Not since 1935 has Slaton  
represented the district in a  
playoff game, according to  
any records which could be

turned up. In 1949, the  
Tigers won their half of  
district and had a playoff  
game for the district title  
with Littlefield, but lost.

Slaton and Anson will  
meet at 7:30 p.m. Friday in  
the Snyder High School

stadium, located on 38th St.  
a few blocks west of Texas  
Hwy. 350 which goes out of  
Snyder to Big Spring. Slaton  
will have the home team  
side, the west side of the  
stadium.

Tickets are on sale at the

Slaton school administrative  
offices on S. 9th, with no  
seats reserved, since there  
will be plenty of room.  
Tickets are \$2.50 for adults  
and \$1 for students. They  
also will be sold at the stadium.

Snyder Chamber of Commerce  
is taking care of all details  
and supplying at no cost the bi-district trophy  
and taking care of many of  
the other expenses involved  
in the game. Mickey Nunley,  
Snyder C-C manager, met with officials of Slaton  
and Anson in Snyder Saturday to work out details.

Slaton schools will dismiss  
at 2 p.m. Friday, it was  
announced this week, and a pep rally is planned  
in the Slaton High School  
gymnasium at 1:20 p.m.  
Friday.

night's game will play the  
winner of the game in  
Alpine, also Friday, between  
Alpine and Crane, the  
champions of districts 7  
and 8.

Football fans in Slaton  
Friday had a tense evening  
before it was determined that Slaton would be the  
district's representative in  
the playoffs. At halftime of  
the game against Frenship,  
it was learned that Roosevelt  
was leading Denver City at the half 9-0, an  
announcement which drew a  
mighty roar from the Slaton  
fans at the game. But at the  
end of the game, and throughout the fourth quarter,  
the phone in the Roosevelt field house was  
not being answered, and there  
was no way to find out if Roosevelt had pulled off  
the big upset, which would  
have given Slaton the right  
to represent district without  
the agony of a drawing  
between three teams.

### Nervous Wait

Not until about 15 minutes after the game was  
it learned that Denver City had

come back to win the  
game over Roosevelt 19-16.

Then came the waiting in  
the administrative offices of  
Slaton schools. After the  
representatives from Denver  
City and Post had arrived,  
these coaches and administrators  
closed themselves in the school board meeting  
room, while outside the room  
waited the crowd of fans and media people.

Outside the building itself  
was a large crowd of players  
and other fans, awaiting  
word of the draw.



## Couple Visits Old Doctor

Last Feb. 6, John Chancellor paid tribute to a 100 year old doctor in Arkansas who was still practicing and making house calls.

The object of the national news story was Dr. J.W. Morris of McCrory, Ark. The story was broadcast on Dr. Morris' birthday.

Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Trussell of Slaton were watching the news that night and Mrs. Trussell recognized Dr. Morris as the family doctor of her parents.

"I was really shocked to see him and remember who he was," said Mrs. Trussell. "I sent him a birthday card, and he wrote me back and said to come and visit him if we were ever in the neighborhood."

The Trussells found themselves only 10 miles from McCrory this fall when they took a trip to Nashville to see the Grand Ole Opry. And since they were in the neighborhood, they dropped in on Dr. Morris.

"Such a memory you wouldn't believe," said Mrs. Trussell. "He asked me questions about my family and then answered them himself before I could think of who he was talking about."

Dr. Morris delivered Mrs. Trussell's brother in 1902. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Wood, then moved from the McCrory area to Texas several years later and lost track of Dr. Morris.

Dr. Morris delivered his 7,000th baby when he was 92 years old, and decided to quit delivering babies. He still has a general practice and his daughter drives him on house calls. Dr. Morris is quite well known in the area for saving pneumonia patients, and is called in

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

Buxkemper's best game for total offense was with Whitharral, when he gained 237 yards. In the Grady game, he rushed for 130 yards. Buxkemper carried the ball 131 times during the season for a 4.5 yard per carry average.

Buxkemper also paced the Eagles in receiving, catching 12 passes for a total of 133 yards.

In total offense, Kendon Wheeler had 501 yards, followed by John Chaffin with 277, Paul Eckert with 226 and Curt Wheeler with 143 yards.

Chaffin totaled 251 yards rushing, followed by K. Wheeler with 70, Edward Davila with 43 and Nathan Wheeler with -41.

Kendon Wheeler, the Eagle quarterback, completed 35 of 123 attempted passes during the season. His passing yardage was 429, with an average of 12.3 yards per pass.

Nathan Wheeler completed three of nine passes for a 9.3 average.

Junior Buxkemper completed one of two for a three yard average, and Steve Cisneros did not complete

the one pass he attempted.

Paul Eckert was a top Eagle in receiving yardage, having 144 yards on 11 catches. He averaged 13.1 a completion.

C. Wheeler pulled in eight passes for 112 yards while Cisneros had three for 41 yards. Chaffin also caught three passes for 16 yards.

