Annual County Fat Stock Show Here Saturday At Tiger Stadium

Two Slaton High School Co-eds, Sue Corley and Martha Allred, will be on hand at the 15th Annual Lubbock County Stock Show to present winners with their ribbons. Distributor of the award money at the show will be J. M. Gilbert high school principal.

The winners in the show March 3 at Tiger Football Stadium will share \$448 in prize money. Also offered will be eight additional special awards.

Judging in the show begins at 10 a. m., at which time all entries must be in their places.

The show is being sponsored by the businessmen of Slaton, the bus-

nessmen of Lubbock County and Wilson's School District, the Slaton Chamber of Commerce, and the Slaton Chapter of the Future Farmers of America.

Entry is open to any active 4-H members of Lubbock County and the Wilson School District, provided the member shall have cared for and fed his animal under the supervision of his county agent or vocational agricultural teacher from January 1 to the date of the show.

Cash premiums will be awarded to the first six places in each of the classes, beginning with \$6 for a first place and decreasing to \$1

for a fifth place.

T. L. Duffy, vocational agricultural teacher at Plainview High School, will act as the show's judge.

The Slaton Chamber of Commerce FFA and 4-H Club Show committee consists of Truett Babb, chairman; Robert Hall Davis, Earl Reasoner, and Joe Walker Jr.

Co-general superintendents of the show are James Shearer and Truett Babb. Assistant superintendent and narrator for the show is Alton Brazell. Other officers for the one day event are Phil Brewer, secretary; J. R. Bridges, superintendent of calves; A. J. Kitten, superintendent of sheep; Carlton Hatchett, superintendent of fat swine; and Don Patterson, superintendent of gilts.

Other agricultural teachers and county agent's staff members who will assist in the show include D. W. Sherrill, Lubbock County Agent; Lee Suther, and Cecil Lewis, assistant Lubbock County Agents; Charlie Hutchins, Cooper High School agricultural teacher; and Lee Christie, agricultural teacher from Idalou.

Other teachers who will assist with the show are Thomas Neely, Lubbock; Cecil Dykes, Shallowater; John Johnson, Wolforth; and J. T. Crumbley, Roosevelt.

A Saving Bond will go to each of the following: Grand Champion Beef Animal, donated by Lubbock Lions Club; Grand Champion Fat Hog, Lubbock Kiwanis Club; Grand Champion Female Swine, Lubbock American Business Club; and Best Group of Three Lambs, Lubbock Rotary Club.

Other Savings Bonds will go to the Best Group of Three Fat Hogs, courtesy Lubbock Optimist Club; Best Showmanship in FFA, Slaton Rotary Club; and Best Showmanship in 4-H Club, Slaton FFA Chapter.

