## Commissioner Sworn In Here

Hesikize Thomas, newly-elected Slaton City Commissioner for Ward IV, took his oath of office Tuesday during a brief, routine meeting of the commission.

Sworn in by Mayor John Landreth, Thomas fills the vacancy created by the death of Eugene Mask last November.

The commission voted on only two items, agreeing to extend the Rhoads water contract and to install a street light at the corner of East Lynn and North Second streets.

The Rhoads water contract was made in 1965 to provide emergency water to Slaton. At the time, a 10 year option to renew the contract was provided. The commission voted unanimously to extend the option.

Although no action was taken, the commission reviewed the quarterly budget report prepared by City Secretary Alex Webb.

Justice of the Peace Arvin Stafford of Slaton pronounced the two men dead at the scene, but said Tuesday he has made no ruling in the deaths pending results of an autopsy on Baldwin, the pilot.

Two Slaton men saw the plane going down, although they did not see the actual crash. David Williams and Jimmy Cordova said they were driving south on 400 when they saw the plane bank to the right, then the nose tipped down and it went out of sight.

Slaton police were notified and Department of Public Safety patrolman Ken Evans found the wreckage about 7:20 p.m. The bodies were still in the cockpit of the wreckage.

Services for both victims were conducted in Tulsa Saturday. Baldwin was survived by his wife, a son and daughter, brother and sister, and Edwards by his wife, two daughters, parents and a sister.

## Three Grand Champions Named

John T. Basinger, Clay Mitchell and Steve Myers won grand champion honors Saturday at the annual Slaton Junior Livestock Show sponsored by the agriculture committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Myers' grand champion steer was one of three entered. This year was the first time steers were shown. Myers did not sell his steer following the show.

Slaton Savings and Loan purchased Mitchell's grand champion barrow for \$230 above the floor price of 38.5 cents a pound, which was established by South Plains Swine Marketing Association.

### Top Lamb

Basinger's grand champion lamb sold for \$250 above the floor price. Slaton Co-Op Gin bought the prize winning animal.

Reserve grand champion awards went to Greg Johnson in the barrow class and to Joe Overturf in the lamb division. Hackberry Co-Op Gin bought Overturf's lamb for \$125 above the floor price. Johnson's barrow brought \$225 above floor price.

A total of 58 animals were bid on Saturday, with \$7535 premiums bid. Twenty-eight head of livestock were sold by auctioneers Coy Biggs and Jim Dulin.

**Conversion to metric system**  
Within the next ten years, American women may be bragging about their 96-56-96 measurements. Consumers may be buying fruit juice by the liter and carpeting by the meter.

the metric system of measuring used by most the rest of the world. Our current system of measuring has its drawbacks. For example, it's inconsistent. More than one unit of measurement is used for the same physical quantity. If you're buying a rug, you have to change square feet or inches to square yards. If you're shopping in a supermarket without unit pricing, you have to juggle ounces, quarts and pints.

A change to the metric system will mean an overhaul of our manufacturing system. Everything from road signs to clothing would be affected. Adapting to this new system may sound complicated, but you're already doing it. Home sewing patterns include metric measurements along with English ones. There is much metric information on the products you find in the supermarket. You haven't noticed it yet, because you haven't felt a need to use it.

