Barrels Following Short Test.

Amarillo, May 3.-Oil shot over the derrick in a solid 8-inch stream when the Smith-Capers well was uncapped Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, and the production is estimated at from 200 to 1,000 barrels, according to wellside information. The well was im-mediately shut off on account of lack of facilities to care for the oil.

The Smith-Capers well went into pay sand last Saturday a week ago and oil gushed in three successive streams, shooting over the derrick be-fore the control head could be capped. Hundreds of people were present when the well was uncapped.







Pour this mix-ture while hot over 13 quarts of clean grain and mix until all the grain is coated well
