# MAYFIELD FIRST, FERGUSON SECOND IN SENATORIAL RACE; BALDWIN HAS LARGE MAJORITY

In the Senatorial contest Mayfield holds the lead, with Ferguson second and Culberson at third place. Governor Neff continues to hold a safe majority over all opponents.

Practically complete returns indicate the nomination of Hon. R. A. Baldwin to the Legislature from the 119th District over his opponent of Seagraves, Gaines County, by a majority ranging from 600 to 800. It is certain that Mr. Baldwin has carried Lubbock, Crosby, Terry, Hockley and Cochran Counties, with a majority in the five named counties of about 1,300 votes. Incomplete returns from Lynn County show him 31 votes behind, and Mr. Baldwin predicts that he will overcome that lead when the returns are all in. Yoakum County reports indicate a close race, Baldwin claiming the county by a small margin. Dawson County was the only place where Baldwin fell behind to any considerable extent, he being about 250 votes behind on incomplete returns. Gaines County, Roberts' home county, was carried by him by a substantial majority. Returns not yet in are wholly insufficient to make any change in the result.

The election of Bud Johnston of Slaton for sheriff over three very strong opponents by a substantial majority, was the most sensational event of the election. Herbert Stubbs was reelected county clerk, R. C. Burns elecetd tax assessor, Owen McWhorter county attorney.

They were greeted on their arrival at Bloomington by jeering crowds of strike sympathizers.

At Clinton, Ill., where the Illinois Central shops have been under guard of state troops since Saturday night when an outbreak was threatened following a fatal shooting affray, the day passed in comparative quiet. At Aurora, Illinois, where an emergency force of deputy marshals has been no guard since the Burlington have obtained a temporary injunction against

strike sympathizers held a silent parade about the shops.

Aside from a few clashes, the cancellation of some passenger trains on he shorter runs and the opening of shops in various sections of the country there were few developments to lay which day the railroad executives had expected to furnish the turning point of the strike because of the ultimatum of many roads that all strikers who did not return to work would forfeit their seniority

Little disorder was reported as the result of the efforts of the roads to reopen their shops. At Hoxie, Ark., fifty non-union workmen sent there for shop duty were chased out of town by a mob and forced to entrain for Poplar Bluffs, Mo. The Katy shops in Parsons, Kansas, the scene of rioting earlier in the strike, re-opened under protection of 300 national guardsmen with 150 non-union men

At Sacramento, California, there were no signs of disturbance. Southabout 1500 men were at work while union leaders said that 1800 workers were on strike. The Erie Railroad posted at its Chicago headquarters:

"No more men wanted, quota full." The Illinois Central announced that any man returning to work before July 17, would retain his seniority

Some curtailment of train service was reported from St. Louis and Han-nibal, Mo., Louisiana, Illinois, New York and several other states. Interference by railroad strikers in Texas with a mail train was reported to the postoffice department today. J. E. Taussen, president of the Wabash Railroad, appealed to the government for protection for his road's shops, saying strikers had stopped a mail train at Moberly, Mo., by cutting the

# Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin

Washington, July 25, 1922.—Two severe storm periods, most rain of the month, doing damage to northern harvests during weeks centering on August 11, and 26. Similar storms and precipitation on the other five continents near these dates. A little too much rain near these dates for cotton; but cotton cropweather for August will average much better than in earlier parts of the cropseason. Fair cropweather for corn will prevail except in parts of Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska, and Iowa. For these shortage of rain sections the lower strata of moisture, which must come from the Carribean Sea, be carried westward by the trade winds,, will be precipitated southeast of the Boston, Rocky, and Ozark mountains, so that the storm centers coming from northwestward will be short of moisture as they approach the States mentioned. cotton, but cotton cropweather for

After the storm centers turn east-ward sufficient moisture will readily pass over the low lands of the Mississippi and Ohio valleys to assure fair rains to States and provinces east of meridian 90. Near August 22 a a tropical storm will organize southwest of Mexico and move toward the Hawaian Islands. This event will be favorable to better rains in Mexico, our southwestern States and on the Pacific slope. Cropweather of August will be generally favorable to sowing winter grain, but it will not indicate the kind of cropweather for 1923. The severe storms mentioned 1923. The severe storms mentioned for August wil be really severe and you should not get careless about

During August the shortage of rain in Australia, New Zealand and South America will increase and, while there are not what I call a drouthonly a shortage of rain, with very little evaporation—the damage to their Winter grain—being in the na-ture of winter killing—will materially increase; the great drouth in southern Europe will largely increase its damages. Farmers should not sell grain at this time; the world demand on all the agricultural products of North America will be greater next winter than ever before.

Kill the boll weevil and other cotton pests with powdered iron ore, same as iron rust. This was tested 25 years ago, near the Washita river, above Camden, Mo. Best of such ores are found near Birmingham, Ala.; similar ores near Springfield, Mo. Sow powdered iron ore on the cotton now or or with the seed at planting time. Cotton soil is usually on iron and this boll weevil remedy is the very best of fertilizers.

increase eastward.
