HARRY T. MCGEE WELL GUSHES OVER THE TOP

Flow is Estimated From 200 to 1,000 Barrels Following Short Test.

Amarillo, May 3.—Oil shot over the derrick in a solid 8-inch stream when the Smith-Capers well was uncapped Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, and the production is estimated at from 200 to 1,000 barrels, according to well-side information. The well was immediately shut off on account of lack of facilities to care for the oil.

The Smith-Capers well went into pay sand last Saturday a week ago and oil gushed in three successive streams, shooting over the derrick before the control head could be capped. Hundreds of people were present when the well was uncapped.

There is no longer any doubt in the minds of oil men that the Smith-Capers will prove a big producer.

The amount of the flow is convincing evidence that the drill needs to be sent down only a few feet more to bring in one of the biggest oil wells in the country.

Lease prices are certain to go much higher as a result of the showing made Tuesday, oil men say. It is said that there is no close-up acreage on the market. Most of the listings in that territory were withdrawn last week when the first showing was made.

The owners of the property are Harry T. McGee, S. D. McIlroy, W. H. Holmes, J. J. Currie and a number of others operating under the firm name of Harry T. McGee and Company.

The gas in the well is 100 feet above the oil and the oil apparently rises as fast as the hole can be emptied thru the small opening.

Efforts will be made to complete this well by drilling deeper. This work will probably be done by the last of the week, it is reported. Casing is on the ground, and efforts to get the gas pressure from over the oil will be made. The work is considered dangerous and is being done with caution.

Automobiles and airplanes have been arriving on the field all during the day, and hundreds of people are on hand, including representatives of the larger oil companies.

TAHOKA FIRM WANTS TO DEFINE TRADE TERRITORY

F. E. Callaway, local manager of Rockwell Bros. & Co., lumber dealers, is in receipt of a letter from a competitor at Tahoka, that will make interesting reading. It follows:

"Tahoka, May 3.—Rockwell Bros., Slaton, Texas. Gentlemen: It has just come to our notice that you have figured a bill for the Lynn School District Nazarene Church. Your figures were about \$150.00 cheaper than ours.

We can't understand why you are doing this. It is not in your trade territory. Neither is it in your Wilson yard territory. This business should come to Tahoka. I am sure that should we undercharge \$150 on a bill that is in your territory you would be surprised at our action in doing so. It would not create any more business for either of us. It would only cause you to have to sell material cheaper. You certainly wouldn't let me get away with that kind of business. It might be that you have left out an item or two in figuring this bill, or else made a mistake. We would be glad to hear from you.

In commenting upon the above letter Mr. Callaway stated that he figured the bill at his company's regular selling price, without any intention whatever of cutting under any other competitor, and that the business came him through the regular channels in response to advertising, and without any other solicitation.

FOSTER'S WEATHER BULLETIN.

(Copyrighted)
 Washington, May 10.—Northwest Division: All north of latitude 35 between meridian 90 and Rockies' crest. Week centering on May 1 lower than usual temperature but rather mild, unimportant weather features; fair cropweather; good time for outdoor work. I repeat to all interested in products of agriculture, this is your opportunity, better than you have had for a long time. Make good use of it and you will be happy when autumn comes with its well filled cornucopia horns. For the period mentioned, less than usual rain, no severe storms. I am not saying that all sections will produce well; some bad failures are sure in America and Canada.

Southwest Division: Louisiana, Mississippi and south of 36 between 90 and Rockies' crest. Temperatures will average a little higher than usual during the week centering on May 16. Dull, quiet, mild weather, but fair and promising cropweather. Sufficient moisture except a few small localities. No bad storms; some encouraging prospects as in first paragraph.

Northeast Division: All north of 36 and east of 90. Great fall in temperatures from May 11 to 20. Week centering on May 18 lower than usual temperatures; about normal moisture; ern sections during week centering on May 17. Moisture will come from southward, from Gulf of Mexico, for all divisions east of Rockies' crest. If long, high ridges are between you and the Gulf of Mexico, you will get less moisture than predicted. If you are between long, high ridges and the Gulf of Mexico, you will get more moisture than predicted.

Pacific Slope Division: All north of 36 and west of Rockies' crest. Old Luna is your best friend for May and you can imagine her friendly smile while you keep watch over the mild Pacific for any who might crave to reap where they have not sown. That great magnet, 2,000 miles in diameter, surely masters our rain carrying clouds. At least two-thirds of the Pacific slope will pass thru May with good prospects for the crops. Your temperatures, moisture, storms, will fluctuate similar to predictions in first paragraph, except two days earlier.

Look southward, between sunset and midnight, at the largest magnet in the solar system except the sun. That is Jupiter, 1,400 times larger than the little earth on which we are struggling to magnify ourselves into something worth while. That great planet has greater influence on animal, man, vegetable and weather than all other planets.

A new weather prophet, W. O. Altman, of Westline, Penn., is gaining some note thru the press. He holds that March 20 controls to April 20, March 21 from April 21 to May 21, March 22 from May 22 to June 19, June 20, 21, 22 control in similar routine for three months; then Dec. 20, 21, 22, up to March 19. There may be something in this theory and if so the cause will be found in the new moons falling closest to and prior to the controlling dates. Some day the "Smart Alecs" of Meteorology will realize that our moon does affect our weather. Sages of weatherology, beginning with the sailors, hunters, farmers, have long known this to be true.

