and turn out at 3:30 thereafter.

The morning half-day kindergarten will be from 9-11 a.m. the first two weeks, and will dismiss at 11:45 a.m. thereafter, Sparkman said.



Under the provisions of the policy the Superintendent of Schools will review applications and determine eligibility.

## Southland School Officials Protest Property Value Hike

Three Southland School officials appeared before an appeals committee in Austin Tuesday to protest that the state set property values for Southland School District too high in determining the local fund assignment for the district.

No report of any decision by the appeals board was available at press time.

Legislation passed recently by the legislature makes it mandatory that 100 per cent property evaluations be reported to the state each year. This figure is then used to determine the local fund assignment for each school district in the state. The local fund assignment (LFA) is the amount of money each school district must raise or produce from local sources to finance school operations.

In January, when Southland submitted its property tax evaluations to Gov. Dolph Briscoe's tax specialists (Management Services Associates, or MSA), the tax assessor-collector, Max Chaffin, reported and attested Southland property evaluations at the 100 per cent figure required, which is reflected on the district's tax books.

This figure was arbitrarily raised by Gov. Briscoe's tax specialists because they said that state-wide they had spot checked and found that what most districts reported as 100 per cent of market value was only 80 per cent of market value. In other words, the property in these other districts was actually worth 20 per cent more than reported.

"Since this arbitrary raise was well above our 100 per cent value we reported, the local school board decided to protest the figure assigned this district by the

state offices," said Supt. T. E. Dickerson. This protest was heard at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday in Austin. A state committee of five tax experts has been appointed to consider appeals from school districts that felt the state set property values for their districts too high.

Two years ago Southland School was required by the courts to evaluate taxable properties at 100 per cent market value. A master in chancery was appointed, and the district was evaluated at full market value at that time. The evaluation was accepted by the court as required by the court and the state law. Southland property evaluations have since been, and will be in the future, 100 per cent evaluations. Chaffin said, "If our taxable property is evaluated at any other figure, we are in violation of the court order."

"Since our property valuations have been accepted as 100 per cent by the court, the school district feels that the figure submitted by our tax collector should be accepted by the Governor's tax consultants," Dickerson stated. "The school board members feel it is their obligation to our property taxpayers to make every effort to get the state to accept the lower evaluation figure which was submitted by our tax assessor-collector."

The appeal in Austin Tuesday was presented by Chaffin, one board member, Spence Bevers, and the superintendent.

If the appeal is successful, it will result in a lower local fund assignment for the school district. If the appeal is unsuccessful, Chaffin feels that MSA should point out any property in

the district which he has under-evaluated. He and Supt. Dickerson expressed confidence that MSA would find little, if any, property not evaluated at the legal rate of 100 per cent.

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



Cattlemen are being outdone by prune producers. At least as far as product promotion is concerned. Paul Horn, writing in one of this summer's issues of THE CATTLEMAN, cites the fact that the prune growers association of California spends more total dollars pushing prunes than the entire cattle industry does in promoting beef. This latest wrinkle comes as a part of the continuing push for the Beef Development Plan which could provide as much as 40 million dollars a year for the promotion and development of beef markets. Hold up on the operation still involves composition of the 68 member "Beef Board" and the mechanics of operating the "beef check-off" system which would provide financing for the promotion by collecting three-tenths of one percent of the sales price of slaughter cattle. If the still lingering problems are ironed out, collections could begin as early as next year.

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## Cystic Fibrosis Group Plans September Drive

September 25, is the date set for the Cystic Fibrosis Drive in Slaton. Co-Chairmen Mrs. Tommy Davis and Mrs. Frank Moore are looking for people who can give a little of their time so that millions of children across the United States can have a better chance in life.

"We are recruiting volunteers for a very important cause — helping children who suffer from cystic fibrosis and other lung-damaging diseases," said Mrs. Davis.

These volunteers will participate in a drive aimed at raising funds to support care, research and education programs benefitting children who have asthma, chronic bronchitis, "childhood emphysema," recurrent pneumonia as well as cystic fibrosis.

"For these children, breathing can be a struggle," she said and added that most people aren't aware that lung diseases can threaten the lives of their children.

"Of the diseases that kill children, lung disease ranks

second only to cancer," she stated. "And cystic fibrosis, the most serious of these diseases, is the number one genetic killer of children."

Mrs. Moore said, "These are grim statistics. We hope to change them for the better. But, we need help. That's why we're appealing for volunteers for our Breath of Life Campaign to raise funds for support of the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation programs benefitting these children."

These programs include support for over 100 Cystic Fibrosis Centers across the nation which provide diagnosis, treatment and referral to children suffering from lung-damaging diseases and gastrointestinal disorders related to cystic fibrosis.

