distributing system, extending from Amarillo southward through five counties, is rapidly nearing completion, according to officials of the West Texas GPS Company, the owners. The system is being installed at an approximate cost of \$3,000,000, it is stated, and will serve a population of 50,000.

The following is taken from a story which appeared in the Amarillo Sun, sisue of Sept. 23, by Arthur L. Carna-

"The West Texas Gas Company today turned its supply of natural gas into the city mains of Canyon, Tulia and Floydada and began supplying its customers in those places, according to announcement by General Manager R. F. Hinchey.

"Within the next two weeks, at varying times, service will be provided, likewise, at Happy, Kress, Plainview, Lockney, Hale Center, Abernathy, Lubbock and Slaton, in each of which the West Texas company holds a franchise for furnishing gas. At Lubbock and Floydada the first connections have been made for the industrial ex-hibits for the county fairs.

Plains country, and the service of nat-ural gas is now available for the people of this section for the first time, thus beating the guarantee provided This in the franchise by more than two months, the company having promised gas by Dec. 1.

> "In addition to the municipalities that will be served, there are innumerable rural connections, any farmhouse along the lines of the system being a potential customer. The counties traversed by the West Texas Gas company's system are Potter, Randall, Swisher, Hale, Lubbock and Floyd.

> "Tests made show the gas to be of ceptional heat value. The supply for the territory will come from four corners area of northeast Potter, northwest Carson, southeast Moore and southwest Hutchinson counties, the first well to be connected being the son county.



The use of Hawaiian plneapple juice in summer drinks is not an extravagance, for the fruit itself appears so often in the summer mean, that using up the juice in tempting ways is really an economy. Hawaiian pineapple juice can also be purchased separately in cans. When large quantities are required, it should be used in this form.

Fruit Punches for Crowds Waikiki Punch: (Serves 50) Make syrup of five quarts of water and two pounds of sugar and let it cool. Combine with it the following fruit juices: one quart Hawaiian pineapple juice, one quart lemon juice, one quart orange juice, one quart white grape juice, two quarts black tas infusion, five quarts water, one

Ambrosia Fruit Punch: (Por one gallon) Make a syrup by boiling four cups of sugar and four cups of water until it is abo a quart in quantity. Add to this the following fruit juices: one pint Hawaiian pineapple juice, juice of six lemons, juice of six oranges, juice of six limes, two cups strong tea, eight cups sweet cider, four cups cold water. When ready to serve, add slices of Hawaiian pineapple, orange, and a few strawberries.

Pineappleade: Mix one cup water and one-half cup sugar, boil ten minutes and chill. Add three cups ice water, two cups of the syrup drained from crushed or grated Hawaiian pineapple and one-half cup lemon juice.

Let stand several hours in the refrigerator. If ginger ale is used, add just before serving.



"Old" Dishes Made New

"ready made" fruit adaptable for a lot of clishes, especially when one is in a hurry and can't think of how to give well knewn dishes a different twist.

The simplest fruit cocktails suggest merely piling a cockteil or sherbet glass full of the chilled crushed Hawaiian pineapple, just as it comes from the cap—and topping with a maraschine cherry. Then there are all sorts of more laborate combinations with granefruit, with strawberries and with a mixture of fruits including hanans. One particularly pleasing fruit cup, at this season, is made by filling cantaloupe halves with crushed pineapple and pouring over mayonnaise. 




