Latest School Finance Bill Would Help Slaton Schools

Slaton school teachers would get salary increases ranging from \$1,400 up to \$3,760 per year if the school finance bill now being considered by the Texas Senate becomes law.

But the bill, already passed by the House, faces some more budget-trimming or a possible veto by Gov. Dolph Briscoe, so school officials here believe that if the measure passes, teachers could get something less than the basic \$1,400 in-

crease. The Slaton Independent School District would get a windfall from the current bill, too. If passed in its present form, the bill would give Slaton ISD \$80,706 more from state sources

than now is being received annually.

According to State Rep. R. B. McAlister, his compromise measure (HB 1126) would, as passed by the House, make the salary of a teacher with 10 years' experience and a masters degree \$13,430 in Slaton, assuming that the district continues to pay \$200 per year above the state minimum salary schedule. This is \$3,760 more than the \$9,670 a 10-year masters degree teacher now makes here.

Base Salary

Five-year teachers with a bachelor's degree would see their pay raised from \$8,770 to \$10,100 in Slaton. And beginning teachers' pay would go from \$6,800 to \$8,200.

Under the bill passed by the House, Slaton's local fund assignment — the amount the state says a district must raise locally to operate its schools — would increase from \$131,803 to \$143,124, a jump of more than \$11,000. But, according to Slaton Supt. J. C. McClesky, the local fund assignment here would increase even more under the old formula, up to \$146,000. School officials here, therefore, are hoping the state Senate will pass the bill, since it would help Slaton schools financially, and would obviate any massive increase in taxes on Slaton school patrons.

McClesky predicted, however, that while the bill may be passed eventually, it will be trimmed, because it would cost the state more money than the state now has in reserve. Since the governor has vowed he would not raise taxes at the state level for this purpose, the measure likely would be vetoed even if voted.

Possible Cuts

"It's going to have to fall within Gov. Briscoe's guidelines, and not exceed the money available in order to pass and in order to avoid a veto," McClesky said. "I feel that the legislature may consider further cuts in the teachers' base salary and possibly in compensatory aid."

If the compensatory aid feature of the bill were to be eliminated, Slaton ISD would still receive about \$47,500 more from the state than it currently does.

One thing the new bill would do that most students would like is to reduce the number of school days from 180 to 174 per year.

Gov. Briscoe's own pet bill, which would have been a financial disaster for Slaton Schools, according to local officials, apparently is dead. Had it passed, Slaton taxpayers would have faced local tax increases which the local officials predicted would have been double the amounts now paid.

Burglaries Are Cleared In Slaton

Police cleared seven recent home burglaries and thefts in Slaton this week with the arrest of a 15-year-old youth. The boy was turned over to juvenile authorities in Lubbock, and many of the items stolen locally were recovered, according to Police Chief Fred Clark.

Two burglaries within the last week were among those cleared. Dr. Don Hatchett reported car keys stolen from his auto and Paul Milton Steele, 880 Collins, reported theft of some meat valued at \$40, a watch and television set. The latter two items were recovered, but the meat was no longer around, police said.

Five motorcycle helmets were stolen from cycles parked at Slaton High School on May 12. They were taken from cycles owned by Lee Tomlinson, Danny Evans, Kevin Meeks and Russell Jones, who lost two helmets. Total value of the stolen headgear was set at \$200.

On Thursday at 20th and Crosby a 1970 auto driven by Trevor Lee Jones, 915 S. 17th, went out of control and struck two parked vehicles, a 1967 pickup owned by Clark Self Jr. and a 1968 car owned by Jesse Norvell of Brownwood. Total damage to all three vehicles was \$1750.

At U.S. 84 bypass Friday, a 1973 car driven by Kay Weddle of Colorado City went out of control and ran off the road, causing minor damage.

City Gets Sales Taxes

Comptroller Bob Bullock issued checks totaling \$19.9 million Thursday to Texas cities in the second round of monthly city sales tax payments. Slaton's net payment was \$9,256.45.