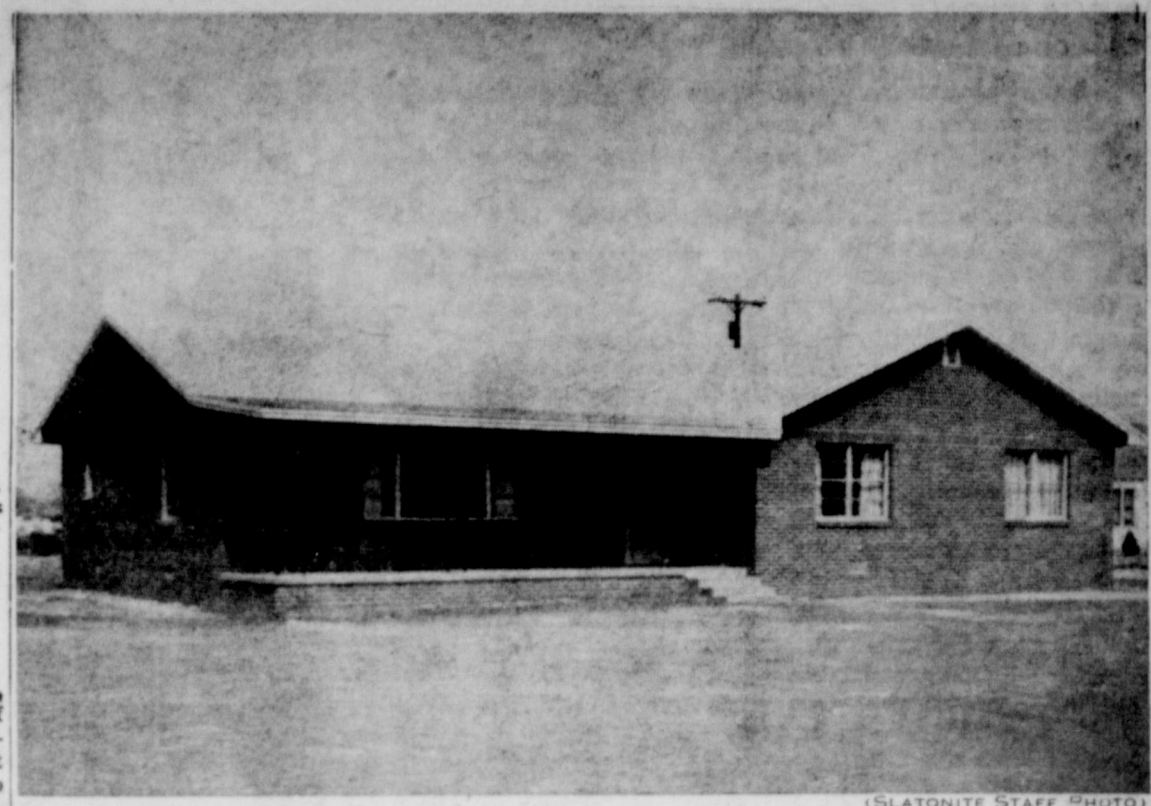
Emmett Waldrop

Petition Requests Increase in Local Mail Delivery

Between 120 and 125 residents had signed a petition to the Postal Inspector of the Lubbock Postal Department early this week requesting an increase in mail delivery to houses not covered in the city at this time.

"We are hoping to get a new carrier route created in Slaton," Charles E. Dickson of 901 S. 14th St. stated. He is circulating the petition throughout the section of the city which is now without mail delivery and would be benefited by the move.

The petition bears the names of the Mayor and the City Commissioners along with approximately 100 residents.

Dedication services will be conducted for the recently constructed parsonage of Grace Lutheran Church, as a part of the Morning Worship on Sunday, March 4 at 10:40 a. m.

The Rev. H. F. Treptow, pastor of the church, will officiate at the special services. An Open House will be held from 1 to 5:30 p. m. for the residents of the community. The public is cordially invited to attend the Open House, according to Rev. Treptow.

The structure measures 54 by 33 feet plus one large front porch and two smaller porches to the side and rear of the house.

It is a brick veneer, semi-modern Gothic home in keeping with the architecture of the church building as well as with other planned buildings for the parish in the future.

Other features of the parsonage include three bedrooms, two baths, a large living room, kitchen and dinette area, utility room and

hallway; wall to wall carpeting, throughout the house; central heating and air-conditioning; and aluminum-sash windows which make the home practically dustproof.

Porter Lumber Company of Slaton furnished most of the building materials, with Fred Walters and crew serving as carpenters.

Much labor was volunteered by members of the congregation. "The floor plan and many features of the parsonage make it very functional for its intended use as well as comfortable," the pastor said.

119 Slaton Residents Found Living Without Proper Food, Income, Heat, Decent Clothing

There are approximately 119 cold, poorly clothed, under-nourished people living within our community. These 24 families are not enjoying life in our city—they are merely existing here from day to day.

Many of them are without any means of income, many are just plain hungry—some are diseased. Every family's needs have been investigated by Stinson Behlen of Slaton.

Recently The Slatonite stated in its columns that the problem did exist—with practically no response from the citizens.

Problem Is Worse
If anything, the problem is worse now than it was then. People who are diseased and weak from hunger cannot work and large families with no father to support them can not live on strength alone.

