

Area Sunflower **Boom Spurs Research**

A booming increase in sunflower production from 5,000 acres last year to nearly 300,000 this year on the High and Rolling Plains has resulted in a new 'package' of research by agricultural scientists at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock.

The package includes studies ranging from seed emergence, breeding, volunteer sunflower control and dynamics of insect populations to fertilizer rates and effects of environmental factors on hy-

Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) researchers, in cooperation with USDA scientists, are gathering information from a host of studies and from results of the first significant acreage of sunflowers seen on the High and Rolling Plains.

Research Areas For several years TAES oilseed crops researchers such as Dr. Raymond Brigham have carried on re-

search, delving into problem

plant diseases and production practices. But only this year, when acreage jumped to more than a quarter million and sunflowers became an economically important crop, did scientists set out to assemble bushels of heretofore unknown facts about sunflower production on the High and Rolling

Already, the short-season crop which may be planted in early April or grown as a late-planted catch-crop is yielding up its secrets. according to Brigham.

'In the upper Midwest and other sunflolwer production areas of the nation. many of these facts are known," he says. "But the climate and soils in High and Rolling Plains areas are different, and problems are different. So, for all practical purposes farmers went into sunflower production this year with many unknowns but plenty of faith." Used In Food

About one million acres of oil type sunflowers are grown in the US, Brigham explains. Most of the oil seed sunflower production in the High and Rolling Plains areas is intended for food uses after the oil is expressed in local oil mills.

He says studies in the multi-faceted research package being conducted this year interrelate with

For instance, Brigham is testing the performance of hybrid sunflowers, while at the same time Dr. Earl Monton, plant pathologist, is collecting data from seed treatments of those hybrids to get a reading on emergence percentages of seed treated with fungicides and insecticides. He's also aiming for uniform emergence and vigorous seedlings.

Dr. George Teetes, TAES research entomologist, with co-worker Curtis Schaefer, are monitoring seasonal carrot beetle populations in 23 counties of the High and Rolling Plains in an attempt to correlate light trap catches with field damage. They are also utilizing dates of

planting hybrid sunflowers to determine infestation damage levels present, and potential pests such as the sunflower moth, sunflower beetle and various stalk

Gift" was about trees.

Answer Sought An important economical question that producers

likely will encounter is how severe will volunteer sunflowers infest fields planted to cotton next year following sunflowers this season. Dr John Abernath, TAES weed control researcher, anticipated this potential problem when he saw over a quarter million acres being planted in April, May and June. Sunflower headers drop a number of seed during harvesting, resulting in volunteer plants emerging next year. To farmers growing crops other than sunflowers, this amounts to an undesirable weed infes-

Abernathy is checking a number of herbicides, applied both pre-plant and pre-emergence to determine

the most effective material and rates of application. He has some 42 treatments under study. The weed control scientist also is looking at potential herbicides for use during the growing season.

Brigham's role in the research effort primarily is centered around hybrid evaluation and breeding. The best single cross and threeway hybrids (total of 15) are being studied in comparison with open-pollinated oilseed varieties such as Peredovik and Sputnik, and the confectionery variety Sundak. The term confectionary is used to describe the purpose for which the seed is grown, such as for use in roasted and salted whole seed products. These studies, Brigham

says, will help in determining the hybrids or hybrids best adapted to the area.

Unique Program

Scavo is going to Dallas to participate in a unique voice rehabilitation program. He will be one of 25 pupil-patients in the International Association of Laryngectomees 15th Voice Rehabilitation Institute, which is sponsored by the American Cancer Society.

Scavo said. "There are only 25 people selected to go to the institute each year. Most people try for three or four years to get accepted. I wrote the director and told him if he would select me, I would bike the entire distance from my home in Lone Pine, Calif." Scavo was chosen and he

kept his word. "I'm doing this to point out to people that just because a major change takes place in a person's life, it's not the end." he said.

Scavo's love for life and his optimistic attitude toward it carries over to everything he does - even bike riding. He has ridden through rain, snow, extreme heat and cold. His philosophy? "You just have to take everything in stride. When I came across Death Valley, it was about 115 degrees. But when I was in the mountains, it was snowing.

HECEWorkshop Held In Austin

Mrs. Patricia Koslan, home economics teacher at Slaton High School, recently returned from the Home Economics Cooperative Education (HECE) workshop at the University of Texas at Austin.

The workshop, a five day training period, was sponsored by the Department of Occupational Education and Technology of the Texas Education Agency.