The May payments were up from the \$16.1 million rebated April 15 when the monthly system replaced the old quarterly rebate system with its 60 to 90-day lag time.

But, Bullock said, the big payment will come in June when city allocations are made of the quarterly returns paid by merchants since April 30. The great bulk of that money hadn't reached the Comptroller's office by the May 2 cutoff date for the May payments.

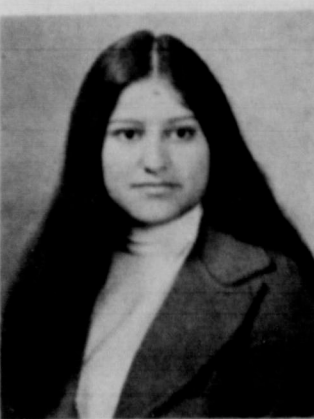

Food Stamp Program Income Being Checked

All income received by food stamp recipients must be verified if it is expected to be received during the certification period or is meant for use during the certification period. This includes total salary and wages, gifts or awards for maintenance and bonuses paid as income (such as the crop bonus commonly given by farmers).

Charges occasionally made that employers do not report total wages paid to employees, particularly the crop bonus. However, local welfare officials are some skeptical of these reports. Both the employe and employer commit criminal offenses when income is intentionally reported incorrectly to obtain benefits or increase benefits from the food stamp program. Local officials feel it is not likely an employer would conspire with his employees to defraud the government. Employers simply have nothing to gain when their criminal responsibility is taken into consideration. The employer commits a criminal offense when he intentionally signs a false income verification statement. The provisions are contained in The Penal Code of Texas, Section 32.32, subsection b.

First Aid For Cracked Concrete

When your concrete walk or driveway needs patching, here are some pointers:

Have materials handy before you start. Patch hairline cracks with ready-to-use concrete in a cartridge. After crack has been thoroughly cleaned, apply with standard caulking gun. Level off excess with thumb or putty knife. Sidewalk cracks larger

than hairline must be enlarged or "undercut" so that crack is wider at the bottom than at the top. Fill deep voids with oakum, rope or similar material to within 1/2-inch of surface.

Premixed concrete patch mixes easily with water and there's no need to bother with sand, cement and gravel. According to Red Devil Inc., leading manufacturer of patch and repair products, premixed concrete patch dries to the color of concrete and cures stronger than original sur-

face. Follow mixing instructions and smooth with pointing trowel. Enlarge driveway cracks deeper and wider than necessary for added strength. After patching, allow about five days before resuming traffic. Small holes often need no enlarging. Undercut larger holes and patch in 1/4-inch layers allowing each layer to partially dry.

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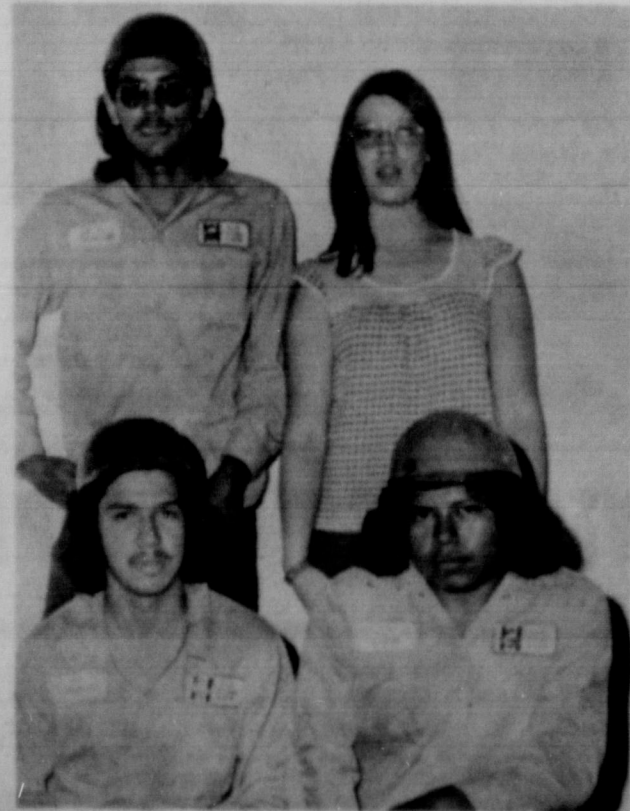

