NEW DIRECTORS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MET MONDAY A. M.

The first meeting of the newly elected directors of the Chamber of Commerce was held Tues day morning in the offices of R. J. Murray \& Co. President B. M. Holland called the meeting to order
Secretary-Manager S. E. Staggs presented a large amount of correspondence to the board for its approval.
H. D. Phillips of Lubbock, who has supervision of the Slaton exchange of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, was present by invitaion, to discuss serious telephone problems that confront our city at the present time.
Mr. Phillips had already been informed of the pressing need of additional equipment here to handle the demands of our fast increasing population. He stated that the plant was sufficient to care for the needs of Slaton, but evidence was quickly produced which plainly showed that if the company's equipment was sufficient to handle the town, that it was not being done. Instances were cited where parties had made requests for telephones two years ago that had not yet been supplied. Other instances were related where business institutions were unable to get telephone service because of insufficient materials and equipment to supply them.
Mr. Phillips contended that the company had a dandy switchboard here, but reluctantly admitted that some of the instruments were obsolete but good enough for Slaton.
Mr. Phillips stated that his company was very anxious for business here, yet they cannot furnish telephones to supply the demand-or have not done it so far. It is also a fact that one citizen of Slaton living on one of best built-up streets phone office was required to pay for and set two
poles before they would give him service. This
and was told that they were not putting up any
Mr. Phillips also stated that his company was in position to take care of all the demands for
telephone service in Slaton now. It was suggested that he advertise that fact to the citizenship of the town in order that they might file their applications. So far he has neglected to do so. The telephone representative was given to understand in very plain terms that Slaton expected a telephone system adequate to care for
the needs of the town-and that if the Southwestern couldn't furnish the service some other company would. He was invited to meet again with the directors on next Monday, accompanied by one of the higher-ups in the telephone official A motion was then made to circulate a petition asking the city officials to order a bond election in sufficient amount to either buy or build an electric light plant of sufficient capacity to take care of the town. A committee was appointed to circulate the petition and present it to the city

They ran for about one-quarter of a mile with no one in the wagon but the little girl. In Mr. Reed's effort to stop them they ran over him breaking his neek. The little girl was uninjured.
Dr. W. A. Tucker of this city was summoned but Mr. Reed was dead before he arrived.
Funeral arrangements are held up pending the arrival of relatives from other sections of the State. A more extended notice of this sad accident will appear next week.