HECE is a program which provides in class instruction and on the job training for high school students who are interested in home economics related occupa-

The student attends classes at school during part of each day and is employed for a minimum of 15 hours each week in a home economics related occupa-

In addition to regular classes, the student receives daily instruction related to the world of work and the home economics occupation in which he or she is employed.

Approved occupations for HECE students include the following: art and craft aide, bridal consult, child care aide, clothing assistant, communications aide, companion to the elderly, consumer aide, dietic aide, fabric coordinator, fashion coordinator, floral designer, food caterer, food service employe. home furnishing aide, housekeeping management assistant, physical fitness assistant, testor of food and testor of textiles.

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
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

as you need them.

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

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



Personal Flotation Devices - The Difference Between Sinking or Swimming


During the summer months, many Americans add swimming, boating, and water skiing to their list of recreational activities. However, an accident can quickly turn recreation time into recuperation time. If you heed safety rules and use proper equipment, you can avoid a case of the summertime blues.

Personal flotation devices (PFD's), which include vests, jackets, ring buoys, and cush-ions, are an essential part of marine safety. Underwriters Laboratories Inc. reminds you that no one can recuperate from drowning, and urges you to use PFD's for your protection in the marine environment. UL offers the following information for your consideration when purchasing a


 An important thing to con-sider is whether the UL label appears on the device. UL Listed, Coast Guard approved PFD's have been subjected to the tests of UL Standard 1123 or 1175, and the U.S. Coast Guard safety regulations. The UL label assures you that the design and construction of the device has been tested with regard to buoyancy, strength, fire resistance, and other relevant

· There are various types of personal flotation devices. You should purchase the type that best suits your needs. Type II devices are designed to turn an unconscious wearer from a face-down to a face-up position in the water. Type III de vices, such as jackets and vests, are especially designed for comfort, and should allow a conscious person to maintain a position either on their back, or near vertical in the water. Type IV devices (buoyant cushions and ring life buoys) may be thrown into the water to assist a person who has fallen overboard. You should never wear a buoyant cushion on your back, like a pack-it might turn your face under-

· The size requirement of a PFD is dependent upon whether the person using the device is a child or an adult. Children's vests (pictured) come in two weight categories: (1) for persons weighing under 50 pounds, and (2) for persons weighing 50 to 90 pounds. Special purpose buoyant devices (pictured) now come in three sizes for children: under 30 pounds; between 30 and 50 pounds; and between 50 and 90 pounds. A child should be provided with a size that

will fit snugly enough to prevent him or her from slipping out. An adult should never try to get by with a child's device. Also, the type of clothing that is to be worn under the device should be considered in choosing the correct size


· Remember that no personal flotation device is a substitute for adult supervision.

· UL engineers recommend that you make sure your PFD's


are thoroughly dry and that you store them in a well-ventilated area. Never store the devices near heat, in direct sunlight, in the bottom of a locker, or in deck storage boxes where moisture could accumulate. Avoid abusing the equipment. For example: don't use your PFD as a boat bumper. If the device has been immersed in salt water, wash the metal parts in fresh water before drying and storing. If the device shows evidence of being rotten or defective, cut it up and burn it to be sure no one will use it.

Underwriters Laboratories reminds you that safety is not a halfway proposition. Statistically, the greatest number of drownings has taken place among good swimmers. Wear your personal flotation device whenever you are in or near the water



Mother nature has many faces. In spite of all her gentleness there is a destructive side as well. Consider, for example, the tornado, one of the deadliest phenomena in nature.

Many of these violent storms occur during the springtime, when the earth is waking from its winter slumber. The destructive, whirling wind may strike almost without warning and seemingly at random, sweeping everything out of its way with a whiplash tail that moves in a narrow path across the land.

At one time, about all that people could do to guard against being killed or injured by a tornado was to be on the alert for tornado weather and to move underground - into a storm cellar - when conditions warranted.

Rural Wrecks Investigated

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 46 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of June, 1975, according to Sergeant O.C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol

supervisor of this area. These crashes resulted in seven persons killed and 31 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first six months of 1975 shows a total of 249 accidents resulting in 15 persons killed and 172 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for June, 1975, shows a total of 572 accidents resulting in 25 persons killed and 355 persons injured as compared to June. 1974, with 466 accidents resulting in 19 persons killed and 261 persons injured. This was 106 more accidents, six more killed, and 94 more injured in 1975 at the same period of time.



community, the State Health Department can provide vaccine, public health engineering, medical emergency nursing know-how, and other vital services, to stem the threat of disease or further complications while disaster relief is underway.

One of the best examples of public health action following a highly-destructive tornado occurred in Lubbock, five years ago.

Although storm warning was in effect, the tornado which actually hit the city appeared out of nowhere forming just above the downtown section at 10 p.m. One of the first things knocked out was the emergency warning system.

