t does get chilly occasionally. The United States weather bureau at Lubbock reported a sharp drop in temperature as a cold mass of air moved in from Canada. Temperatures dropped 14 degrees during the Sunday recordings-to 74 degrees.

It was the lowest maximum reading of any day since May 1 when a high of 73 degrees was recorded. Though rainfall was only enough to whet the appetites of crops and tease sweltering residents the cold front which came with it brought

We have a fair amount of sympathy for those parents who Couldn't stand hours and hours of Elvis Presley, played on the Phoenograph by their 14-year-old daughter. And we think we can understand why the teen-ager ran away when she wasn't allowed to continue her rock-and-roll spree.

There's a fine old scholar who lives down the block from us, immersed in weighty tomes on the archaeology of Mesopotamia and similar intriguing subjects, who has the perfect answer to the Elvis Presleys of this world.

When he heard his granddaughters discussing the boy in the long sideburns, he took his pipe from his mouth, looked reminiscently at the ceiling and remarked: "Presley, Presley . . . I don't seem to know that name. The last time I heard you talkin it was about Rudy—let me see, was it Valley or Mountain? Something like that. Or perhaps it was your mother, or your grandmother . .

Then, he went back to the old stones in Mesopotamia. If you wait long enough things become permanent-or they go away.

MORE TROUBLE COMING

Egypt's seizure of the Suez Canal may be the forerunner of like drastic action elsewhere. An Arab youth congress, sponsored by Egyptian Premier Nasser, calls for the nationalization of all oil companies and other foreign wealth in Arab nations. That would include the possessions of American corporations, and thus would be of great interest to us.

The Arab youth are undoubtedly hot headed and ignorant, but they represent many of the ideas held by their elders. They might easily carry a government further than it wished to go, if for no other reason than the danger of assassination if the officials held back from the popular wish.

So far, Egypt has shown no signs of wanting to embark on this dangerous course. Still, Orientals are traditionally bargainers, and they think it a good idea to hold out the youth congress' proposals as a threat which may be acted on if western governments are not conciliatory. The present trouble in the Middle East may get worse before it gets better.

VACCINE SUCCESS

In the days just after announcement of a successful poliomyelitis vaccine, people reacted with almost hysterical optimism. Then an almost inevitable reaction set in when a mixup occurred and some vaccinated children became victims

Results this year, however, indicate that the Salk vaccine averages out to about 72 per cent effectiveness. In Chicago, of 475,000 youngsters inoculated with the vaccine only 15 contracted polio. Of the 15, only one had had the three-shot treatment. By way of comparison, in a group of 625,000 Chicago youngsters not inoculated, 147 cases were reported.

Chicago has initiated an emergency inoculation program to prevent the spread of polio. This is a justified expression of confidence in the Salk vaccine.





(2) Observation wells continued a decline to all-time lows in live areas of South Central and West Texas. (3) Dwindling stream lows and decreasing storage realted in water rationing in many