"The Foundation also supports top-notch researchers who are trying to find a cure or control for cystic fibrosis and to develop better methods of treating cystic fibrosis and other

children's lung-damaging diseases," Mrs. Davis added.

Two aims of Foundation research, she pointed out, are a test to detect carriers of the gene for cystic fibrosis which is a hereditary disease and a method of diagnosis at birth. The true goal, of course, is to find a cure or control for cystic fibrosis.

"Although there is much to accomplish, there has been terrific progress in conquering these diseases since the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation was established in 1955. And this progress was made possible because of the public's support," said Mrs. Moore.

In 1955, most children with cystic fibrosis died in their early years. Now, more than 50 percent are living past age 18 and becoming productive adults.

"But, we want to make it possible for all children with cystic fibrosis to live past

age 18. Volunteers can help," she added.

# COTTON TALKS

FROM PLAINS COTTON GROWERS, INC.

August through December, Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. hears a considerable amount of producer opinion and obviously in the opinion of a Board of Directors," says Executive Vice President Johnson, "PCG's part in making these valuable service to cotton producers, including the complaining."

The base PCG-LCE committee is composed of four cotton producer members of the PCG Board and four cotton trade members of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange—four sellers and four buyers. Also taking active part in the committee's deliberations as advisory members are cotton entomologists and agronomists, the area's agricultural meteorologist, and others in the industry who are constant and knowledgeable observers of High Plains cotton production.

Even with such a group, Johnson agrees "estimates cannot always be right, especially those made early in the season, but they are almost certain to serve the interests of producers better than if they were made without producer input."

Of the August crop estimate Johnson notes that the 420 pound projection is only about 4 pounds per acre above the area's 10-year average, and in the opinion of the committee is about what the area can be expected to make, assuming "normal" weather conditions the remainder of the season.

USDA is going to make estimates, cotton publications are going to make surveys and publish estimates, cotton merchandising companies and individual cotton merchants are going to make estimates, and individual producers will do some guessing."

Therefore, he reasons, cotton producers have only two choices. "We can hide our heads and let others assess the potential of our crops as they will, or we can take an active part in the making of estimates that we know to be as realistic and accurate as the vagaries of weather and other uncertainties will permit. And it seems clear to me that the latter option is by far the best."

## BICENTENNIAL BITS

America's Bicentennial is receiving more and more attention across the nation. Some aspects are serious, some are fun, and some are commercial.

For example, did you read about the needlepoint rug being made for the Missouri Governor's mansion? Over 600 sample squares were sent in by Missouri needlepointers who wanted to be a part of a Bicentennial "something" for their state. Eighty women and one man were finally chosen to make the rug squares. Each of the 81 pays \$40 cost of materials for the square, specially designed for the rug, and then does the work.

Twenty-seven women are creating a 265-foot embroidered tapestry for their church in northern New Mexico as their project for the Bicentennial. Oldtimers have contributed their knowledge of the town's history, and the women have included local history and folklore, Coronado's visit, U. S. annexation, and many more subjects. A carpenter will frame the massive stitched embroidery in local cactus wood for installation in their ancient Our Lady of Guadalupe Church.

Many serious quilters will be making the Bicentennial Star Quilt. The only pattern officially authorized by the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration, the

new quilt was introduced in the July issue of Good Housekeeping magazine.

Do you know about the Freedom Train? The Bicentennial? The American Issues Forum? The uncountable worthwhile projects in motion across the U. S. typifying the spirit of Bicentennial?

Yes, there's some BUY-centennialism involved, also. An eatery in South Plains Mall is building trade by offering a free new-issue Bicen half-dollar in exchange for a purchase and a coupon clipped from a newspaper. A Lubbock shop specializing in beautiful things for the home is advertising Bicen nostalgic items such as pewter candlesticks, Liberty Bell bookends, etc. A paper-backed book lists data on some Bicen events. For \$1.50 one can buy the book, which tells about celebrations such as the chili-eating, gospel-singing Harvest Festival in Brownfield Oct. 2-4; the Pinata Festival in Tucumcari, N.M. Sept. 3-7; the 3,000 voice presentation of "Song of Democracy" next spring in Ada, Okla.; and countless other events across the nation.

The best answer thus far to complaints about commercialism in the Bicen: "The word 'bicentennial' is in the public domain, meaning it can be used freely by anyone in any way. Of course some will use it solely for personal gain. That's free enterprise at work. The founding fathers fought just as hard for free enterprise as they did for freedom of speech. In the end, the good judgment of the people must decide what is worthwhile and what is junk."