Chaffin was the second leading defensive player, netting 70 tackles and 37

assists. Other defense stats are: Bobby Flores, 58 and 17; Junior Vasquez, 52 and 25; K. Wheeler, 46 and 21; Ricky Cardona, 43 and seven; C. Wheeler, 43 and 16; John Surtice, 32 and 14; and Eckert, 21 and eight.

The Eagles ended the season 0-8-2, scoring a total of 105 points. Total points allowed during the season was 386.

# Win Over Frenship Is Fifth In Row For Slaton

The Slaton Tigers started slowly, but ended up with 19 points in the last quarter last Friday to close out the regular season with a 32-0 win over Frenship to clinch a first-place district tie with Slaton. And, as just about everybody knows by now, will represent District 6-AA in the playoff with Anson Friday.

The game at 7:30 p.m. in Snyder will be the first playoff game for the Tigers since 1949, and the first time they have been out of district since 1935, according to the records of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

The 1949 game was a playoff for the district title between Slaton and Littlefield, winners of the north and south divisions of a district which then was split. Slaton lost that one as Littlefield went on to the state.

Certainly Friday night's win over Frenship made it five wins in a row for the Tigers, and gave them a 6-4 regular season mark, 5-1 in district. Only a 7-2 record in 1967 and a 5-3-2 mark in 1970 stand with this year as winning seasons since that 1949 team. In the other 23 years the Tigers broke even six times and had losing seasons 17 years.

Slaton's running attack was more varied against Frenship, as Ernest Gipson rushed 11 times for 58 yards, Charlie Haynes 8 times for 31 and one touchdown, Gary Aycock gained 37 yards in just four tries, and Rocky Smith gained 21 in four trips. But it still was Tailback Bill McClesky who did the most damage, running 25 times for 138 yards and ending the regular season with three more touchdowns for a total of 114 points this year so far. He also has gained 1,397 yards in 257 carries, an average of 5.4.

Frenship made only two first downs in the football game, both of these in the first half. But the game started off on a bad note for Slaton fans, as the hometown Tigers fumbled the first two offensive plays, losing the second one at the Slaton 31. Frenship then gained 20 yards on a pass to end Vernon McKinney down to the Slaton 10, but on the next play Geron Stricklin recovered a fumble for Slaton on the 12, and starting with runs of 18 and 14 by McClesky, Slaton drove 88 yards for a touchdown, with McClesky scoring from the 2 with 4:14 left in the first. Lorin Roberts' kick was wide and it was 6-0. Slaton scored again early in the second period on a 9-yard run by McClesky, and Roberts' kick went true, making it 13-0. Frenship then made its other first down for the night, on a fake punt, with Fullback Bobby Tennell racing 29 yards to the Slaton 46. There

was no more scoring in the first half, but Slaton Quarterback Mike Tumlinson drew cheers with a soaring 80-yard punt which went over the head of the receiver.

## No Scoring

The third period was mostly a punting battle, with neither team able to do much offensively, and it was still 13-0 at the end of the third, as Frenship appeared stronger than had been expected on defense. McClesky did hit End Tim Bourn on a big 45-yard pass in that quarter. Midway of the fourth, however, Slaton scored after moving downfield on a drive featuring Tumlinson's 31-yard pass to Haynes, and Haynes later scored from the 1. A pass for points was no good, and it was 19-0.

When Slaton next got the ball, McClesky, Aycock and Gipson did some good running to move the ball to the 15,

from where McClesky ran for this TD. Roberts' kick made it 26-0. With just 36 seconds left, Frenship fumbled on the 2-foot line and Slaton recovered, with Fullback Clarence Hammons scoring from there just before the end of the game.

On defense for Slaton, John T. and Greg Basinger did fine work, and the offensive line opened good holes for the running backs. For Frenship, tackle Brent Drennan was outstanding.





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

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# Anson Wins Title In Final Second

There are more similarities between Slaton and Anson's 1975 football teams than just their mascot and colors. Anson's Tigers, like Slaton, were not expected by the "experts" to win district, but they upset state-ranked No. 8 Ballinger in the final regular-season game with a touchdown in the last second of play to win all the marbles.

Another similarity between the two teams is that each has one backfield performer who has scored most of the points and made most of the yardage this season. For Anson, it is

Quarterback Tony Watts, 185-pound senior, who lunged 2 yards into the end zone on the last play of the game Friday to give Anson the 13-7 bulge over Ballinger.

It was Watts' 97th point of the year. Halfback Eddie Munoz, a junior weighing 150, has scored 52 points this season. He will be wearing No. 41.

The Anson team is coached by Dick Rogers, and has compiled an 8-1-1 record this season, losing 15-14 to Coahoma and being tied 14-14 by Winters.

Anson used a razzle-

dazzle type of play twice to get in scoring range in the game against Ballinger, one of them involving 2 laterals.

Anson last was in the playoffs in 1960, when they advanced to the quarterfinals before losing to Denver City 43-0. Anson has outscored opponents 245-105. Slaton has outscored its foes 184-95.