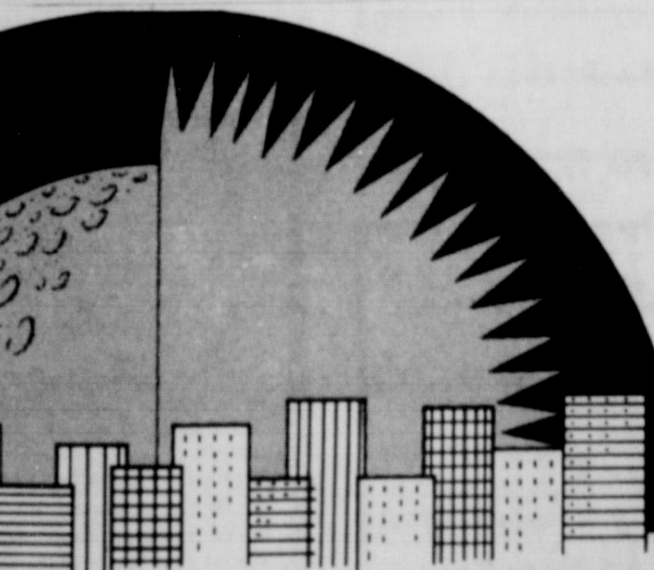

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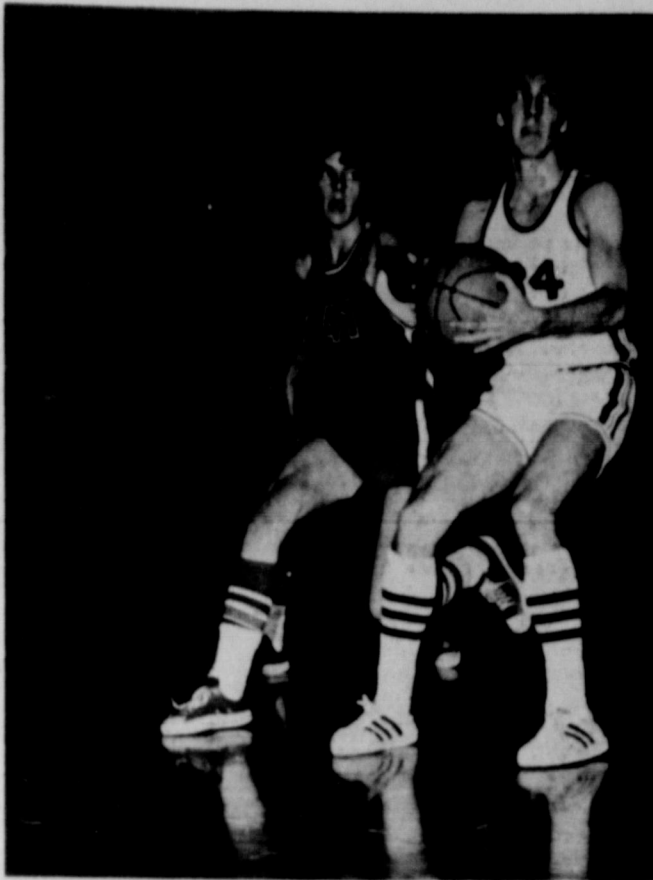

There will also be baked goods, pennants and the school directory on sale.

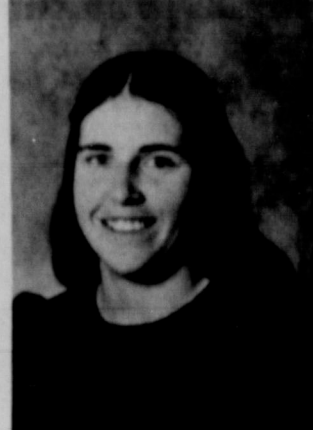

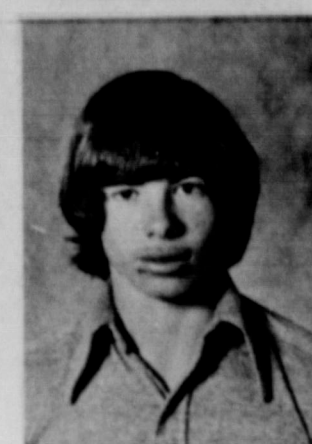

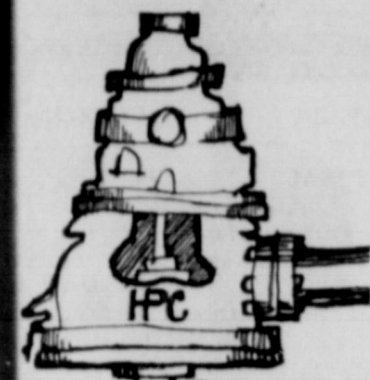

TEXAS TALK

KILLING MERIT — is the term used to describe the qualifications of cattle for slaughter. Generally, there are three points considered in determining the grade of a steer for slaughter. They are: conformation, finish and quality.

CONFORMATION — is the build or shape of the steer. In this determination, bone structure is secondary since the contours of an animal are controlled primarily by the size and shape of the muscles. A good conformation is important in grading beef since it usually means a higher dressing percentage, more of the higher priced cuts and a better meat-to-bone cutting percentage.

## MAGIC NEEDS PREPARATION

As the leading character appears for his last scene, the audience becomes caught up in the "magic" of the theatre. A character a person sometimes wishes to be, comes to life before his eyes. Minds entranced by this "magic" are unaware of the preparation that has gone into the production.

It all begins with tryouts for all the parts. Professional actors have agents who book them to perform at various places. Local theatres usually open tryouts to anyone. There are some theatres that use mostly drama majors. Cooper tryouts are only open to those students who are taking drama.

Time well spent is a big key to the success of a play. Trained actors and actresses receive a copy of the script several days before the actual cast rehearsals. There is a limited number of days to rehearse before the play is put on stage. Because of limited time, seven hours a day, six days a week straight is required. Nonprofessional actors who participate in plays at the Lubbock Theatre rehearse up to six weeks. Cooper drama students spend many long hours preparing for their yearly musical and one act play. Each year drama students must give up their Easter holidays to prepare for the one-act play. A camping trip is usually made to Palo Duro Canyon for a weekend where the students rehearse in the Amphitheater.

The costuming is taken care of in a number of ways. So theatres have their own costume designers and seamstresses. This designer helps the actor get the costume from his own wardrobe or the theatre's storage of costumes. Frequently, costumes must be designed and sewn. Other theatres rent their costumes from places that carry the costumes needed. Mrs. Pamela Brown, drama teacher, works with the drama students in preparing their costumes.

Mrs. Brown feels that many people would appreciate the work that goes into a production if they were made aware of the time and effort put into it. Not only does she teach her students the fundamentals of drama, she teaches them to appreciate the many intricate and complex workings of the finished product.