Three of the families were picked at random from the list which has been compiled by a group of local men.

Take the Lupe Biduare family of 1245 S. 4th St. for example. The father of the five children left them 11 months ago. Since that time the mother has been unable to work because she had no one to care for her children. The children range in ages from three months to 10 years. The children need shoes, underwear, and clothing of any kind.

No Income
They have no income at all. They need quilts and a bed for the baby. The house has no facilities for heating.

Nothing fancy is needed in the way of food, they just want the simple foods such as beans, flour, meat, lard, rice, and potatoes.

Mrs. Manuel Martinez and her nine children are the second family on the list. This family has no food and one or two of its members are sick. The children need shoes—especially two girls who would like to attend school.

The family of Marciana Alvarado has four children in it. The mother and her children need food and especially milk for her two-month-old baby.

No Bedding
This family has no bedding other than a mattress and one quilt for the one bed the family has.

These three are only a few of the families who need our help. Stinson Behlen and a group of other local individuals have gotten together and plan to work toward easing the burden which now rests on these people.

These people plan to spend the next two Saturdays driving around the town picking up your donations. If you have a donation of food, clothing, bed clothing, or money you can contact one of the above people or take it to the Mexican Mission at the corner of

7th St. and Jean St.
The Mission will be open all day both Saturdays to accept the donations.

Needs Listed
Behlen has estimated the needs of the 119 needy persons to be as follows: about 16 cases of canned milk, about 16 cases of powdered milk, pinto beans, dried or salted meat, about 18 sacks of flour, kerosene, old clothes, shoes, underwear, quilts, blankets, old mattresses, springs, sheets, lard, potatoes, salt, rice, baking powder, and corn meal.

Behlen and his group have the names and addresses of all of the 119 persons who need help and will be glad to see that the donations are distributed.

March 3 to 10 has been proclaimed Public Schools Week in Texas by Governor Allan Shivers. During that period parents in Slaton will have an opportunity to see, at first hand, what goes on in the local school system.

Winding Up Plans
Each school in the system is this week winding up plans to participate in the activities of the week. The public is cordially invited by Superintendent of School P. L. Vardy Jr. to visit the schools during the special week, and also to continue visitation throughout the year.

"We hope that people will visit their schools not only this week, but we are anxious that they visit throughout the year," he said.

The principal days of visitation at High School will be Tuesday and Wednesday. On Wednesday at 11:30 a. m. a special assembly program will be presented in the High School Auditorium portraying the growth of education in the schools in Texas.

Guides Tours
Guided tours through the new building will also be conducted by members of the Student Council for those residents and visitors who have not previously seen it.

At the Junior High School an assembly will be presented on March 8 at 11:30 a. m. The assembly will be centered around the theme of education and is a cooperative program worked out by students in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades.

The sixth graders will present folk games at the assembly. Seventh graders have written a play which they will present during the assembly. The eighth grade students will give their impression of an old fashioned school as it appeared in the early days of Texas education.

Visitors will be directed through the Junior High Building by some of the young ladies who are enrolled in Junior High. Visitation has been set for March 7 and 8

at Junior High.
At the West Ward School visitation days are March 6 and 7. There will be a committee of youngsters on hand to guide and direct visitors through the building during the two-day visitation.

Commission Offers Facts On Water Contract Election

(Ed's Note: The following release came from the Slaton City commission in order to let the people of Slaton see for themselves what the up-coming Water Contract election entails. In this way the commission is telling the people just what they will be voting for.)

At the commission meeting Monday night the commission discussed, at length, the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority contract election to be held March 13, 1956. The commission feels that the public should be as well informed concerning this water problem as possible.

Since the Canadian River Dam was first conceived in 1948 each Slaton Commission has voted unanimous approval of Slaton's participation in the Authority.

