The first meeting of the newly elected directors of the Chamber of Commerce was held Tuesday morning in the offices of R. J. Murray & Co. President B. M. Holland called the meeting to

Secretary-Manager S. E. Staggs presented a large amount of correspondence to the board for its approval.

H. D. Phillips of Lubbock, who has supervision of the Slaton exchange of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, was present by invitation, to discuss serious telephone problems that confront our city at the present time.

Mr. Phillips had already been informed of the pressing need of additional equipment here to handle the demands of our fast increasing population. He stated that the plant was sufficient to care for the needs of Slaton, but evidence was quickly produced which plainly showed that if the company's equipment was sufficient to handle the town, that it was not being done. Instances were cited where parties had made requests for telephones two years ago that had not yet been supplied. Other instances were related where business institutions were unable to get telephone service because of insufficient materials and equipment to supply them.

#### 47 Miners Died in Argonaut Mine Fire

since August 27th are dead, it was announced officially shortly before 9. The mine officials said that the o'clock tonight.

A note found on one of the bodies indicated that all the men had died within five hours of the beginning of the fire on August 27, officials said.

All the miners were found behind the second of two bulkheads they had built in a cross cut 4,350 feet down in the Argonaut mine. Byron Pickard, chief of the federal bureau of mines for this district, was the first man to go behind the bulkhead and discovered the bodies. Pickard, on an earlier exploration behind this bulkhead had

Mine officials declared that the condition of the cross cut behind the bulkhead was such that life could not have been sustained there by the enombed men for more than five hours.

> tions of the men, as evidenced by the bulkheads they built and other mat-ters, indicated they had died within five hours after being entombed.

The officials declared the mute evidence of the men's struggles showed they were 47 of the most cool-headed men imaginable.

Sixteen of the entrapped miners removed their clothes to provide material for stuffing the cracks in the wood-

Argonaut, but the fact that only a bare start was made at it proved, the mine officials said, that the deadly carbon monoxide and the suffocating car-bon dioxide had reached it and per-formed their fatal work before the 47 unfortunates could raise even an ex-

cuse for a barrier. Mine officials said that death had come to the entombed men painlessly. The gases, they said, would produce first a lethargy, then a coma and fi-

ally death.

alive. But news came soon that all the men were dead, and the little hope still held by wives, mothers, fathers, sisters and sweethearts vanished. Knots of people gathered and gave or who had met fate bravely and been

Relatives of some of the dead could be seen walking slowly, calmly to the telgraph office to send word to other relatives in distant cities that there no longer was any hope.

Farm Lands and Products.

Despite the extreme drouth this year Slaton territory is making an average of one-fourth bale of cotton per acre, and with the increased acreage is producing more cotton than last year. #### Foster's Weekly Weather Bulletin

Washington, Sept. 27.—I advise not to sow winter grain on dry soil. There are many risks before those who are interested in planting and sowing for the crops of 1923 and 1924. With confidence I can say to Mexico a great winter drouth, including four or five months, covering the whole of that country, will begin in October, 1923, and ruin a large part of winter farming products and winter grain. But the drouths that will come to America, Canada and Alaska, within those two Canada and Alaska, within those two years will be local, cannot be explain-ed in a general weather bulletin, and therefore must be dealt with private-ly. Australia nad New Zealand have short crops on account of the long foretold shortage of rain—not a drouth—but th egreat drouth, beginning in October, 1922, will ruin their crops and they should prepare for a famine that will hit them about May, 1923. I am not expecting a drouth in North America this year but— after the general heavy rains of October the general heavy rains of October-a rapid decrease of rain may be expected where excessive rains have fallen for several months. I again warn you of great extremes of temperatures in October averaging colder than usual east of Rockies; better weather west of Rockies; better weather west of Rockies.

Sec. 1. North of latitude 47, be-tween meridian 90 and Rockies' crest; highest temperatures Oct. 1 and 16, lowest 3 and 21; average much below normal; excessive rains where sufficient rains have recently occurred and probably some rain in dry places. Severe storms during week centering on Oct. 4 and 12; cold waves and frost following last two dates.

Sec. 2. North of 47 and east of meridian 90. This meridian runs north

Sec. 7. North of 431-2, west of Rockies' crest; highest temperatures Sept. 30 and Oct. 14, lowest Oct. 2; average colder than usual; most severe storms and most rain during weeks centering on Oct. 2 and 10;

Sec. 8. South of 43 1-2, to Mexican ine; west of Rockies' crest; weather

Hartley found her at Per-kins & Stubbs' and asked her about the check, for she had given a different name there. She left the package she had just bought at that store and took Hartley to her husband, who with two children was sitting in a car listening to the band concert. The man immediately gave Hartley the cash for the check. Hartley went back to Perkins & Stubbs' and about that time two or three merchants came in with Sheriff Terry, in search of the woman. Hartley ran back to where he left the parties, but they were

Sheriff Terry telephoned to all the towns in this section immediately, but so far there has been no arrest made. Several searching parties were at once formed to follow the swindlers, but ould never find a trace of them.

The clerks said that the woman was a clever one. She was evidently a nice, refinde woman, and appeared to be a good customer, buying high quality goods and being easy to serve. She bought a set of silver from Dowden Hardware Co. and Carl Brown took her check for \$37, and this was the only instance of her beating any other than a dry goods sto

#### MARRIAGE UNNECESSARY IN RUSSIA, SAY WOMEN

Genoa, Italy, Sept. 26.—Women members of the Soviet delegation have been kept cloistered at Rapallo, a town near here, seeing no outsiders and never leaving the grounds of their quarters.

"The Soviet delegation has no wo-men delegates," according to Bronis-lava Bronskale, who is head of the Bolshevitst clerical department. "Although both sexes are considered absolutely equal in Russia, statesmen are not used to discussing political matters with women. Therefore, women delegates would be placed in an unfair position. However, the Soviet delegation has a large staff of women who attend to closical matters." who attend to clerical matters.

Miss Bronkskale and Bertha Mark, a prominent woman attache of the

delegation, said:

"On coming from Russia we are struck with the difference in the attitude of men toward women. Here a woman is looked upon as just a wo man. In Russia a woman is looked upon as a human being. Love and marriage form the center of European women's lives, but with us they are just incidentals. We are more interested in cultivating our own personalities and doing interesting work than worrying about a kitchen and

"Both legal and religious marriages exist in Russia, but both are unnecssary, as women are independent and ble to take care of themselves. State guarantees sustenance to children an dno woman is obliged to face he misery of social ostracism because she lives a life according to nature's law, even of unmarried. If a woman chooses to have children, the unmar-

ied, it is all right. "All this talk about nationalization of women is sheer rot. It is untrue that the Sovie tregime takes children away from their mothers. The State

merely provides food and shelter.
"Real women are happier in Russia than elsewhere, but that does not apply to the 'clinging-vine' type. The latter kind of women are absolutely lost in the Soviet republic."
