Tire chains and overshoes were at a premium in the city during the weekend snow storm. Many merchants were sold completely out of chains as motorists were stuck in every conceivable position in city streets. It was not uncommon to see four to six cars stuck at one time at the intersection of 9th and Lubbock Streets. Hoyts Body Shop wrecker pulled eight or nine cars out of the snow during the storm.

Old man winter was responsible for many freak snow drifts and other icy tributes to his art. Mrs. R. M. Nash of 1120 S. 10th St. reported an icicle on the south side of her home that measured 82 inches in length. The storm, she reported, brought with it the most ice that has been on her house

Slippery sidewalks claimed their share of casualties, with at least two people suffering broken bones. Mrs. George Jones and Mrs. F. A. Drewry, both of Slaton, each received fractured arms in falls. Hopart Limmer was bruised when he fell from a sled being pulled behind a car.

IT'S THE PUBLIC'S MONEY!

For many years the Texas Press Association-of which this newspaper, along with a vast majority of all Texas newspapers, is a member-has suggested laws that would require governing bodies of the state, various districts, and municipalities, to open their records to the public.

In many instances, publication of minutes would be required, and in the case of agencies handling public funds, publication of a financial statement would be mandatory.

Some progress has been made in these efforts, but not nearly as much as the importance of the project justifies. There never has been a great deal of opposition to the TPA proposals. But they have been shunted aside for other matters.

Apathy-not opposition-has kept them off the statute

books. Now all Texas is concerned over the numerous, unsavory circumstances that have come to light the past few years. There have been the Duval County revelations; the veterans land investigations; the U. S. Trust and other insurance debacles; to say nothing of smaller local instances of corruption and abuse of public trust of which there have been many.

Men who are in a position to know-such as the Attorney General of Texas-say that none of these things could have gone on for long had there been adequate laws governing PUBLIC NOTICE. It is doubtful that any of them would have been attempted, had there been requirements that official actions be made public.

Proper public notice laws will prevent such things in the future. Such laws automatically lead to good government.

This is an election year. If you think public business should be made public, ask each candidate for the legislature how he feels about secrecy in government affairs. Vote for and support men who pledge themselves to help pass legislation requiring publication of financial reports by insurance companies, county treasurers, and any and all persons who handle public funds.

FREEDOM TO READ

The freedom to read, like other freedoms, needs to be restated-almost to be redefined-in each generation. It is not enough to speak vaguely of constitutional rights. The meaning of "freedom to read" must be set forth clearly for

To do so, however, is not so easy as one might think. There are factors involved today—the paperbacked novels, for example, and the comic books-that did not concern an earlier generation.

Valuable guidance in this task of restating or redefining is to be found in a statement issued recently by the American Book Publishers Council. Noting that freedom to read "is es- STRENGTH FOR sential both to democracy and to a creative culture," the Coun- THE WEEK cil declared in its censorship bulletin:

"We recognize that the freedom to read, like all freedoms, can be used wisely or foolishly. Efforts to improve the quality of choices through which that freedom is exercised are sound, but to deny the opportunity of choice in the fear that it may be unwisely used is to destroy the freedom itself."