At a previous meeting the commission had asked their engineers to survey the water needs of Slaton and to evaluate our participation in the Canadian project. This survey has been made and they find that participation in the project will necessitate an increase in revenue of approximately 40% from the water and sewer system. This could be done in one of two ways—by putting a small increase on water prices and approximately 75c per month on each sewer user or to put all of the increase on water users. The commission feels that if the contract is voted that the revenues can be adjusted some time in the next two or three years. Whether the Dam is built or not, if underground water production costs continue to increase then

rates to the consumer must keep pace.

Other cities in the Authority have projected their water cost from ground supplies and find that they will equal the cost from Canadian River in approximately ten years. From that time on the Canadian River Water will be cheaper than water from ground supplies.

It was pointed out that after the first six years of operation, Canadian River water would become cheaper each year due to retirement of the bonded indebtedness and after thirty-five years when all bonds have been paid, water would be sold to member cities at rates to meet only maintenance and operating expenses of the Authority. If contract confirmation is voted by the member cities a dam and distribution facilities will be built to assure each city an adequate water supply for at least fifty years.

Slaton's present water supply is thought to be adequate for the next four or five years. After that time it is strictly a guess as to availability of supply and cost. Our cost has steadily increased for the past ten years and is anticipated to increase even faster from now on due to irrigation.

The commission is unanimously in favor of the Canadian River Water Authority contract, however; we know that decisions such as these must be made by the public. It is our desire to keep our citizens as well informed about city business as is possible because we know that an enlightened public makes for a progressive city.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS WEEK
SOURCE OF WONDER TO OUTSIDERS

Whenever a Texan has an opportunity to discuss the magnitude of Texas Public Schools Week, the wonderment of school people from other states is modified only by their suspicion that perhaps here is just another of the "tall-talk" Texans. Only a person who has witnessed the extent of public interest in the schools of his state can believe it possible, in a state having a population of 8,000,000, to induce more than 2,000,000 people to visit their nearest public school during a single week.

Although the figures evidencing the extent of past visitations during Texas Public Schools Week certainly are impressive, citizens have an opportunity in 1956 to make them still more impressive. The success of this educational event is indicated by both the head count of visitors in the schools and the fine intangible relationships that are formed when citizens meet with school administrators and teachers. When citizens of a community begin to share their ideas about the educational program available to the children of their community, better schools often are the result.

The effective manner in which the Texas Citizens' Committee for Public Schools Week has assisted with local organization and publicity for the week of observance is highly commendable. While a school district is under no coercion whatsoever to participate, I know of no district in Texas which has not wanted to participate when the meaning and purpose of Texas Public Schools Week have been fully explained. —J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education.

DO-IT-YOURSELF SAFETY

A speaker before the American Public Health Association said recently that the do-it-yourself movement is helping to make the home more dangerous than traffic. "There is no control over the health and safety of the home hobbyist", he said.

In industry enlightened management and labor unions are constantly seeking ways to make machinery safer. Unfortunately people who have small machine tools for home use do not always take adequate precautions. As a result accidents occur, often crippling or even fatal.

The do-it-yourself idea is good. It can help people live better, provide them with an outlet for creative energies, save them money. But common sense dictates that safety measures be taken. Why let what should be relaxation and pleasure result in misfortune and tragedy? Do it yourself—but do it safely.

THE WHOPPER WOODS

If Johnny tells whoppers, don't whip Johnny. With proper guidance mellowed by tolerant understanding, he'll come through the whopper-telling stage without getting into the habit.

The Psychiatric Bulletin, published by the Illinois department of health, says that telling fibs is normal and not to be deplored if it doesn't get out of hand. And how can it be kept from getting out of hand?

Not by being over-strict: not by severe punishment. Wise parents understand that a child's imagination is a wondrous country where fact cannot always be told from fancy. They know that patient explanation about the importance of truth-telling will do more than rigid insistence on an adult code that children find hard to grasp.

It is better, in short, to lead Johnny out of the whopper woods than it is to drive him out.

TO NIAGARA IN A HURRY

Niagara Falls is doomed. In only 1,000 years the river will have cut back a few hundred yards to a layer of soft rock. When the brink of the falls reaches this layer, it will slice through and form a steep rapids.

