

MUSICIANS' DISCORD

James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, has been charged with building up the welfare fund for unemployed musicians at the expense of the rights of performing artists. This charge was made by the Hollywood, Cal., local. Second largest and one of the wealthiest in the AFM, it is a major contributor to the welfare account.

Contracts with music recording businesses provide that recording artists will pay percentages directly into this fund, which is used by unemployed musicians whether they contribute or not. Hollywood musicians, because of association with movies, television and radio, receive few welfare benefits. Of this they do not complain, but they do claim that during the past two years \$3,000,000 of theirs has been channelled to the fund at the expense of helping employed musicians whom they believe the union should also be representing. They further say that Petrillo has diverted about \$275,000 into a pension fund which benefits only union administrators.

The basis of their argument applies to all union organizations. When unions maintain large welfare funds which are controlled by a few people, some form of accounting is needed which will assure members that this money is being used for their benefit and not to build up the wealth, power and interests of selected individuals. Unless union officials voluntarily provide such accountings, they may evenutally be forced to do so by law, because such funds are too large to be treated as private property.

THE MISSILES ARGUMENT

The recurrent argument as to whether our armed forces ought to be moving faster in development of long-range missiles is at a high pitch again. The average man has a tremendous stake in the outcome.

Much of the debate revolves about this question: Are we ahead of Russia, or is Russia ahead of us? The question is important, and it serves to dramatize the matter. But in a sense it is an academic question, because both the United States and Russia are making rapid progress and will soon possess that terrible weapon, the intercontinental ballistics

Actually, whether we or the Russians have the edge is not the most important thing. Russia is not going to rush into war immediately on achieving this weapon, nor would our possession of it be a final deterrent against aggression.

The really essential aspect is that the intercontinental ballistics missile will soon be reality. When it comes, it will be able to transport a hydrogen bomb warhead some 5,000 miles in about half an hour. For practical purposes, warning STRENGTH FOR time will be reduced to almost zero.

Once such missiles are unleashed, it will not much matter who had them first. Water Inventory **Slated to Continue** In Lubbock Area

Lubbock County in January 1956 contained about 4,630,000 acrefeet of ground water available for pumping. In 1938, Lubbock Councontained about 7,350,000 acre feet of ground water available for pumping and about 2,720,000 acrefeet or 37 per cent of the water was pumped from 1938 to 1956.

Lubbock County

All of Lubbock County, about 570,000 acres, is within the boundary of the Water District. The accompanying maps were prepared from data compiled from a study of about 1,600 logs of water wells and about 400 measurements of water levels in wells.

The map in plate 1 shows the thickness of the water-bearing strata in the Ogallala formation in 1938 from the total volume of satof water had been pumped from the reservoir. The map in plate 2 shows the decline of the water table from the spring of 1938 to January 1956.

Water Volume

The volume of water remaining in the underground reservoir was determined by subtracting the volume of material unwatered since 1938 fro mthe total volume of saturated material in 1938 and multiplying the remainder by the coefficient of storage of 15 per cent.

Some of the irrigation wells in the north central part of Lubbock County draw water from crevices and solution channels in limestone strata in the Cretaceous rocks which underlie the Ogallala formation in that area. Pumping from the so called "crevice wells" causes a decline of the water table in the Ogallala formation; therefore, it is evident that the water in the crevices and solution channels is derived from water in storage in the Ogallala formation. The thickness of the water-bearing material in the Ogallala formation underlying any particular farm, therefore, is a practical measure for the determination of the quantity of water in storage available for

Underground Water Supply

Some areas in the eastern part of Lubbock County have a hundred or more feet of water-bearing material, however, some of the irrigation wells have rather meager yields in gallons per minute. Logs of many of the wells in the eastern part of the county show that the Ogallala formation consists mainly of very fine-grained sandy clay and clay. These fine-grained materials reduce the permeability of the water-bearing strata, and are responsible for the meager yields of the wells.

The approximate quantity of underground water in storage, available for pumping, beneath an individual farm may be determined by multiplying the number of acres in the farm by the thickness of the water-bearing strata underlying the farm and then multiplying by the storage coefficient of 15 per cet.

Suppose the farm consists of 160 acres and has 150 feet of water-bearing strata underlying it, then 160 acres × 150 feet × 0.15 per cent equals 3600 acrefeet of water available for pumping. An acre-foot of water is the quantity to cover one acre to a depth of one foot, and it is also equal to 43,560 cubic feet or 325,-829 gallons.

An individual may use this information to determine, within reasonable limits, how long the quantity of underground water in storage beneath his farm will last at any annual rate of withdrawal. This assumes of course, that his neighbors pump a comparable amount of water per acre on their





When you are ready to build, you will find that the law helps in many ways to make your home enjoyable and secure.

Have you decided on the type house you want and the amount you want to spend? If so, then let's go into details

1. Your lot: Junior's school or your church may be nearby, but

(a) Whether they are planning to run a highway through the area or nearby, or make any improvements for which you can be assessed.

(b) What "covenants" or restrictions run with the land? To protect residents, the plats or basic deeds of some neighborhoods call on you to build a certain size or type of house. Do you want to and can you afford to?

(c) Easements. Either you or your neighbors may need to run pipes, or string wires over each other's land or to share a driveway. Have the abstract checked carefully to disclose any easements.

2. Zoning Ordinances: For your protection the local government frequently zones some areas, for example, for single houses only, for multiple dwellings; for retail stores, for manufacturing, etc.

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