With much of Lubbock's communication system knocked out, the health department staff and other city personnel were on their own in following the emergency procedures that had been established in advance. Vaccines and other medical supplies were dug out of the demolished health department building for transfer to an emergency

State Health Department

nel arrived on the scene early the next morning. Food and drug investigators were assigned to Lubbock immediately and within a week had disposed of all spoiled foods and drugs. A large supply of tetanus vaccine was sent by the Health Department laboratories. Rapid insect control activities were vital because of the large amounts of rain.

As in all similar disasters, the one great lesson learned was the value of being prepared.

Over the years, the Naticnal Weather Service has developed a system to accurately report severe weather conditions. The public is informed by radio and television advisories.

For tornado activities, the terms used are "tornado watch", indicating the possibility of a tornado; "tornado warning", meaning that a tornado has been reported in the general area; and "tornado alert," meaning to act fast, that a tornado is known to be in the area.

What can you do in the face of a tornado alert?

If it's daylight, or if you can see the funnel advancing toward you, you may have time to move out of its path. If you have a storm cellar, you should move into

If you can't get out of the way and you don't have a storm cellar, you can still protect yourself.

In homes, open some windows and then keep away from them. Get to the center of the house, or to a basement if there is one.

In schools, move to prearranged shelter areas. Post a lookout if it can be done safely

In shopping areas, go to designated shelter areas.

In mobile homes, evacuate the area. If no shelter is nearby, leave the trailer park for low protected

In open country, move away from the twister's path. If there isn't enough time, lie flat in the nearest depression with hands shielding your head. If heavy rains accompany the twister, be alert for flash flooding.

According to Bob Townsley, Director of the state's Motor Vehicle Division, Eighteen states now follow this 'staggered' system of motor vehicle registration and have proven it success-

"Not only will it relieve some of the pressure on motorists." said Townsley but it will also relieve the all - too - familiar burden placed on the county tax assessor-collectors."

He added, "By effectively distributing the registration workload evenly throughout the year, county tax offices will be able to conduct other phases of their work, such as voter registration and preparation of property tax

rolls, without interruption." For all practical purposes. April 1, 1978 will be almost eveyone's vehicle registration renewal deadline - for the last time. Renewal notices will inform motorists as to their renewal date thereafter. Fees will be calculated on a prorata basis to that date.

Upon registration, motorists will be issued two license plate stickers - one for the year and one for the month of the subsequent renewal. Once a vehicle is assigned to a particular expiration date, it will remain on that annual renewal cycle thereafter. The month sticker first issued for a vehicle will remain on the license plate. and new month stickers will not be issued each year.

Also, the month payable sticker will serve as a reminder to the motorist. just as the windshield auto inspection sticker does. Since renewal notices will be mailed during the month preceding the month in which renewal fees will be due, motorists should have no problem in renewing registrations in plenty of

In making the transition to the new system, some vehicle owners will pay for more than 12 months of registration while others will have to renew twice within the first year.

The 1978 renewal notices will reflect a dollar amount due which may be smaller than usual, or it may be larger. It may be a billing for 16 months, with an expiration date of July 31. 1979, or it may be any date

Townsley said, "Annual registration periods for passenger cars and 'light' commercial vehicles already registered in Texas will be determined by the 'tens' digit, next to the last number on the current license plate." He said, "If you know your auto license plate number, you can readily determine when the vehicle will have to be registered again after April

Example: ABC 953 / 5

months — expires Aug. 31, 1978; BBB 849 / 16 months - expires July 31, 1979.

The middle digit "zero" will indicate an 11-month registration period.

'Bear in mind the use of the 'tens' digit on the license plate is a one-time operation for the purpose of spreading the registration periods of vehicles already licensed in Texas evenly over the entire year," said Townsley. "Once a vehicle is assigned to a particular month, the registration renewal for that vehicle will become due on the last day of that same month in subsequent years," he said.

The 1978 "staggered" licensing system for Texas will reserve the month of March for registration of miscellaneous classifications of vehicles, such as small trailers, campers, mobile homes, buses, motorcycles and other special plates.

In December, commercial

vehicles only (other than "light" commercial vehicles) would be registered. This would coincide with a calendar year basis for registration used in most other states.

Townsley also concluded, 'Transition from the present system, to which everybody is accustomed, to the year-round program will not be easy. Once accomplished, however, it will assure an even flow of registrations for all Texas motorists, put an end to the annual 'jam-ups' at the county tax offices and effectively distribute the registration workload over the entire year.