Perhaps before that time a way will have been found to reinforce the river bed so that this catastrophe will be averted. Meanwhile tourists who have not seen the falls had better hurry to beat that thousand year deadline.

Highway Plans Discussed by Slaton Men

Two Slaton men, Francis E. Perry and Bruce Pember, met with the district highway engineer Thursday at Lubbock for the purpose of discussing the highway which is to be built to Lubbock from Slaton.

The men met in the office of the engineer, S. C. McCarty.

The engineer told the men that the right-of-way deeds for a part of the construction will be ready within a month.

All deeds are already in the hands of the county commissioners court for the part of the highway which will connect the Lubbock circle with U. S. Highway 84.

Survey parties are now working on surveying the right-of-way to Slaton.

The problem of getting through town is still not settled; as far as is now known the plans call for the highway to stop near the edge of town.

Perry said that there is still some thought that the construction will stop a mile to a mile and a half from the city limits of Slaton, though it is possible that the state highway department may come on to the city limits with the four lane road.

The Lubbock County Commissioner's Court has the necessary funds for payment of the right-of-way land when the deeds to the land are furnished from the district highway office.

Perry is president of the Slaton Chamber of Commerce and Pember is chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Highway Committee.

Commissioners had on a previous occasion voted to place a right-hand-turn-only sign on the street which runs through the parking area in front of the shopping area on the west side of the square.

The commissioners directed that the sign be placed at the end of the street so that traffic will be directed west on Lubbock Street.

The commissioners voted approval of a proposal to charge \$2.50 per load for hauling brush and trees from the yards of local residents. This will help defray the expenses incurred in the use of a city truck and labor costs to the city in doing the work. This action was brought about by excessive amounts of brush which takes several loads to carry it off.

The city will still continue to haul brush if no more than the amount which would normally be hauled by the trash truck is placed in the alley and is cut up so it can be easily loaded.

\$100 Scholarship For Slaton Senior

These letters of recommendation must be mailed directly to the committee. The student should also prepare a short talk on "Why I Want to Teach."

Applications should be turned in to Mrs. Alma Caldwell, chairman of the Slaton-Strickland scholarship fund committee, not later than March 15.

The money will be given at the beginning of the first and second semesters of school and it will not exceed \$50 per long term semester. The committee will also check on

the recipient at the end of each grading period to see if the student has maintained the proper grade point average of 1.5 or better in order to qualify for the next semester.

Vegetable Council To Investigate New Industry

Farmers, businessmen, and others interested in bringing organized production of fresh vegetables to the Plains met together at Plainview February 14 and brought into being the West Texas Vegetable Council, the first large-scale group of its type ever to appear in this part of the state.

Although the constitution and by-laws of the organization are now in the formative stage, it is no secret that the aim of the Council will be to bring about a survey of the possibilities of large-scale vegetable production in the region, and to supervise the establishment of such.

Ronald Davis, Lazbuddie (Parmer County) farmer, who first started the ball rolling on the effort, was elected temporary president of the organization.

Other officers, also on a temporary basis:

L. A. Marshall, Floydada, first vice president; Don Anthony, Dumas, second vice president; Jason O. Gordon, Plainview, secretary-treasurer.

The 35 members of the council present heard talks from several officials, including Dr. W. N. Williamson, assistant director of Extension Service, A & M College.

He stressed the need for a survey to determine the feasibility of such a move before production steps are taken.

The council also listened to Dr. John McNeeley, marketing specialist from the A & M Experiment Station. He gave an optimistic note to the meeting by pointing out the increased growth of the fresh vegetable markets in this country due to diet changes, increasing population, the decline of "back yard gardening," and other factors.

One of the major steps taken at the meeting was the issuance of a formal request to G. G. Gibson, director of the Extension Service, asking that assistance be given in making the preliminary survey, which the Council feels should be gotten underway as soon as possible.

Pledges of cooperation were obtained from Dr. George Elle, assistant dean of agriculture at Texas Tech, who said that all the facilities of that department would be available for the work; and a like expression of help from the agriculture department of West Texas College by Dr. R. M. Calihan, head of that department.