Cooper FFA Members Place In Area Meet



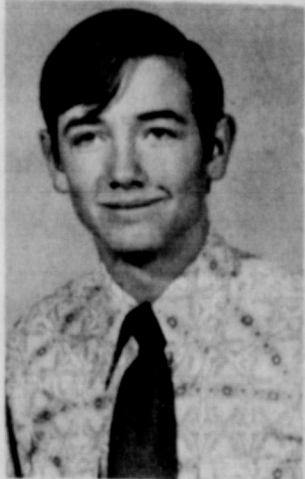

1977 Tractors Must Have Rollover Guards

Job safety rules announced by the U. S. Department of Labor will require rollover protective structures on new agricultural tractors manufactured after Oct. 25, 1976 and used by employees.

Rollover structures, which may be a frame or a frame and enclosure, are designed to protect farm workers from injury if a tractor overturns.

The rules will apply only to tractors used by employees — not to those used by farm employers or members of their immediate family.

"Low profile" tractors used in hop yards, vineyards, tree fruit farms, farm buildings and greenhouses, are generally excepted from the rollover protective struc-

ture provisions of the rules.

Assistant Secretary of Labor John H. Stender, head of the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), said OSHA had changed its original proposal for a Sept. 1, 1974 effective date to give manufacturers sufficient lead time to produce needed quantities of the new protective structures.

Stender said the National Safety Council reports that a 1969-1972 survey of 10 states with nearly one-third of the nation's farm workers showed that on-the-farm deaths due to overturns occurred at a rate of 8.6 per 100,000 tractors. Another survey, conducted by the Department of Transportation through 1969, shows rollover tractor accidents

cause some 540 fatalities annually.

Stender said the requirement for a rollover protective structure will apply to all agricultural tractors of more than 20 engine horsepower and the various type structures would have to meet specified structural strengths based on prescribed test procedures.

In addition to the rollover protective structures, seatbelts also are mandated in new tractors.

Rural Auto Toll Listed

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 27 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of April, according to Sergeant O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in

four persons killed and 34 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first four months of 1975 shows a total of 152 accidents resulting in eight persons killed and 103 persons injured.

PRAISE THE LORD

A few weeks ago I planted a garden. I could hardly wait for the plants to begin coming up. Every day I'd go out and look to see if anything was up. Then after it rained, the plants just came popping out of the ground over night! Everything began growing so fast you could almost see it moving.

You know, as I was planting the seed, I thought how foolish it would be to not expect it to come up and grow and produce — some 30-fold, some a hundred-fold. Of course it's going to grow if you give it the proper care — that's just God's natural laws.

The same laws are true with giving and receiving. The Bible says "give" before it says "receive" — and it's for a reason: that we might receive! Some feel they cannot give God much of their time, because their schedules are so loaded already. But God cannot multiply it back to you if there is nothing there to multiply. Some feel they cannot give any money to the Lord because they do not even have enough to pay their bills as it is. But God cannot multiply it back to us because there's nothing being given to multiply.

"Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you!" Matt. 6:33. "If you give, you will get! Your gift will return to you in full and

overflowing measure, pressed down, shaken together to make room for more, and running over. Whatever measure you use to give — large or small — will be used to measure what is given back to you." Luke 6:38.

If you give nothing to God, just remember that nothing times nothing is still nothing.

The things we give to God, He can and does multiply back to us, the same way He does the seed that we plant in the ground. If we don't plant any seed in the ground we don't expect anything to come up. If we do plant, we do expect it to come up and multiply. If we don't first give something to God, not even He can multiply it back to us.

As Oral Roberts explains this in the book "Miracle of Seed Faith," he says: "Remember, only what you give can God multiply back. If you give nothing, and even if God were to multiply it, it would still be nothing!"

