

AFDC, they are often also eligible for other benefits such as medical care and food stamps.

"Medicaid is a program which entitles recipients to free medical care." said Sammie, "Each family has an identification card that proves they have Medicaid. A doctor doesn't have to accept these state paid cases. Some doctors will and others won't, it's not mandatory," said Sammie.

Glasses, Dental Care

Medicaid also enables families to free glasses. dental care and three prescriptions per family member a month.

Sammie's caseload of families now receiving AFDC numbers 126 for Slaton. Among those cases, some of the welfare is being abused.

'When anyone calls us and tells us that they think someone is violating any of the welfare rules, we go and check it out. We have a fraud unit operating out of Lubbock, and we prosecute violators." said Sammie.

The most common fraud practiced has to do with men living in the household. When a family is receiving AFDC, the mother cannot have a live-in boyfriend and still receive her share. If a man is in the home. assuming the role of provider, it is a violation of the rules not to report it. We welcome calls that let us know when this is going on." said Sammic.

Another common fraud is to lie about the number of children in the house and "Sometimes a their ages. mother will report she has six young children, when two of them are over 18 and are working," she said.

Each case is reviewed every three months and fraud is usually found out sooner or later. "Our welfare rolls are decreasing now because we are really getting serious about prosecuting." said Sammie. "We also have a new child support unit that is going after unwed fathers and

Another type of relief available to low income families is food stamps. Adrienne Blanchard is in charge of the food stamp program for the eastern half of Lubbock County and she now has 685 active cases in the area.

Lots of Interviews

"I handle twice as many cases as a worker in Lubbock would, and it keeps me busy." said Adrienne. During the average week, Adrienne interviews approximately 50 people a week. During migrant season. from October to December, Adrienne sees 20 people a day and her case load doubles.

'We now have a new program where we transfer food stamp cases from county to county rather than beginning a new case on each family when they move. It makes it harder to get food stamps, and cuts down on fraud cases." said Adrienne.

Food stamp fraud is being practiced too, but it's only a matter of time before the violators are caught. "We have a series of checks and 'balances," said Adrienne, 'and any fraud in the program will be found. Our fraud unit is very active."

The most common fraud practice is to lie about income or the number of children in the family, thus obtaining more food stamps. "I don't give anybody any-

Austin - Comptroller Bob Bullock issued city sales tax rebates Friday worth \$19.9 million and announced a new plan to give cities their proportionate share of any partial collections from delinquents. Slaton received \$7,211.80 from the state.

In the past, money from delinquents was applied first to the state's claim and only after that was totally paid off did the city get its money.

"It was wrong for the cities to be playing second fiddle," Bullock said. "In more than 800 cities the five per cent sales tax is

four-and-one split, so that's exactly how we are going to rebate it.'

Bullock said he doesn't look for the new plan to bring significantly more money to cities but "it will get them their share a lot faster than when they had to bring up the rear."

The City of Austin is one example of an immediate beneficiary of the new plan, Bullock said.

An Austin tire company shut down by Bullock last week owed \$37,102 in state taxes and \$9,936 in Austin's city sales taxes. The busines was allowed to reopen after paying \$12,000 cash toward the deliquency and agreeing to pay \$2,000 monthly on the balance plus keeping future taxes current.

The City of Austin's \$2,400 share of that initial \$12,000 payment will be included in Austin's rebate

next month and its \$400 share of the \$2,000 monthly payment will be paid every month until the full city liability is paid off.

This month's \$19.9 million in rebates to the cities is significantly higher than the \$11.4 million rebated last month. August is the second month of the three

relatively small rebates followed by a large "clean up" in the third month.



Persons who provide essential community servicessuch as firemen and policemen-may also be considered for immunizations.

Persons falling into the risk categories may want to contact their physicians now about setting up their vaccination schedules. Influenza vaccine should be administered by mid-November.

A word of caution is put forth by the Bureau of Biologics, Food and Drug Administration, concerning the vaccine. Since influenza virus vaccine is prepared from viruses grown in embryonated eggs, it should not be administered to persons clearly hypersensior injected. Physicians are asked to thoroughly read the manufacturer's package insert before administering the vaccine.

Vaccine released by the FDA will contain the type A and type B influenza virus. Dr. Dickerson says there's virtually no way that a mobile person can keep from being exposed to influenza, and that the vaccine in most people produces an immunization level which affords some protection. "For maximum protection, the vaccine is recommended," he said.

What type of influenza season the state and country will have this year can't be predicted, said Dickerson. "A large number of people will be immunized, and there is a large amount of immunity carried over from one year to the next in the general population." he said.

With fall comes the cold season, and there is confusion in the minds of many as to whether they have a cold of influenza.

"We have to have laboratory confirmation of what we have before stating there is an upsurge in influenza,' he said. "In order to isolate viruses causing influenza, we need throat swabs plus blood serum specimens during the acute stage of the illness in the convalescent stage," he said. "And," he added, "the sooner we get in specimens the better off **Getting Married?** we are.

To aid in identifying and keeping track of influenza in Texas, a surveillance system has been established by the department of Health Resources. The existing Health Resources regional offices and some local Health Departments collect data from various points in their jurisdictions. This allows

the state headquarters to have an immediate picture of influenza upswings. Kits are made available for taking specimen for submission to the State Laboratories.

When an upswing in influenza appears, educational efforts can be made immediately to zero in on prevention. Among the things stressed are personal hygiene, avoiding unnecessary exposure and confining yourself to bed if you

Threat To Children the home. Even with the best economic resources and emotional conditions, family life can be hampered. Helping children and




