





Undue pessimism, he said, could be a serious deterrent to efforts to make atomic energy a benefactor rather than a crucifier of humanity. He noted that some progress has been made-international co-operation on developing and building atomic reactors, for example-and commented:

"It should never be forgotten that these results could not have been possible if the world had retreated meekly before those who gloomily insisted nothing could be done.

A healthy skepticism continues to be necessary. As Stassen pointed out, "it would be sheer folly to become falsely secure or to complacently assume that the thermonuclear danger will automatically dissolve and disappear." But just saying the situation is hopeless won't get us anywhere.

HOPPY'S CREATOR

Clarence E. Mulford died recently at the age of 73. He had not written anything for almost 23 years, yet he died one of the most prolific of American writers.

Mulford won no Pulitzer prizes, nor was he ever considered as a candidate for a Nobel prize. He wrote more than 100 novels and short stories, yet even he never considered them literature. He was a journeyman writer who fed the world's appetite for westerns. Judged for what they were intended to be by the man who wrote them, Mulford's stories were well done. His work has been favorably compared with that of Zane Grey.

Perhaps the thing for which Mulford will be best remembered is the character Hopalong Cassidy. This mythical hero of the West rode through a great many movie adventures. The coming of television really brought old Hopalong into his own. Scarcely a child under ten who did not own a Hopalong pistol, a Hopalong sweater, or a Hopalong cereal bowl.

There have been writers who made much greater contributions to literature than Mulford. Few, however, have seen a character they created more widely idolized.

DIRECT APPROACH

Somewhere in Minnesota there is a driver who is wiser than he was before the incident we are about to mention. Early one morning, the driver was stopped at a crossing by a long freight that had just pulled into the yards. He hopped out and uncoupled two of the cars, figuring that when the engine pulled ahead most of the train would stay behind and the crossing would be opened.