Work of the Council was divided into four categories, and committees named to proceed along those lines. Committees and their members:

Survey—Gene Quest, Lubbock; R. G. Jones, Anton; Arno Struve, Abernathy.

Finance—Don Anthony, Dumas; Hosea Foster, Canyon; B. R. Evans, Tulia.

Organization—Gene McLaughlin, Ralls; Arlon Miller, Floydada; Herman B. Thornton, Lockney.

Education and information—Nelson Welch, Friona; Arlin Hartzog, Bovina; E. O. Baker, Muleshoe; Don Williams, Farwell.

Until the organizational committee workers can draw up a constitution and by-laws, the Council will work informally on its goals. One phase of activity that will be speeded up in the near future is the contacting of town and areas generally within the irrigated High Plains that may be interested in such a movement, but which have not yet been worked with.

Farm Operators Face April 15 Tax Deadline

COLLEGE STATION—Self-employed farmers and ranchers can become eligible for insurance benefits under the social security law by mid 1956 if they have earned as much as \$400 from farming in both calendar years 1955 and 1956. A. B. Wooten, extension economist, reminds Texas farm operators.

Along with this goes the responsibility to report earnings from farming and pay the 3 per cent social security tax not later than April 15, 1956. The Social Security Administration has suggested that payments be made as early as possible after January 1.

The form for making a report and remitting the required tax for social security insurance (Schedule SE) comes with the Federal Income Tax Return, Form 1040. If your net earnings from farming were as much as \$400 in 1955, you

are obliged to fill out and file this return and pay the social security tax, according to Wooten, even if you do not owe any Federal income tax for 1955.

Older farmers—those 65 or over—can retire after mid 1956 and start getting monthly old-age insurance payments if they have met the earnings requirements and paid their tax. Other farmers, regardless of age, will acquire family protection in the form of monthly payments to surviving dependents in the event of their death, provided they meet the same requirements.

In either case, the payment of the social security tax must accompany your income tax declaration or return. This responsibility is required by law.

Further information on social security taxes may be obtained at

your nearest Internal Revenue Service office or from the local county agent. Information about benefits can be obtained from your social security district office. If you do not know where these offices are, your postmaster can tell you, says Wooten.

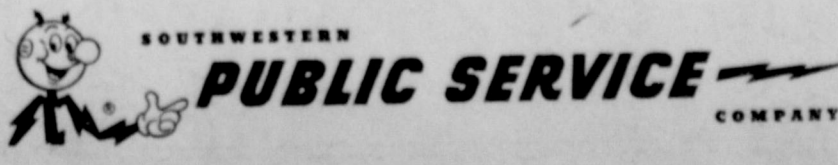

stress the subjects which are added in those grades. Teachers will also exhibit samples of their students' work in each classroom.