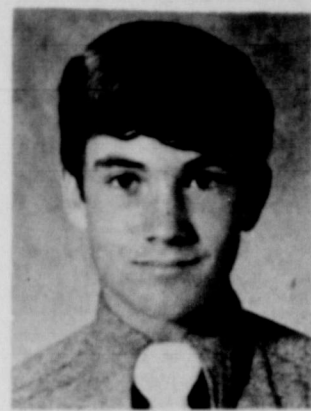

Thank you for your coverage of school board meeting May 13th.

I called Mrs. Brasher the following day, to again try to find out more about the people who presented the programs at West Ward school. She told me there is "no organization but 'we' provide the material and anyone from any church may use it and present it in any way they wish!"

When asked if these programs were taken into the Lubbock schools, she stated, "Everyone is so busy around Christmas and Easter time we no longer give the programs in the Lubbock Schools."

A call to Dr. Leslie of the Lubbock school system brought this response, "The programs formerly were presented in Lubbock schools but were stopped several years ago because of the legal implications."

On the Slatonite church page, I counted 23 churches in Slaton. It would seem that 23 churches — and the homes — could adequately provide religious training for Slaton children.

Surely these churches would allow the Christmas story to be told in their buildings (or would they — if it were not the same denomination?). If the people presenting the programs sought only to reach their own — and the children whose parents wanted them to hear the Christmas story — the churches would be the logical place for such presentations! So, I can only believe they are trying to reach our child — and others — who are required by law to attend school — but not church!

The board of education is charged with the important job of policy making for all children in public school — not just Christians.

Other parents, regardless of their beliefs, might feel concern if they knew — their children are being taught by persons whose beliefs are unknown. No other adults — no school personnel are present — and only very young children to report what is said to them.

The schools are my concern — and I hope — the concern of every parent and taxpayer.

I would remind the minister who was present at the meeting and who stated to me that "You are trying to

dictate to everyone," that I have never even made a small suggestion to any of the 23 churches in Slaton about how they conduct themselves or their services.

"I would ask the board member who stated 'The fact remains 'your daughter is just a girl' — if his chauvinistic attitude will color his policy making and deny the girls the equal educational opportunities the boys will receive in Slaton school?"

Mr. Wood, your reporting of meeting was excellent. One very small correction: I did not 'specifically' object to the reference of virgin birth and ascension of Jesus. At any rate, I did not mean to object to a part of the program, but to the entire program. I did mention the people giving the program held these views, which of course, not everyone does.

PARTY PERFECT DESSERT

A special occasion calls for a special dessert. Party Pastel Baked Alaska is a new version of the dessert favorite. The day before the party, make the lemon-scented cake using DROMEDARY Pound Cake Mix. Fill with a trio of sherbets in pastel hues and frost with meringue. Pop into the freezer. - 1 cup orange sherbet
- 1 cup lime sherbet
- 1 cup granulated sugar

Grease an 8-inch springform pan; then line bottom with wax paper. Prepare DROMEDARY Pound Cake Mix according to package directions, using 1 cup milk and 4 egg yolks in place of eggs and adding lemon rind and baking powder with egg yolks. Pour into prepared pan. Bake in a preheated moderate oven (350°F.) about 55 minutes, or until done. Cool in pan 10 minutes; then invert on rack; peel off wax paper; cool completely. Cut horizontally into 4 layers. Spread one layer with raspberry sherbet, one with orange sherbet and one with lime sherbet, place in freezer to firm up; then stack. Top with fourth layer. Keep in freezer while preparing meringue. Beat egg whites until soft peaks form; gradually add sugar, while beating until stiff and glossy. Spread over top and sides of cake. Freeze until ready to serve. Before serving, bake in a preheated hot oven (450°F.) about 3 minutes, or until lightly browned. Serve immediately. Makes 12 (about 2 1/2-inch) wedges.

BICENTENNIAL BITS

Heritage Committee members who have been calling on Slatonites in their homes about the souvenir calendar, pioneer recipes, and personal histories have been shown and told so many interesting things about our town.

