"PORK BARREL" VETO

Regardless of politics and personal interests, the country as a whole must applaud the decision of President Eisenhower to veto the \$1,600,000,000 flood control and rivers and harbors bill.

It is an old congressional trick to make a "pork barrel" of rivers and harbors bills. Congressmen manage to get appropriations included which will make them popular with the voters at home. They "log roll" the bill through; that is, they say in effect, "Vote to include my pet project in the bill and I'll vote for yours."

It took courage to veto such a bill in an election year. In doing so the President said that he regretted having to do it. He pointed out that the Congress had given several of the measures inadequate consideration. He declared himself in favor of many of the provisions of the bill.

As the President pointed out, money for the bill would have had to be appropriated at the next session of Congress. This means that the veto should not necessarily delay worthy rivers and harbors projects. It does mean that the congressional log rolling in the last session has gone for naught.

DON'T GIVE UP HOPE

It was one of the delights of boyhood, during several generations of this country's history, to hustle to the circus grounds at dawn of the great day and see that wondrous traveling city go up. The later pleasure of watching the show itself didn't quite obscure the special joy of seeing the big top

Now it appears that both of those childhood pleasures may be denied to the youngsters of a new generation. Ringling Bros. Barnum & Bailey circus has called it quits and gone back to winter quarters. There are other circuses, to be sure, but Ringling Brothers is the last of the big ones.

As recently as the childhood years of those now in middle age, it would have been unthinkable that the circus might some day fade into limbo. There seemed to be a kind of unfailing rhythm in its appearance summer after summer, a thing of entrancing sights and sounds and smells.

But the rhythm has been stopped by a combination of troubles that began in 1944 with the disastrous fire at Hartford, Conn. Next year, Ringlings will be only an indoor show. Its passing may mark the end of an era. But don't give up hope. The traveling circus has shown great vitality in the past. The big top may rise again.

FALSE APPEARANCES

A television news commentator did a rather strange but interesting and useful thing the other night. He sat before the cameras for 15 minutes without once mentioning current happenings. His entire broadcast time was devoted to a sort of illustrated lecture on how a man's reputation can be built up or torn down by the adroit use of adjectives and pictures.

Using various public figures-Secretary of State Dulles, for example, and Adlai Stevenson-as guinea pigs, the commentator shewed how favorable or unfavorable impressions can be created. Photographed smiling and serene, a man may have great public appeal. Photographed shouting something in a speech, or looking up owlishly as he climbs out of a car, the same man may seem coarse or stupid, or perhaps evil.

Much the same thing, the commentator noted, can be done with adjectives. Refer to "pudgy-faced, balding Joe L. J. Schermerhorn. Doakes," and you tend to set the reader against him. Refer to the same man as "that cheerful solid citizen, Joe Doakes," and the reader is inclined to like him.

With almost two weeks of school already gone, the enrollment figares in the Slaton Public School system are complete. This year the enrollment showed a slight drop from 1414 last year to 1410 this

Totals in the various show that the high school has 303 students; the junior high school has 289 students, West Ward has 579 students, and East Ward has 99 students enrolled.

Evans school has not yet begun though enrollment is expected to be about the same this year as it was last year-140.

For the first time in the last four years the first grade enrollment has shown a decrease, super intendent of schools P. L. Vardy Jr. reported. "Ordinarily if this had not happened we would show an increase of about 35 to 40 people. According to national figures as well as local figures this decrease in first grade enrollment is surprising as the figures indicate that there should have been as many first grade students enrolled this year as last year," he went on



- 4. Do the same for the letter "A," then for each of the figures, in order - "8-3-1-0-8."

Don't confuse the letter "I" and the numeral "one" or the letter "O" and the numeral "zero."

When you have finished dialing, you should hear a burr-rr, the ringing sound. If the line is busy, you will hear a fast buzz-buzz.

If you hear the busy signal, or if you hear neither sound, hang up. Wait for a few moments, then try the call again.



Brood Sows

Many farm chores have been eliminated by labor saving devices. but there are a few that are still difficult to adapt to automation. Hog farmers are confronted with one of these in the management of their sows.

Sows have been hand-fed since the beginning of hog farming. Nowadays, some hog farmers are experimenting with self-feeding their sows. Research and experience have shown that sows can be self-fed, although there are problems in doing it.

The problems in feeding brood sows by any method usually involve getting them to eat the right balance of nutrients without eating too much. It's easy to control this by hand-feeding. Self-feeding requires some changes in the feed

ing program.

The good hog man usually wants six pounds of this ration daily, depending on her condition. When

Research at the Ralston Purina farm in Missouri indicates that when ground shelled corn is fed, four parts of corn, one part of supplement, and three parts of ground legume hay make a good ration for self-feeding. Other adjustments are made when other grains are fed,

It will cost a little more to selffeed than to hand-feed. There is roughage and mixing it in the ration. Also, sows may nose around in the feed and blow out some of the chopped roughage to get to the grain, causing wastage. But self feeding sows can be done as a la bor saving device.

Executive Offers 21 Rules for **Buying Used Car**

An estimated 12 to 15 million people every year buy a used car but very few of them really know how to shop properly for the car they want and need. This was pointed out here this week by S. P. Hutchins, Dodge used vehicle manager, who presented 21 rules to guide prospective used car shop-

Hutchins pointed out that customers are often at fault by shop ping "price" rather than quality He pointed out that no two used cars are exactly alike and purchasers who look for price alone too often find that first costs are not "the best deal," as repairs and maintenance can sometimes b

Dealer Facilities

A new car dealer who sells new cars has more facilities, trained personnel, and equipment to con dition his used cars. When proper ly reconditioned, these cars give petter value to the purchaser Hutchins said new car dealers gen erally keep only their better trade ins for retail sale, preferring to sell outright to wholesalers those units not suitable for resale. These remaining "first choice" cars nat urally represent the best value Such dealers frequently offer cus tomers a written warranty which assures the customer of the deal er's confidence in the product he is offering.

Take Ride

Hutchins added that too few customers take a thorough demon stration ride when selecting their purchase. This is the buyer's op portunity to point out the obviou items which should be corrected before delivery.

To point up some of the things a customer should consider, Hutchins sets forth "21 Rules for Buying" as follows:

1) Oil pressure: should be in the mid-range on the indicator and hold steady under acceleration.

2) Tire wear: Check both the outside and inside outer casing for cuts and undue wear. Tread patterns should be even across the tire, indicating proper wheel alignment