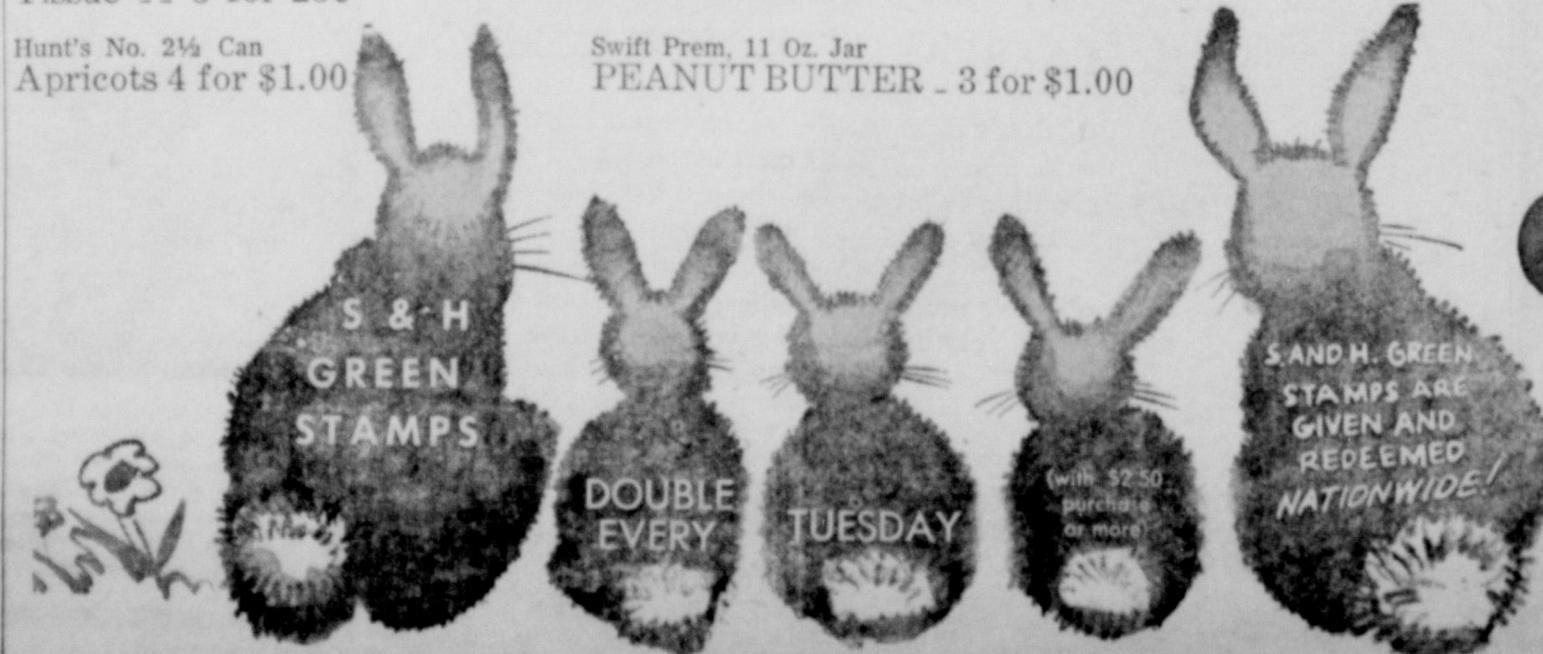

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

Mrs. C. E. Dickson chose this recipe as one she uses more often than any other for a dessert. She says this fruit cobbler can be made in a matter of minutes and is just as good hot or cold. They enjoy pouring cream over it while it is still warm.

Fruit Cobbler

1 cup sugar
1 cup flour
1 stick oleo or butter
1/2 teas. salt
1 can of pie fruit

Method: Mix the first four ingredients together until crumbly. Pour fruit (peaches, apricots, apples or cherries) from the can in a long flat pan, sprinkle crumbly mixture over top and bake about 30-45 minutes in a 350 degree oven until top is brown.

This recipe is especially good for the homemaker who works away from home or when she only has a few minutes to prepare a dessert.

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Slaton, Texas, on the 13th day of March, 1956, in obedience to a resolution and order duly entered by the Commission on the 23rd day of January, 1956, which is as follows:

"RESOLUTION AND ORDER calling an election on the 13th day of March, 1956, in the City of Slaton, Texas, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the question of whether the Commission, on behalf of the City, shall be authorized to enter into a water supply contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and enacting other provisions relating to the subject and purpose of this resolution."

WHEREAS, the City of Slaton is in need of a water supply which may be obtained by contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority; and

WHEREAS, the Commission has received from the Board of Directors of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority notice to call a water supply contract election in accordance with the provisions of Article 8280-154 R.C.S. of Texas, 1925, as amended, such election to be held under the provisions of Article 1109e, R.C.S. of Texas and other applicable laws; and

WHEREAS, the Commission deems it advisable and to the best interest of the City and its inhabitants to call and conduct an election as hereinafter provided for on the proposition hereinafter stated; therefore

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held within and throughout the limits of the City of Slaton, on the 13th day of March, 1956, at which time there shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, the following proposition:

"SHALL the Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, be authorized to contract with the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority for a water supply for said city as authorized by Article 1109e R.C.S. of Texas, 1925, and other applicable laws?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws of this State applicable thereto, particularly the provisions of Article 1109e, R.C.S. of Texas, 1925, and only qualified electors of said City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held at the City Hall in the City of Slaton, Texas, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct, with the election officers thereof as follows:

Mrs. P. A. Minor Clerk

SECTION 4: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.S. Election Code, adopted by the 52nd Legislature in 1951, as amended, and that printed on such ballots shall appear the following:

"FOR THE WATER CONTRACT"

"AGAINST THE WATER CONTRACT"

AS TO THE FOREGOING, each voter may mark out with black ink or pencil one of such expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition; or, in the alternative, each voter may vote on the proposition by placing an "X" in the square appearing on the ballot beside the expression of his choice.

SECTION 5: In the event the results of the aforesaid election are favorable to the proposition for the water contract, the Commission shall pass an ordinance prescribing the form and substance of the contract and directing its execution. A form of said proposed contract is on file in the office of the City Secretary and is there available for public inspection. The contract thus to be authorized will be substantially in such form.

SECTION 6: A substantial copy of this resolution and order signed by the Mayor and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Notice of said election shall be given by posting and publication of a copy of this resolution and order, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF WATER CONTRACT ELECTION." Said notice shall be posted at the City Hall and at two other public places in the City, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in THE SLATON SLATONITE, which is a news-

paper of general circulation, published in the City of Slaton, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election. The City Secretary shall cause said notice to be prepared, posted and published as aforesaid, and make due returns thereof to the Commission.

SECTION 7: Immediately after said election, the officers shall make due returns of the results thereof to the City Secretary for canvassing by the Commission.

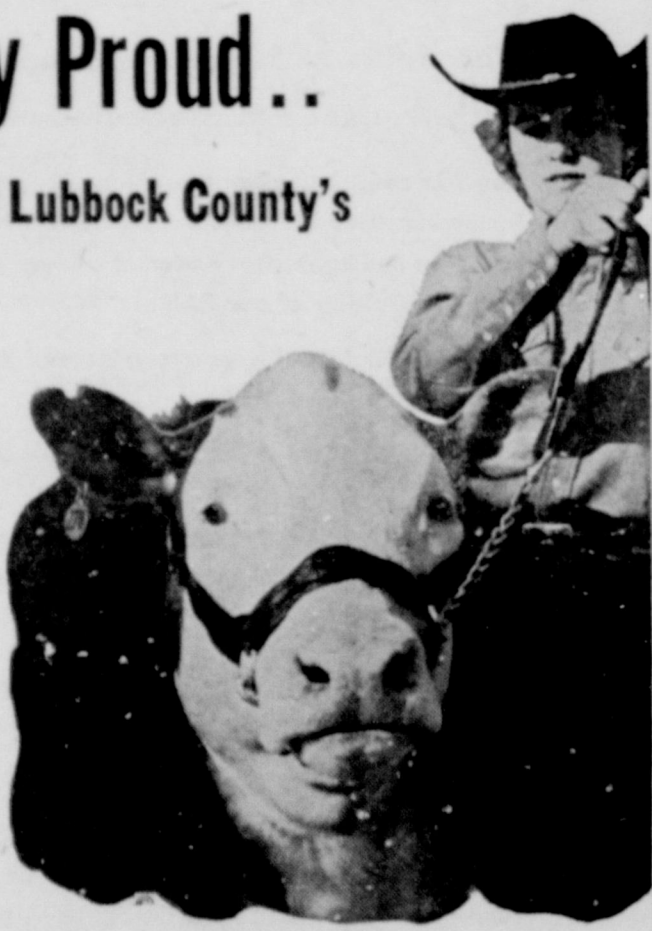

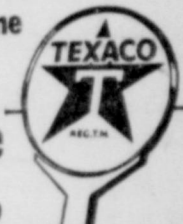