We saw a 1920 photograph, about a foot wide and three feet long, of the entire Slaton school — buildings, students and teachers. We've looked through a Slaton High School annual dated 33 years ago. Mrs. Merrill, who was Slaton's librarian for about 35 years, showed a Slatonite clipping from July, 1945, about Mrs. Merrill's mother who was then nearly 90 years old. I remember once we went to see Frankenstein, and after the show was over the man who was running the film told everybody to hold their seats, they had a surprise for us, and sure enough they did! A man dressed up as Frankenstein came walking out of there. You talk about people fainting, running, screaming, and whatever — me and my brothers and sisters were the first to the door!"

Mandi is the 1975 WHS salutatorian and she is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bobby Lee.

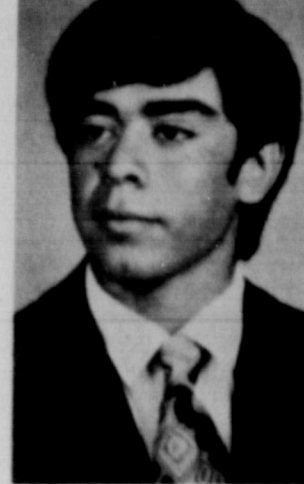
Active in all phases of WHS, Mandi played both basketball and tennis. She was voted honorable mention all-district guard and she won the Fighting Heart award in basketball.

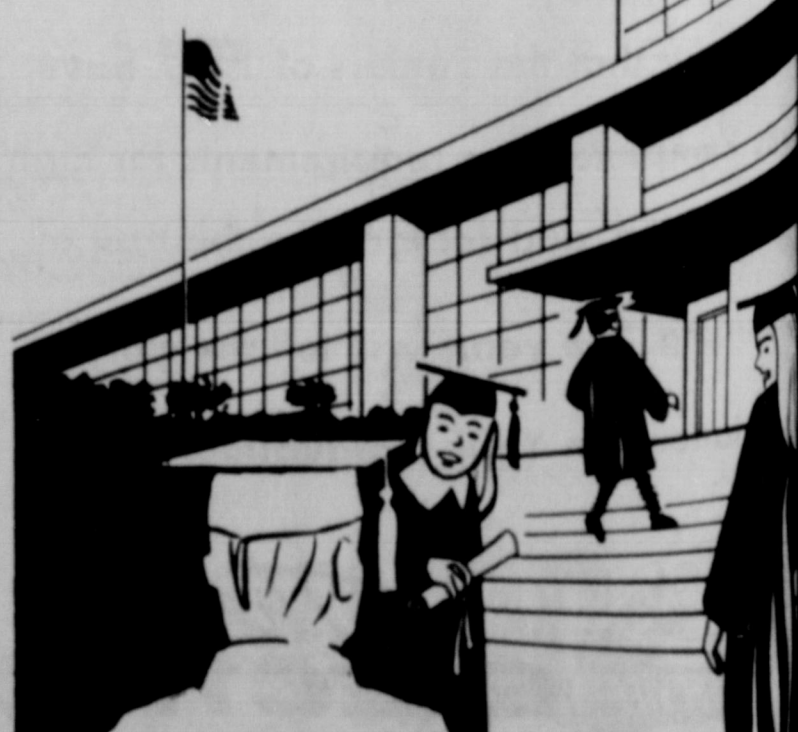


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Twelve Seniors To Graduate From Southland High School

Her plans for the future are to work.



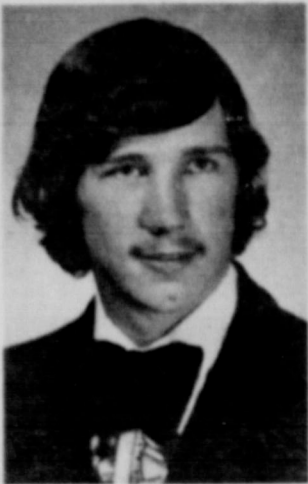
DEBBIE CRADDOCK