Houston Man Wins TV Here


A Houston man who was visiting relatives in Slaton last month is the winner of the color TV given away by the Babe Ruth baseball



The week-long emphasis will highlight farm and ranch accident prevention, through programs conducted by the Texas Safety Association, Texas Farm Bureau. State Agricultural Extension Service, Future Farmers and Future Homemakers, and the Young Farmers of Texas.

Records show that 285 Texas farm and ranch residents died in 1974, an increase over the 214 fatal accidents which occurred in 1973. Accidents involving traffic, tractors and drownings were the leading caus-

"Facing this kind of situation requires strength of character," Smith said, 'but it is possible to plan ahead to ease recovery. State, county and local officials will be on the scene, as will insurance industry representatives. but the ultimate responsibility for survival and recovery is with the individual families.

Smith says the TIAA recommends several steps be taken after the danger of a storm passes.

Take immediate steps to prevent loss to lives or property. Make any necessary temporary repairs to prevent further damage from wind or rain that might follow the tornado or hurricane. Keep a record of costs for the insurance adjuster.

Notify the insurance representative as soon as possible about any loss; if damaged property must be left, be certain to inform the insurance agent or company representative. Always deal with a repu-

Botulism Can Be Found

prices has come an increase in home canning, as families buy foods in bulk at their peak seasons to save on the grocery bill. And with the increase in home canning has come a serious health hazard - botulism.

Botulism is a serious form of food poison that produces critical illness and is fatal in one fourth of all cases, the Texas Medical Association states.

Unless strict precautions are followed, home canned food may be contaminated with the spores of Clostridium botulinum. The danger does not come directly from eating the bacteria themselves. In fact, a great deal of fresh food contains the spores of the bacteria which, when eaten, pass harmlessly through the digestive tract. However, under special conditions Closa toxin, a substance which may be the most lethal human poison in existence. Food canning, if improperly carried out, can provide perfect conditions for the production of this poison.

The problem of botulism is prevented in commercial canning by use of equipment producing a combination of temperature and pressure capable of killing the spores so they cannot grow into bacteria to produce their toxin. However. since the botulinum bacteria can survive 20 hours of boiling at normal sea level pressures, simple home canning methods may not succed in getting rid of them, and during storage there is plenty of time for the fatal toxin to be

produced. Home canning can be

lowed. A pressure cooking device is recommended for obtaining the combination of temperature and pressure which can kill the botulinum organism during the canning process.

If you have a supply of home canned food, you can make sure of its safety by one simple precaution boil before using!

Although the bacteria may not be destroyed by boiling, the highly dangerous toxin is made harmless by ordinary boiling - 10 minutes at sea level, longer at higher altitudes. Make sure every particle of the food is heated at the boiling point in order to destroy all of the dangerous

Botulism kills through the paralyzing action of its toxin upon the nervous system. Control of the muscles is about the face and neck. Loss of the ability to swallow makes it impossible to eat, leads to choking which may introduce foreign materials into the lungs, and usually produces death in several days. Most patients give a history of having eaten food which

few hours by nausea and vomiting Later the symptons of muscle weakness begin to appear. If medical aid is quickly obtained and the correct diagnosis is rapidly made, it may be possible to save the patient. A serum may be injected which, while it cannot help the nerves already damaged, it is sometimes able to limit further paralysis.

But the best treatment for botulism is prevention.

Comercially canned food can be considered safe. If you are given some home canned food you can make it safe by boiling at least 10 full minutes before use. Those who do their own canning should review their procedure to make certain it protects against botulism. even if they have been canning for years without incident.

Never taste preserved food which appears to have spoiled for a very small amount of botulism toxin can produce illness. When in doubt, throw it out.

Canadian River Project Cheaper Than Estimated

River Municipal Water Authority received a double dose of good news recently when they learned that water from the giant Canadian River Project, built to supply the eleven member cities of the Authority, cost about 20 percent less than

one-third of its present

The Project, including Lake Meredith on the Canadian River near Borger and a 322-mile aqueduct system to deliver the water to over 375,000 citizens of Amarillo, Borger, Brownfield, LameDonnell, Pampa, Plainview, Slaton, and Tahoka, was finished in 1968 and has since supplied up to 22 billion gallons of water per

year to the cities. Because some of the contractors filed claims for additional payment, the fi-

nal actual costs of construction have only recently become known. The Bureau of Reclamation, which handled design and construction for the Authority, has now reported that actual costs payable by the Authority totaled \$83,358,280

Average capital cost of water to the member cities, including interest over the 50-year repayment period, will come to 10.103 cents per 1000 gallons. The original estimate of water cost was 12.17 cents per 1000
