GOOD CAMERAS SELDOM WEAR OUT

Prequently people write us that cause it does not have every modthey have found an old camera in their home and wonder if it is still any good. Mere age has little to do with a camera's usefulness. Good photographe can still be made with the cameras Matthew Brady used to take pictures of the Civil War. Like may be pleasantly surprised at the

the cameras Matthew Brady used to take pictures of the Civil War. Like a fine watch, a good camera may look old-fashloned, but with good care they seldom wear out.

Before you try to use a camera that has been out of action for source time, take it to your camera dealer or repair man for a good check-up. Have him inapect the beliows and body for light leaks, see if the shutter needs cleaning or adjustment and polish up the lens. If the camera shows obvious signs of wear or damage, it is best to send it to the manufacturer for a good going over,

A few dollars spent on a thorough worthaul will often make an old camera as good, and sometimes better than new for black-and-white pictures, even though its lens may not be corrected for color. If the old camera has a good lens, don't be in a rush to get rid of it just be-