MAKES FLAPPERS WASH FACES.

Chicago Juvenile Cop Starts War on Use of Rouge by "Kids."
Chicago, May 10.—Chicago has become the center of a police war on flappers.
Four girls were arrested in one afternoon this week by a juvenile officer and compelled to wash the rouge from their faces.
"I have been waiting for such a chance for three weeks," said the officer. "For days I have been watching these painted girls pass me on the street, hoping to be able to grab a pair some day and take them in and wash their faces and put some clothes on them. I got my chance when they smiled at a man."
One of the girls said she checked her flapper clothes at a loop store before going home so her parents would not see them.

PRAIRIE DOG POISON.

Wheat, oats or maize may be used in preparing the poison and should be put out at the rate of about 2 pounds per acre. The grain should be put on hard ground near the mouth of the hole. If ordinary care is used there is no danger of poisoning domestic animals. However, extreme care must be used to keep chickens from eating the grain. It might be better to trap the dogs around the farm home.
Mix thoroughly 1 oz. of powdered strychnin (alkaloid) and 1 oz. of common baking soda (bicarbonate). Dissolve 1 heaping teaspoonful of laundry starch in a little cold water and add to it three-fourths pint of boiling water. Boil and stir until a thin, clear paste is formed. Slowly sift the mixture of strychnin and soda into the starch paste, stirring constantly to form a smooth, creamy mass. Add one-fourth pint of heavy corn syrup and tablespoonful of glycerin and stir. Add one-tenth oz. of saccharin and again stir thoroughly. Pour this mixture while hot over 13 quarts of clean grain and mix until all the grain is coated well.
If alkaloid strychnin is not available the sulphate form may be used, either powdered or in crystals. Dissolve the strychnin in boiling water before adding the cold starch. After the poisoned starch paste is clear, stir in the soda very slowly. Then add the syrup, glycerin and saccharin as in the above directions and mix with the grain.
For mixing small quantities an ordinary metal wash tub may be used. After the grain is thus prepared it may be sacked up and kept for future use.

THE KU KLUX KLAN.

From newspaper reports it is learned that the Ku Klux Klan is organized at Plainview, Canyon and Amarillo. It appears that the Klan has not yet invaded this section of the Plains country, as nothing has ever been done or said to indicate that such an organization existed in Lubbock, Slaton, Brownfield, Tahoka, Lamesa or Post City. No mob violence has ever been proven against the Klan organization at either Amarillo, Canyon or Plainview, but 'tis said that they have had good effect upon the morals of each of those towns. As we understand it, the Ku Klux Klan does not believe in nor practice mob violence.

UNFAIR TO THE TAXPAYERS.

The heads of the various departments at Austin have decided that during the summer months that the offices of the State Department will be closed at noon each day and not reopen till the next morning, giving the employes half the time off. We do not see any justice in this to the taxpayers of the State. We are paying those folks for their service and they should render the service. If the pay is not sufficient, then make it sufficient, and demand them to stay on the job the same as other folks. If the work can be done in half a day by the force that is on, fire fifty per cent of the bunch and send them back to the walks of life in commercial circles or on the farm, where they can be producers. We are of the opinion that there are twice as many on the payroll down there anyway as is necessary to carry on the work. The Avalanche does not see any need in keeping a bunch of folks on the payroll to do the work of the State, when they are not needed.—Lubbock Avalanche.

This same principle applies to the counties as well as the State. New offices are created when they should be consolidated, but laws have been passed giving power to do so, and the taxpayers foot the bill—those that pay their taxes. There are today many people in Lubbock county, as well as other counties of the State, who have paid no taxes for several years. Yet the law says that if the tax collector and county attorney fail or refuse to file suits and collect these delinquent taxes they can be impeached. Did you ever hear of an officer being impeached in Lubbock county? Hereafter, it will be our purpose to urge the non-payment of any tax unless the State, the county, cities and school districts make them all pay alike.

A fellow has to be pretty blind that he cannot see that law and order will and must prevail. Law and order are on top of the crime wave, and are doing all in their power to check the wave. If you want to help law and order, join hands with the officers of the law, report the cases of law infringement that you see. The organization of unlawful bands and mobs is not the way to uphold law and order. Law does not need more agencies than it now has to be strictly enforced, but it does need the hearty co-operation

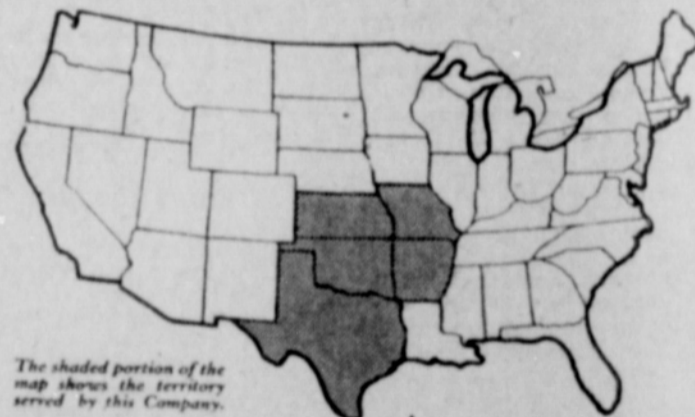
