YOUTH HOLDS COURT

A new phase of the campaign of teaching motorists safe driving habits has begun among adolescents. This is a youth traffic court. These are found in several cities such as Tulsa, Oklahoma, and Wichita, Kansas, and are now appearing in smaller communities such as Ponca City, Oklahoma, which has a population of 20,185.

Officials of the courts are elected by fellow students. Their positions are coveted, for only youngsters with reputations for good driving can hope to win such an election. Cases against teen-age drivers are heard and those found guilty are "sentenced" to attend sessions of a special driving school, or to write a theme on a safety subject.

The chief value stressed is the educational value. Attending a driving school, or doing the necessary research for a 3,000-word essay teaches a driver by making him think.

Youth courts have full legal power over the cases they try. If a young driver defies its orders, his case is handed over to the municipal court for trial where sentencing is often se-

For teaching road safety, these courts appear to be of considerable value. Since they do not involve a large expenditure of money, they can be established in any community interested in promoting safety among young drivers.

NEW OIL FROM COAL

An interesting example of the wonders achieved by modern technology may be found today in South Africa, where oil is being extracted from coal.

This is no experiment, nor is it a laboratory process. A plant is actually in operation and when it reaches full production it will turn out 4,500,000 gallons of oil monthly, producing enough gasoline to supply one-sixth of South Africa's

Plans are already being made to double the plant's capacity, at which point it will provide one-third of national consumption. The new coal oil, we are told, has a different chemical formula from the old. It is not coal oil at all in the old sense.

The outcome of this operation is being closely watched by all countries whose coal is plentiful. The chief drawback today is the cost of the plant which has already exceeded \$80,000,000. Yet experience gained by American, British, South African, German, Norwegian and Dutch engineers who have observed the project will bring down the cost of building similar plants. Sale of by-products, such as ammonium sulphate, tar, paraffin waxes, is expected to reduce operational costs somewhat.

The prospects opened up by this technological advance are exciting. In an era when oil can be squeezed from coal, nothing seems impossible. Eventually man may be able to produce the most precious metals by artificial processes. Those THE WEEK old guys who thought metals could be "transmuted" had an idea which refuses to die. As for the new coal oil, it seems to be here. And a new transmutation may be in the wind.

Pumping federal funds into so called depressed areas could easily create an economic "Jack-and-the Beanstalk," with no assurance that the giant would be killed in the end, the National Association of Manufacturers holds.

In a statement filed with a subcommittee of the Senate Commit tee on Labor and Public Welfare, the NAM questioned the need for enactment of S. 2663 which would authorize loans or grants up to \$200,000,000 of federal funds.
